# Plans set for apartment building

Cass City's downtown district will feature a brand new apartment building thanks to the generosity of a local businessman, the initiative of a local contractor, and plenty of cooperation on the part of village officials.

Village Manager Peter Cristiano announced Monday that plans for demolition of 2 existing buildings on the north side of Main Street, and construction of the new building with up to 5 rental units was finalized last week.

The news was welcomed during a regular monthly Cass City Village Council meeting Monday night, and village President Bert Althaver praised Cristiano for his efforts along with those of the Cass City Downtown Development Authority (DDA).

"This is a solution to a problem that's been with us for years in terms of the condition of those buildings, and the owner's willingness to deal with them," Althaver said.

During an interview earlier Monday, Cristiano explained the existing buildings are located at 6529 Main St. and 6531 Main St., directly west

of the Copeland Gornowicz Insurance Agency Inc., building near the corner of Main and Oak streets. "These buildings were gifted to the

village DDA by (local businessman) Ray Armstead, and the DDA turned around and is selling them to (local contractor) Charles Roe," Cristiano explained, noting the sale price was \$1. "His obligation is that within 3 months, he has to demolish the buildings and take everything away, and in 6 months, he will be constructing a new building."

Residential units on small town Main streets is becoming popular again, according to Cristiano. "It's really going back to the way it

was years ago," he said, "and the objective of residential on Main Street is that people would be on the Main Street and business would thrive and so on. We're also talking with officials at Baker College because they want to initiate student housing. They feel that their enrollment can be stronger if they have student housing available, but there's nothing set in stone."

The project is just one of several

major upgrades that are becoming a reality in the business district - Dave and Mimi Nicol have purchased and are completely renovating the former NAPA building at the corner of Main and Oak streets, and Dick and Carol Gaffney recently purchased and are transforming the old Hardee's building into a family style, sit-down restaurant at the west end of town.

And, Cristiano said, other Main Street business owners have approached the village regarding taking on façade upgrades. "So, we're kind of excited about it."

he added. "I think it will symbolize a rejuvenation of our Main Street. It's a good start."

It was noted both countywide orga-

nizations have benefited the village over the years, with the airport supporting local business operations and continuing to expand and improve available transportation services. EDC officials, meanwhile, have worked with the village on a host of business related issues, including securing a \$45,000 Community Development Block Grant for sidewalk improvements, and helping businesses such as Millennium Industries participate in financing programs that have both retained and added jobs

•Authorized spending up to \$8,000 to have Hunt Construction re-shape the sledding hill at Cass City Recreation Park to make the hill safer, as recommended by the village's insurance company.

Plans are still in the works to purchase a snowmaking machine with donations, but the council took no action on the project Monday. The equipment will cost about \$30,000 installed, Cristiano said. "The Cass

# **Board** approves school repairs

Student-staff relationships were adopted in the Cass City School's policy book. Immorality is defined as conduct that offends the morals of the community and is a bad example to youth whose ideals a teacher is supposed to foster and elevate.

# Board cuts position, accepts resignation

The Cass City School Board accepted the resignation of Campbell Elementary Principal Jody Miklovic and announced a cut in the curriculum at a special meeting Wednesday morning at the school.

Appointed to replace Miklovic is Aaron Fernald, presently assistant principal and athletic director. How the position of athletic director will be filled has not been decided.

The reason the special meeting was held, Supt. Ron Wilson explained. was because by law if the cut in staff was announced after school opened it would have been necessary to pay the teacher this year.

Victim of the school's economic

problems was Kurt Tuckey, the teacher of the industrial arts class that has been discontinued this year. It was deemed by the board to be the class that could be the least disruptive because the students will be able to study at the Tuscola County Tech-Center in Caro. There has also been a marked decrease in class size in the program.

Also announced was a change in the reporting of financial information to make information available more promptly as required by the State of Michigan Department of Education.

When a school is rated at the absolute top by the Michigan Department of Education it becomes very hard to stay there because one of the factors in the rating system is average yearly progress (AYP).

When you start from the top level, Supt. Ron Wilson said, a drop of just a few points on the Michigan Education Assessment Project (MEAP) can affect your rating even though the average is well above the state aver-

That proved to be the case this year, Wilson explained, as the Cass City High School, Cass City Middle School and Campbell Elementary School dropped from all A to all B

Wilson said that he met with the curriculum staff last week to examine the study program in an attempt

# Gagetown Veterans Memorial Post Office dedicated last week

Pablo "Rick" Lopez Sr. figures that veterans deserve more than respect; they deserve to be thanked. And of-A desire to ensure veterans are re-

membered, respected and thanked has been the driving force behind Lopez' effort to have the name of the Gagetown Post Office changed to reflect a thankful nation and the town he called home many years ago. Lopez went all the way to Congress

to make that happen, and last Wednesday, Gagetown's population of some 400 people nearly doubled in size as legislators, postal officials and other dignitaries formally dedicated what will now be known as the Gagetown Veterans Memorial Post Office.

