## Dead crow tests positive

# West Nile virus detected in county

Tuscola County Health Department officials last week announced that West Nile virus has been detected in a crow found in Columbia Township.

There is no need to panic, according to local health officials, who say the chances of contracting the illness are slim. Still, officials issued recommendations on ways residents can reduce the risk of exposure.

The discovery - a first for Tuscola County - was confirmed based on laboratory testing conducted by the Michigan State University Animal Health Diagnostic Laboratory and confirmed by the Michigan Department of Community Health.

On-going public and animal health surveillance for the virus has not detected any

cases of West Nile virus in humans or horses in Michigan.

Edward L. Kimbrue, environmental health director at the Tuscola County Health Department, said the chances of developing West Nile virus after being bitten by an infected mosquito are less than one percent.

"To give you an idea, over the past 10 years there have been, like 150 cases in the northeast part of the United States, and out of those 150 cases that were diagnosed with West Nile virus, there were (about) 15 who died."

West Nile Virus was first identified in Michigan at the end of August 2001, and officials expected to see the virus again this year. To-date in 2002, 7 birds have been confirmed positive with the disease in Genesee, Ingham, Tuscola, Wayne, Macomb, Branch and Oscoda counties. Health Department officials say taking some simple precautions is the best defense against the virus.

"Reducing exposure to mosquitoes is the key to reducing the risk of contracting West Nile virus," Health Officer Gretchen Tenbusch said.

"Residents of Tuscola County are afforded a certain degree of protection since the county is one of only 3 or 4 in the state to have a countywide mosquito control program," she added.

"However, there are many ways an individual can reduce exposure risks even further."

Tenbusch recommended the

following measures to minimize potential risks of being exposed:

\*Apply insect repellent containing the active ingredient DEET to exposed skin or clothing, always following the manufacturer's directions for use on the label.

\*Avoid applying repellent to children under 2 years of age, and to the hands of older children, because repellents may be transferred to the eyes or mouth, potentially causing irritation or adverse health affects.

\*Maintain window and door screens to keep mosquitoes out of buildings.

\*Drain standing water. Empty water from mosquito breeding sites such as flower pots, pet bowls, clogged rain gutters, swimming pool covers, discarded tires, buckets, barrels and cans.

\*Avoid activities in areas where large numbers of mosquitoes are present. Horse owners are also encouraged to contact their local veterinarian to discuss appropriate preventive measures, including use of approved insect repellents, placing horses indoors during the prime mosquito hours of dawn and dusk, and eliminating standing water.

Mosquitoes become infected with West Nile virus when they feed on infected birds that carry the virus in their blood. After 10 to 14 days, the mosquito's salivary glands become infected, and infected insects can then transmit the virus to humans and animals while biting them.

Crows are very susceptible to West Nile virus and will die within 2 to 3 weeks of infection. Because of this, dead crows are the most sensitive indicator for the presence of the virus in an area.

Health experts say that most people infected with West Nile virus have no symptoms of illness, but some may become ill within 3 to 15 days after being bitten by an infected mosquito.

"Based on preliminary evidence, about one in 4 persons will have mild illness with fever, headache and body aches, sometimes with skin rash and swollen lymph glands," Tenbusch said.

"Encephalitis is less common and may include headache, high fever, stiff neck, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness and paralysis. In a few cases, mostly among the elderly, death may occur."

Tenbusch noted the virus is not transmitted from person to person, horse to horse, or horse to person. People can not get the virus from touching or kissing a person who has the disease, from a health care worker who has treated someone with the disease, or from contact with an infected horse.

### Snover native trains NASA security officers

Mabel O'Quinn laughs when she's asked about the conversation at her dinner table on some nights.

O'Quinn, who was born and raised in the Snover area, now lives in Florida, where she works at the Kennedy Space Center as a NASA federal law enforcement training instructor for Space Gateway Support, a firm that contracts with both the Kennedy Space Center and the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. O'Quinn's husband, Rick, also is employed by Space Gateway Support - as an assistant SWAT (special weapons and tactics) commander. "It's a wonderful job to have," O'Quinn commented Friday morning from her office at the Kennedy Space Center.

O'Quinn's career with NASA began in the fall of 1998, when she was first hired as a security officer. "I've been in management, going on 3 years now, and I've been an instructor for 2 years," she said.

