Rehab expansion scheduled

Officials at Hills and Dales Heather Hankin. General Hospital's Center for Rehabilitation and Health and Fitness (formerly the Michigan Athletic and Rehabilitation Center) are gearing tion area, private treatment up for a major expansion project at the Caro facility.

"We are expanding rehab. We're going from about 600 square feet to approximately 3,600 to 3,800 square feet,"

She said the project will include construction of a separate entrance with a patient waiting room and registrarooms, and an expanded occupational therapy area to enhance work-conditioning

drug assistance Pierce, a sales director with Tuscola County senior citizens and low-income households will no longer have to choose between buying food, paying for heat and lights,

and prescriptions because of a new program. Tuscola County commissioners are supporting Prescription Relief, an Ohio based non-profit corporation that acts as a middleman between pharmaceutical firms

and customers.

"There is about a 200 percent markup on prescriptions. Many only cost pennies to make. The elderly and low-income individuals literally have to choose between eating, being warm and taking the medication they are suppose to," said Douglas

Prescription Relief. "We had a 92-year old woman who joined our program and said she could now take all of the medication she was supposed to and have enough money left where she didn't have to eat cat food."

The Prescription Relief program works with 140 pharmaceutical companies that give away more than 1,700 name-brand prescription medications that are still good, but nearing their expiration dates and would have to be destroyed. Instead, they donate them to Prescription Relief in exchange for a tax deduction.

Sheriff's department mourning Caro deputy

Tuscola County Sheriff's Department officers are mourning the loss of one of their own following the death of Sgt. Kevin Thane, who died at his Caro home Friday following a year-long battle with cancer.

"(He was) just the best. You can't say anything more about him," Sheriff Tom

"He's just one of those guys who didn't have any bad habits. He was a super nice guy," Kern added. "He did an awful lot to keep the esprit de corps of this department."

Kern, who sent Thane to the 203rd session of the FB1 Academy in the late 1990s, said he would have liked to have seen Thane in the sheriff's seat some day. "He

just had the right qualities of a leader," he added.

Thane, a graduate of Caro High School, was a highly decorated officer, receiving a number of awards and commendations. His honors included the department's annual Officer of the Year.

Thane, 40, joined the sheriff's department in 1989 as a road patrol officer. He was promoted to sergeant in 1997. During his tenure, Thane served as an instructor for firearms and pressure point control tactics.

Kern and the entire department stood behind Thane during his illness. Last year, a host of officers, including the sheriff and undersheriff, shaved their heads as a sign of support for Thane.

and remodeling. According to Hankin, the decision to expand was based on several factors.

"The fitness (portion of the facility) has traditionally operated at a loss, and part of the reason is so much of the space is dedicated to fitness rather than rehab," she said.

She added that officials want to continue offering the fitness programs, and even take care of needed renovations, but at the same time take advantage of an increased demand for various rehabilitation services.

"Rehab's growth potential has been halted by space, so it was the logical thing to do. By expanding the rehab, the patients here."

Currently, the rehab facilities are all housed in a single room. "We are seeing between 50 and 60 patients a day at this facility for rehab in 600 square feet," Hankin said. "It's very crowded down there.'

She noted construction will be completed over time. the 16-week rehab expansion will get underway. Officials don't expect that rehabilitation services will be interrupted during construction. Improvements to the health and fitness facilities are ex-

pected to begin in late spring or early summer, with completion at the end of the summer. Due to the scope of the locker room improvements, customers can expect some interruption of ser-

Hankin said she expects the combined projects will be a boost to all those who have

Micklash named top Thumb school chief

Achievements ranging from a first-place ranking in the county in MEAP scores to a flourishing fine arts program to making the state football playoffs for the first time ever have Cass City School District residents saying it's a great time to be a Red Hawk.

Michigan Association of School Administration (MASA) officials have just given the community another reason to feel that way.

MASA officials recently named Cass City School Supt. Ken Micklash the MASA Region 5 Superintendent of the Year.

MASA is a statewide organization that represents the superintendents and first-line administrators of Michigan's local and intermediate school districts. Region 5 is composed of Tuscola, Huron, Sanilac, Lapeer, Genesee and St. Clair counties.

