Motorists injured in accident

Two women were seriously injured in a 2-vehicle collision at the intersection of M-81 and M-53 in Sanilac County's Greenleaf Township Thursday morning.

Sanilac County Sheriff's deputies said the accident occurred at about

"A BMW driven by 28-year-old Allison Rossi-Utter of Midland was turning northbound onto M-53 from M-81 in front of a southbound pickup truck driven by 30-year-old Kirt Pawlowski of Harbor Beach," said Sgt. James Wagester. "The collision resulted in the pin-in of both occupants of the BMW.'

Elkland Township firefighters responded to the scene and used their Jaws of Life to extract both Rossi-Utter and her passenger, Barbara Valliere of Saginaw from the wreck-

Wagester said Rossi-Utter was airlifted to St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw, while Valliere was transported by MMR Ambulance to Hills City. Information on their conditions was not available.

Argyle man nabbed in cocaine probe

Sanilac County Drug Task Force officers arrested a 38-year-old Argyle Township man Friday in connection with an investigation into cocaine trafficking in northwest Sanilac

"The investigation began several weeks previously with tips to drug task force investigators that a township man was conducting cocaine sales from his wife's Argyle Township home," task force Director William Gray said Monday. "Officers conducted a number of surveillances and undercover cocaine purchases that confirmed the tips of cocaine

sales emanating from the home." . Gray said officers were conducting à surveillance of the suspect's home and "observed traffic patterns consistent with in-progress drug sales ac-

"One officer broke off from the surveillance in order to prepare and obtain a search warrant for the property, while the other officers continued the surveillance," he said. "Before the investigator returned to the area with the signed search warrant, the surveillance officers on-scene observed the suspect drive away from the home." Officers continued their surveillance

of the man and also learned that he was already wanted on an arrest warrant in Huron County, according to Gray, who said officers stopped the suspect in Austin Township, where they found him attempting to dump multiple plastic bags of cocaine on the car's floor as they approached

Officers then returned along with the suspect to his home in the 2300 block of Pringle Road, where they executed the search warrant.

"Drug task force officers seized multiple pre-packaged plastic bags containing cocaine, additional amounts of cutting agent used in the trafficking of cocaine, drug trafficking paraphernalia and several hundred dollars in suspected drug proceeds," Gray said.

"The 38-year-old Argyle Township man was arrested and transported to the Sanilac County Jail, where he was lodged on the arrest warrant for contempt of court from Huron County,' he added. "He was also lodged and scheduled to be released on bond pending the issuance of an arrest warrant for possession with intent to deliver cocaine less than 50 grams in

connection with Friday's search." In all, Gray said, officers seized more than 20 grams of cocaine with

a retail street value of \$2,000 to \$2,500. He noted the drug typically sells for \$100 to \$125 per gram in Sanilac County.

Gray credited the success of the investigation to a cooperative effort involving the Cass City, Bad Axe Deckerville and Marlette police departments, and the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department Road Patrol.

Tuscola teen safe and sound after journey

A tense week ended happily over the weekend for a Tuscola County family whose teenage daughter flew to Amman, Jordan, to meet a man she had met on the Internet.

Katherine R. Lester, 16, was reunited with her family after arriving on a

flight at Flint Bishop Airport Friday night. Lester disappeared from her home Monday, June 5, and flew to the West Bank to meet a man she had met on the website MYSpace.com. Authorities

say the man's MySpace account describes him as a 25-year-old from Jericho. MySpace.com is the wildly popular online social club that enables members to communicate through an interactive network of photos, weblogs, user profiles, e-mails, web forums and groups. The service is free and easy to join, and has attracted more than 70 million members.

The service's popularity with teenagers has raised concerns among authorities nationwide due to concerns about sexual predators on the Internet.

Tuscola County Sheriff's Department detectives began their investigation into the Gilford Township teen's disappearance early last week. Undersheriff Jim Jashinske said Sgt. Mike Pine was dispatched to the family's home to take a runaway/missing person complaint from Shawn Lester regarding her daughter, Katherine.

Jashinske said interviews with the family revealed that Lester had met a subject on MySpace.com at least 3 months ago, and that the individual was from Israel.