Her work schedule has been particularly hectic since 9-11, and the pace hasn't let up as NASA continues to beef up and maintain a high level of security at its facilities across the country.

"Our pace has been wild and furious. It's been non-stop," O'Quinn said.

"We have increased security, and all other NASA centers are demanding our training because of 9-11," she added. "We've already traveled to California twice, we've gone to Alabama and D.C. - it's going on 3 times now."

The Space Gateway Support Security (SGS) Training section is responsible for conducting security training for all SGS security officers - more than 400 at Kennedy Space Center alone. The department also heads up the NASA Federal Law Enforcement Training (NFLET) Program, which is responsible for tracking and training all NASA and contractor personnel that have federal arrest authority throughout the United States.

Since September, O'Quinn and her fellow instructors

have conducted training at Ames Research Center in California, Marshall Space Flight Center in Alabama, NASA Headquarters in Washington, D.C., and at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory in California.

O'Quinn said she was among 7 instructors who were attending an instructor course at Brevard Community College, Florida, when they heard the tragic news

Sept. 11. Their response was immediate - within 90 minutes all 7 instructors were in uniform and present for duty, and they spent the next 2 weeks assisting shifts in order to maintain a high level of security at Kennedy Space Center.

Later, the instructors put together a special training program for 50 additional contractor security personnel as well as 53 new-hire SGS

security officers.

The training, O'Quinn explained, covers legal issues - criminal law along with Constitutional and basic rights - and human diversity issues such as cultural awareness, ethics and sexual harassment. "Almost half of the class is defensive techniques," she said. "It's exciting and thrilling to train officers (in techniques) that could essentially save their

lives."

O'Quinn noted the officers she trains are charged with ensuring security for space shuttle launches at Kennedy Space Center, as well as rocket launch operations at Cape Canaveral.

It's a job she takes very seriously.

"Even now, we can't quit because if we quit, we're giving

## King flying high in an F-16 Fighting Falcon

When the son of a Snover couple walks onto his driveway in the small town of Cold Lake, Alberta, Canada, tucked into the middle of nowhere, it seems like the entire town comes out to greet him.

It's a common experience this time of year in this re-

mote area where moose and trout far outnumber people.

For Air Force Capt. Ronald J. King, son of Boyd and Linda King, Germania Road, Snover, his driveway is actually a 12,000-foot runway and the commotion that draws the locals to him is an annual NATO exercise dubbed "Maple Flag."

King is one of more than 4,000 pilots, maintenance crew members and support specialists from the U.S., Canada, Germany, England, France, Sweden and

Singapore who recently converged on this Canadian air base to test the skills of new pilots in a combat environment, simulating their first 10 hours of flying sorties over enemy territory.

King is an F-16 Fighting Falcon pilot, normally assigned in Italy with the 555th Fighter Squadron "Triple Nickels."

"I'm getting great experience by working with a large multi-national force. I'll be able to better understand how other nations and weap-

ons systems operate in a combat environment," said the 1993 graduate of Marlette High School.

"Mission planning is a challenge because of the large number of aircraft in the operation. Developing a solid mission plan and then executing it in the skies is our goal - but we have some of the best pilots in the world flying against us looking to upset our plans."

American fighter units from as far away as Japan and Italy converge on this remote air base to insert their newer fighter pilots into formations with more experienced pilots. Teams of aggressors from Nellis Air Force Base, located outside of Las Vegas, Nev., serve as realistic adversaries against the young pilots and provide them training intended to save their lives in the early stages of real combat.

"The coordination with other nations and units gives me a better understanding of their strengths and weaknesses. This understanding helps greatly for real-world operations where being based together and briefing together are rare events," said the 1997 graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy. "In today's world climate, it's essential that we're all able to work together efficiently


On the other hand, after a nightmare, you may feel anxious and be out of sorts all day without really knowing why.

Well, here's some good news. The old building where I attended school is being replaced with a brand new structure, featuring quiet classrooms, a teacher's lounge, flush toilets — the works!

My old school district finally got a bond issue passed with enough money to build a new elementary school. I'm happy to see it, too. Some folks might get nostalgic about antiquated buildings, but I don't.