MASA will honor Micklash March 11 during the 2005 meeting of Region 5 at Zehnder's Restaurant in Frankenmuth.

"The Regional Superintendent of the Year Award is presented by each of the 10 regions in the MASA organization to an individual who has shown tremendous effort and dedication to enriching the lives of children and the community as a whole," said Lisa Rentz, MASA Communications and Member Services manager.

'Mr. Micklash has been an effective, well respected long serving superintendent in Cass City," Rentz said. "He is community service oriented through participation in Rotary, chamber of commerce, hospital board and Little League.

"Mr. Micklash is well respected by his peers and when an area superintendent has a question, Mr. Micklash is usually the first one they

George Bednorek, superintendent of the Kingston Community Schools, agreed. "He's been very supportive of me since I came to Kingston. He's been a mentor for

me," Bednorek said.

"He's very knowledgeable when it comes to all facets of education," he added. "I'm very proud to be associated with him as a fellow superintendent."

Teresa Rabideau, president of the Cass City Board of Education, said she and her fellow board members are "absolutely proud" of MASA's recognition of Micklash's efforts.

"I think throughout the community and school district we are fortunate to have Ken as our superintendent, but certainly the award emphasizes just how special he is," she said.

Rabideau pointed out that Micklash's first reaction to the news was to share the honor with the administrative staff, faculty, the board, students and community as a whole.

"He was very quick to point out it wasn't his efforts alone," Rabideau said. "That's just the kind of guy he is — he doesn't take the credit for himself — that's the kind of leader he is. And, he's very active in the community. He has made Cass City his home.

"We are very fortunate to have him here.'

"It's very special to me. I was honored and proud to represent this region," said Micklash, who has served in Cass City for 17 years and has been active in MASA throughout his career, including serving as Region 5

"People ask me why I stayed in Cass City - I kind of hopped around a lot before I came here," he added. "It's a great place to raise our kids, it's a great school system. It's been a great place to live one's career."

Micklash has a bachelor's degree in elementary education and earned a master's degree in special education in 1973 at Eastern Michigan University. In 1986, he was awarded an education specialist degree in public school administration from

Central Michigan University. Prior to his appointment as Cass City superintendent in January 1988, Micklash served as Cass City High School principal for 18 months, administrative assistant/principal with the Huron Intermediate School District for 6 years, administrator with the Tuscola Intermediate School District for one year, principal of Port Austin Public Schools for one year, teacher with the Huron Intermediate School District for 2 years, and teacher with Alpena Public Schools for 2

Fundraising effort now underway for memorial

Richard Little had no problem finding support and approval from village officials for a planned war memorial. Now, he's shifted his efforts towards fundraising.

It's going to be a big job, but the Cass City native is already about halfway there.

"A grant from the Pinney Foundation was applied for and approved," Little said. "This means that the money we raise for this project will be matched by this grant. Consequently, we will have to raise at least half of the \$20,000 cost to make this memorial a reality."

Towards that end, Little is organizing what he calls a "Festival of Trees" display that will be located in the former Doerr Dance Studio building on Main Street. The display will be open Friday and Saturday, Dec. 3 and 4. Participants will be asked to decorate a Christmas tree for display inside the building along with a poster board size sign in front of the tree listing their organization or business.

There is room for about 10 trees, according to Little, who said citizens wishing to view the display will be asked to make a donation to help pay for the memorial. "This is our first attempt (at

fundraising), and then I'm going to each of the clubs, making a presentation," said Little, who is still in the process of organizing his fundraising efforts.

"Right now I'm by myself, (but) I'm trying to get a committee together," he noted, adding both Cass City Village President Bert Althaver and village Manager Frank

Sheridan have been very supportive of the project. "This is important. When I start something I like to take it to the end."

Although not a veteran himself, Little feels strongly that all of those who served and died for their country should be honored, including local servicemen. It's a desire that stems from his 40-year career as a counselor at Yale High School.

