Drug task force arrests trio

Sanilac Drug Task Force officers recently arrested a trio of suspects following separate drug-related inves-

The first investigation involved anhydrous ammonia thefts and methamphetamine production in central and southwestern Sanilac County, and the second involved cocaine trafficking in western and southwest portions of the county, according to drug task force Direc-

tor William Gray. "In the early part of September the task force began an investigation into several reported thefts of anhydrous ammonia from storage facilities in the central portion of Sanilac County," Gray said.

"On multiple occasions large commercial storage tanks containing anhydrous ammonia were found to have been tampered with after being left locked but unattended during non-business

Anhydrous ammonia is a primary ingredient illicitly used in the production of methamphetamine. The most common method that "meth cooks" use to acquire anhydrous ammonia is by

breaking into commercial storage facilities or farm stor-

age tanks. The drug task force had already set up a surveillance operation at a storage facility in the Sandusky area Sept. 13 when a citizen reported that a suspicious vehicle had dropped off 2 men wearing ski masks at the Crop Production Service storage fa-

cility in Brown City. The drug task force, Sanilac Sheriff's Road Patrol and Brown City Police Department all responded to the Brown City incident.

"A vehicle matching the

description given by the caller was located occupied and parked in a closed business across the street from Crop Production Services. Gray said. "The 26-year-old driver of the vehicle gave officers conflicting and unsatisfactory explanations for his presence in the area."

form of state revenue sharing doesn't offer long-term security, but it's better than losing revenue sharing altogether. The state House recently

voted on 2 bills that save local communities from significant funding cuts.

The legislation will shift property tax collections from December to July over a 3year period and create a pool of funding, using one-third of the tax collections. Counties will be able to draw from the pool to fund what the state is no longer paying them in the form of state revenue sharing.

For the state, the solution erased \$183 million in red ink by the start of the new fiscal year Friday.

An alternative proposal would have eliminated state revenue sharing altogether. something state Rep. Tom Meyer said was not acceptable.

communities continue to fund the necessary services that protect people," said Meyer (R-Bad Axe), who supported the legislation. "Many departments, like fire and police, have already set their budgets for the upcoming year; we need to make sure that these services have the money to function prop-

Tuscola County Controller Mike Hoagland emphasized that the property tax collection shift does not mean higher tax bills for residents.

"It is not a property tax increase; it is a 'roll forward' of when you pay your taxes. You will be paying your taxes sooner," he explained, noting the collection applies only to the county's general operating levy of 3.93 mills.

Under the shift, residents will pay their property taxes as usual this December, and one-third of the collection will be set aside to create a revenue sharing fund, leaving the county with twothirds of its normal general fund revenue.

"There will be some cashflow issues, but generally, we think they're not insurmountable," he said. Residents will first notice

the shift in July 2005. "Tax-

sharing pot," Hoagland said. "Then, in December 2005, two-thirds of the levy will be collected. In July 2006, two-thirds of

the levy will be collected, with the remaining one-third collected in December 2006. In 2007, all of the levy will be collected in July.

"In essence, we will end up with the equivalent of one year of our normal allocated millage levy," Hoagland, who added the allocated 3.93 mills generates about \$4.7 million, which is used to pay for all county services not funded by special millages or other earmarked revenue sources.

Hoagland pointed out that the tax shift will provide the county with roughly \$982,000 in what was state revenue sharing funding. The shift will not reinstate thousands of dollars the county has lost in recent vears.

Tuscola County has an annual budget of about \$11 million. Over the past 4 years, the county has lost a combined \$1.15 million from state and county sources. Those losses include more than \$400,000 in state revenue sharing dollars.

While the tax shift will buy some time, some counties, including Tuscola, will find themselves in serious financial trouble again in just a few years.

"One of the most important

points I can stress is this approach offers much more security to some counties than to others," said Hoagland, referring to state officials' suggestion that the newlycreated funding pool should last from 4 to 27 years.

