Crash leaves area 9-year-old boy dead

A 2-vehicle traffic crash claimed the life a 9-year-old Kingston boy and left another child critically injured Sunday morning.

Troopers at the Michigan State Police post in Caro were dispatched to the intersection of M-24 and M-46, about 6 miles south of Caro, at 10:45 a.m., according to

First Lt. Doug Lautner, post

commander. Lautner reported 2 vehicles collided in the intersection when the driver of a westbound Dodge Intrepid attempted to turn south on M-24. The driver of the second vehicle, a Ford F-250, pickup truck, was eastbound on M-46 and made contact with the first vehicle's passenger side midsection.

Lautner said the crash resulted in one fatality. Two other occupants were injured and both were transported to Covenant Hospital in Saginaw. A 7-year-old was listed in critical condition, and a 38-year-old driver was treated for minor injuries and then released.

Troopers did not release the names of the occupants by

Reports state alcohol does not appear to be a factor in the accident.

Troopers are continuing their investigation. They were assisted at the scene by the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department, Caro Fire Department, MMR personnel and 2 conservation officers from the Department of Natural Resources.

Board passes resolution

The Cass City School Board took another step at its regular meeting Monday towards a vote May 3 on a proposed \$11.5 million bond issue for a new Performing Arts Center together with building and equipment renovations.

The board passed a resolution asking the Michigan Department of Treasury to approve the preliminary bond qualification. The bond issue is to be decided at the new regular election May 3 that includes election of school board members. This year the election will be held at the school because the VFW hall is not available. The election will be at the school this year only.

Supt. Ken Micklash released figures that show the cost to taxpayers if the millage is approved. Taxes will increase 1.26 mills from 4.2 mills now paid to 5.46 mills

Storm blasts Thumb

A weekend snowstorm that dumped several inches of snow in the Thumb caused headaches for motorists and translated into long hours for road crews, but law enforcement officials reported few serious traffic accidents.

The blustery storm blew into the area early Saturday morning and increased in intensity, with wind gusts reaching nearly 40 miles per hour, causing whiteout conditions at times.

According to weather data recorded at the Cass City Wastewater treatment plant, the total snowfall was 6.8 inches, although amounts varied from area to area, with some portions of the Thumb receiving nearly a foot of snow.

The blizzard prompted Tuscola County Central Dispatch officials to urge residents to stay home unless they had an emergency. The announcement came as county road commission officials decided to instruct their truck drivers to pull off the roads and stand-by when they encountered zero visibility conditions.

In Cass City, a DPW crew of 5 men along with 3 blade trucks and a grader started plowing early, but their efforts proved futile by mid-

day.
"Saturday we went out from around 8 until noon," said DPW Supt. Gary Barnes, who said the crew was eventually forced to give

up.
"It was a blizzard. It just kept coming down," Barnes

Northwood CNA training a first in the state, nation

Kelly Richmond ran into a problem when she sought out a training program that would hone her staff's skills specifically in assisted living and adult foster care environments - there were none to be found.

But that didn't deter Richmond, who serves as director at the Northwood Meadows assisted living and dementia care facility in Cass

Richmond turned to Paula Pobanz, nurse manager at Hills and Dales General Hospital, and Karen Perry, director of nursing, also at Hills and Dales. And together they created a unique training program they hope will become a model for similar facilities across the nation.

The first students to complete the program received their certificates and congratulations from Northwood and hospital of-

ficials during a "graduation" ceremony Friday.

'It all started early this summer - the end of June," Richmond said of the innovative training. "Assisted living in this area, the business itself, is going to become more competitive as the Tuscola County Medical Care Facility opens up its new wing, and we wanted to make Northwood the choice of families that would need as-

care." Richmond said she began to look into accreditation for certified nursing assistants


sisted living or dementia

(CNAs) in the areas of longterm and adult foster care.

"There aren't any," said Pobanz, who wears many hats at Hills and Dales including CN trainer and director of infection control, employee health and chemotherapy.

"So, with Paula's help and Karen's help, they put together a course," Richmond said, adding the 4-month training session included a couple hours of classroom

Generous gift

FYI investing \$5,000 in youth

A community youth organization in Tuscola County has invested in the Novesta Church of Christ's popular "Fifth Quarter Parties".

