Skilled team saves lives in rolling emergency room

Dan Mashike turned his back on a career in electronics to be a full-time emergency medical worker.

He had worked in electronics for 23 years, but decided to take a 50 percent pay cut and join Mobile Medical Response (MMR) full-time in 1989 instead of follow Orbital Fluid Technologies to Virginia Do not call Mashike just an ambulance driver, though the 46-year-old is a paramedic, doctor and health technician all in one.

MMR center, which comes complete with two bedrooms, plush furniture, a kitchen and a TV. The comforts of home ease the stress of the job — Mashike said the average length of time a person stays with MMR is

O-G athletic director and coach calls it quits

Lay-offs approved in June following the closure of Gagetown Elementary School have cost the Owen-Gage School District its athletic director and assistant football coach.

The school board accepted "with deep regret" Josh Hahn's resignation during a monthly meeting Monday night.

Hahn served as both athletic director and assistant football coach, and also briefly held the title of dean of students, a new position created by school officials earlier this year to assist with administrative duties after the district reduced administration by hiring a parttime superintendent.

Hahn's pay as dean of students was \$15,000. He received no fringe benefits.

The board eliminated the dean of students position along with several other fulland part-time positions last month after voting to close the elementary school and move the younger students to the junior-senior high campus in Owendale.

District resident Tom Jeffery asked the board to reconsider its decision to eliminate Hahn's administrative job, saying that during Hahn's brief tenure in the position, discipline problems were elearing up and the athletic program was flowing smoothly.

In addition, Hahn served the district as a substitute teacher and could play an important role should Supt. Bob Peterson decide to leave the district. Peterson accepted the job last year on a parttime, temporary basis.

"I think you were getting a big bang for your buck (with Hahn)" leffery said "The students like him and, more importantly, I think they respected him."

"Did we get our money's worth? Yeah, I think you got a lot more than your money's worth," he added.

Aside from the athletic director and football coaching positions, school officials are also trying to find a golf coach. Letters sent to district employees, announcing the vacant positions, haven't drawn any applications yet, according to Peterson.

"I've been punched twice and chased with a knife," he said. "We're generally not dealing with people in the best of situations.

Mashike is one of many dedicated EMT workers employed by MMR, the emergency response service that covers nine Michigan counties. Four stations in Tuscola County ---- Vassar, Fairgrove, Caro and Cass City --- run one ambulance per day with two workers aplece.

Some days, such as most of last Friday, the only calls received are for patient transfers from one hospital to another. Transfers account for about 60 percent of an MMR team's duties.

Other days, though, workers barely find time to eat or use the restroom in between calls.

Mashike said what makes him most upset is how people think of ambulance drivers as just that.

"It's a big lack of respect, and everyone here gets upset because people see us as just ambulance drivers," he said. "We had a patient once go into cardiac arrest, and we took care of him so he got out. ...We're a rolling emergency room.'

Mashike and his partner last Friday, Rikki Tschirhardt, met at 6 a.m. for the shift change. MMR workers in the country generally work 24hour shifts, but those with seniority can opt to work different 12-hour shifts.

After cleaning the vehicles, the pair spent the better part

five years. "If God wants me to be successful, I will be," he said,

adding that many former EMT workers go on to become doctors, nurses, lab techs, police officers and firefighters.

Tschirhardt, 24, came to MMR after volunteering with Central Huron for a few years. As an emergency medical technician, she said the hardest thing to get used to is how different paramed ics operate.

Mashike, for example, practices triage as soon as he arrives at the scene. Triage is a French term - in EMTspeak, it means to sort out the bodies and figure out if backup police, firefighters and helicopters need to be alerted. Mashike said this must be done as soon as possible because response times in the Thumb are a lot longer than in Saginaw, where he works part-time.

"I miss the city a lot," Tschirhardt said. "Things aren't as widespread."

After triage is completed, EMT workers go to work on the patients, making sure they have vital fluids and oxygen. Mashike said an ambulance is a moving hospital and he performs many necessary services that are needed right on the spot.

"I've had doctors say they have nothing to do once we get there," he said.

Sometimes, people get confused about why there is more than one ambulance at a scene. In the 1960s, all an ambulance driver did was shovel the body into the back and race to the hospital. Over time, ambulances came com-

plete with life-support equipment and the personnel who could operate it.

Now, a scene could feature an Emergency Life Support ambulance, a First Response snowmobile accidents.

"The next phase of the work will officially begin Thursday and the new detour will begin at that time," said Duane Maas, delivery engineer at the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) Transportation Ser-

vice Center in Cass City. "Frank Street will be closed on both sides of M-81 on Thursday and probably Friday so crews can install a storm sewer across the intersection," Maas explained. "Frank Street will be open after the storm sewer is installed but closed again when paving begins in August."

Maas noted that parking has been prohibited in downtown Caro since Monday to allow crews to work on saw cutting the road for a storm sewer trench. That work will be done under 2-way traffic until Thursday.

"Eastbound traffic will remain open through the downtown area during (this phase) but as stated earlier, parking on M-81 will be prohibited," Maas said.

As he often did on mornings. Dick Turner was working the drive-thru at Parkway when a man came through asking for condoms.

Turner misheard the man and instead gave him Alka-Seltzer. The man did not notice anything was wrong until he got home; he returned to Parkway about 10 minutes later and said he did not have a headache.

