Gruber mending after gun shot accident


A Cass City area man is continuing to recover from a shotgun wound he suffered in a hunting accident near his Elkland Township residence.

Troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro reported the accident occurred Saturday, Dec. 18, on private property near Elmwood and Cemetery roads.

According to reports, the victim, William J. Gruber Sr., 49, 6787 Elmwood Rd., told troopers he was leaving his tree stand at about 5:30 p.m. when he bent over to pick up his backpack. The pistol, a .50 caliber single shot muzzleloading handgun, was holstered in his bandoleer, which fell when he bent over. The weapon struck the stand and discharged, hitting Gruber in the lower torso.

Williams was able to walk to his vehicle and drive to his home, where he honked his horn to get his wife's attention.

Williams was transported to Hills and Dales General Hospital in Cass City for emergency treatment. He was then transferred to Covenant hospital in Saginaw, where he underwent surgery to repair his stomach.

Jesse Rader awarded rare scholarship

A couple months ago Jesse Rader wasn't sure if he had what it takes to attend just about any school he chooses after accepting his high school diploma next year.

A Cass City High School senior, Rader knows it now.

The 17-year-old was recently accepted for admission at Harvard University in Cambridge, Mass. He'll start attending classes there next fall.

"I've shaken a lot of hands, gotten a lot of congratulations," Rader said of the reaction he's received since Harvard officials sent him an e-mail Dec. 15 and a confirmation letter a couple days later, congratulating him.

Rader has reason to be excited.

Harvard is the oldest and perhaps most prestigious institution of high learning in the United States. Founded in 1636 - 16 years after the arrival of the Pilgrims at Plymouth — the university has grown from 9 students with

Rader, who plans to study engineering in either the medical or science fields, has been thinking about his college plans for some time. "Quite awhile," he said, "but

not Harvard."

It was a university information book he received in the mail before school started this year that got him thinking about Harvard.

"At first I didn't think much about it because I didn't really think I had a chance," he recalled. "Then I did some research and I found out I'm not too far off, and I thought, okay, I'll send it (admission application) in.

"I didn't know what would come of it, so I didn't really worry about it."

Rader has maintained a near perfect grade point average at about 3.9 and earned at least average scores on the American College Test (ACT).

The application process included a personal interview with an alumnus who resides in the Flint area. Rader also had to secure 2 teacher recommendations and another from a counselor. He indicated the written application

itself was a bit of a surprise.
"Actually, it was easier than most of the schools I looked at. There was only one essay, whereas with University of Michigan there were 3."

Rader also completed 3 SAT subject tests, earning average scores in chemistry and biology and an above average score in math.

"I just waited after that," he said, adding an e-mail confirming his status arrived from Harvard by Dec. 15, just as school officials had promised. "It just said, congratulations, you've been accepted."

Interestingly, the prospects for financing an education at Harvard - about \$42,000 a year — didn't enter the picture until after Rader was accepted. In fact, he pointed out, university officials didn't ask because they have programs to ensure students can afford to complete their education.

"Their financial aid package should make it fairly easy for me," Rader said. "They pay for what you can't, and if a family makes less than \$40,000, the family isn't expected to contrib-

"They will put him to work and (there are) scholarships and things. Whatever it takes, they will get you educated," said Rader's mother, Susie, who has 3 other children at home; Alex and Ivy Hiatt, both juniors at Cass City High School, and Michael Bader 6

Rader is looking forward to experiencing Harvard, and there are plenty of others that share his enthusiasm, including officials at Cass City High School, where Rader has been active in a number of activities, including Student Council and band.

LaPonsie withdraws from village manager position

The Cass City Village Council took a step back in its quest to replace Frank Sheridan as village manager Monday night in a special meeting at the municipal building. Lou LaPonsie, Cass City, who was hired by a 6-1 vote, withdrew his name from consideration as a village manager for what was expected to be a one-year term.