"The daughter had misled her mother about going to Canada after school was out for the summer with friends, so she could obtain a passport," Jashinske

Jashinske said the girl's mother found out last week that no trip to Canada had been planned.

"Katherine then became very upset and refused to tell her mother what her original plans were," he said. "On June 5, while the parents were working, Katherine left home with her passport and enough clothing for 2 weeks. She was supposedly picked up by a yellow cab, according to her brother. The mother then called Katherine's cell phone for the next 2 days, but Katherine did not return her calls."

Sgt. Pine and Detective Sgt. Glen Skrent contacted the FBI Office in Bay City Thursday, according to Jashinske, who said federal authorities were able to trace the teen to a Wednesday flight from New York's Kennedy International Airport to Tel Aviv, Israel, with a stop in Amman, Jordan.

U.S. authorities reportedly found Lester traveling alone, confiscated her passport and convinced her to return home.

Family members last week expressed shock over Katherine's decision to leave home. The honor student and National Honor Society member finished her junior year at Akron-Fairgrove High School.

Calls to the family's home over the weekend for comment were not re-

Jashinske said the on-going investigation has not determined whether any crime has been committed.

FBI spokesman Brian Endrizal declined comment on whether charges will be filed against the man Lester went to meet.

Search and rescue

Coast Guard honors pilot Houghton

Lt. Greg Houghton has been flying helicopters since he was about 20 years old and is a seasoned search and rescue pilot, but he was still awestruck at the site of hundreds of Hurricane Katrina survivors on the Gulf

Coast last summer.

"It was on a scale I've never seen before," recalled Houghton, who currently serves as an HH-65 standardization instructor pilot at Coast Guard Aviation Training Center in Mobile.

"It's pretty humbling when you fly over that many people and they all have their hands up," he said.

Houghton's skill as a pilot and his courage on those missions recently earned him the Distinguished Flying Cross - the highest honor awarded to aviators in any branch of the service. One day in particular stands out for Houghton, whose search and rescue mission began within the first 48 hours after Hurricane Katrina struck. Normally, a Coast Guard helicopter crew is composed of 2 pilots and a flight mechanic, but Houghton found himself flying solo with his mechanic on board. Together, they managed to rescue 38 people that day, but their final run nearly proved to be their last.

Houghton recalled that an oily film on the waterways below him began to accumulate on the windscreen (windshield) of his aircraft. At one point, he said, "I could not see out of the left side at all. My mechanic suddenly - he just yells, 'break right!"

Houghton made an abrupt turn, barely escaping a collision with an-




But back to the dime. I found it on Seventh Street, where I often walk. I couldn't help but think the dime I found was one I probably dropped on a previous walk.


I 'm judging that by the amount of change found scattered around the easy chairs and the sofas at my house

Blood drive on tap in Cass City

Cass City area residents can make a lifesaving donation Tuesday, June 13, from 1 to 6:45 p.m. at the Cass City VFW Hall, 4533 Veterans Dr.

Michigan hospitals need about 2,000 blood products daily to treat accident and burn victims, cancer patients, babies in neonatal intensive care, people undergoing surgeries, and others with serious medical conditions like anemia, according to Sharon Jaksa, executive director of the Great Lakes Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross.

"Blood uses are climbing as the general population ages, and as more medical advances and treatments involve the use of blood and blood therapies," she said. "Unfortunately, the blood supply doesn't always keep pace with the demand."

"We'd like more people to join our family of donors, and make donating blood an enjoyable, satisfying and easy-to-do volunteer activity," Jaksa added. "When you donate blood, you're giving someone a lifetime in exchange for just a little over an hour of your day.'

I guess I'll never be much of a cook. Anything with more than three ingredients is way too complicated for my culinary abilities. Besides, I never have more than three ingredients at

the same time, anyway. One thing I do pride myself on is cleanliness when I'm cooking. I make sure all of the utensils are clean and that my hands are clean.

I don't believe in the five-second rule, either. Readers will recall the five-second rule says anything that hasn't been on the floor more than five seconds doesn't have time to be contaminated. Anyone should know better than that.

One of the camp tenders the neighbor employed fancied himself as a pretty good cook. And he was, except for one thing: He wasn't very clean about it.

This fellow would wash his hands before he started preparing a meal, but he didn't pay much attention to them after that. This might have been fine if he wasn't so easily distracted.