For Tuscola County, he added, the funds generated by the tax collection shift aren't expected to last more than 4 years, largely because of the county's low allocated millage and a weak tax base. "So, there's a day of reckon-

Following PTO accident

A Cass City man is continuing to recover from serious injuries he suffered in a power take-off accident and a subsequent stroke in late

John Doerr, 45, is expected to be released from the hospital Friday, but will face extensive rehabilitation in the coming weeks, according to his wife, Barb Doerr.

"He's coming along, but he's got a long ways to go," said Doerr, who noted her husband's stroke left him paralyzed on the right side and robbed him of his speech.

Doerr was injured Aug. 29 at his property on Huron Line Road, where he was running a brush hog. "We were just cleaning up deer camp and getting ready for fall," recalled Barb Doerr. At some point, she said, John stopped the machine after thinking he had struck a small log. He reached up into the equipment and his arm became

"We found out later that a part on the tractor that runs the PTO broke and tore the gears off," she continued.

When he went to turn it off and see if there was something in there, it caught him Barb Doerr noted she was

on her way back to the property at the time. She said she arrived at about the same time as a neighbor, Bob Joseph, who had heard John Doerr calling out. Doerr, who suffered several

breaks in his right arm along with massive tissue damage. was transported to Hills and Dales General Hospital, then airlifted by LifeNet helicopter to St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw, where orthopedic surgeon Dr. Brian C. deBeaubien immediately erformed surgery to repair the damage.

The 4-hour surgery went well, but Barb Doerr, who works as a registered certified nursing assistant at Hills and Dales, noticed that something wasn't right when she returned to the hospital. Her husband had suffered a stroke.

"They're not really sure when the stroke took place. It could have been at the time of the accident, before the surgery or after the surgery," she said.

Doctors performed a CT Scan, which confirmed Doerr had suffered a stroke on the left side, causing swell-

ing of the brain and paralysis on the right side of his body.

How quickly Doerr will recover is difficult to say, but Barb Doerr said there have been some promising signs, including John getting some movement back on his right side. "At this point he still has some swelling, but he's improving every day," she added. "He lost his speech, but he's slowly getting a word here and there out that we can understand."

Doerr spent 19 days at St. Mary's and has since been undergoing rehabilitation at the Marlette Community Hospital Center for Rehabilitation.

Throughout the ordeal, family and friends have rallied around the Doerrs with encouragement, cards, prayers, and offers to help. Barb Doerr said a handful of friends got together and held a garage sale, then donated the \$500 in proceeds to the family. "It's been pretty amazing," she added.

"It's still a waiting game. You just don't know," she said, referring to the time it will take for John to recover. "At least we're getting him home

Proud to be an American

Brooks anxious to cast first vote in general election

Draw June Brooks into a conversation about politics and you can count on getting an earful from a very enthusiastic citizen, a staunch supporter of John Kerry, an advocate of exercising the right and privilege to vote.

A proud American.

Brooks moved to the United States from her home in Birmingham, England, just a few years ago when she married her American husband, Bob Brooks. She's spent a great deal of time since then working towards earning her citizenship here, and she realized that goal in July, when she was sworn in during a ceremony held in Troy.

"It's a long complicated

thing, especially with this terrorism going on," Brooks said of the process, which began with an interview and concluded about 3 years later after she passed her citizenship test with a perfect score. In between, the Cass City resident annually renewed her green card and employment card.

And she studied American history, preparing for a written test that would qualify her to take the oath of citi-

While the test itself consists of only 10 questions, there are a possible 100 questions, "so you have to learn them all. You just don't know which ones they're going to ask," said Brooks, who figures she spent countless hours studying American

history and government. "I'd take the thing (study guide) to work and I'd have people ask me questions," she said.

