Top gun Gagetown youth ready to match skills with the best

Eric Montreuil isn't a big talker, but put the Gagetown youth on a motocross track and he speaks volumes.

A veteran racer at the age of 12, Eric, the son of Patti and Don Montreuil, is coming off one of his best summers of competitions yet, including an undefeated season at MPX Racing in Sebewaing. He's currently ranked seventh overall among competitors in the American Motorcycle Association's District 14.

Now, the seventh grade Cass City Middle School student is gearing up for his biggest challenge yet - 5 days of racing against the best of the best during the 34th annual Winter National Olympics, also known as the "Mini Olympics", Nov. 21-25 in Gainesville, Fla.

Last year's Winter National Olympics drew some 5,000 young competitors from across the country, all vying for a top 4 finish in order to advance to the main event. This year, some 4,000 or

more competitors are expected.

"Only the fastest kids in the country will be going there. If you're not winning here in Michigan, you wouldn't go," said Don Montreuil, who introduced Eric to motocross racing at the age of 5. "I've (riden) all my life, so

I thought it would be a good hobby, keep him out of trouble," he added. Eric has since concentrated

on motocross as well as supercross events, honing his skills on practice tracks owned by some friends, and competing on tracks in Millington, Marlette, Midland and beyond. His resume includes racing supercross at the Pontiac Silverdome.

"It's just fun," Eric said of the sport. "I like riding and the jumping - all the long jumps and the corners."

"Supercross is a tighter track with bigger jumps steep jumps. It's the stuff

you usually watch in the wintertime in an indoor arena." Don Montreuil explained. "Motocross is outdoors on Please turn to back page.

The first time I visited Smitty's Steak House in rural Boyne City it had been open a few short months and I mentally crossed it off as a place that was destined for failure. Not because the food or the service was poor, but because of its location.

The prices are about average for a steak house. Steaks cost between \$12 and \$25 dollars and other menu items are priced at a corresponding level.

In Boyne City a popular restaurant has closed until next summer and a widely known Stafford restaurant, One Water Street, closed and was later sold and the size of the restaurant cut about in 2 before reopening under new ownership. Stafford has top restaurants in Charlevoix, Petoskey, Bay View and Harbor Springs.

Maybe Smitty's success is due to the owner's on site management that goes out of its way to make customers happy and the quality of the food is constantly good.

Snover resident pens book to help young, old

Like many others, Margie Gerow has struggled with a past haunted by memories of abuse, a feeling of not being accepted by others, and a resulting drive to be without flaw.

But the Snover woman has found a unique way to cope and at the same time hopes to help others struggling with their own pasts.

Gerow recently published the first in a series of books entitled "Margie Gerow's School of Hard Knocks".

The first installment totals 430 pages and was published by the Bloomington, Ind.based Author House.

"Margie and the School of Hard Knocks is a 9-book series about a 65-year-old woman who is still looking for that 'magic bullet' to make her feel whole," Gerow explained.

"She gets taken into a deep State University with a Bachdream state to live her life elor of Science Degree in elover again, in a different way, from the age of 3. She is taken to Stuffed Animal music. Land, a land of unconditional

love, with her bear and bunny who can talk to her there. "There, each day equals a year," Gerow continued "Because she is a little spoiled, she cannot stay there for more than 5 days. Mama Shiree Stallion takes her to the 'School of Hard Knocks'

where she meets the staff and classmates she will be with for all 7 levels, to learn life's lessons.

"Life's lessons is what the book is all about," Gerow said. "Lessons like listening to your inner voice, balance, patience, cause and effect, how one person's behavior affects others."

Gerow is a Detroit native who graduated from Wayne

ementary education with majors in both English and A former nun, she has

worked in the Catholic Church as a teacher, assistant director and, finally, as director of religious education for an entire parish.

A resident of Snover since 1979, Gerow has been doing transcendental meditation for the past 15 years. She also has an avid interest in metaphysics, alternative medicine and the healing arts.

Gerow's life very much reflects her attempts to cope with the past, which she describes as being exposed to a world of darkness in the form of verbal abuse by a nun and sexual abuse at the hands of a priest. "Growing up in such an

environment led me to develop an intense self-hatred, rejection of self, dread of eternal punishment and a drive to be perfect," she recalled.

Gerow's outlook dimmed further when, as a high school student, she suffered a severe facial injury in an automobile accident.

Gerow desired to be a nun at a young age, but was rejected by a convent in Michigan. She was later accepted into a convent in Maine, but continued to struggle with unresolved issues in her life and eventually returned

home. "I naively believed that if I got married, I would finally belong and be happy, but that was a short-lived illusion," she said. "I married when I was 39 and, within a year and a half. I realized I wasn't happy and I didn't have inner peace. That was the day I started on my quest to find

After years of soul searching, reading, studying, meditating and some counseling, Gerow was inspired to write her series of books during a morning meditation session. "While I have not yet recovered the inner peace I have been looking for, I have gone so far beyond my comfort zone, I will never be the same," she said. "For that, I am most grateful. I have learned much about myself and the many different parts of me.

"While I still struggle with self-hatred and the bondage of the past, I have developed a great deal of respect for myself. Every day in every way, I am learning to like me.'

In the process, Gerow has seen her book evolve to the point where her target audience has expanded to both young and old.

The center maintains a minimum staffing of 2 dispatchers 24 hours a day.

"A third team member, who may be a supervisor or another dispatcher, is scheduled for 110 to 120 hours per week and at our busiest times," Klenk noted.

Central dispatch handles more than 30,000 police dis-

patches, more than 4,500 EMS dispatches, and more than 600 fire calls annually.