To top it off, each kid had a big pair of clodhoppers or cowboy boots to clomp around in. Class changes sounded like The Wave at a professional football game.

I don't know how schools are made in the Netherlands, but I can guarantee wooden shoes would have closed down St. Paris Elementary.

The walls in our school were pretty thin, too. If a kid was real bright and blessed with good hearing, he could complete three grades at once — without ever leaving his seat.

Reading was taught by phonics in those days; and we had teachers who could sound termites out of the walls.

My third grade teacher was a good example. Mrs. Lambert (not her real name) was a little bit deaf, and she could shout "A-E-I-O-U" in such a way that two janitors learned to read by the sounds coming from the third grade room.

The first thing we learned when I was a kid was the ABCs. The smarter kids mastered the whole alphabet, but some of us just got the ABCs.

At the same time the first graders were learning their ABCs, Mrs. Lambert was administering the A-E-I-O-U to the third graders. If a kid stood in the hallway too long, he listened to "A-E-I-O-U-W-X-Y-Z" until he couldn't remember which grade he was in.

Mrs. Lambert had it in for us farm kids. She thought we were a privileged group and was fond of saying, "You farm kids won't ever have to

worry about jobs or money. When you need some food, all you have to do is go out and kill a pig."

I can remember standing in the hallway listening to the second grade reading, "Run, Spot, run," when suddenly from the third grade Mrs. Lambert would interject, "Go kill a pig!"

Each time I go to a polling

booth to vote on a school levy I remember my old school and the noise that seemed to permeate the place. I think about today's kids and their need for more computers, or a band room, and a stage.

All of those things are fine; but I still believe the greatest advance in education has been nice, quiet rooms with good insulation.

# Dubs new Gagetown chief

The Gagetown Village Council has hired a former Huron County police chief to serve as the village's new chief of police. Aaron Dubs is scheduled to begin his duties early next month.

The hiring didn't come without some controversy; council members voted 4-3 in favor of Dubs, who was arrested last January in Huron County on a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.

Dubs, who was not on duty at the time, was suspended without pay by his former employer, the Fairhaven Township Board, pending the outcome of the case. He later pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 30 days in jail.

The incident wasn't Dubs' first involving an arrest. Michigan State Police troopers from the Bad Axe post arrested him in 1999 on suspicion of drunken driving. However, Prosecutor Mark Gaertner dismissed the

charge, saying troopers didn't have a legal basis for the traffic stop.

Gagetown Village President Charles Wright, who cast the tie-breaking vote last week, said he agreed with council members who feel Dubs should have another chance.

"That's the way we feel. The man deserves a break," Wright added. "We sat there and he (Dubs) told us the whole past, and he said he's trying to turn his life around. And he knows that if he doesn't go straight, he'll be done."

"I checked with Owendale Village President Walter Howard and a council member, and the Huron County Sheriff's Department before I made my decision," Wright continued, noting Dubs previously worked for Howard as a police chief. "They all told me Aaron did a real good job."

Dubs was one of 3 candidates who applied for the

position. The others are Mike Stec and former Gagetown police chief Ken Currey, who resigned last August, citing differences of opinion with the council.

"I like Mike Stec real well, but he works for the city of Caro and he doesn't get out until 8 p.m., so there's a conflict with his hours," Wright said. "And Ken has had problems with the council before."

Trustee Bill Ehrlich, who along with trustees Rita Lopez and Tom Reehl voted against hiring Dubs, said he wanted the council to seek some additional candidates for the job before making a decision.

"The citizens gave us a millage to have a police officer, and I don't think this is the way we should have went. Our money could have been better spent," he said. "I just wasn't happy with it. I wanted somebody with no clouds hanging over their head."

At the same time, Ehrlich indicated he respects Dubs forthright approach with the council.

"It took a lot of guts to do that," he said. "I'm sure he'll do a good job."

The Chronicle could not reach Dubs for comment.

Gagetown has been without a police officer since Currey's resignation last summer. Village officials eliminated the department because of financial problems. However, residents solved those problems during a special election in May when they approved a 7-mill tax levy, providing an additional \$20,000 in revenue annually. About half of the money will be used to fund the police department.

Dubs will work part-time, about 15 hours a week, according to Wright, who said the council has not yet set his pay rate.