Brooks' drive to participate in the American political process stems from her zealous opposition to the war in She admitted her strong

views on the issue had her at odds with her husband at first, and that he wondered at one point whether she felt the same sort of disdain for the United States and Americans in general as she does for President George Bush. But that wasn't the case at

"I wasn't really bothered about becoming a citizen at first," Brooks recalled, adding she reassured her husband that she just feels very

strongly that America needs another leader in the White House

"I like this country," she said. "I gave up a lot to come. to this country - I've got 3 (grown) children at home, and grandchildren." Brooks said she has always

felt strongly that United Nations inspectors should have been allowed to complete their search for weapons of mass destruction before any country invaded Iraq. Those weapons were never found, and now soldiers and civilians alike are dying. "I'm just overwhelmed by

it all," Brooks added. "I voted at home, but I was never this excited. I've never been so proactive before. It's only because I'm so stirred up about Bush and his policies. I don't like him. I don't trust him. "That was the biggest mo-


tivation. I want to be able to vote. That's why I was really keen" to become a citizen. She also doesn't care for

British Prime Minister Tony Blair, whom she believes will be out of a job soon. "They call him Bush's poodle at home," she noted. Both Brooks and her hus-

band are Kerry supporters, but Howard Dean was her first choice for president. "I think they (Republican Party) were scared of him," she said of Dean's unsuccessful bid for the nomination.

While Brooks enjoys discussing politics, she's also quick to talk about her hus-

Area sportsmen who check out Scott Hendrian's new Eagle Eye Archery Range will have the opportunity to not only sharpen their shooting skills, but also take a step

back into time.

Hendrian, who owns Hendrian's Floor Covering, 6447 Main St., has transformed the second floor of the former Kritzman build-

ing, also known as the old opera house, into a range where archers can sharpen their shooting skills at distances of up to 30 yards. What Hendrian hasn't done,

is alter the historical significance of the upper floor, which offers a peek into an era long past, when area residents would settle into the balcony for an evening of

entertainment in the form of a play or musical.

The archery range has been in the works for about a year, according to Hendrian.

"I was making it a community center before, but that kind of fell through," he said, noting a community center would have required him to install an elevator at a cost of \$40,000 to \$60,000 to meet handicap access requirements.

Hendrian acknowledged the building, constructed in the late 1800s, has a long and interesting history.

"It was originally built as an opera house, and this (first) floor was a hardware, and there was a creamery and a bakery in the basement," he said. In addition to steps, an old hand-pull elevator links the first and upper

"It's like the original opera house the way it is up there now. I'm not really changing the historical part at all. I'm not going to up and paint the walls," added Hendrian, who removed a drop ceiling on the second floor, which at one time housed a pool hall.

"At first, the pool hall started downstairs and they bowled upstairs," he continued. "My dad bowled up here and he's 78. I talked to a few guys who bowled up here - one guy was a pin set-


The opera house hosted plays through 1920, and evidence of those years can be seen on the hallway walls, which are covered with the signatures - some dating back to the 1800s — of actors and the names of various performances over the years.

The building was also the site of graduation ceremonies, judging by the many signatures of students who noted their year of graduation. Some even left drawings and poems.

Hendrian plans to preserve the signatures and eventually offer tours of the build-

In the meantime, he's putting the final touches on the archery range. Much of the work has involved installing safety features and improving the lighting. "It's been a lot of building material and a lot of time.

"I'm already basically ready (to open)," Hendrian said. He plans to officially open in a week or 2 and host target shooting 2 or 3 days a week, with special events and 3-D target shooting on the week-

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

The couple met on Valentines Day in 1998 when Brooks traveled to the United States to attend the marriage of her brother to an American. After the wedding, she was at a country and western club, and Bob approached her and asked for a dance. A few days later, he proposed, and the couple married about 8 months later. Afterwards, the Brooks lived

in Connecticut, where Bob was employed by TI Automotive. The company moved the couple to Cass City about 2 years ago, and he was laid off in June after 15 years as an engineer with the firm.

Now, he's working as a truck driver, a good job but one that takes him away from home often, according to Brooks, who recalled a difficult transition at the start of their marriage.

"At first, in Connecticut, I was terribly depressed," she said of having left her homeland. "But I pulled myself together. I've made a commitment and I'm going to stick with it."

Still, it was difficult getting used to different customs and a different country. "The first 12 months I gave him hell," she said of her husband. "(But) he's a wonderful man, and patient. Now, I think I'm a better person."

Brooks, who works in direct

care at a home in Cass City for developmentally disabled individuals, is also a very loyal American who encourages others to make their voice heard, especially if they're not happy with their leaders and their policies.