Future Youth Involvement (FYI), a branch of the Tuscola County Community Foundation, recently awarded \$5,000 to the church to help fund the youth parties, which are held after Cass City High School home football and basketball games.

The grant money is being used to purchase a number of items, including an air hockey table, new board games, recreational equipment and a swing set, according to Brad Speirs, youth minister at Novesta. "We've got 3 new TVs with an X-Box, Playstation and a Game Cube," Speirs said.

The Tuscola County Community Foundation's mission is to maintain and strengthen the quality of life for all Tuscola County residents, to encourage philanthropy in the area by serving as a convenient vehicle to receive and distribute gifts of all sizes, to grow and maintain

a permanent endowment asset base from a wide range of donors, to address the changing needs of the community, and to provide a neutral, non-political convening place where visions and ideas for improvement can be presented, researched,

developed and prioritized.

The goal of the Fifth Quarter Parties, meanwhile, is to provide students in grades 7 through 12 with a safe and enjoyable environment to socialize. It's an outreach ministry for the church that has literally served hundreds of young people in the com-

munity. The parties were started during the boys basketball season in the mid-1990s following a tragic accident involving a teen who was killed in an accident after drinking and then getting behind the wheel of car.

Speirs said the church's youth group decided then to spearhead a weekend activity that might help kids to make better choices, one that offered an alternative to gatherings involving alcohol and drugs.

"There were maybe 10 or 15 of us that first couple of years," he recently recalled. "It was 10 to 30 kids for 3 years, and then it started to slowly get bigger. In the late 90s up until a couple of years ago we'd have 50 to 60 kids."

Attendance has continued to grow, with 100 teens or more attending Fifth Quarter Parties in 2002. During the football season last fall, up to 175 youths poured into the Cass City area church on Friday nights.

And the numbers are holding this basketball season. "We're averaging 150 (youths) per night," Speirs said. "We're still surprised every time they all show up."


The parties begin shortly after the home games and continue through about

"It's 95 percent Cass City (students that attend), but occasionally somebody from Cass City will bring their friends," said Speirs, who noted the atmosphere is informal, although the teens are asked to sign in and fill

With exams being over, and school being back to the way it was, it is now time to focus on other things that need to be done.

For junior students, it is now time to prepare for the MEAP test, where they can have the opportunity to receive \$2,500 for college courtesy of the Michigan Merit Award. That is also true for seniors who want to retake the MEAP test, so they can get the Merit Award before college.

Speaking of college, high school seniors also have to start thinking about the FAFSA application before the deadline approaches, and also finishing up on scholarships while there is still time

At Owen-Gage, doing well on the MEAP test is stressed and encouraged. In order to prepare, teachers will give assignments that will specifically help them for the test prior to taking it, so when students do take it, they are not as overwhelmed or get surprised by anything they might not know or under-

Teachers prepare students for the MEAP test very early on in high school. Before a special reading or writing assignment, teachers will tell you whether or not it will be on the MEAP test, so the students know to pay extra attention. Even though the juniors will not take the MEAP until April, it is a good thing to start early so they will know exactly what to do when they actually have to take the test.

One thing that is definitely a priority for high school seniors who plan to go to college is filling out the FAFSA. For those who don't know, FAFSA stands for Free Application for Federal Student Aid, and it is one of the most important things to have when it comes to college, because it is the first step in the financial aid process. To begin, the students need help from their parents. The reason for that is because before you can send your FAFSA application in, it is a good idea to have your parents complete their tax return, because if you send in your FAFSA before completing your tax return, it could result in inaccurate information, and may delay the federal student aid process.

It is important to also get in your application early, so if corrections have to be made, it will leave your college enough time to do it, so apply as soon as you can after Jan. 1, 2005.

When thinking of the Michigan Merit Award and the FAFSA application, it also serves as a reminder of application deadlines for scholarships.

When looking for the right kind of scholarships, you can visit your guidance counselor's office, or go online. There are websites actually dedicated to scholarship searches. It can narrow down the scholarships you are eligible for by asking questions about your family, extracurricular activities, and different things that you have been involved in or have been awarded to you in school. It also gives you the amount the scholarships are worth and will send you emails when a scholarship is nearing its deadline. Some of those scholarship websites are www.fastweb.com, and www.cashe.com.