## Dumping unwanted cats, dogs only adds to problem

This letter is written to the person who dumped 3 adult cats and 5 kittens along the roadside near Greenland and Reed Roads, east of Cass City. It is also written to anyone else who has ever dropped kittens, puppies, and unwanted animals along the side of a country road.

We are given stewardship over the earth and it's animals. Some may take the view that animals will live and die by Mother Nature and things will just fall into their appropriate places. Some may think (or hope) that other people will pick up the slack for them and take care of their throwaway animals. Perhaps you think leaving an unwanted animal along a country road is more humane than taking them to the shelter where death is a high probability.

Whatever your reasons are, the end results are often cruel and inhumane.

Because my name is often referred to others as someone who is active with a local companion animal organization, I received a call recently from a Good Samaritan who had happened upon your throwaways. These three kittens were half starved and have upper respiratory infections. One of the kittens had fly eggs on its body and would have been slowly eaten alive had it not been rescued. They are only 5-6 weeks old, the sickest one weighing only one pound. Along with these three tiny survivors were 3 adult cats and two kittens that had already been killed on the road.

You may ask how the medical information is known on

these kittens. It's because this Good Samaritan took responsibility and paid out of his pocket to take them to the veterinarian!! He took care of your throwaway animals.

If you don't want kittens and puppies, does the phrase spay/neuter come to mind? Yes, it costs a little money, but so do your kids. If you are not willing to take financial responsibility for your pets, then you shouldn't have one.

The Humane Society of Tuscola County offers discounted certificates to aid in

the cost of spaying and neutering. The Cass River Pet FriendZ has offered drawings to pay the entire cost of a spay/neuter, one drawing of which will be available at the Tuscola County Fair this year.

Every year thousands of homeless pets are euthanized in shelters because there aren't enough homes for them all. In the year 2001, the Tuscola County Animal Shelter took in 1,302 dogs and cats. Out of that number 72 were reclaimed by their owners, 396 were adopted

out and the remaining 1,175 were euthanized or sold to a class B dealer (someone who then turns the animals over for medical research).

The kindest thing you can do for your pets is to have them altered so they aren't adding to the already outrageously high pet population. Dumping them along the side of a country road isn't the answer, it only perpetuates the problem.

# Bob Papovich: whatever happened to common sense

A little of this and a lot of that.

Mike Byron's letter last week was right on target. His letters are typically "right on target". Unfortunately, his politically incorrect logic, as logic usually does, will elude most if not all of the socialists who had the privilege to read it. Whatever happened to common sense?

Two weeks ago the CCC reported that a 2.0 grade average was necessary for a student to take drivers training. That policy is extremely discriminatory and, in my opinion, defies all logic. Not always, but generally speaking, students from more affluent families get higher grades than do students from poor families simply because their parents generally have more education. And, generally speaking, driving is a luxury, seldom a necessity, for more affluent children.

They don't really need to work to survive. On the other hand, students from less affluent families may have no choice but to work while still in school, sometimes to help support the family. And, generally speaking, one needs transportation to go to work. For them driving may well be a necessity, not a luxury.

The parents of students who get poor grades also pay taxes to support the drivers education program and I'm certain it's often times a financial burden to provide private drivers training for their children. We're not talking about an extra-curricular sport - an insignificant "game". This may be an unaffordable necessity for some unfortunate students. Anyone who has spent any time driving around the north-west metro area knows that a higher degree of affluence and education have nothing to do with one's ability to drive. You'll find some of the best educated worst drivers in the state in that area. The 2.0 policy is bass ackwards to say the least. Whatever happened to common sense?

A few weeks ago Tim Brown wrote a letter suggesting that there should be 0-mills property tax. Ditto to everything he said. It's good to know that some people still have their head screwed on straight and understand what "property rights" actually means in this country. Taxing private property is a jurisdictional scam and the people imposing the scam are corrupt to the core. Since "the pursuit of happiness" has always meant the "right" to acquire and own private property, how can anyone impose a tax on that right? If a right can be taxed it's no

longer a right, it's a privilege. The "pole tax" and it's judicial demise is a perfect example of this legal truth. Could it be that when you register your deed with the county you have voluntarily relinquished your "right" to that property and given the county jurisdiction over it, a jurisdiction foreign to your Constitution? Something to think about.

