New village manager on board in Cass City

The Cass City Village Council formally hired new village Manager Peter J. Cristiano of Caseville during a regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The unanimous vote brings to a close a frustrating administrative search that ended with 2 previous hirings - first of Mark Glenn of Grand Blanc and then John L. McCurtain of Marquette. Both candidates subsequently withdrew, sending the council back to the drawing board.

This time, however, there were signs that the council's latest choice would be officially on the job Tuesday, including the fact that Cristiano was on hand during Monday's meeting.

Trustee Don Richards recommended hiring Cristiano, saying a background investigation and pre-employment physical have been completed and revealed no prob-

The contract approved by the council offered 3 additions not included in the previous manager contracts. They include giving Cristiano the option of resigning "with dignity and pride" should there be an irresolvable dispute between himself and the council. Cristiano will also be reimbursed for the use of his own vehicle for village business instead of using a villageowned vehicle, and the council approved paying him up to \$1,000 in moving ex-

Along with the duties of manager, Cristiano was appointed the village's street administrator and zoning administrator, and was authorized to sign MDOT contracts and to sign on all checking accounts.

In a related matter, the council officially relieved acting interim village Manager Rick Mohr of all of his administrative duties "with the highest possible com-

after a discussion about the need for outside aid in the search. Board members indicted that they had no strong opinions about the issue. President Teresa Rabideau said she had talked with the Reese superintendent and said that they drew 24 candidates for the job and were satisfied with the result. cost will be shouldered entirely by the village's water customers, who would see their water bills increase dramatically.

The village has no control over whether or not to building the treatment plant. The decision was made after federal officials reduced the acceptable level of arsenic in public water supplies from 50 parts per billion to 10 parts per billion. Arsenic levels in Cass City average 16 or 17 parts per billion.

Federal officials have made it clear they will fine municipalities that fail to address the arsenic issue, although a number of governmental units, including Cass City, are entering into administrative consent orders (ACOs) with the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality.

Mohr told the council Monday that he sent in Cass City's ACO Friday.

'That will give us, I believe, 30 additional months to bring our system into compliance. I think we are one of the first communities to sign an ACO," he said.

In other business, the council adopted 3 new village ordinances that address establishment of adult entertainment businesses, property maintenance, and dangerous buildings.

All of the ordinances were previously reviewed by the village's attorney and the village's zoning enforcement company, village President

Severance: dependable help is vital on the farm

Editor's note: This is the fourth in a series of agricultural stories the Chronicle is publishing this summer in cooperation with the Michigan Farm Bureau's Adopt-a-Farm program, which pairs members of the media with local farming operations. The goal is to give readers a close look at "life on the farm" through stories that track the ups and downs of agriculture through the eves of a single area farm family. In this installment, lifelong Sanilac County dairy farmer Randy Severance discusses the challenge of finding longterm, dependable help on a small dairy farm, and how

his lone, full-time employee,

Robinson, a 1982 Cass City High School graduate, works / days a week, although he puts in only a couple of 2hour shifts on most days.





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

Judging food is, at best, subjective. It's always influenced by factors other than just its quality.

I experienced that this morning when I spread jam on a piece of toast. This jam had everything going for it. Besides being great in itself, this is why it ranked a 10-plus for me. It was a jam that probably very few have been privileged to often eat. It was made from WILD blueberries (huckleberries). My nephew, who found and picked the berries and made the jam, gave it to me.

Every bite brings back pleasant memories of good times we shared together.

Because we were headed into Canada, we stopped at Port Huron to fill the gas tank. We lucked out because the price on June 23 was \$2.169 per gallon, the lowest we found all weekend. We also filled up later in Canada but can't give you a comparison. We purchased 50.89 liters and the cost

Even if you do the conversion and know how many liters are in a gallon you don't know the true cost unless you know the discount rate for that day.

It's safe to say it wasn't less expensive than gas in the United

At London the man looked over my car without a license plate on the front and smiled, you're from the states. I was checking for a place to eat and he said, try this restaurant (the Swiss Chalet Rotisserie & Grill) you'll like it, it's great. We did and it was good, but perhaps we left a shade less enthusiastic about it than the friendly Canadian.

Mine included a small order of ribs, baked potato, rolls, coleslaw and a beer. We split a generous apple turnover. Esther had chicken, potatoes, rolls, a tossed salad and coffee. The beer cost \$3.69, coffee, \$1.89 and the turnover, \$5.74. Total cost was \$34.28 Canadian. The food was better than the atmosphere and the service was adequate. Give it a 6.5 on the 1-10 scale.