"As a senior counselor, one of my jobs was to act as a liaison recruiter for the United States military, helping to recruit young people to serve our country," he explained. "Three of those students that I helped recruit never came back. They lost their lives fighting to protect our freedom to ensure that people in other countries might have it

in the military - so many of my kids got killed. I was aware of the loss," Little said. "I was pretty close to those kids. That affects anybody, to lose a good friend." Little first approached the

"That's how I got interested

Cass City Village Council last September with the idea of constructing a war memorial to honor 27 veterans from the area who lost their lives in wartime.

Members of Cass City VFW Post 3644 collected the list of military casualties over the years and found there were 10 from Cass City who died during World War I, 13 during World War II, and 2 each during the Korean and Vietnam wars. Other names will be added in the future as they become known.


I can remember when a conservative was considered to be a person who was careful with money and wanted government to pay as you go.

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

One of the great things about U.S./Canadian relations is the relatively open border between our two countries. We're used to driving up to the border, answering a few silly questions and going our merry way. The wicket is getting stickier, however.

A man called from Calgary recently and ordered a few of my books. He called back a week or two later to say he has this phobia about owing people money and wanted to send me a check even though the books hadn't arrived yet. (This made him one of my favorite people.)

He apologized that the Canadian government has decided to search all small parcels at the border in retaliation for the nasty tricks we've pulled on them lately. "If our gutless wonders really wanted to do something, they could cut off oil exports to the U.S.," he said.

I received his check and the following letter a few days

"The books you sent me are still being processed by Canada Customs, along with 200,000 other dangerous U.S. parcels in a Vancouver, B.C. warehouse. Hundreds of thousands of other U.S. parcels are also being held in Toronto and Montreal.

"On the other side, your books pose a real and present danger, so I can see Canada Customs protecting Canadians from them. While reading "My Dog Was A Redneck..." at our lake cabin I laughed so much my beach chair tipped over, spilling me and my Glenfiddich onto rough sand.

"Further, while reading the same book late at night, I couldn't help but laugh out loud. This woke up other family members who were tired from a hard day of water skiing, followed by vodka coolers. This brought on threats of book burning, unless I learned to read without laughing. (It could have

led to physical abuse.) "You can see why it is necessary for our respective governments to protect their citizens from each other. A more appropriate retaliation would be for Canada to cut off oil and natural gas we send you. That way Americans would have to walk everywhere, instead of riding in cars, trucks, snowmobiles, or golf

"This would result in a nation of physically fit people. The option is you could sit at home and freeze in the

"Hopefully, some day my government will allow me to read the books you sent, and the extra copies will get to family members; so they too will be able to laugh. (Out loud.)"







Milligan received 2,922 votes compared to 2,237 votes cast for Hunter.

Aside from his business, Milligan was appointed to the Michigan Bean Commission by then-Gov. John Engler in 1998. He served 6 years, including 2 as chairman. He was also a participant in the MSU-sponsored Michigan Agricultural Lead-

Cass City area voters ership program. He has There's no doubt about it." served on the county planning commission, county Farm Bureau board and is active with the Cass City Rotary Club.

"I certainly need to thank the people in Cass City - that was it (key to winning the election), and I think we knew that going in," Milligan said last week.

Milligan acknowledged that now the real work begins, starting with playing a role on a board that is facing some serious financial decisions.

"It's too bad the road patrol millage didn't pass, but we do the best we can, we make it (county government) as efficient as we can," he said. "It's going to be a tough job.

Milligan said the county's financial crisis "was not caused by anything the commissioners did or didn't do, and I've said that before. This is the trickle-down from

the federal and state (govern-

ments) trying to balance their

Milligan added he has no magic to bring to the table; only the experience he has gained in township government and by running his own

Milligan will replace Commissioner Ed Scollon of Cass City, who opted not to seek reelection. District One is comprised of Wisner, Akron, Columbia, Elmwood, Elkland, Gilford and Fairgrove townships.

DISTRICT 3

In District 3, Incumbent Republican Commissioner Donald P. McLane of Mayville emerged the winner in a close race against David W. Lich, a Kingston Democrat.

The district is composed of Novesta, Wells, Kingston, Fremont, Dayton and Koylton townships.

McLane is a lifelong resident of the county who has served 12 years as a county commissioner, including 2 as chairman.