Then you reached into the sack and wallowed the water and flour around until it formed a biscuit. These were then fried in a skillet.


This particular camp tender loved to make flour-sack biscuits. They were pretty good, too - as long as you didn't look at them.



"When the foster grandparent program began in the Thumb area, a limited number of grandparents were placed in the schools. After seeing the enormous impact these grandparents had on the children they worked with, more and more teachers began requesting their help," DeGuise

She said it's not just the kids and the schools that benefit from the program. Many grandparents active in the program feel that they get as much or more from their efforts as the kids. "Along with the satisfaction of helping a child who needs a little extra encouragement, foster grandparents receive a non-income stipend, training, a daily meal and much more," DeGuise said. "The opportunity is offered to adults 60 or more years and living with a limited income."

"So far, so good" the word on area crops this year

"So far, so good" seems to sum up how the Thumb's 5 main crops are

With much of the harvest relying on conditions in July and August, crops in good condition now could take a turn for the worse, said Dave Pratt, agriculture extension agent at Caro's Michigan State University Extension

"It's early. We'll know a lot more in July," he said. "It just depends on how much rain we get."

However, he added that the corn, soybean, wheat, sugar beet and white and black dry bean crops are looking

The same can be said for Huron County, where Jim Mantey, agricultural educator at the Michigan State University Extension Office in Bad

Pratt said lack of rainfall and moisture in July and August can hurt the

With wheat, moisture is needed to help the plant grow, but also can create favorable conditions for head scab, a disease that creates shrunken kernels and a vomitoxin, which could ruin a crop, Pratt said.

Though soybean aphids are one of the main enemies of the soybean crop, Pratt said the overwintering population of the insect was down and therefore, "this year we think numbers (of aphids) are going to be down."

Another danger to the soybean crop is soybean leaf rust, a fungal pathogen that has affected the crop globally, Mantey said.

"It can reduce yields by as much as 60 or 70 percent," he added.

He said the Thumb has been lucky to dodge the disease, with many thanks to its geography, since the pathogen can be airborne and travel hundreds of miles, except in the win-

"It (leaf rust) forms orangeish pustules on the leaf...it actually looks like rust," he said.

The pathogen can hit at any time. It starts below the canopy and works to the top, making disease control measures difficult as it is hard to get through the dense canopies, he added. Mantey said one of the challenges to the sugar beet crop will be thinner

stands, or the number of plants per Also, these plants have 2 main enemies: cercospora and leaf miners. Cercospora is a fungal pathogen that

burns the plants' foliage.

Leaf miners, which can spread easily from plant to plant, are insects that come about 2 months after planting, and eat the chlorophyll between leaf layers, leaving a transparent leaf.

Pratt added the leaf disease septoria, which attacks the chlorophyll in the plants, to the fungal pathogens that could attack the sugar beets. If the chlorophyll is gone, the plant

cannot develop because "it can't take in sunlight and take in energy for the plant," he said. Both Mantey and Pratt said the dry

deans are most reliant on the weather, and having too little rainfall is what will most affect this crop.

Pratt said the corn yield is very weather dependent.

When the nights get below 55 degrees, the corn shuts down, he said. "If we get rain in July, we'll be in good shape," he said. "And we need warm temperatures, too."





Hacker added that while in her 7 years at the pool there have been no serious incidents requiring the backboard or CPR, the lifeguards have had to make saves.

Sarah Hobbs, a lifeguard of 5 years from Cass City, said the in-services work well to refresh their skills from year to year.

She added the refreshers are good because although nothing that serious has happened yet, "that doesn't rule out the possibility of it happening in the future.'

TO PROVIDE FOR THE COLLECTION OF REVENUES FROM THE SYSTEM SUFFICIENT FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COSTS OF OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF THE SYSTEM AND TO PAY THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE BONDS. TO PROVIDE A RESERVE ACCOUNT FOR THE BONDS. TO PROVIDE FOR THE SEGREGATION AND DISTRIBUTION OF THE REVENUES. TO PROVIDE FOR THE SEGREGATION AND DISTRIBUTION OF THE REVENUES. The phrase "delivery installment" shall mean each installment of the Bonds delivered to the Government as initial purchaser thereof. Each delivery installment shall be noted on the registration grid set forth on the bond. "Engineer" shall mean Spicer Group, Inc., Consulting Engineers of Saginaw

"Fiscal Year" shall mean the fiscal year of the Village and the operating year of the System, commencing January 1 and ending on December 31 of each year, as such year may be changed from time to time.