LaPonsie withdrew, president Bert Althaver explained, after reading in the Chronicle that he did not have the unanimous support of the village council.

The council then turned its attention to hiring a temporary and permanent village manager.

Sheridan suggested that the council hire the Michigan Municipal League (MML) to

conduct a search.

He said that there are 12 persons who would take a part-time 20 hours or so a week job on a temporary basis. Most of these qualified persons are retired and are

not looking for full time employment, Sheridan said. Two of the persons available are within reasonable driving distance.

It is expected that the council will be ready to act on another special meeting slated for Jan. 10.

It is estimated that the search for a permanent manager will take several months and the MML fee for conducting the search will be in the neighborhood of \$5,500. The budget for conducting the hiring search and filling the manager role for the year has been set at \$100,000, trustee Jeff Gillig said.

Trustee Don Richards, who will be one of the persons involved in recommending a candidate to the council, asked what the committee should be looking for. Discussion revealed that it should be someone familiar with the paperwork required to meet the demands for a

water treatment plant.

On a temporary basis,
Sheridan said, there isn't a

great many qualified people who would accept the job and the village may have to accept the most qualified person available, although they might not have all the quali-

fications desired.

The council then discussed tax abatement for personal property to be installed in the building at the corner of Doerr and Garfield streets. He said that the tax abatement is for personal property only and does not include the real estate. Of course, if the company moves the equipment out before the end of the tax abatement period, they must pay the money that the plan saved the company.

The tax abatement reduces the company's tax from 50 percent of true cash value to 25 percent. It appears that there is a consensus to approve the tax abatement at the Jan. 10 meeting.

By a voice vote, the council expressed appreciation for the work that Sheridan did as village manager and thanked him for his efforts.

Year 2004 in review

The year 2004 was not unlike any other year in that the only constant was change.

For some, the past 12 months will be remembered fondly, while others will mourn events that shaped the year in their lives. For most, it was a continuing journey of living and working together, celebrating new life and grieving the loss of loved ones, basking in each success, and struggling with the

challenges.

And all the while the community in which they live has continued to change and evolve.

Many of those changes were reflected on the pages of this newspaper, just as they have been for many years.

Although one person's opinion of the most important stories invariably differs with those of another, we feel it's appropriate to take one more look back at the top stories in the Cass City area in 2004

ECONOMY

Michigan's economic woes continued to trickle down to local government in 2004, with state officials reducing red ink on the backs of counties, villages, townships and schools.

For area schools, that meant broken promises of full perpupil funding, with the state finally promising \$6,700 in funding per student - the same amount promised 3 years earlier. During that time, Cass City Schools' funding was reduced by about \$255,000. The belt tightening meant significant increases in fees for driver's education.

At the county level, the loss of a half-million dollars in state shared revenue prompted Tuscola County commissioners to ask voters for additional tax revenue to fully fund the sheriff's department road patrol. Voters rejected the request in August and again in November.

The end result will be reduced man power for Sheriff Tom Kern, who outlined cuts, including the loss of 4 of his 16 road patrol officers, effective at the start of the new year.

The future prospects for county finances remain gloomy. The state formulated a plan to provide counties with state revenue sharing they are no longer receiving by shifting tax collections from December to July over a 3-year period, creating a pool of money that counties can draw on. However, for Tuscola County, that well will run dry within 4 years.

TRAGEDIES

Few years are unmarked by tragedy, but 2004 was particularly deadly for young people in the Cass City area. Among the deaths were those of Michael Wark 19

Among the deaths were those of Michael Wark, 19, Cass City, Drew DeLong, 22, Kingston, and James Morell, 16, Bad Axe, who were killed in a head-on collision in Huron County's Verona Township last April.

Another 2-vehicle accident claimed the life of 17-year-old Cory Merz, of Gagetown. The Cass City High School senior died when his car struck a vehicle at the corner of Dodge and Milligan roads in June.

