Special school board meeting No decision following grading system debate

Advocates for a change in the marking system currently used at Cass City High School and defenders of the system now in use sparred for an hour and a half at a special meeting before the school board Monday at the Cass City Middle School.

When it ended nothing changed and the board will mull the facts presented and is expected to reach a decision at the next regular meeting of the board on April 26.

Sheridan hires clerk-treasurer

The search for someone to replace veteran Cass City Village Clerk-Treasurer Joyce Bemus is over.

The village hired area resident Nanette S. Walsh to fill the post during a special meeting Monday morning. The session followed a comprehensive search and interviewing process

"We had 31 applications and then Joyce, myself, Joel Chamberlain - she's our auditor - interviewed 6 of them, and I asked 3 of them to come back for additional interviews." Village Manager Frank Sheridan explained.

He added that he put an emphasis on the bookkeeping skills required of the treasurer's duties, but was also looking for someone who could handle the job of clerk. "I sought a candidate who demonstrated the ability to be the general accountant and who had verifiable integrity and dedication

"It was a hard choice. We had good candidates," Sheridan said. "I think she has the personality and background to fit in well with us.

Walsh, who will earn an annual starting salary of \$34,200, will serve as deputy clerk-treasurer during the next several weeks while working along side Bemus, who is retiring after more than 26 years of service to the village.

Walsh is an Ubly High School graduate who earned a Bachelor of Science Degree at Central Michigan University, majoring in computer science with a minor in business admin-


After the special meeting. the regular meeting of the board was held.

Half-pound of cocaine seized Drug probe ends in chase

The Sanilac County Drug Task Force continued to hit Thumb drug traffickers hard last week, seizing more than a half-pound of cocaine and arresting 3 Detroit area men during an undercover drug buy in Marlette Township. The undercover operation capped a series of drug buys made by Deputy Mark Siemen during an 8-month investigation involving several related street level drug trafficking investigations in northwestern Sanilac County.

Driver hits, kills man lying on road

> Tuscola County Sheriff's Department investigators are continuing their probe into a fatal traffic accident that claimed the life of a Mt. Morris man Saturday night in Fremont Township.

The victim was identified as Jeremy Keith Cummins. 21

The accident was reported at 11:14 p.m. on Saginaw Road, just east of Washburn Road.

Sheriff Tom Kern said Cummins was lying in the westbound lane of Saginaw Road and was struck by a vehicle driven by Timothy K. Griewahn, 43, of Vassar. He noted deputies determined the victim had been at a party for several hours at a residence not far from the crash scene.

"Just prior to the crash an occupant of the residence had called 911 to report the victim being intoxicated. fighting and was refusing to leave." Kern said.

clude a series of cocaine purchases and ultimately identified the cocaine supply source to be a 23-year-old drug dealer operating in Detroit near the Fort-Green area.

> Gray noted Siemen's investigation eventually led to the identification of the Detroit suspect's wholesale level cocaine suppliers - A 43-yearold Romulus area man and his 23-year-old son.

"Deputy Siemen was successful in making a cocaine purchase from the Detroit subject and began negotiating the purchase of 10 ounces of cocaine from the suspect. Through a series of conversations, the Detroit suspect agreed to sell 10 ounces of cocaine to Deputy Siemen for \$10,000," Gray

continued. A meeting was set for the morning of March 8 with the exchange of money and cocaine scheduled to take place in a mutually agreed location in Marlette Township.

Gray said the drug task force arranged for surveillance and arrest teams to cover the Marlette location.

"One suspect vehicle was driven by the Romulus cocaine suppliers and appeared to be conducting countersurveillance cover for the second vehicle driven to the meet spot by the Detroit suspect. The Detroit suspect met with Deputy Siemen to discuss the exchange but appeared to be extremely agitated and nervous and began to make additional demands to be fulfilled to complete the purchase."

When those demands were not met, Gray said, the Detroit suspect left without completing the drug sale, followed by his Romulus suppliers in the second vehicle. Drug task force surveillance crews followed

"When the marked unit signaled the Detroit suspect to pull over, the suspect fled southbound on M-53 at a high rate of speed, pursued by Sgt. Wagester," Grav said, adding the chase continued southbound out of Sanilac County and into eastern Lapeer County.

The Romulus suspects, meanwhile, also continued southbound on M-53, followed by surveillance officers, who eventually stopped them near the intersection of Montgomery Road.

"A search of the Romulus vehicle resulted in the recovery of 10 ounces of import grade cocaine and a stolen and loaded 9mm handgun," Gray said. "The suspects were arrested and transported to the Sanilae County jail and their vehicle impounded.

Pursuit of the Detroit suspect continued and approached the northern limits of Imlay City, where officers from several departments deployed "spike strips" to flatten the suspect vehicle's tires. The strips worked, but the suspect continued southbound, driving on the wheel rims of his truck, according to Gray. As the chase approached M-53 and I-69, he said, Wagester performed a modified "pit" maneuver that was successful in finally stopping the suspect vehicle.

