

Police: beware of scam artists

ties in Huron and Tuscola counties are continuing to warn Thumb residents to beware of a myriad of scams designed to cheat the elderly and others out of their cash. Huron County Sheriff Kent Tibbits said Thursday that his department and other area agencies have received several phone calls from residents complaining about scams over the past several

Law enforcement authori-

Tibbits said his department's detectives have been inundated with calls from citizens who have received calls from people asking for bank account num-

"Sadly enough, people have been giving out their information to these callers," Tibbits added. "There's not much we can do about it if you give out your personal information other than take a police report.

"Most of these scams can originate from any part of the world, but when a kind voice talks to you and acts concerned and they want to help you, we let our guard down, and that's when they get

Tibbits said residents must be on guard at all times when it comes to sharing their financial information.

"Do not give any personal information to anyone over the phone or to a stranger at your door. Be suspicious of anyone that asks for your bank account number, Social Security number or anything you may consider private,"

"If you feel that you have been a victim and have given out your bank account number to a caller, don't be embarrassed," Tibbits added. "Just go to your bank and ask that your account be closed. You can't do this over the sonal check.

Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern issued a similar warning Thursday, saying he had been informed of the latest scam targeting senior citi-

"In the past 24 hours, seniors have been calling their banks in regards to the following: the caller identifies him/her as a 'National Security Provider', saying that your personal identification has been posted on the Internet. The National Security Provider then offers to delete it for you to protect you," Kern said. "But before they delete the information, they ask for pertinent information such as your Social Security number and your bank numbers off your per-

Veteran Ubly educator honored as top teacher

When Ubly High School teacher Nancy Elliott tells her senior English students to go fly a kite, she means it. Seniors wrap up the school year in Elliott's class by completing what seems to be a pretty simple assignment construct a kite that will take to the sky. If it flies, they get an A. If it doesn't, well, they don't.

It might seem like a strange English class assignment, but the kite project is just one way Elliott challenges her students to go beyond mastering reading and writing. The veteran instructor's approach to teaching was recently honored by the Sec-

ondary Section of the Na-

tional Council of Teachers of

English (NCTE), which

awarded Elliott the 2005 Secondary Section Teacher of Excellence Award for the state of Michigan. She was selected for the honor by the Michigan affiliate of NCTE.

Elliott is the only English teacher to receive the award in Michigan this year. The award is based on evi-

dence of "excellent classroom teaching of English" at the secondary school level. Elliott will be formally honored at a luncheon scheduled for Nov. 19 during the NCTE Convention in Pittsburgh.

"I was really pleased and honored and humbled by it (award) because there are a lot of good English teachers out there," said Elliott, who has taught in the Ubly Com-

munity Schools for 37 years. Elliott's kite assignment is a good example of why she earned this year's NCTE award.

"It sounds like a real easy problem, but it's a creative thinking, a critical thinking project. I've seen valedictorians struggle with this," she said. "Really, a lot of times it separates the kids who can think from the ones who can memorize. You need both you need to learn the material, but you also have to apply it.

"I think one of the things that's really important to do is to try to make kids think do a lot of critical thinking that's vital," Elliott added. "So often in life, if something doesn't work, you have to find a way to fix it."

911 funding on line in Nov. 8 election

won't be deciding any political races in the Tuesday, Nov. 8 election, but they will help to decide the fate of a proposal to continue funding emergency 911/Tuscola County Central Dispatch ser-

County voters will be asked to renew the 911 operating surcharge of up to 16 percent (not to exceed \$3.20 per month per telephone line) for 5 years to continue funding emergency telephone answering and dispatch services.

Approval would not mean an increase in the surcharge, according to Robert J. Klenk, Tuscola County Central Dispatch director.

"This is a renewal of the surcharge that has been in place since 1996," he said. Since the bond for the radio system and building will be paid off in 2006, the surcharge will not increase and will mostly likely be re-

Klenk explained that under state law, county voters can authorize a telephone line surcharge up to 16 percent per month. The county board can enact an additional 4 percent, for a maximum of 20 percent, or \$4 per line, per

Tuscola County collects \$3.10 of that amount, according to Klenk, who emphasized the county has never collected the full amount authorized by law.

"We continue to collect

Cass City area residents only what is needed to fund the Tuscola County Central Dispatch Center," he said. "As the expenses have varied, so has the surcharge. The surcharge was originally set at \$2.66, increased to \$3.35, then reduced to what it is now at \$3.10.

"We're fiscally responsible. I think we've proven that we collect only what we need."