"Government" shall mean the government of the United States of America or an

"Ordinance" shall mean this ordinance and any ordinance or resolution of the camendatory or supplemental to this ordinance, including ordinances or tions authorizing issuance of Additional Bonds. "Outstanding Bonds" means, as of any given date, the Series 2006 Bonds and any Additional Bonds of equal standing hereafter issued and delivered under this Ordinance except for Bonds or maturities thereof which the Village has paid.

"Project" shall mean the construction and acquisition of improvements to the Village's water treatment and distribution system in order to remove arsenic from the Village's water supply, including but not limited to an arsenic removal treatment plant, a building to house said plant, piping from the Village's water wells to the arsenic removal treatment plant, well #3, a standby generator, and electrical controls and upgrades for wells together with associated appurtenances and attachments thereto, which are public improvements, as defined in Section 3 of Act 94, and are authorized to be acquired and constructed under the provisions of this Ordinance.

"Reserve Amount" shall mean the lesser of (i) the maximum annual debt service requirements on the Outstanding Bonds. (ii) 125% of the average annual debt service requirements on the Outstanding Bonds. or (iii) the total of 10% of the original aggregate face amount of each series of Bonds currently outstanding, reduced by the net original issue discount, if any provided, however, that the Reserve Amount shall not at any time exceed the amount allowed to be invested at an unrestricted yield pursuant to Treas. Reg. Section 1148-2(f)(2) or any successor provision thereto as applicable to the Bonds.

"Series 2006 Bonds" shall mean the Series 2006A Bond and the Series 2006B

"Series 2006A Bond" shall mean the Water Supply System Revenue Bond, eries 2006A of the Village in the principal amount of \$1.858,000 authorized by this

"Series 2006B Bond" shall mean the Water Supply System Revenue Bond, cries 2006B of the Village in the principal amount of not-to-exceed \$92,000 authorized

"System" shall mean the Village's water supply system including such facilities thereof as are now existing, are acquired and constructed as the Project, and all enlargements, extensions, repairs and improvements thereto hereafter made.

"Transfer Agent" shall mean the transfer agent and bond registrar for each series of Bonds as appointed from time to time by the Village as provided in Section 5 of this Ordinance and who or which shall carry out the duties and responsibilities as set forth in Sections 5 and 6 of this Ordinance.

Section 2 Necessity: Approval of Plans and Specifications. It is hereby determined to be a necessary public purpose of the Village to acquire and construct the Project in accordance with detailed maps, plans and specifications therefor prepared by the Engineer and on file with the Village, which maps, plans and specifications are hereby approved.

Section 3 Section.3 Costs: Useful Life The total cost of the Project is estimated to be not less than One Million Eight Hundred Fifty-Eight Thousand Dollars (\$1.858.000) including the parment of incidental expenses as specified in Section 4 of this Ordinance, which estimate of cost is hereby approved and confirmed, and the period of usefulness of the Project is estimated to be not less than forty (40) years. Section 4 Payment of Cost, Series 2006 Bonds Authorized. To pay part of the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping the Project and legal, engineering, financial and other expenses incident thereto and to the issuance and sale of the Series 2006 Bonds, it is hereby determined that the Village borrow the sum of not to exceed One Million Nine Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$1,950,000), and that a revenue bond or bonds be issued therefor in one or more series pursuant to the provisions of Act 94. The remaining cost of the Project, if any, shall be defrayed from Village funds on hand and legally available for such use.

