Mural resolution eludes VFW, council Monday

There appeared to be little movement during most of an hour-long discussion between Cass City officials and representatives of VFW Post 3644 Monday over a patriotic wall mural that has been the subject of debate for 2 vears now.

However, in the end, VFW Post Commander Ron Lomasney hinted that the veterans will probably meet with the village's zoning board of appeals next month in an effort to settle the is-

Both sides discussed the controversy at length during the monthly village Council meeting Monday.

The debate was sparked in June 2003 when then-village Manager Frank Sheridan and members of the local VFW post clashed over a large painting on the north side of the post's annex building. The painting features the Pledge of Allegiance and an eagle wrapped in the Ameri-

can Flag. Sheridan said the images amounted to a "wall sign" in the village's sign ordinance, which allows such signs provided they pertain to the use of the building and meet cer-

At the time, Sheridan said the post was repeatedly asked to apply for a zoning variance, but VFW members refused, saying the painting is a mural, not a sign. They have noted murals are not specifically addressed in the ordinance.

That position has not changed, judging by Lomasney's remarks to the council Monday.

In spite of Sheridan's opinion that the veterans are radicals who don't think they have to follow the law, Lomasney said, the veterans don't feel they are above the law. He said post members carefully examined the ordinance and feel their mural was not in violation of the zoning ordinance.

"Our position is very simple. What we have is a mural. A mural is not a sign. There are no guidelines in the ordinance for murals." Lomasney said.

Village President Bert Althaver noted the council last month directed the village's planning commission to review the ordinance in an effort to more clearly address murals in the future. However, he said, the VFW mural remains under the jurisdiction of the existing or-

Althaver conceded that Sheridan might have dealt with the veterans differently in an effort to resolve the issue, but that it's still the council's responsibility to enforce local ordinances.

"That puts us, I guess, as the bad guys, and we don't want to be the bad guys, and we don't think the VFW (are) the bad guys. All we want to do is resolve this within the frameworks of the village of Cass City.

"No one is opposed to the content of the sign/mural, whatever it is," continued Althaver, who emphasized that applying for a zoning variance is not tantamount to admitting that an error has been made. Variances, he explained, are available because special circumstances are always going to exist.

"There's nothing wrong and there's nothing negative with that. Unless we do it that way, we're really stuck," he added.

Lomasney suggested that the problem lies in "simple error" on the part of village officials who failed to specifically address murals in the ordinance. The solution,

he said, is for the village to "just plug it in. That's all we're saying is...there is an omission. Put it in. We have violated nothing." Trustee Don Richards asked

why it is such a big issue to apply for a variance.

"You have no mural ordinance. You have a sign ordinance," Lomasney replied.

Althaver reiterated the council's position, saying the village has a legal opinion that the mural violates the ordinance.

"I don't want to say this...but the only way for council to deal with this issue, unless the VFW seeks a variance, is in court," he said. "Please believe me. I'm not threatening anything. We're stuck. Please see where we sit and the way we're trying to deal with the situation."

Trustee Dwight Thabet indicated he doesn't believe the VFW post is in the wrong, and that the council should not rely on one legal opinion. "We're going to go to court and waste a lot of money, and then we're going to run into it again down the road," Thabet said. "I don't see the

sense in it.' "It's a matter of principle," Trustee Don Richards responded. It's about representative government - if you don't like a decision, you have a right to appeal," he added. "We do not want to fight. We want to resolve this. That's why we invited you (VFW members) here tonight."


Richards asked why the veterans refuse to request a variance. "Is it contempt for the process?'

"Absolutely not," Lomasney replied.

'We must resolve this or else we will end up in a very sad situation," Richards said. Several of the 2 dozen audience members, including Bud Schneeberger, also

voiced their opinions. "I'm not willing to go to court to get this settled," said Schneeberger, who added he would prefer to support

Arts center in hands of voters

and debate, residents in the Cass City School District next week will decide the fate of an \$11.5 million bond

If approved, school officials plan to construct a performing arts center estimated at \$7.5 million, and complete several major renovations/ upgrades of the district's existing buildings.

Residents will cast their ballots in the annual school election Tuesday, May 3, at Cass City High School. The polls will open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m.

If approved, school officials would be authorized to sell bonds totaling \$11.5 million.

The district's debt retirement tax levy for the middle school totaled 4.2 mills in 2004. Under the proposed bond issue, the new debt levy for the first year would be 5.46 mills, an increase of 1.26 mills. The debt would then be paid off in 2020, 12 years beyond the payoff of the middle school.

A chart demonstrating how the millage rate would affect property owners accompa-nies this story. School officials have emphasized that taxpayers receiving the Michigan Homestead Property Tax Credit would see little or no tax increase with passage of the new levy.