Klenk said telephone surcharge assessments are the sole funding source for central dispatch operations and capital improvements, and

services because all landline users of 911 pay equally. The problem now, Klenk

pointed out, is that funding is becoming less predictable because of a continuing trend of county residents abandoning land telephone line service in favor of cellular telephone service. "Currently, every landline

phone generates \$37.20 per year for central dispatch operations," Klenk said. "When the homeowner switches to cellular that the surcharge remains service...central dispatch

the fairest means to fund 911 stands to lose over \$34 per year in funding.'

Klenk explained that a state law in 1999 established a cellular telephone surcharge of 52 cents, which is collected by the cellular phone vendor and deposited with the state treasury for disbursement to counties based on a complicated formula. After Dec. 31, that surcharge is slated to be reduced to $\overline{29}$

Owen-Gage School officials breathed a sigh of relief Friday as they formally closed on the sale of the former Gagetown Elementary School.

After exchanging counteroffers, school officials agreed to sell the building for \$80,000, \$15,000 less than the original asking price.

The purchaser on record is a Florida resident, but school officials said a family mem-

uses discussed for the structure have included using classrooms for office space and utilizing the gymnasium, cafeteria and stage for hall rentals. The Owen-Gage Board of

Education first listed the 19,000-square-foot elementary school building in September 2004 after closing the school in a consolidation effort to stem a growing budget deficit caused by several factors, including a shrinking enrollment.

Shortly after putting the building up for sale, the board learned of a potential buyer who subsequently agreed to meet the district's asking price of \$95,000, but in the end was unable to arrange the financing.

Then, in June, another buyer came forth and the sale looked promising only to fall through again.

The sale is very good news for district officials, who reviewed the past year's audit during a regular monthly meeting early last week.





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

Maybe the Corps got to celebrating independence day and broke their shot glass? Whatever the cause, it's a long walk from Montana to Astoria and there's nothing like a cold, wet barracks to make a guy wish he had never signed on with this outfit.

Lewis and Clark reportedly doled out whiskey as a reward and to boost morale. Stealing liquor resulted in severe punishment. (Running out solved that problem.)

On Christmas day 1805, Sgt. John Ordway wrote: They divided out the last of their tobacco among the men that used and the rest they gave each a Silk hankerchief, as a Christmas gift, to keep us in remembrance of it as we have no ardent Spirits."

The whole thing reminds me of an elk hunting trip many years ago. Just like Lewis and Clark, two friends and I underestimated the hardships that lay ahead.

Ours was only a three-day trip. What can go wrong in three days?

My friends and I arrived in the mountains with two tents and a sheepherder stove. We somehow decided to put the stove in the cook tent and sleep in the cold, clammy

Next, we pitched our sleep-

ing tent with the door uphill so the melting snow could trickle in and float our sleeping bags. Then, I got out some steaks for dinner.

I read a lot of outdoor magazines in those days, and these publications were full of stories about how to pack a nice dinner for the first night on a camping trip. The outdoor writers always had the perfect meal and nice weather to cook it in.

I, on the other hand, had a small fly over my tent door - and a cold, wet snow coming in sideways. My steak grilling job turned into a twohour ordeal

was much longer than expected. Needless to say our ardent spirits were nearly gone the first night.

My friends and I awoke the next morning with the revelation that a sleeping pad is nothing more than a large sponge and a sleeping bag might be warm if it was dry. Needless to say we hurried to the cook tent to get the old stove puffing.


ship in high school athletics, we know that we need to work harder and improve ourselves so we may get the award next year.







Hawk defense steps up in win over Tri-Valley Dukes For the second straight year, Cass City advanced into the Division 5 district finals with a convincing win at the expense of a Tri-Valley East

The Red Hawks struck quickly for a pair of unanswered first quarter scores Friday and never trailed, cruising to a 38-26 victory over host Essexville Garber in the playoff's opening

Cass City needed only 2 minutes and 6 seconds to register its first score, as fullback Cody Halasz capped a 5play, 52-yard march with a one-yard plunge. Halasz's running mate, Chris Johnson, set up the visitors' opening drive marker when he rambled 40-yards down the Duke sideline to the one-yard

The Hawks then needed just 2 minutes and 28 seconds to add its second touchdown of the night on its next possession, moving 53 yards in 6 plays. Dustin Bitzer ac-

counted for the TD when he scored the first of his 3 touchdowns on a 13-yard strike from quarterback Chris Landrith. Following Justin Glaza's second of 5 pointafter kicks, the Hawks were able to take a 14-0 margin into the next frame.

Cass City 38, Essexville Garber 26

Despite the Hawk's success moving the ball on offense, it was the team's defense that set the tone early.