Section 5. Series 2006 Bond Details, Registration and Execution. The Series 2006 Bonds shall be designated as the WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM REVENUE BOND. SERIES 2006A, and the WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM REVENUE BOND. SERIES 2006B. Each series of the Series 2006 Bonds shall be dated as of the date of delivery of the first delivery installment, and shall be payable in principal installments serially on October 1 of each year, as shown in the payment grid attached to the Bond Form set forth in Section 8 of this Ordinance, or in such other principal maturity amounts and dates as the Village President and Village Clerk may determine at the time of delivery of each series of the Series 2006 Bonds which is acceptable to the Government as the initial purchaser thereof, provided that the final principal payment of each of the Series 2006A Bonds shall be due and payable within 40 years of the date of issuance thereof. The Series 2006A Bond shall consist of one (1) single fully-registered nonconvertible bond of the denomination of \$18.8,000. The Series 2006B Bond shall consist of one (1) single fully-registered nonconvertible bond of the denomination of \$92.000 (or such lesser principal amount issued in the discretion of the Village President and Village Clerk).

Each series of the Series 2006 Bonds is expected to be delivered to the Government as initial purchaser thereof in installments (each, a "delivery installment") and each delivery installment shall be noted on the registration grid set forth on the bond. The delivery installments shall be deemed to correspond to the serial principal installments of the Bond in direct chronological order of said serial principal installments.

The serial principal installments of the Series 2006 Bonds will each bear interest from the The serial principal installments of the Series 2006 Bonds will each bear interest from the date of delivery of the corresponding delivery installment to the Government as shown on the registration grid set forth on the Bond at the rate of not to exceed 5.00% per annum, payable on the first October 1 or April 1 following the date of delivery of said delivery installment, and semiannually thereafter on October 1 and April 1 of each year until maturity or earlier prepayment, or on such other semi-annual dates as the Village President and Village Clerk may determine at the time of delivery of each series of the Series 2006 Bonds which is acceptable to the Government as the initial purchaser thereof. If and at such time as either series of the Series 2006 Bonds is transferred to or held by any registered owner other than the Government. the Village by resolution may appoint a bank or trust company qualified under Michigan law to act as transfer agent and bond registrar, and the Village may thereafter appoint a successor Transfer Agent upon sixty (60) days

Section 6 Bond Registration and Transfer of the Bonds. The Transfer Agent shall or cause to be kept at its principal office sufficient books for the registration and transfer of Section to <u>Bond_Registration_and_Inansier_O_inte_Bonds</u>. In irransier_Agent sinal keep or cause to be kept at its principal office sufficient books for the registration and transfer of the Bonds, which shall at all times be open to inspection by the Village. The Transfer Agent shall transfer or cause to be transferred on said books the Bonds presented for transfer as hereinafter provided and subject to such reasonable regulations as it may prescribe.

Any Bond may be transferred upon the books required to be kept by the Transfer Agent pursuant to this Section, by the person in whose name it is registered, in person or by his duly authorized attorney, upon surrender of such Bond for transfer, accompanied by delivery of a duly authorized attorney, upon surrender of such Bond for transfer, accompanied by delivery of a duly executed written instrument of transfer in a form approved by the Transfer Agent shall record such transfer on the registration books and shall register such transfer on the registration grid attached to the Bonds. At the time of such transfer, the Transfer Agent shall note on the Bonds the outstanding principal amount thereof at the time of such transfer. In the exent any Bonds are called for prepayment in part, the Transfer Agent, upon surrender of the Bonds, shall note on the Bonds the principal amount prepaid and shall return the Bond to the registered owner thereof together with the prepayment amount on the prepayment date.

Section 7 Payment of the Bonds. Principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft mailed by the Transfer Agent to the registered owner at the address of the registered owner as shown on the registration books of the Village kept by the Transfer Agent. If the Government shall no longer be the registered owner of any series of the Bonds, then the principal of and interest on the Bonds shall be payable to the registered owner of record as of the fifteenth day of the month preceding the payment date by check or draft mailed to the registered owner at the registered address. Such date of determination of the registered owner for purposes of payment of principal or interest may be changed by the Village to conform to future market practice. The Village's Treasurer is hereby authorized to execute an agreement with any successor Transfer Agent.

The Transfer Agent shall record on the registration books the payment by the Village of each installment of principal or interest or both on the Bonds when made and the canceled checks or drafts representing such payments shall be returned to and retained by the Village's Treasurer, which canceled checks or drafts shall be conclusive evidence of such payments and the obligation of the Village's with respect to such payments shall be discharged to the extent of such payments.