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
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County early last week led Sanilac County Drug Task Force officers to a healthy crop of marijuana. The operation targets

Gray noted the marijuana plants were transported to the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department, where they

were photographed, separated and itemized for transport to the crime lab.

"For scientific purposes, the crime lab will analyze each individual plant's root system," Gray explained. The crime lab will also test the marijuana plants' leaf and bud growth for positive mari-

The third example is a man and wife who operate an architecture and design business. These folks are expecting a baby this fall, so their home has "the feeling of

movement and beginnings." That's kind of scary, it seems to me. Anytime my house gets the feeling of movement, I'll be looking for the insurance policy.

The owner of the design business comments, "I tend to think that physical minimalism that tends to do with design or environment could be different than a lifestyle or a metaphysical process.

CRP extension offered

USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) officials last week announced that farmers and ranchers with certain Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts expiring this year may extend their contracts for one year.

"The expiration affects approximately 16,165 acres now protected by the CRP in Michigan," said Bruce Weir, state executive director for the USDA Farm Service Agency. "Extending certain, existing contracts will ensure that CRP's environmental

benefits are preserved."

The extension option applied to CRP participants with contracts scheduled to expire Sept. 30, 2005, and whose original contracts with the extension will not exceed 15 years. Michigan offices of USDA's Farm Service Agency will notify eligible CRP participants of their option to modify and extent their CRP contracts.

In all, about 7,000 contracts are eligible for the extension. The deadline to apply is Sept.

change participants' rental rates. All or a portion of the acreage under contract may be included in an extension, but no new acreage may be added. Obligations and responsibilities under the original contract continue to apply to contacts that are modified and extended.

Weir said that USDA is not planning to offer a general CRP sign-up in fiscal year 2005. However, he added, producers may continue to enroll relatively small, highly desirable acreage, such as fil-

The extension will not ter strips and riparian buffers in the continuous CRP at any time at their local FSA office.

The CRP is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land.

Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resourceconserving cover vegetation to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion and enhance wildlife habitat. In return, FSA provides participants with rental payments for 10- to 15-year contracts and cost-share assistance to establish the prac-

Since its inception in 1986, CRP continues to reduce soil erosion, improve water quality and wildlife habitat, and sequester atmospheric carbon in the 35 million acres currently enrolled in the program.



In addition to his outside artistry, Glaza has the ability to put the ball on the floor and drive to the cylinder.



'Mrs. Allen simply (wanted) Mr. Allen to leave the home for the night and not be arrested," he added. "Based upon established procedure, Mr. Allen was taken into custody and transported to the Huron County Jail.

Huron County District Court ordered Allen's release Thursday afternoon after he posted a \$250 cash bond. A formal arraignment date is to be scheduled.

"This morning I will begin the formal, legal procedure of contacting the Michigan Attorney General for the appointment of a special prosecutor to review the entire

matter to determine if formal charges will be filed," Gaertner said. "This will be done even though Mrs. Allen does not wish to press charges."

Even though a determination of guilt has not been made in court, Gaertner said he has suspended Allen from his duties as an assistant prosecutor pending the outcome of the review by the special prosecutor.

"He will continue in his capacity as county corporation counsel," added Gaertner, who said he will take no further action until a decision has been made regarding formal charges. "At that point I will make a decision as to his employment status with my

Sewer grant approved

State Rep. Tom Meyer and Sen. Jim Barcia recently announced the Michigan Economic Development Corporation has approved a \$600,000 grant to upgrade the sewer system for the Village of Millington.

The funds will be used to place a 24-inch clay liner in a village lagoon. While the village was making upgrades to its 2 sewer lagoon cells, it was discovered that one lagoon no longer had a suitable clay liner.

"The new liner will help keep local residents healthy and safeguard our environment from possible ground contamination," said Meyer, R-Bad Axe. "I commend village officials for working hard to take care of a potential problem. The upgrade will improve efficiency and

fortify the lagoon for years to come.'

"This grant will help avert a serious environmental crisis and dramatically reduce the financial burden on Millington residents," said Barcia, (D-Bay City). "I am pleased that we were able to work with the MEDC to secure this important investment in Millington's future."

The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality has currently quarantined the lagoon cell. Lagoon capacity is now at 45 percent and if the cell is not relined, the village will have to dump their inflow more often and with limited treatment into Millington Creek.

Grant funding comes from the Community Development Block Grant program. The local contribution is \$550,000.