Playing without the services of all-conference linebacker Halasz - who has a tender ankle and was used for offensive purposes only - Cass City held the Duke offense to 3-and-outs on all three of its first quarter possessions.

"We came out and hit them hard," said defensive coordinator Josh Stern. "I think we shocked them a little on the first 2 series."

Garber sliced into the Red Hawk advantage at the 7:24 mark of the second quarter on Dan Meier's one-yard run, but Cass City was able to regain its 2 touchdown margin on their next series when Bitzer found pay dirt from 9 yards out.

Both teams would add another score before the break, where Cass City led 28-14. The Hawk defense, in practically Glaza's interception of Duke quarterback Mike Gruszynski's pass, led to the visitors' next score, as Landrith and Bitzer hooked up again, this time for 38yards. But with just 18 seconds remaining till the break, end Eric Fournier scored on a critical 4th-and-goal situation on a pretty reverse. The Dukes, who had some success running the quarterback option during the 14-play drive, scored when Fournier intercepted Gruszynski's option pitch while moving down the left side of the Duke line and scored from 4yards out on an opening found in the Hawk line while traveling in the other direc-

In the final half, Cass City's defense came up big again as a Scott Meeker tumble re covery, and a subsequent 60yard sprint by Bitzer, led to a Glaza field goal from 32yards. However, the Dukes closed to within 31-20 entering the final 12 minutes as Meier ended a 74-yard, 8play drive from 2 yards out. "Scott (Meeker) did a nice

job. After watching the game film, he was in the quarterback's face on nearly every option play forcing a quick pitch," Stern said.

Cass City had a golden opportunity to put the game away in the opening minutes of the 4th period when Landrith's 50-yard pass to Brad Hartel spotted the ball deep in the Red Zone. However, the Dukes were able to deny Cass City on a 4th and short and took over the ball on downs at the 5-yard line.

Then after trading punts, the Dukes pulled to within 31-26 with 3:39 left in the game on Josh Pierson's 10yard run.

Landrith prevented any chance of a Garber comeback on the team's next series. Needing a pair of first downs to run out the clock, Landrith delivered with 2 timely quarterback scrambles and then busted loose for a 51-yard gallop to

ice the game. After struggling early in the

season, Landrith has put together outstanding back-toback outings. The 3-year starter threw for 85 yards on 5 of 7 passes and directed the Hawk offense to 365 total yards. Halasz led the Hawk ground gainers with 96 yards

on 21 totes. Dereck Halasz, who filled in at linebacker for his injured brother, led the Cass City defense with 17 tackles. "Dereck has a great nose for

the football. And our defensive backs played well,' Stern said.

Birds flock to Cass City for district final

Cass City has not faced Frankenmuth on the gridiron field since 1978, when both schools were competing as members of the Thumb B Conference. That all changes Friday when the Eagles invade the Recreational Park with the Division 5 district championship at stake. Kick-off is slated for 7:00

For Cass City, the game will mark the school's first-ever home playoff encounter. With a win, the Red Hawks (8-2) can also equal the school's highest win total in one season set during its 1972 campaign.

Achieving victory, however, will be no easy task. Cass City hasn't faced a team this season with the swiftness of the Eagles. Leading the pack is speedster running back Mike Golden, a state champion sprinter, enters the contest after

leading Frankenmuth to a 42-22 victory at Millington Friday. Golden rushed for 204 yards on 18 carries, resulting in 5 touchdowns. 
ets for Friday's showdown will go on sale at the high school starting today (Wednesday) for \$5.00, while the stadium gates will open at 5:30 p.m. on game day.



Lemanski of Andrews, Hooper and Pavlik, PLC, presented the report, which showed the district had general revenues totaling \$1,919,310 and expenditures of \$1,983,874

School Supt. Dana Compton said the deficit, \$64,564, was absorbed into the fund balance, leaving a balance of about \$390,000.

"As we looked at the whole audit...the auditor said that our fund balance falls within the recommendations, so he had no concerns there," Compton said. "But we still have concerns regarding our enrollment and maintain enrollment.'

Compton noted a conservative approach to budgeting has paid off, with both enrollment and state funding slightly higher than expected. "We're probably a little better off than we thought when we were budgeting," he said.

In other business, the board: *Approved the hiring of 3 coaches. Arnie Howard will serve as varsity boys basketball coach, Liz Robinson will head the junior high vollevball program, and district Athletic Director Nathan Haag will coach junior high boys basketball.

School officials are still looking to fill coaching jobs for JV and varsity volleyball and JV boys basketball.