Upon payment by the Village of all outstanding principal of and interest on Bonds of an series issued pursuant to this Ordinance, the registered owner thereof shall deliver the Bonds

Section 8 Execution, Sale and Delivery of the Series 2006 Bonds. The Series 2006 Bonds shall be manually signed by the President and countersigned by the Village Clerk and shall have the corporate seal of the Village impressed thereon. After execution, the Series 2006 Bonds shall be held by the Village's Treasurer for delivery to the Government. No Series 2006 Bond or any delivery installment thereof shall be valid until registered by the Village's Treasurer or by another person designated in writing by the Village's Treasurer to act as Bond Registrar, or upon transfer by the Government and thereafter, by an authorized representative of the Transfer Agent.

The Village Manager or the Village President is hereby authorized and, directed to negotiate privately the sale of the Series 2006A Bond to the Government at an interest rate not to exceed 4 125% per annum and at the par value thereof is hereby approved. The Village Manager or the Village President is hereby authorized and directed to negotiate privately the sale of the Series 2008B Bond to the Government at an interest rate not to exceed 5.00% per annum and at the par value thereof is hereby approved. The Village's Treasurer is hereby authorized to deliver the Series 2008B Bonds in accordance with the delivery instructions of the Government.

Section 9. <u>Bond Form</u>. The form and tenor of the Bonds shall be substantially as follows, with such revisions, additions and deletions as may be advisable or necessary to comply with the requirements of the Government and subject to appropriate variation upon issuance of Additional Bonds:

Section 10. <u>Security for the Bonds</u> To pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds as and when the same shall become due, there is hereby created a statutory first lien upon the whole of the Net Revenues of the System to continue until the payment in full of the principal of and interest on the Bonds and said Net Revenues shall be set saide for the purpose and identified as the Bond and Interest Redemption Account, as hereinafter specified

Section 11. <u>Budget</u> Immediately upon the effective date of this Ordinance for the remainder of the current Fiscal Year, and thereafter prior to the beginning of each Fiscal Year. the Village shall prepare an annual budget for the System for the ensuing Fiscal Year itemized on the basis of quarterly requirements. A copy of such budget shall be mailed to the Government without request from the Government for review prior to adoption (as long as the Government is the registered owner of any of the Bonds), and upon written request to any other registered owners of the Bonds.

Section 12. <u>Custodian of Funds</u>, <u>Funds</u>. The Village's Treasurer shall be custodian of Bepository Bank. The Village's Treasurer shall execute a fidelity bond with a surety company in an amount at least equal to the maximum annual debt service for the Series 2006 Bonds.

(A) CONSTRUCTION ACCOUNT. The proceeds of the Series 2006 Bonds, and no other funds. shall be deposited in the WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION ACCOUNT (the "Construction Account"). In the Depository Bank. Moneys in the Construction Account shall be used solely for the purposes for which the Series 2006 Bonds are sissed. If monies other than proceeds of the Series 2006 Bonds are deposited into the Construction Account. then the monies constituting proceeds of the Series 2006 Bonds shall be accounted separately from such other funds or monies.

Any unexpended balance of the proceeds of sale of the Series 2006 Bonds remaining after completion of the Project herein authorized may in the discretion of the Village be used for further improvements, enlargements and extensions to the System. Any remaining balance after such expenditure shall be paid into the Bond and Interest Redemption Account and used as soon as is practical for the prepayment of installments of the Series 2006 Bonds or for the purchase of installments to the Series 2006 Bonds at not more than the fair market value thereof. Following completion of the Project, any unexpended balance of the Series 2006 Bonds shall be invested at a yield not to exceed the yield on the Series 2006 Bonds.

After completion of the Project and disposition of remaining proceeds, if any, of the pursuant to the provisions of this Section, the Construction Account shall be closed.

(B) WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM RECEIVING ACCOUNT. Upon and after the effective date of this Ordinance, the Revenues of the System shall be set aside into a separate ecount to be designated the WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM RECEIVING ACCOUNT (the Receiving Account), and moneys so deposited therein shall be transferred, expended and used nly in the manner and order as follows:

(1) Operation and Maintenance Account. There is hereby established a separate Account to be designated the WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE ACCOUNT (the "Operation and Maintenance Account"). Revenues shall be transferred each quarter of the Fiscal Year (each. a "Fiscal Quarter"), commencing upon the effective date of this Ordinance, from the Receiving Account to the Operation and Maintenance Account to pay the reasonable and necessary current expenses of administration and operating and maintaining the System for the ensuing quarter.