Such stories pepper the 22 years Turner and his wife Robbie spent at Parkway, the drive-thru convenience store at 6703 Main Street. However, after so many years entrenched in the community, the Turners called it quits on June 30.

The couple sold Parkway to Mike and Renee Brinkman, who took over the business on July 1.

"We had a great time but it was time to retire," said Robbie, 68. "The people of Cass City have been very faithful to us and I hope they keep going to Parkway." Brinkman said he has no

plans to change anything yet because he is still learning how to operate the store.

"I bought it for something new," said Brinkman, a former shop worker. "I thought it would be a good challenge."

Robbie and Dick, 77, started the store in 1982 and ran it each day. Dick usually operated the window while Robbie made pizza and caught up on office work.

Although Michigan outlawed the selling of alcohol in a drive-thru in 1985, the "grandfather law" ensured the Turners could keep selling alcohol, since they built the store prior to the law.

Robbie said morning was the busiest time, especially for mothers who were trying to feed their kids breakfast but needed emergency milk or coffee. She often served customers in robes and curl-

"It's very convenient and wonderful," she said, "especially since America is hooked on drive-thrus."

In addition to beverages and picnic supplies, Parkway's pizza is in high demand. Robbie said there are few places where one can get a single slice of drivethru pizza, and the construction of Little Caesars did not hurt business any.

"People like their pizza like they like their eggs," she said cryptically. The Turners, who have been

married since 1976, will spend their free time tending to the garden and home. Dick has never seen Florida, so a winter vacation could be in order, though the couple does not plan to leave Michigan because they like snow.

"We're just sad to see (Parkway) go," she said.

It's past time, but the remedy is incomplete. Awaiting the governor's signature last week was a change in the listing in Michigan's sex registry. It eliminates the listing of persons having consensual sex with minors within 3 years of their own age.

Teenagers now having consensual sex are subject to listing for 25 years as Michigan sex offenders. There is no differentiation. These teens and criminals that commit rape and assault are grouped. Obviously this is not fair and the new law corrects the injustice. However, it does nothing for those teens already on the list. The only recourse is to petition the court for removal of their names from the list after 10 years.

Listing teens with consenting partners makes it difficult to learn the real predators among the 34,000 names on the list, critics point out. A half-measure is better than none, but the amendment of the law still needs more work to be fair to all.

An Oxford man who failed to pay child support for nearly a year will be making up those payments for some time to come.

Donald M. Wrathell Jr. was sentenced last week in Tuscola County Circuit Court, where Judge Patrick R: Joslyn ordered the defendant to pay \$90,188.95 in restitution as well as \$120 in court costs and fines.

He was also sentenced 60 months probation and 365 days in the county jail, although the jail term was deferred without a date.

Wrathell previously pleaded guilty to failure to pay child support since October 2003.

In other circuit court proceedings last week:

•Michelle L. Gascoyne, 26, Carrollton, was sentenced to 43 days in jail and 12 months probation for her plea of guilty to writing a no account check for \$254.79 Aug. 19 in Reese.

The Moving Wall measures 252.83 feet in length, slightly longer than half the length of the memorial in Washington, D.C., and is composed of 74 separate frames, each containing 2 silk-screened panels. The tallest panels have 137 lines of names, while the shortest panels at each end of the wall have only one line. At the vertex of the all, the panels are just over 6 feet in height. As of Jan. 1, 2003, there were 58,228 names listed on the memorial. Some 1,300 of these are still unaccounted for prisoners of war (POWs) and missing in action (MIA). They are in chronological order, according to the date of casualty. Within each date, the names are alphabetized.

"Move over law" stiffens penalty

Motorists who fail to exercise due caution when approaching a tow truck or freeway courtesy patrol van providing roadside assistance

now face the possibility of spending 90 days in jail and being fined \$500.

Public Act 19 of 2004, passed in February by the Michigan Legislature, took effect earlier this month. It extends tow trucks and MDOT freeway courtesy patrol vans the same protection that covers police cars, fire trucks and other emergency vehicles.

The law mandates that a motorist who sees a vehicle ahead providing roadside service must move over one lane from the scene of the assistance being rendered, if possible. If moving over is not possible because of traffic in the adjoining lane, the motorist must reduce speed to a safe level, given traffic and weather conditions, before passing. On a 2-lane road, the motorist must slow to a safe speed until past the

service vehicle. Under the Michigan Vehicle Code, a person who does not move over or slow down when approaching and/or passing a stationary, authorized emergency vehicle is guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a maximum fine of \$500 and/ or imprisonment for up to 90 days.

The penalties are more severe for any motorist whose

action or inaction actually causes harm to the operator of an emergency service vehicle. If the result is injury, the

motorist is guilty of a felony punishable by up to 2 years in prison and a fine of \$1,000. If death results, the penalty is up to 15 years in prison and a fine of up to \$7.500.

The original law, known as the "move-over law," applied to emergency vehicles displaying flashing red lights. Because tow trucks and courtesy patrol vans use flashing amber lights, the original wording of the law did not cover them, so the legislature acted to correct

Traveling by vehicle continues to get safer judging by a new, record-high seatbelt use rate and a decrease in the number of traffic fatalities during the July 4 holiday weekend.

According to the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP), seatbelt use in Michigan has climbed to nearly 87 percent based on information compiled by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute.

The 86.8 percent rate is an all-time high for the state, besting last year's 84.8 percent record set following the 2003 Labor Day holiday.

OHSP officials estimated the state will prevent 10 traffic deaths for every one per-