Investigators said the seized cocaine has a wholesale value of \$10,000. If it had been left uncut but broken down into street level gram weights, the cocaine would have had a sale value of more than \$34,280, Gray said. "If cut to normal street level purity levels and broken down into gram weight for sale, the cocaine would have

McNaughton home after year of missionary work

Joshua McNaughton has returned home to Cass City ready to begin studies to become a missionary or a pastor for the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.

McNaughton graduated from Concordia College. Ann Arbor, and immediately volunteered for a year's service at Ysleta Lutheran Mission in Mexico.

McNaughton's headquarters was in El Paso, Texas, a stone's throw across the river into Mexico. Actually, there was little difference working in El Paso or in Mexico.

The El Paso church was in a poor section, McNaughton pointed out, and was primarily populated by Mexican-Americans. We held 2 services on Sunday, one in English and the other in Spanish. The English services were attended by 10 to 20 worshippers and the Spanish services drew 70 to 80.

Those 2 services were just a start for McNaughton and the volunteer missionaries in El Paso. A quick bus ride across the border enabled McNaughton to attend 2 church services in Mexico, one at 2 p.m. another at 3:30 p.m., and sometimes a third service at 6 p.m.

McNaughton was right at home at these services. He majored in Spanish at Concordia and spent some time in Spain. He is as proficient in Spanish as he is in English, with no need to transfer Spanish in his mind to English to understand conversations.

McNaughton was one of a group of volunteers, each with special talents. McNaughton's was music in the "Sounds of Ysleta Music Ministry'

Possibly the highlight of his year was that he was selected to help with the installation of a pastor at one of the churches.

Volunteers work without pay and receive financial support from various Lutheran churches, Lutheran Church Missouri Synod World Missions and, McNaughton noted, from mom and dad. Dave and Connie McNaughton, Cass City.


Speaking of robins, let me say that a boo-boo in naming robin spotters has left me as red-faced as a robin's breast.

In another recent investigation, TNU officers executed a search warrant in Huron County's Caseville Township early last week following a month-long investigation.

Krugielki said the investigation began with TNU officers receiving tips that a suspect residing in an apartment was using and/or selling illegal drugs.

"The search warrant was executed March 8 at approximately 2:30 p.m.," he said. "The search resulted in TNU officers seizing a quantity of suspected marijuana from the location." No arrests were made and

TNU officials said no additional information would be released pending submission of warrant requests to the Huron County Prosecutor's Office The Huron County Sheriff's

Department assisted in the investigation. Krugielki reminds citizens

that suspected drug activity in Sanilac, Huron, Tuscola and Lapeer counties can be reported anonymously to TNU by calling 1-877-868-8477 or 1-877-TNU-TIPS.

I always get a kick out of wine writers. They are such inventive fellows, you just have to like them.

A recent newspaper column is a case in point. The writer describes a red dinner wine as, "A gorgeous wine, supple and muscular, with deep roasted flavors of meat, smoke, and espresso."

The wine writers' comments always take me back to my wine tasting experience in the mid-70s. I was a county extension agent at the time, and each county with any kind of wine grape industry was asked to send an agent to the research station for the annual meeting.

Imagine my chagrin when I learned this conclave consisted of a couple of hours of research reports, followed by an afternoon of wine tasting. This was a real tasting, too. Where each person is given a couple of glasses, some water for rinsing his mouth, and a little can to spit in.

The idea is to take a sip of wine, taste it, and spit it into the can. Then, you rinse your mouth with water before the next sample. It seemed a horrible waste to me, but I figured the organizers knew what they were doing.

This wasn't just a bunch of sheepherders, either. The included gathering winemakers, growers, and wine writers, and a few plain old county agents like Fred and me.

Fred sat across the room, but I could see he wasn't any more comfortable with this shindig than I was. He wasn't much of a wine drinker, and probably hadn't consumed an entire glass in years.

We had barely begun tasting when the wine critics began waxing their adjectives. "This one might be O.K. with cheese, but I would like to see a little more ambiance and a bit more nose," one fellow said.

"I sense the flavors of black cherry and anise, mingling with undertones of smoked bacon, spice, and vanilla," another added.

"That's what folks need," I thought. "A good breakfast wine.'

This went on for some time — until we had tasted 30 wines or more. Then, a man from British Columbia's Okanogan Valley stood up and said, "I have a couple of cases in my car I would like for each of you to try."








Red Hawk Talks

Opinions tend to vary from student to student and especially from parent to parent. However, it was consensual by the seniors that sex education should be offered at our high school. Forty-two of the fifty-three seniors that responded to my questionnaire felt it should be offered. Issues that should be addressed in this class varied, but one thing remained apparent. Along with a variety of health related issues this awkward topic definitely needs discussion. Parents and authoritative figures may not want to admit this, but students feel they need to. Just recently, I was randomly selected to participate in the 2004 Tuscola county schools adolescent health survey, which prompted me to research this issue. These results are not yet tallied, but the past surveys make a few issues evident.