(2) Water Supply System Revenue Bond - Bond and Interest Redemption Account. There is hereby established a separate account to be designated as the WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM BOND AND INTEREST REDEMPTION ACCOUNT (the "Bond and Interest Redemption Account") After the transfer required in (1) above, Revenues shall be transferred each Fiscal Quarter, commencing on the first day of the Fiscal Quarter after delivery of the first delivery installment of the Seres 2006 Bonds, from the Receiving Account: before any other expenditures or transfer therefrom, and deposited in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account for payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds and to fund the Bond Reserve Account.

Upon any delivery of a delivery installment of the Bonds there shall be set aside at the time of delivery and on the first day of each Fiscal Quarter thereafter an amount equal to that fraction of the amount of interest due on the next interest payment date on said installment so delivered, the numerator of which is 1 and the denominator of which is the number of full and partial Fiscal Quarters from the date of said delivery to the next interest payment date. There shall be set aside each Fiscal Quarter on or after the delivery of the first delivery installment, an amount equal to at least 1/2 of the amount of interest due on the next interest payment date on all outstanding installments of the Bond not delivered during the then current interest payment period.

Upon any delivery of a delivery installment of the Bonds there shall be set aside at the time of such delivery and on the first day of Fiscal Quarter thereafter to the next principal payment date an amount equal to that fraction of the amount of principal due on the next principal payment date on said installment so delivered, the numerator of which is I and the denominator of which is the number of full and partial Fiscal Quarters from the date of said delivery to the next principal payment date. There shall also be set aside each Fiscal Quarter on after the delivery of the first delivery installment, an amount not less than 1/4 of the amount of principal due on the next principal payment date. Except as hereinafter provided, no further deposits shall be made into the Bond and Interest Redemption Account (excluding the Bond Reserve Account) once the aforesaid sums have been deposited therein. Any amount on deposit in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account (excluding the Bond Reserve Account) in excess of (a) the amount needed for payment of principal installments of the Bonds for the then current principal payment period, plus (b) interest on the Bonds for the theq current interest payment period, shall be used by the Village for redemption of principal installments of the Bonds in the manner set forth in Section 10 hereof, if such use is impracticable, shall be deposited in or credited to the Receiving Account.

If for any reason there is a failure to make such quarterly deposit in the amounts required, en the entire amount of the deficiency shall be set aside and deposited in the Bond Redemption ecoupt out of the Revenues first received thereafter which are not required by this Ordinance to deposited in the Operation and Maintenance Account or in the Bond and Interest Redemption ecount, which amount shall be in addition to the regular quarterly deposit required during such ecceding quarter or quarters.

There is hereby established in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account a separate account to be designated the WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS RESERVE ACCOUNT (the "Bond Reserve Account"). Commencing on the first day of the Fiscal Quarter after delivery of the first delivery installment of the Series 2006 Bonds, there shall be withdrawn from the Receiving Account at the beginning of each Fiscal Quarter and set aside in and after delivery of the first delivery installment of the Series 2006 Bonds, there shall be withdrawn from the Receiving Account at the beginning of each Fiscal Quarter and set aside in and transferred to the Bond Reserve Account in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account, after provision has been made for the Operation and Maintenance Account and the current requirements of the Bond and Interest Redemption Account: the sum of \$9,560 annually, or such greater amount as the Government might require prior to accepting delivery of the Series 2006B Bond, until there is accumulated in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account the Bond Reserve Amount of \$95,600 or such greater amount as the Government might require prior to accepting delivery of the Series 2006B Bond. Except as hereinafter provided, no further deposits shall be made into the Bond and Interest Redemption Account for the purposes of the Bond Reserve Account once the sum on deposit therein is equal to \$95,600, or such greater amount as the Government might require prior to accepting delivery of the Series 2006B Bond. The moneys in the Bond Reserve Account shall be used solely for the payment of the principal installments of and interest on the Bonds as to which there would otherwise be default; provided however, that in the event the amount on deposit in the Bond Reserve Account exceeds the Reserve Amount, the moneys in the Bond Reserve Account in excess of the Reserve Amount and the series of the Bond Reserve Account in excess of the Reserve Amount and the series of the Reserve Amou