More recently, Cass City High School senior Andrew Haas, 18, of Ubly, died as a result of head injuries he suffered in a fight during a weekend party in Elmwood Township in November. The Tuscola County Prosecutor's Office is expected to issue charges against the as-of-yetunnamed suspect.

FACELIFT

he year was certainly unequalled in terms of change in the make-up of Cass City Village government.

A virtually complete facelift took place. The spring elections saw incumbent village President Les Karr along with trustees Cathy Kropewnicki, Steve Wright and Matt Prieskorn all opt not to seek reelection. Trustee Don Ball was also gone, having previously resigned.

Coming on board were former longtime village President Bert Althaver and newcomers Dwight Thabet, Jon Zdrojewski, Jenny Zawilinski and Don Richards. In July, Trustee Dale McIntosh was forced to resign when he moved out-

French lessons set at library


Are you interested in learning the beginning basics of another language? How about French? Rawson Memorial Library will be hosting "Beginning French" with Alice Lincoln Ward.

The Washington state Governor's election should be a lesson to the entire country. Nearly three million votes have been counted three times, and we're still calling election boards and hassling over 130 votes.

Sea Cadet organizations exist in most of the maritime nations of the world. In this country, the Navy League of the United States formally established the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Navy League Cadet Corps in 1958. The basic objectives of both programs are to help young Americans become more patriotic and responsible citizens, and to help them understand the role of the maritime services in national defense and in maintaining the economic viability of the nation.

The groups operate through organization and cooperation with the Department of the Navy to encourage youth "to develop, train them in seagoing skills, and to teach them patriotism, courage, self-reliance and kindred virtues."

"The Sea Cadets is kind of like a youth group," explained Brzuchowski, who joined when she was just 11 years old. "It's junior Navy and it's for people who are interested in going into the naval or other military service after high school. It's to give them a little taste of what the Navy or any of the

armed services is like." Brzuchowski's interest in the Sea Cadets was sparked by her father, Ronald, who checked into the program after seeing a television commercial. The next thing they knew, they were visiting the HR Doud Division, one of

Michigan, based at the Saginaw Reserve Center. The unit has 35 members, ages 9 to 18.

"I was quite nervous because I didn't know anybody and I thought it was going to be hardcore," she recalled. "But I liked it actually a lot. They teach you, basically, everything the Navy would. I caught on pretty quickly." Brzuchowski said the training includes basic physical training, marching, military terminology and knot tying. Brzuchowski attended a 2week boot camp at the U.S. Naval Base in Great Lakes, Ill. She later attended other 2-week training camps, including basic medical training at another naval base in Jacksonville, Fla., and annual one- to 2-week trips on a Sea Cadet ship.

She explained the training is required for a member to advance in rank from scaman recruit (E1) to seaman apprentice (E2) to seaman (E3) to petty officer third class to petty officer second class to petty officer first class to

Along the way, Brzuchowski has earned dozens of awards for her performance in training and test-

Her future plans include attending Eastern Michigan University, where she will enroll in the Recruit Officers Training Corps (ROTC), and then enter the U.S. Navy as an ensign.

The Sea Cadets have become a family affair for the Brzuchowskis. Lauren's father, Ronald is a lieutenant junior grade and serves as the Sea Cadet's Michigan regional recruiter. Her mother, Susan, is an ensign and administrative officer for the Navy League Cadet Corps. Brzuchowski, a co-op stu-

dent employed at Knight Insurance in Cass City who is also involved in volleyball and the pom squad at Cass City High School along with dance, said her experience in the Sea Cadets has been a great way to prepare for the





Sanilac Medical Services receives \$185,000 grant

Ambulance staffing in Huron and Sanilac counties will benefit from a federal grant recently awarded by the U.S. Office of Rural Health Policy

Sanilac Medical Services, which will receive \$185,000, was one of just 3 agencies across the country to be awarded the funding.