The proposed performing arts center would feature an 800-seat auditorium, dressing rooms, storage areas, a new band/vocal music room and restrooms. The facility would be built at the high school.

A group of parents initially spearheaded the proposal with the support of Director of Bands Doug Burtch, whose nearly 3-year tenure in Cass City has seen dra-

> High school band numbers have increased from the mid-20 range to about 80 this year, with a projection of more than 100 members next year. An estimated 40 percent of current middle school students are now enrolled in music programs.

Burtch has said the high school band has simply outgrown its rehearsal and storage facilities, with 245 concert band, concert choir and marching band uniforms crammed into inadequate spaces, and more than 2,000 music titles stored in file cabinets designed to hold 500 music pieces.

On a daily basis, according to Burtch, 80 musicians try to rehearse in a space that was designed for a 65-member band.

Aside from providing adequate rehearsal and performing areas, the performing arts center would enable the district to host Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association band festivals. But school officials empha-

size the facility would have many school-related uses, from concerts and awards ceremonies to Academic Track and Forensics competitions, to hosting guest speakers and fine arts festivals. The center would also offer a variety of community uses, they say, including community theatre and music concerts, recitals, charity and hospital benefits, and community forums.

School officials say that expanding the multipurpose room would enable them to address a possible court ruling requiring all Michigan schools to realign several athletic boys' and girls' sea-

Among the resulting changes would be aligning the girls' basketball season with the boys', along with wrestling and gymnastics, which translates into scheduling difficulties for practices and competitions. The expanded gym would make it easier to schedule those and avoid weekend and late night

practices. School officials also want to replace the roof at the former Deford Elementary School

and Don Booms are seeking a lone 4-year term, while Mike Byarski, Carol Peruski Fess and Martin Kubacki are running for a 2-year term that was created when Janice Sageman resigned.

In the Kingston Community School District, only the incumbents are seeking election to 4-year terms. They, are David Kolacz, the current school board president, and Trustee Seth Geister.

O-G okays pay hikes, narrows candidates

Owen-Gage School officials Thursday approved pay raises for the district's principal and support staff, and selected 6 individuals to interview for the newly created superintendent/K-12 principal position.

Meeting in special session, the board of education approved a 2-year contract with 22 support staff members, including secretaries, custodians, cooks, parapros and bus drivers, and for the principal's post.

The pact gives them a 3percent pay increase in 2004-05, and another 2.5 percent in 2005-06. School Supt. Bob Peterson said the increase will cost the district about \$11,000 the first year.

Turning to the superintendent/K-12 principal position, the board narrowed a list of 27 applicants down to 6 candidates who will be inter-Please turn to back page.



with the story behind the title, let me share it: A panda walks into a café.

He orders a sandwich, eats it,

Leaves" by Lynne Truss.

draws a gun and fires 2 shots in the air. As the panda starts to leave, the confused waiter asks,

'Why?' The panda tosses him a poorly punctuated wildlife manual and says, "I'm a

panda. Look it up.' The waiter turns to the panda page and finds Panda, large black and white bear-like mammal native to China. Eats, shoots

and leaves." You can see how significant a misplaced comma can be. Another example of the value of punctuation is noted in the statements: A woman,

without her man, is nothing. Or, A woman: without her, man is nothing. Punctuation matters!

Some people don't believe in using commas. They simply string words together until they're done and then attach a period. (Truss, who is English, refers to it as a full stop.)

Others, who'don't understand the comma's purpose, drop one here and there indiscriminately, hoping one will fall in the proper place.

Alas, as ill-treated as the comma is, I fear the poor apostrophe is even more misused.

In discussing the misunderstood apostrophe, Truss says, "Why would they open a large play area for children, hang up a huge sign saying 'Giant Kid's Playground. and then wonder why everyone stays away from it? (Answer: everyone is scared of the Giant Kid)"

I'm convinced that only a handful of people know how to use the apostrophe. You often see an apostrophe

stuck where it has no business. Most of the farms that state in large letters on the barn "The Smith's" are not truly owned by a single smithy but by a family of

If they wanted to let the world know the barn belongs to the family, the apostrophe should go after the s, which designates more than one Smith and that they're all

More likely, the apostrophe is totally unnecessary. They just want people to know that the Smiths live there. No apostrophe needed.

There are sticklers who are ready to go to the mat for proper punctuation and some who might be categorized as punctuation snobs, looking down on anyone who doesn't use the marks exactly as they do. But then, you find that in every area of life.

As a retired proofreader, I notice improper punctuation and sometimes it irritates me

But for the most part, I feel that if a person has something worthwhile to say and is able to get it across to his readers, he's accomplished what he set out to do, regardless of punctuation.

Anyway, Lynne Truss presents what could be pretty dry subject matter in a clever, amusing way. If you're at all interested in it, I'd recommend the book.