In the 2002 Health Survey for Tuscola County there were a few results I believe many parents and adults would find shocking. It is important to remember that the results included high school students any age from 12 through 18. A variety of questions are asked. Sometimes a statement was given and your opinion was asked. You had to state whether you strongly agreed, agreed, were unsure, disagreed, or strongly disagreed. One opinion on the survey stated, "Most teenagers do not use alcohol these days." The highest percentage was 38, and these students disagreed. The following statement was "Most teenagers do not use other drugs these days." Again, 40.5% of the students questioned disagree with this statement.

What do these results show? The majority of the students in high school feel most teenagers use drugs and alcohol. Results prove again there is an issue at hand when 42.1% of high school students feel alcohol abuse is a problem with youth. This is a huge percent! How can teachers and parents not recognize this when even the students can? However, if it is recognized, then why has

high or drunk because there is nothing better to do! This trend yet again continued with support. 39.7% of these same students feel there is a lot of pressure to do alcohol and other drugs.

These issues are definitely a problem, but the survey results showed that these weren't the only issues. Over 31% never talked with parents about their personal problems. Even 24% never talk with friends about their problems. With the students who have been pregnant only 30% kept their child, 30% adopted, 10% had abortions, and 20% had miscarriages. Although all of these numbers were low, the message is still not good. "Have your parents, or other adults in your family ever talked with you about what they expect you to do or not to do when it comes to sex? 39% answered NO. For the parents out there who think that sex isn't an issue until their children are 16 years old;

you could be wrong. 9% of the students who filled out this health survey were 14 to 15 years old when they had sex for the first time. 9% may be a low percentage, but what if this was your child in that percent? Society has been leading us-

into so many directions sometimes we don't know what to believe or what to accept. On television we see lesbians and gays pushing for their rights and even the Super Bowl had to be censored! For the students who don't have parents responsible enough to care, who will teach them what is dangerous and wrong.

I offered a questionnaire for the seniors to get their perspective on the option of a sex education class. The support for a class of this na-

ture was overwhelming. Sex related issues, STDs and ways to prevent them; many students felt should be addressed. Others mentioned were abstinence, contraception, AIDS, STDs and awareness information.

Critics of a Sex Education class may argue that it isn't up to teachers to enforce morals. However, if parents and society don't tell adolescents the consequences of decisions being made, who will? A class such as this might not have a huge impact on every student, however wouldn't it be worth it if even one teen pregnancy could be prevented, or an alcohol/drug related death? One in every four college students has an STD. Statistics like these need to be shared. Please think about these statistics. If you are the parent, student, teacher, or school board member it should be an issue you consider. Thank you.



The second annual Preschool Expo will be held April 17 from 9 a.m. to noon at the Sanilac Career Center, 175 E. Aitken Rd., Peck.



1673. Pesticides are chemicals designed to kill or repel living things that are considered by humans to be pests.

Pesticides include insecticides, herbicides, rodenticides, fungicides, wood preservatives, molluscicides, and disinfectants.

Household pesticides usually contain a small amount of chemicals designed to kill the pest, called active ingredients, and a number of inert ingredients, which are added to enhance the effectiveness of the application or use. All household pesticides have some degree of toxicity and the potential to harm human health and the environment. These chemicals need to be disposed of properly and safely. MSU entomologists research control of emerald ash borer

Michigan State University (MSU) entomologists spent much of 2003 evaluating methods to control emerald ash borer (EAB), an exotic pest that threatens ash trees in Michigan. A report that summarizes the results from their insecticide trials is now available in hard copy or on the Web

The report provides a summary of the insecticide products and application techniques tested, including the advantages and disadvantages associated with specific products and techniques. The study evaluated the ability of insecticides to control EAB adults and larvae and assessed the persistence of the insecticides over time. The insecticide reoccurred in search Washtenaw and Livingston counties in 2003.

In the opening 2 games of the championship, Owen-Gage started fast and enjoyed big leads.





Bill would cancel insurance fine

The Senate Appropriations Committee has voted to cancel the \$300 fine for motorists who are ticketed for failing to produce proof of insurance, provided they can demonstrate that they were insured at the time of the infraction.

The legislation, House Bill 4308 (HB 4308) amends Public Act 165 of 2003, which assessed certain "driver responsibility" fee increases for people who have 7 or more points on their record or who commit serious moving violations. Included in PA 165 was a fine of \$300 for drivers who cannot produce proof of insurance when requested to do so by a law enforcement official.

"Penalizing law abiding citizens for an honest mistake is no way to make public policy or balance the budget," Barcia said. "I strongly support this measure to put