He has also served on the Tuscola Behavioral Health Systems Board, Michigan Works! Thumb Area Consortium Board, dispatch authority board, and the Human **Development Commission** Board, and has been a liaison to the Family Independence Agency Board, board of public works and road commission.

McLane agreed finances will be a difficult issue to tackle.

"We don't want to make anymore cuts than we have to," he said, "but you've got to do what you've got to do. If you haven't got the money, you can't spend it, whether it's my budget or the county's budget."

McLane vowed to continue working for his constituents, including senior citizens, by supporting efforts such as a new prescription relief program in the county.

Road patrol cuts now on the way

Tuscola County Board of left - services not mandated Commissioners Chairman Gerald Peterson was still shaking his head last week after voters again rejected a tax increase to fund the sheriff's department's road

"I don't know what the voters are looking at, if it's economics or what," Peterson said. "I thought the health and safety of the county was the important issue here.

"What are the people saying? Enough is enough? You've got to work with what you've got? I don't know," he added.

"It is (disappointing). I think we're just going to have to go back and say, let's make the cuts."

County voters defeated the proposed new half-mill tax levy in the Tuesday, Nov. 2, general election by a vote of 13,879 to 12,959.

Had voters approved the tax, some \$600,000 would have been generated to fund the road patrol.

Officials have traditionally used the county's general fund budget to subsidize the road patrol, with the remaining revenue generated by a special millage that voters renewed last August.

However, the county can no longer afford to provide that subsidy, which adds up to \$300,000 to \$400,000 annually, largely because of cuts in funding to the county. Tuscola County has an annual budget of about \$11 million, and over the past 4 years has lost a combined \$1.15 million in state and county revenue, including a half-million dollars in state revenue sharing.

Peterson said county officials now have no choice but to follow through with plans to cut costs in the only area

by the state. That includes the road patrol, which will be reduced by 20 percent, or 3 officers.

What that boils down to, Sheriff Tom Kern explained, is delayed response times and follow-up investigations. eliminating education and community policing programs, reducing crime prevention efforts, eliminating participation in the Thumb Narcotics Unit, and reduced staff and support for the sheriff's emergency management office.

"Let's face it," Peterson said, "the state police post is at minimal staffing, so the sheriff has been having to pick up their load, and then the sheriff has already been understaffed.

"A lot of people look at the sheriff's department as tickets," he added. "I look at the sheriff's department as health and safety.'

PRESIDENT

Thumb area voters joined their counterparts statewide and turned out in droves for the election. In fact, 67.5 percent of registered Michigan voters cast ballots, setting a new state turnout record of more than 4.8 mil-

Some 80 percent of Tuscola County voters cast ballots. The Huron County voter turnout was 68 percent and in Sanilac County, 71 per-

While Democrat John Kerry took Michigan's 17 electoral votes, voters in the traditionally Republican Thumb stood with President

With a majority of the vote counted, Bush had taken 45.63 percent of the vote in Tuscola County compared to Kerry's 37.45. In Huron County, it was 55.35 percent for Bush and 43.67 percent for Kerry, and in Sanilac County Bush had 60.81 percent and Kerry, 37.95.

CONGRESS

Rep. Dale Kildee, a Flint Democrat, was reelection in the 5th District, taking 67 percent of the vote. Republican Myrah Kirkwood had 31 percent and Libertarian candidate Clint Foster and Green Party Candidate Harley Mikkelson had one percent each.

For the most part, voters in the upper Thumb counties followed statewide trends that saw a pair of proposed constitutional amendments approved.

Proposal One, which amends the constitution to require most new gambling operations to be approved by voters at both the state and local levels, received just 45.24 percent approval in Tuscola County, compared to 50.34 percent in Huron County and 55.77 percent in Sanilac County.

Proposal 2, which defines marriage as a union between one man and one woman in the state constitution, received a majority of yes votes in Tuscola County (52.57 percent), Huron County (64.17 percent) and Sanilac County (66.47 percent).

STATE REP.

State Rep. Tom Meyer overcame a challenge from Democrat Steve Montle to retain his seat in the Michigan House of Representatives. The Bad Axe Republican represents the 84th District, comprised of Tuscola and Huron counties.