To prove my corruption point: Almost every year I go before the township to protest property assessment increases. If I do not it's an unfortunate oversight, not intentional. My wife owns a small piece of property in Novesta Township and around ten years ago they raised everyone's assessments by approximately 11% to 12%. They increased my wife's assessment from \$9,000 to \$10,200. I asked them from where did they get this magic number? They said Tuscola County gave them a list of the real estate transactions from the previous year and it averaged the increase reflected in our assessment. They showed me the list and, sure enough, 9 properties sold for considerably more than the assessed value and 2 sold for less. It seemed totally on the up and up.

Then I asked if these were all of the properties that were sold in Novesta Township during the previous year. They said this is what the county gave them and if I needed more information I had to go to Caro. So I did. A very young and perhaps naive, helpful public servant brought up the real estate transactions on the screen of the computer and let me have at it. It seems there had been more than 150 real estate transactions in Novesta Township the previous year (not 11), more than 80 of which were warranty deed transactions wherein the county had recorded the previously assessed value, the asking price and the sale price. I didn't need to do the math to realize there was a major problem here, which I brought to the township's attention and I'm certain that my "discovery" was relayed to the county.

Since I couldn't see any reason for the increased value of the property, my protest was only that they leave the assessment at \$9,000. When the decision from the township came in the mail I was shocked to say the least. They not only agreed to keep the assessment at \$9,000 - they reduced it to \$7,000!!! The following year I didn't even go to protest the assessment and they reduced it again to \$6,300!!! Now a cynical person might consider this a bribe to keep my mouth shut about the fraud I'd discovered. For those who care to pursue it, remember, fraud has no statute of limitations.

Two years ago I went to the same office in Caro and again asked for the real estate transactions. To assume that 8 years later Tuscola County did not have a more up to date computer system complete with printers would be utterly ridiculous. A much older, more experi-

enced and less helpful public servant told me that they didn't have that information in this office. I told her that I got the information there before and she assured me they never had that information in her office. She lied, pure and simple. She then sent me to the Annex (?) Building where they turned me on to large file cabinets containing the information I requested. It would have taken me weeks to review all the files that would only have taken minutes to review on a computer screen. I didn't have weeks so I left in frustration.

The reason I'm relaying this "experience" to anyone who is interested should be obvious. The property assessments have gone up drastically this year and it wouldn't surprise me if this historical fraud has repeated itself, perhaps annually. Those who don't care how high their assessments are because they can only raise the actual tax a few percent a year should keep something in mind. Should you sell your home, the new owner will pay taxes on the most recent assessed value minus homestead exemption. "Let the next guy worry about it," you say? Well, when you sell your home where will you go? You'll buy someone else's home, and now you're the "next guy" paying taxes on those most recent high assessments.

I always thought the upper echelons of government had a corner on the corruption market but experience has shown me that corruption starts right here at the bottom of the barrel. And, as we all know, the scam always rises to the top.

A few months ago it was reported that Governor Engler was offering early retirement to thousands of state employees and for every four that retired the state would hire one employee to replace them. What was not reported but should have been obvious to any thinking citizen is that for all these years the lucky taxpayers of the State of Michigan have been paying four state employees to do the job of one! And now those lucky taxpayers will have the opportunity to pay full lifetime retirement benefits to thousands of state employees who have been doing only 25% of the job they were getting paid to do. Fairness should dictate that these state employees pay back to the taxpayers the 75% they were overpaid. But to force them to do that would be impractical and cruel and we certainly wouldn't want to emulate government. But, in all fairness to the taxpayers, they should only receive 25% of their retirement benefits.

During his radio broadcast a few weeks ago Paul Harvey said: "Not enough government and someone steals your strawberries. Too much government and the government steals your strawberries."

It's July, 2002. Do you know who's stealing your strawberries?





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## Farmers getting set to battle insect problems

Now that planting and early weed control efforts are wrapped up, it's time for farmers to head back out into their fields to scout for potential insect problems.

Several major Michigan crop pests are now or soon will be showing up, says Michigan State University (MSU) assistant professor of entomology Chris DiFonzo. He recommends that farmers begin scouting their fields now to be on top of the situation if populations approach economic thresholds.