The line graph below shows the mills levied from 1996 to 2020 assuming approval of the new bond issue. From 1996 to 2004, the mills levied have been between 4.81 and 4.2. The mill levy will increase to 5.46 in 2005 until the middle school debt is paid off in 2008. In 2009, the mill will decrease to 4.99. After that time, the mills steadily go down each year until 2020.



Crash injures 4

Snow storm blasts area, cuts power, closes school

A ferocious late spring storm that roared into the Thumb over the weekend dumped up to a foot of snow or more, covering roads with thick slush and cutting power to hundreds of residents.

Blizzard warnings were posted early in the weekend, prompting the cancellation of dozens of activities.

School officials in several area school districts, including Cass City, Owen-Gage, Kingston and Ubly, canceled classes Monday morning.

Meyer supports voting bill

The Michigan House last week approved a "no-reason early voting" bill designed to expand voter access and maintain integrity and security to the voting process.

State Rep. Tom Meyer, R-Bad Axe, said he voted in favor of House Bill 4569, which allows residents to vote at their local clerk's office during the one-week period before an election. To guard against fraud, he added, voters would be required to present a government- or school-issued photo identification card to cast early ballots.

"This bill will increase voter turnout and empower people to take part in our democratic process," Meyer

Secretary of State Terri Lynn Land last week testified before the House Oversight, Elections and Ethics Committee in support of the bill, saying the no-reason measure is a solid step in the ongoing effort to make the process more efficient and promote a higher voter turnout.



Although it unfortunately is not enforced, Art. II Sec. 6 of the Michigan Constitution states in part: "Whenever any question is required to be submitted by a political subdivision to the electors for the increase of the ad valorem tax rate limitation imposed by Sec. 6 of Art. IX for a period of more than 5 years, 'or for the issue of bonds,' only electors in, and who have property assessed for any ad valorem taxes in, any part of the district or territory to be affected by the result of such election or electors who are the lawful husbands or wives of such persons shall be entitled to vote thereon."

Apparently the wise legislators who wrote that into the Michigan Constitution understood the immorality of non-property owners voting to impose a property tax that they themselves would not have to pay.

I think it's admirable that young people are urged to get involved in the voting process. Although we should all vote in elections and concern ourselves with issues that affect our community, it's not only unconstitutional but somewhat obscene to recruit easily impressionable voting age students, who have never paid property taxes, to cast a vote to help impose a property tax upon those who are forced to pay the tax on a project that they consider to be unaffordable and an unnecessary luxury. The recruiting of voting age students to help pass the middle school bond proposal was a perfect example of this obscenity. I can only hope that history will not repeat itself and that some will not stoop to that level again when the community votes on the proposal for the new performing arts center.

Center not taxpayers' responsibility

To the Editor:

I would like to introduce myself, my name is John and my beautiful bride is named Jane. We have been married for some years, but I am not going to reveal how many. We are senior citizens and very fortunate to have lived as long as we have. We are in fairly good health, of course, are getting older.

I enjoy reading the letters to the editor, that is the first thing I turn to in the Chronicle. I respect everyone's opinion but do not necessarily agree with them all.

What I do not enjoy or respect are the people who write in and say, "If you don't like it why don't you move somewhere else," or "If you don't support our children you are not a responsible citizen of our community." I want those scoffers to know I belong here and I am going to stay here until the day I die. I will support what I think is right just and fair

With regard to school taxes, we already pay: 1. Tuscola Intermediate School (Tech Center - Highland Pines special needs children); 2. Cass City School debt; and 3. State Education Tax. These 3 taxes at the present rate of taxation for example: property of \$50,000 taxable value (1/2 of state equalized) totals \$699. Also, 2 percent of the sales tax supposedly earmarked for education. Then we have the rest of the property taxes (figured for Elkland Township) in the amount of \$562

for a total of \$1,261. We are on a fixed income and being seniors, we have very limited means of increasing our income. Other expenses have increased: health insurance (we pay our own), car insurance, homeowners insurance and the cost of prescription drugs. These increases have come in the last 12 months. Then we have increased heating costs and the cost of gasoline.

You start adding these up an increase here, an increase there - you decrease the amount available for other necessities such as food, dentist and doctor visits. Thus an increase in taxes becomes a very heavy burden. The increases mentioned affect everyone, not just seniors.

In the Thumb area, we have lost many manufacturing jobs and we are not replacing those jobs with jobs that are equal in pay and benefits to the jobs that were lost. We need to increase our tax base and that means bringing good paying jobs into the area. We need more jobs, not more taxes. These taxes only cause a hardship for many

people. The school tax has now reached the same point it was before the Headlee Amendment was passed. I personally do not think the performing arts center is a responsibility of the taxpayer. If a private investor wants to finance this venture, that would be great and it should be constructed on private