Meyer won in Huron County with 71.3 percent of the vote, garnering 12,104 votes to Montle's 4,698. Meyer took 47 percent of the vote (15,811) in Tuscola County compared to Montle's 31 percent (10,486).

OTHER RACES

In a hotly contested race for the office of Tuscola County Register of Deeds, Republican Incumbent Ginny McLaren overcame a challenge from Democrat Judy Babcock. McLaren garnered 13,836 votes, while Babcock received 12,875 votes.

Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern, a Democrat, easily defeated Green Party candidate Adam S. Wright of Cass City, 20,383 votes to 2,163 votes.

Winning re-election unopposed were Prosecuting Attorney Mark Reene, Republican (19,234 votes), Treasurer Patricia Donovan, Democrat (19,195 votes), and Drain Commissioner Sarah Pistro, Republican (18,992 votes).





Blood drive set Nov. 16 in village

Michigan residents can give at least 3 meaningful gifts this holiday season without visiting a shopping mall.

By donating blood through the American Red Cross in the next few weeks, eligible blood donors can help save the lives of up to 3 people, and help offset the slump of blood collections around the Thanksgiving Day Weekend.

In Cass City, residents can donate blood Tuesday, Nov. 16, from 1 to 6:45 p.m. at the Cass City VFW Hall, 4533 Veterans Dr. The Hills and Dales General Hospital Auxiliary is sponsoring the drive.

"Because the Red Cross doesn't typically have blood drives on Thanksgiving Day, and runs on reduced schedules the Friday after, we stand to lose up to a day or more worth of collections,' said Fred Sterns, CEO of the Great Lakes Region. "But

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sick and injured people need blood every day, regardless of the season." Blood donations typically

drop 10 to 15 percent between Thanksgiving and New Year's when donors are busy with shopping, visiting relatives or other holiday activities. The Red Cross needs to collect about 750 units of blood every weekday to maintain a safe and ample blood supply for nearly 70 Michigan hospitals.

"We're hopeful that the beginning of the holiday season will inspire people to give the gift of life and help hospital patients who depend on steady, consistent blood collections year-round," Sterns said. Blood donors must be at

least 17 years of age, weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and be in good general health.

changes, including consolidation of the Evergreen and Deford elementary schools, construction of a new middle school, and some rocky financial times caused by state economic woes.

Micklash said some of the district's greatest achievements include curriculum enhancements over the years, a strong emphasis on early childhood education programming, implementing state-of-the-art technology, and turning around the fine arts program.

Finances have been another key. Under Micklash's guidance, the Cass City District has sustained state cuts and revenue losses from declining enrollment, and still maintained a healthy fund balance. "That's crucial. You've got to have your financial house in order for good things to happen," he

At the same time, Micklash added, measures such as consolidation of the elementary schools has enabled the district to operate more efficiently.

More importantly, he indicated, has been the quality of people who have made the district what it is today.

"We have a great staff. There aren't any weak links. And our board's been tremendous to work with over the past 17 years," Micklash said. "That filters all the way through, and we can focus on our objective or goal, which is to do the best for the students that we can do."

"My style has been to try to be a good listener and try to support our staff with their initiatives, give them the resources they need and then get out of the way," Micklash added. "To me, I think that's been successful.

County unveils drug assistance

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To participate, there is a \$25 initial fee per person for a year. After that, the cost is \$7 per prescription to those who qualify.

"I talked Prescription Relief into waiving the \$25 initial fee. I plead poverty," said Tuscola County Human Resource Coordinator Julie Dillon.

'Our residents were going to have to pay the \$25 initial fee themselves, but I told those at Prescription Relief that some of our residents would have a hard time even doing that and paying for prescriptions. They agreed to waive the fee.'

The \$25 initial fee will be waived until Dec. 31.

"If there is a good response to the program here, the \$20 fee for the second year a person is in the program might be waived also," Dillon said.

The program is for maintenance medications, which a person needs to take for longer than 30 days. The prescriptions have to be picked up at the person's doctor's office rather than mailed to