A display of American flags flew just cast of the podium as well as behind the guest speakers. A host of area veterans were on hand, including members of VFW Post 3644 in Cass City, Caro post 4164, American Legion Post 7 and Kingston AMVETS Post 1072.


The event marked the first time a Michigan post office name has been changed by a special act of Congress. The bill, H.R. 3368, was sponsored



The headline "Reinventing the carbon wheel" in the Detroit News led me into the story and all but the final paragraphs were interesting, informative and impressive.

The final paragraphs could also be described the same way with the addition of one more descriptive word-depressing.

The story said that carbon fiber has become a magic material for auto applications. The material is very light, but very strong and is already in use for bodies of racecars, brake discs, and original equipment of some extreme performance cars.

The list of performance advantages of fiber wheels is long. First they are lighter and stronger than one-piece wheels. It reduces unspring weight by at least 70 pounds. That enhances steering response and suspension and lightens the load on the car's power train. The carbon wheels also heighten the grip of tires on turns and makes braking easier. Since it's lighter than magnesium wheels, it should be easier on gas consumption. That's all the good stuff about car-

bon wheels. Now the depressing feature: a set of 4 18-inch diameter wheels costs \$8,400. Move to the 20inch size and the price is \$9,400.

One that did modestly well for a while was the Crosley, built by an appliance manufacturer. A Crosley refrigerator was not uncommon in Michigan homes just before World War II until the late 1950s. In fact, we had one in our home and it was a great addition because it eliminated the iceman's weekly visit to install a chuck of ice in the icebox. What a mess that was.

I suspect that the Crosley was eventually junked. It's too bad because in be worth more than it ever was when it was one of the prize appliances in

# The back forty by Roger Pond

Most folks think golf is a low-impact sport, a game for the old codgers as well as the young. A news feature from the LA Times Post Service says this isn't necessarily true. Older golfers need to pay attention or they are going to hurt themselves.

The news feature states there are 6 million golfers over 50 years old in the U.S. This represents one fourth of this country's golfers; but while older golfers make up one quarter of the total, they play one half of the total annual rounds.

That doesn't surprise me any. If you drive down the road past the golf course you'll see the same people, day after day.

They're retired, for gosh sakes. That's all they do is play golf!

The LA Times story says that's fine as long as we take some precautions. Golf experts estimate that seven in ten senior golfers will experience injuries, such as "hand tenderness or numbness, shoulder, back and knee pain, golfer's elbow, and wrist injuries, including tendonitis and carpal tunnel syndrome."

They suggest we should warm up before a round of golf, and that older golfers should take some lessons to learn how to swing a club without wrenching our backs.

They have got to be kidding. I've spent 40 years learning how to swing a club in my own unique fashion, and now they want me to take lessons and mess it all up!?

Besides, if I didn't have shoulder, back and knee pain, golfer's elbow, carpal tunnel, and hand numbness, I'd think I was unconscious.

Unfortunately this fellow's eyesight wasn't what it used to be, so he couldn't see a golf ball at 140 yards. He could hit the ball wonderfully, but

he couldn't see where it went. Luckily, this man's playing partner was a young whippersnapper of about

85, and he saw the ball go down. "It's a hole in one, Max! It's a hole in one!" the partner shouted.

As luck would have it, Max didn'thear very well, either. So he couldn't hear his partner shouting.

Finally, Max turned his hearing aid up, and his partner said, "Max, it's a hole in one.

"Nah, it couldn't be," Max said. I think we can see the problem here: This is a 90-year-old man with the strength and flexibility to make a hole in one; but his eyes couldn't see it; his ears didn't hear the cheering, and his mind wouldn't let him believe it

I can't speak for other golfers, but when I can't see it, hear it, or believe it, I think I'll just go fishing.

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
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# **Down Memory Lane**

Though many persons may have the impression the consumer protection sentiment now prevailing in many areas is a new concept, it really is not. Actually, it's been 100 years since state government first entered the field of consumer protection. Back in 1871 the Legislature established an Insurance Department in state government to regulate about 100 insurance companies, which were doing business in the state worth \$75 million annually. Today, that depart ment is part of the State Commerce Department and keeps tabs on more than 1,000 insurance companies, which now do nearly \$3 billion worth of business in the state.