"It so amazes me that people don't care. They can vote and yet they don't even register?" she said. "It's so easy, so simple, and then their voice is heard. It's a privilege, you should do it."

Brooks said she was a bit surprised when she attended the swearing-in ceremony in July, and a number of the 250 new American citizens there were dressed very casually. "Some of them were dressed as though they were going to go to the beach - halter tops, shorts. This was a special day," she added.

"As soon as I got my little (voter) registration form, I went straight away to the town hall to make sure that's everything I need," she recalled. "So, come the second of November, I'll be

Brooks confided she still has some mixed feeling about her decision to leave England and seek citizenship in the United States.

"But I still feel American. It's a good country. (The people are) good hearted, they want to help other people," she said.

"I regret leaving my children, but I don't regret com-

sitting on a million (dollar)plus problem," Hoagland

He added that, in return for the counties' acceptance of the tax shift, the governor promised to form a statewide committee, represented by counties, cities, townships and villages, to explore better ways of funding local government.

"I think they're accepting that they need a better solution," Hoagland added. "The state of Michigan expects us to provide mandated services, and we don't have the money to provide the services they are mandating. The system is broken.

"Is it (property tax shift) ideal? Hardly, but it's the

best we have to work with at this point," he said, adding counties really had no choice, given that losing an amount of money equal to state revenue sharing would have meant unprecedented service cuts.

As it is, Tuscola County officials have some serious financial decisions to make should voters again reject a proposed tax increase of .5 of a mill for the sheriff's road patrol. The ballot question failed in August, but the county opted to again make the request in November.

"Without approval of that millage, we're looking at about a \$660,000 problem," Hoagland said. "So, that (property tax shift) didn't solve our financial woes; it's just kept them from getting

Over the next several days, Gray said, officers identified a third suspect and are continuing their investigation into his involvement. Two of the suspects, Gerald

S. Perzanowski, 37, of Clyde Township, and William J. Brown Jr., Melvin, were arraigned Sept. 21 in Sanilac County District Court.

The pair was charged with unauthorized tampering with an anhydrous ammonia container and removing anhydrous ammonia, and conspiracy, both 4-year felonies that are also punishable by up to a \$15,000 fine, and a misdemeanor count of larceny under \$200.

COCAINE

In a separate investigation, officers made an arrest for cocaine trafficking Monday, Sept. 27, that resulted in the seizure of one-half ounce of powder cocaine with a street

'Over a period of weeks, drug task force investigators had developed information concerning cocaine being sold from a home in the area of M-53/Snover Road," Gray said.

"Investigators were able to discern that the suspect in the cocaine sales was obtaining his cocaine in quantity from the Detroit area and then cutting and repackaging the cocaine for street level distribution in western Sanilac County.'

Early last week, drug task force investigators learned that sheriff's deputies had been at the suspect's home to serve civil process papers and had been told by family members that the suspect had gone to the Detroit area on personal business" and would not be back until midnight, Gray said. Since this activity fit in

with cocaine supply trips the suspect was known to engage in, task force investigators and sheriff's road patrol deputies attempted to locate the suspect as he returned from Detroit."

Shortly before midnight, a car fitting the description of on M-53 from M-46, traveling at a speed of 90 miles per hour. A sheriff's deputy stopped the vehicle, which was occupied by the suspect, his girlfriend, who was driving on a suspended license,

and her 10-week-old baby. Gray said officers searched the vehicle and found the half-ounce of powder cocaine and one ounce of an unknown powder substance.

"A search of the suspect's home resulted in the seizure of additional suspected narcotics (and drug paraphernalia), including ecstasy, scales and drug packaging materials," he said.

Officers arrested the 19year-old Marlette man, who was booked on a charge of possession with intent to deliver cocaine. He was later released on bond. His girlfriend was cited for multiple traffic violations and then released to her home.

Gray said several police

departments, including

Kingston and Cass City, and the Sanilac, Tuscola and Lapeer sheriff's department assisted in the investigation by providing tips and leads. He urged anyone who witnesses suspicious activity at or near anhydrous ammonia