DiFonzo has received scattered reports of armyworms in cornfields across the state. The pests have been found only in weedy or cover-cropped fields, which have more potential for armyworm problems. There have also been a few reports of armyworms in wheat in Sanilac County. Southwest Michigan farmers need to be alert for European corn borer (ECB), which has been found at threshold levels in fields in Van Buren and Berrien counties. Farmers farther north may have an additional one to 2 weeks before they see any ECB evidence, but they should also begin considering control options.

"The insecticide choice is not as important as scouting," DiFonzo says. "Growers need to get out and examine their crops and then make decisions about treatment before the borers make their way into the stalks." Though it might seem like a timesaving option to mix a pesticide and a herbicide, growers should read label directions or contact their county MSU Extension office to avoid possible interactions. Soybean aphid populations have been increasing at the MSU Saginaw Valley Bean and Beet Research Farm.

near Saginaw, and smaller numbers have been found in fields on the MSU campus and at the university's Southwest Michigan Research and Extension Center, near Benton Harbor, so DiFonzo advises growers to monitor their fields for this relatively new pest. DiFonzo also says that she has had reports of cereal leaf beetles exceeding threshold numbers in several Clinton County oat fields. Growers have several options for treatment, but should check labels to make sure their chosen product is registered for use on oats and has an acceptable pre-harvest interval. # Tuscola, Sanilac part of ag disaster declaration

In a continuing effort to expedite emergency disaster declarations in areas hit hard by adverse weather conditions, the U.S. Department of Agriculture last week designated 50 Michigan counties, including Tuscola and Sanilac, as agricultural disaster areas.

The designation will make farmers in those areas immediately eligible for USDA emergency farm loans.

"This assistance will go a long way in aiding farmers devastated by severe weather," said Deputy Agriculture Secretary Jim Moseley, who was in Michigan last week to speak to participants at the Ag Expo in Lansing.

"We will continue to implement every available USDA program to assist farmers and ranchers through these difficult conditions."

USDA officials designated 26 counties as primary disaster areas. They are Allegan, Antrim, Benzie, Berrien, Cass, Genesee, Grand Traverse, Ingham, Ionia, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Kent, Lapeer, Leelanau, Livingston, Macomb, Manistee, Mason, Muskegon, Newaygo, Oakland, Oceana, Ottawa, St. Clair, Shiawassee and VanBuren counties.

Also eligible for assistance because they are contiguous are Barry, Branch, Calhoun, Charlevoix, Clinton, Crawford, Eaton, Gratiot, Hillsdale, Kalkaska, Lake, Lenawee, Mecosta, Missaukee, Montcalm, Osceola, Otsego, Saginaw, St. Joseph, Sanilac, Tuscola, Washtenaw, Wayne and Wexford counties.

The emergency declaration makes all qualified farm operators in primary and contiguous disaster counties eligible for low-interest loans from the Farm Service Agency (FSA), provided eligibility requirements are met.

Farmers in eligible counties have 8 months from the date of the declaration (July 16) to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses.



The proposed constitutional amendment would:

- Allow certain permanent and endowment funds, including Natural Resources Trust Fund, State Parks Endowment Fund and Veterans Trust Fund, to be invested as provided by law, eliminating prior restriction on investing in stocks.
- Increase Natural Resources Trust Fund cap on assets from \$400 million to \$500 million.
- Allow the Natural Resources Trust Fund to continue to annually expend up to 33-1/3% of Fund royalties or other revenues, up to a new asset cap of \$500 million.

## 5 YEARS AGO

This year members of the livestock club received Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion honors in all of the categories of the large animal show at the Tuscola County Fair, except in dairy cows. Lucile DeLong said this kind of a success makes a statement about the club.

Dee McKrow, chief executive officer of Hills and Dales General Hospital, has accepted an appointment to serve as a member on the Michigan Health & Hospital Association Council on Small and Rural Hospitals for the 1997-1998 program year. The purpose of the council is to provide a forum for small or rural hospitals to provide input into the policy and decision making of the Michigan Health & Hospital Association.

It appeared the entire community turned out to attend a benefit for one local woman. Friends and family gathered by the hundreds Friday at the VFW Hall of Cass City to attend a benefit for Tammy Ehrlich, a Gagetown resident formerly of Cass City, recovering from life threatening pneumonia.