"The grant is a Rural EMS Training and Equipment award," explained Kay Balcer, project consultant for the Huron-Sanilac EMS Task Force. "Funds have been approved for 3 years totaling \$555,000. Grant funds for year 2 and 3 depend on future federal appropriations."

In addition to federal money, Balcer said, more than \$83,000 will be contributed to the project from various local sources during the first year.

The grant was submitted on behalf of the Huron-Sanilac EMS Task Force and Medical Control authorities.

"The project goal is to increase the number of EMS volunteers in Huron and Sanilac counties," Balcer said. "It will increase the ability of Sanilac Medical Services to provide EMS training."

Grant funds will be used hire an additional EMS instructor and purchase a mobile training trailer and supplies, according to Balcer, who noted the staff will use distance learning to hold EMS continuing education classes.

"A mobile computer lab will also be used to train students in on-line testing and electronic record systems. Education on EMS management and communication will also be added to programs," she added.

The task force has submitted a second grant to recruit EMS volunteers, implement a high school EMT course, and expand community support of EMS providers. The second grant application is through the Rural Health Care Services Outreach program, and awards will be announced in the spring.

"Both grants relied on the input of the 113 EMS volunteers who completed an 8-page survey in the spring of 2004," Balcer said.

"The survey indicated that

lance services short handed.

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

side the village limits, and his seat was filled by another newcomer, Jeff Gillig.

The year also saw village Clerk-Treasurer Joyce Bemus retire after more than 26 years on the job.

The latest vacancy came in December with the resignation of village Manager Frank Sheridan, who has accepted a job in the city of Sheridan, Oregon, after 3 years in Cass City.

CONSOLIDATION

With student numbers continuing to fall and red ink growing, Owen-Gage School officials have been faced with many tough decisions in recent years. Perhaps none were as difficult, however, as the decision to consolidate by closing Gagetown Elementary School and moving the young students to the junior-senior high building in Owendale.

That move came after several other cost-cutting measures, including retirement incentive packages, a downsizing of the administration, a general spending freeze and the sale of a district-owned home.

The school board voted to close the elementary school last May, and followed that decision with related lay-offs and hour reductions for school staff.

In August, the board voted to sell the building, and a month later they had a buyer willing to pay the \$95,000 asking price. However, the deal has since gone sour due to financing troubles for the purchasers, who had hoped to transform the school into a reception hall and meeting facility.

ELECTION

Presidential election years typically draw larger voter turnouts, but 2004 was a record-breaker for Michigan, including the Thumb area, where 60 to 80 percent of voters cast ballots in the general election.

While Democratic presidential candidate John Kerry took the state's 17 electoral votes, residents in the traditional Republican Thumb area stood with President George Bush.

State Rep. Tom Meyer, who represents much of the upper Thumb, won another term in spite of a challenge from Tuscola County resident Steve Montle.

Among county elections, Drain Commissioner Sarah Pistro emerged the victor in battle with former longtime Elkland Township Treasurer Art Randall, and Huron County Prosecutor Mark Gaertner survived a tough battle with challenger and Tuscola County Chief Assistant Prosecutor Tim

Rutkowski. Locally, Cass City area farmer Dave Milligan won the right to replace Ed Scollon as District One Commissioner after defeating John Hunter, while Kingston Police Chief Dave Lich failed in his bid to unseat incumbent District 3 Commissioner Donald McLane.

SHORTAGE

A nationwide shortage of flu vaccine announced in October created some anxious days for residents locally and across the country.

The shortage was created when a major vaccine manufacture in Britain was unexpectedly shut down due to a contamination problem, which led to the loss of some 46 million doses earmarked for the United States.

Michigan and local health officials acted quickly, following an emergency order to provide flu shots only to those most at risk for the illness, including the young. the elderly and the chronically ill.

By December, the situation had improved drastically and restrictions were lifted on who was eligible for a vaccine. Area hospitals and the health department have secured enough vaccine to offer shots to any healthy adult who wants one.