After exams are over, most people think that school goes back to normal, and for some that is true, but for juniors and seniors, it is a time of preparing for the MEAP test and making scholarship and financial aid deadlines. Doing all those things are preparing us for the future that seems so far away.

For all the procrastinators, I will say that the best way to go is to get everything done now, so you don't have to worry about it later, because that future that seems so far away will be here before we know it.

Down Memory Lane

5 YEARS AGO

A job well done isn't always rewarded, but the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department took time recently to thank some Cass City police officers for their assistance at the scene of a fatal traffic accident. Cass City Village Council members reviewed a letter from Sgt. Kevin Thane, written to village Police Chief Gene Wilson, during a brief monthly meeting Monday night. Thane specifically thanked full-time Cass City Officer Mike Gebauer and part-time officers Bill Hartzell and Mark Durfee for their assistance during the early morning hours of Jan. 16 after a pickup truck struck and killed a pedestrian south of Cass City. "Without the assistance of these officers, the accident would have been very difficult to control with only the 2 county officers," Thane continued. "Having your officers on scene within a few minutes was a great benefit in securing the scene and preventing contamination of the evidence."

Bitterly cold temperatures and snow aren't exactly ideal conditions for running, but that hasn't deterred Lindsey Mills from training for what she hopes will be her best ever high school track season. 

20 victory in game 4 and then ended the match with a 15-6 margin in the final game.


Swiastyn was perfect, again, from the service line in 24 attempts and recorded

14 points and 6 aces for the Bulldogs. Swiastyn also added 13 assists, 10 kills, and





Landfill materials banned

As of Nov. 1 a series of new state laws were passed that adds to the list of materials that are banned from all Michigan landfills

Michigan landfills and waste hauling companies can no longer knowingly transport or accept for disposal whole tires, yard waste, or beverage containers. These laws are intended to stop importation of Canadian and out of state waste, but will affect all of us also.

Beverage containers are described as one-gallon or less in size and either a soft drink, soda water, carbonated natural or mineral water or other non-alcoholic carbonated drink, beer, ale or other

holic content, or mixed wine drink or mixed soft drink.

The prohibition does not include green glass containers before June 1, 2007.

All materials with a Michigan 10 cent deposit should be returned to stores that sell them for a refund. All other non-deposit beverage containers and green glass should be recycled through curbside recycling or taken to a recycling facility.

Tires should be taken to a recycling facility or to a tire retailer where a disposal fee must be paid.

Yard waste cannot be put to the curb for pick up other than during designated yard times. Yard waste can be put into compost piles and grass clippings should be mulched.

Trash haulers will be fined for transporting these banned items and can refuse pick up. Other banned items include: used oil, lead acid batteries, medical waste, asbestos, empty drums, and regulated hazardous waste.

Grant to fund research into harvesting wind

Farmers have always been at the mercy of the weather. Now, the wind currents that bring rain and snow may also bring Michigan producers

Michigan State University and the Michigan Energy Office are exploring the potential of wind energy development in the state - specifically, farms in the Thumb and in western Michigan. Wind energy can diversify the economy of rural areas and provide new sources of income

"Wind energy is an alternative way for farmers to increase their revenue," said Lynn Hamilton, project coordinator. "It's like a third

The project, entitled Integrating Wind Energy Resource Information into the Michigan State University Extension System, is being funded by a grant from the Michigan Energy Office and the U.S. Department of Energy. It will include wind energy workshops, information for farmers about the legal aspects of wind energy, and help for farmers in determining whether wind energy might be viable for their operations.

Farmers interested in wind energy production have 3 options, according to Hamilton.

"They can lease their land to developers, who put up the capital and operate the wind project while farmers receive payments for use of the property," she explained. "Farmers may also choose to develop and own the wind turbine themselves, either via cooperative or sole ownership. A third possibility is to install a small-scale wind turbine on the farm to reduce the energy costs of their op-

"If you manage the risk initially, in the long term profitability is good," Hamilton added. "After about 10 to 15 years, after the debt is paid, farmers can bring in 6 figures annually, just from the wind blowing."

MSU Extension farm management agents will work with farmers interested in wind energy to help them pursue grant opportunities and determine the best ownership structure for their op-

"The ownership structure determines the amount of revenue that stays in the locommunity," said Stephen Harsh, MSU agricultural economics professor and primary investigator.


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
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