## 10 YEARS AGO

L.E. Althaver, chairman, president and chief executive officer, Walbro Corporation, reported sales of \$62,721,000 for the second quarter ended June 30, compared with \$52,574,000 for the same period in 1991. Net income for the quarter was \$3,549,000 compared with \$1,448,000 for the second quarter of 1991.

Work on the new Edison plant in Cass City is the start of something big. Big in size of the building and perhaps in what it means to the future of the community. The building requires 250 tons of steel. Over 300 truck loads will be needed to supply 3,000 cubic yards of concrete. The building will be nestled in 3 acres asphalt paving and to make the site

ready, over 35,000 cubic yards of dirt will be moved. Rain early last week threatened to put a damper on Cass City's annual Sidewalk Sale Days, July 15-18. But as it turned out, timing - not weather - had the biggest impact, as similar promotions held in other area communities at the same time cut into local sales.

## 25 YEARS AGO

Receipt of the federal grant for planning the Cass City wastewater treatment plant renovation project has been delayed again, the village council was informed Tuesday night. Even when the grant is received, there still remains a question mark whether the village will receive federal money to build the plant improvements and expansion.

Demolition of the old and construction of the new portions of Owendale-Gagetown High School won't start until late September, the Owen-Gage School Board was told at a special meeting Monday night. Jim Giachino of Construction Coordinators, Inc., of East Detroit, told the board that construction costs have been increasing at 3/4 percent a month since voters approved the school bond issue in December, 1975.

Cass City will receive a Pedestrian Safety Citation in the American Automobile Association's 38th annual Pedestrian Safety Inventory for going four years without

a pedestrian fatality.

## 35 YEARS AGO

Unemployment figures in the nation rose to four percent of the total civilian work force in June, reaching the highest level since 1965. In addition to the national rise in unemployment, the size of the labor force increased. Carl Oehmke, Michigan Employment Security Commission, Caro, reports similar June and July statistics on the state and county employment scene.

Cars driving by stopped and the people stared at the men working atop the radio tower. At the 250-300 foot level, the men were nothing more than black specks clinging precariously to a thin shaft of metal. and effectively." Living conditions in this barren stretch of Canada are Spartan at best and go far in reflecting the life they would mirror in actual combat.

The U.S. hosts, normally stationed near Las Vegas, have tagged high-priced resort hotel names such as "Luxor," "Excalibur," and "Bellagio," to accommodations that range from rundown barracks to large cargo containers.

"I'm staying in a hotel off-base with one roommate. Our Canadian hosts are friendly and helpful, and the wildlife and scenery are something to see," said King. "I'm really enjoying this experience."

King and his fellow airmen are out to prove they're the best at what they do. And, for now, they've got the 'coolest' driveway in town.

ing them (terrorists) an opening to take advantage of us again. We're not letting our guard down," she said. "Especially with the space shuttle. What better a target to get to the American public than the space shuttle?"

Interestingly, the road that led O'Quinn to NASA started with a stint in the U.S. Air Force, where she served as a security officer. But it was her first career choice that

landed her in Florida.

The 1986 Sandusky High School graduate entered the service right out of high school.

"At the time I didn't want to go to college, but when you get out you realize that you have to (further your education)," she recalled. "That's when I got my degree."

O'Quinn left the Air Force in January 1992. She attended Delta College for 18

months, then transferred to Black Hills State University in Spearfish, S.D., where she earned a bachelor's degree, majoring in biology and minoring in chemistry.

"I was looking to get into anything dealing with animals," she said of her career choice. O'Quinn also narrowed her choices of where she wanted to work - it would be either Alaska or Florida.

As it turned out, the first job offer came from Florida, and O'Quinn found herself working with sea turtles as a biological science technician for the National Park Service in Titusville, Fla.

Ten months later, her experiences in the Air Force opened up a job opportunity in security at Kennedy Space Center. "I didn't want to move back to Michigan - I love the weather here, can't beat it," she said. "I figured, hey, Kennedy Space Center? Yeah."

O'Quinn counts herself very fortunate, but she attributes much of her success to a strict upbringing in the rural Thumb, and the support of her parents, Carolyn Fleming of Snover and the late John Fleming, along the

way. "They just taught us to never quit," she said.