COMMUNITY

A pair of community projects have drifted in and out of the newspaper pages during the year, and both are likely to continue to receive

The most ambitious is a proposed state-of-the-art performing arts center spearheaded by a group of band parents and other residents and led by Doug Burtch, director of bands at Cass City

Cass City School officials have been considering the project and recently discussed a possible \$12 million bond issue vote in May to build the facility and make necessary repairs on existing school buildings.

The other project - a community center for teens and adults alike - has seen less progress, but volunteers have renewed their efforts in the wake of the death of a local high school senior who died in an altercation at a weekend party.

The volunteers hope to purchase a building on Main Street formerly used by Millennium Industries, and turn the facility into a center with activities and games.

HIGHLIGHTS

There were many other highlights in 2004 that deserve a mention, including:

•For the second year in a row, the Cass City High School Forensics Team walked away with the state Class C-D forensics title.

•A trio of Cass City Senior Girl Scouts rolled up their sleeves and organized a local food pantry last spring. Organizing and running the pantry was part of an effort to earn the Gold Award, the highest honor in Girl Scouting. The girls have since earned the award, but have vowed to continue opening the pantry each month.





Farm produce insurance tax starting Jan. 1

Michigan Department of Agriculture (MDA) Director Dan Wyant recently reminded farmers and grain dealers that beginning Jan. 1, grain dealers in Michigan will start collecting premiums when farm produce is sold to a dealer.

The premiums will be collected to establish a fund, administered by the Michigan Farm Produce Insurance Authority, to pay farmers in the event of a financial failure of a farm produce dealer. Farm produce includes dry edible beans, small grains, soybeans, cereal grains and

The Michigan Farm Produce Insurance Authority, created by P.A. 198 of 2003, is a 9-member (7 voting) board, representing farmers and grain, feed and banking interests, and has the responsibility of establishing, administering and promoting the fund. Wyant chairs the board, and is a non-voting member. The department has auditing and regulatory oversight responsibilities at grain elevators in Michigan.

Other members include Carl Bednarski, vice chair, Caro (representing general farm interests); Carmen Cousino, Temperance (representing general farm interests); Derek Lecronier, Freeland (representing general farm interests); Lyle Lecronier, Freeland (representing soybean producers);. Mark Stoeckle, treasurer, Cass City (representing agricultural lenders); William Lynn Uphaus, Manchester (representing corn producers); Gene Van Driessche. Bay City (representing dry bean producers); and Arthur A. Loeffler (non-voting member), Frankenmuth (representing grain licensees).

"The Michigan Farm Produce Insurance fund provides a safety net for farmers in the event of a failure, to make sure their livelihoods and the security of their farms are not affected." Wyant said. "Although this

program is voluntary, we hope farmers will take advantage of the protection offered and contribute to the Beginning Jan. 1, farm pro-


duce buyers in Michigan will be required by law to collect a two tenths of one percent (.002) premium from the gross sale price of each producer's payment. The producer premiums must be collected by the farm produce buyer and remitted to the program quarterly. If a farm produce dealer fails, farmers who have paid into the fund will be entitled to 100 percent payment on farm produce that has been stored under warehouse receipt, grain bank or open storage in Michigan licensed warehouses, or 90 percent payment on all other financial losses from farm produce delivered to the buyer. Producers have the option to receive a refund of the premiums paid into the fund, but by doing so will not be eligible to receive payment from the fund.

After the fund reaches \$5 million, premiums will no longer be collected. However, when the fund dips below \$3 million, premium assessments will be reinstated. It is estimated that assessments under the program will generate sufficient funds to reach the \$5 million cap within about four years, assuming no losses are paid out during the period.

Support from agriculture groups representing producers, including Michigan Farm Bureau and Michigan commodity organizations, were instrumental in the establishment of this fund.

"We're proud of Jesse," he said.





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
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