# **DNR** addresses leaking underground tanks

The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has announced the start of the Refined Petroleum Temporary Reimbursement Program (TRP) to address leaking underground storage tank sites.

The TRP is designed to reimburse owners and operators for a portion of newly-incurred cleanup costs associated with releases from petroleum underground storage tank systems. Starting Nov. 1, the DEQ will be able to accept up to 900 participants in the TRP Program on a first come, first served basis.

"We expect the TRP to provide a much needed incentive to help owners and operators of gasoline stations to continue their efforts to clean up releases from underground tanks,' said DEQ Director Steven E. Chester. "We have a great deal of work left to do in Michigan to abate the threat leaking tanks pose to our environ-

The legislation to create this program, signed by Gov. Jennifer M. Granholm in July, is based on the recommendations of the Refined Petroleum Cleanup Advisory Council, which was established in 2004. The TRP provides a total of \$45 million for owners and operators who had approved claims under the former Michigan Underground Storage Tank Financial Assurance Program, as long as certain other eligibility criteria are

Eligible persons can receive reimbursement of 80 percent of each approved work invoice, up to a maximum total reimbursement amount of \$50,000 per approved facility. The remaining 20 percent, up to a maximum of \$12,500, is considered a copay amount. To receive funding, the applicant must retain a qualified underground storage tank consultant to perform the corrective actions.

The money will be allocated under a 2 round pre-certification process. If funds remain after the first round of pre-certification applications, the DEQ will announce an initiation date for a second round of applications with broader eligibility criteria. If funds still remain after all allocations during the first 2 rounds, the remaining money will be allocated on a prorated basis among the approved firstand second-round applicants.

The DEQ Remediation will begin accepting pre-certification applications at 8 a.m. Nov. 1, and will continue to accept applications through 5 p.m. April 30. The program forms and guidance documents are under development.

# Cass City wins opener in convincing fashion over Sandusky, 56-22

Take away a pair of defensive lapses and the Cass City football team opened its season Friday looking like a team ready to make some noise in

Coach Scott Cuthrell's Red Hawks put on an impressive offensive display while running over Greater Thumb East foe Sandusky, 56-22, during the team's home opener. Cass City will now face Marlette, who was stunned 20-0 by Kingston to kick off its season, Thursday, the second of 3 consecutive games in the Recreational Park.

Despite controlling most of the first half, Cass City's margin at the intermission, 36-22, could have been much larger.

The Redskins struck first as Cory Bolsby scampered 75 yards through the middle of Cass City's defense on the game's opening play before most of the spectators had settled into their seats.

The Hawks, to their credit, shook off Bolsby's quick jab by mounting knock out touchdown drives on their opening 3 possessions.

Senior quarterback Brad Hartel, making his first varsity start, played like a seasoned veteran as he guided the hosts to a 24-6 advantage entering the second quarter. Hartel threw for 103 yards and rushed for 58 yards, producing 2 scores.

Halfback Kyle Sieradzki also appeared in mid-season form and rushed for 160 yards, on 16 totes, and 3 scores. His first touchdown jaunt came from 55 yards out. Sieradzki also added the 2-point conversion and with 10:27 remaining in the initial quarter the Hawks were on top for good, 8-6.

Hartel received excellent protection up the gut from linemen Alex Walsh and Brad Severance, among others, and capitalized by completing 5 of the first 6 passes. His first toss on the night found Derek Ricker open near the right sideline resulting in a 30yard score. Moments later Hartel connected with Dereck Halasz for the points after and a 16-6 edge.

Sandusky, meanwhile, had trouble sustaining drives against the Hawk defense in the early stages and Cass City took over on downs near midfield for its 3rd offensive set.

The hosts continued to attack through the air, but back-to-back completions were nullified by holding penalties. However, facing 3 and 25, Hartel hit Sieradzki for a first down inside the Red Zone and then 3 plays later, Hartel accounted for the marker with a 3-yard run.

Trailing 24-6, Sandusky opened the 2nd quarter scoring on Bolsby's 6yard run. But Cass City was able to offset that score at the 3:33 mark of the period when Sieradzki found pay

dirt with a 6-yard run of his own. Cass City got one more opportunity to score in the opening half when they took control of the ball near midfield with 1:37 remaining on the clock till the intermission. The Hawks moved 42 yards on 6 plays, ending with Hartel's 15-yard strike to end Andrew




Dereck Halasz accounted for Cass City's final score on a fumble recovery in the end zone.