If at any time it shall be necessary to use moneys in the Bond Reserve Account for payment of the principal of or interest on the Bonds (other than in the event the amount of deposit in the Bond Reserve Account exceeds the Reserve Amount as provided in the preceding paragraph), then the moneys so used shall be replaced from the Net Revenues first received thereafter which are not required by this Ordinance to be used for operation and maintenance or current principal and interest requirements for the Bonds

No further payments need be made into the Bond and Interest Redemption Accouncing of the principal installments of the Bonds have been retired so that the amount the in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account (including the Bond Reserve Account), is eithe entire amount of principal and interest which will be payable at the time of maturity of principal installments of the Bonds then remaining outstanding.

The moneys in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account and the Bond Reserve Account shall be invested in accordance with Section 13 of this Ordinance, and profit realized or income carned on such investment shall be used or transferred as provided in Section 13 of this Ordinance.

After the transfers required in (1) and (2) above, as long as the Government is the holder of any of the Series 2006 Bonds, revenues shall be transferred each Fiscal Quarter from the Receiving Account and deposited in the RRI Account in an amount as follows the Village will annually transfer \$3,000 or such greater amount as the Government might require prior to accepting delivery of the Series 2006 Bond; after the balance of the Bond Reserve Account reaches the Bond Reserve Amount, the Village will annually transfer \$12,560 or such greater amount as the Government might require prior to accepting delivery of the Series 2006 Bond. Moneys in the RRI Account shall be used and disbursed only for the purpose of paying the cost of (a) repairing or replacing obsolete, deteriorating deteriorated or worn out equipment or other portions of the System. (b) repairing any damage to and emergency maintenance of the System. (c) acquiring and constructing extensions and improvements to the System, and, when necessary, for the purpose of making payments of principal and interest on the Bonds. If the amount in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account and the Bond Reserve Account is not sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds when the Bond and Interest Redemption Account and used for that purpose. Moneys in the RRI Account than the RII Account than the remainder and the remainder of the suppose.

(4) REVERSE FLOW OF ACCOUNTS, SURPLUS MONEY. In the event the moneys in the Receiving Account are insufficient to provide for the current requirements of the Operation and Maintenance Account, the Bond and Interest Redemption Account (including the Bond Reserve Account) or the RRI Account, any moneys and/or securities in the accounts of the System described by this Ordinance shall be transferred. first, to the Operation and Maintenance Account, second, the Bond and Interest Redemption Account, and third, to the RRI Account.

All moneys remaining in the Receiving Account at the end of any Fiscal Year after satisfying the above requirements for the deposit of moneys into the Operation and Maintenance Account, the Bond and Interest Redemption Account and the RRI Account may be transferred to the Bond and Interest Redemption Account and used to call Bonds or portions thereof for redemption, or at the option of the Village, transferred to the RRI Account and used for the purpose for which the account was established; provided, however, that if there should be a deficit in the Operation and Maintenance Account, the Bond and Interest Redemption Account, the Bond Reserve Account or the RRI Account, on account of defaults in setting aside therein the amounts hereinbefore required, then transfers shall be made from such moneys remaining in the Receiving Account to such accounts in the priority and order named in this Section, to the extent of such deficits.

Section 13. Investments. Moneys in the funds and accounts established herein and moneys derived from the proceeds of sale of the Bonds may be invested by the Village Council of the Village on behalf of the Village in the obligations and instruments permitted for investment by Section 24 of Act 94, as the same may be amended from time to time, provided, however, that as long as any of the Bonds are held by the Government, then the investment may be limited to the obligations and instruments authorized by the Government. Investment of moneys in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account being accumulated for payment on the moneys in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account being accumulated for payment on the next maturing principal or interest payment on a series of the Bonds shall be limited to obligations and instruments bearing maturity dates prior to the date of the next maturing principal or interest payment on a series of the Bonds. Investment of moneys in the Bond Reserve Account shall be limited to Government obligations and instruments bearing maturity dates or subject to redemption, at the option of the holder thereof, not later than five (5) years from the date of the investment. In the event investments are made, any securities representing the same shall be kept on deposit with the Depository Bank. Interest income earned on investment of funds in the Receiving Account, the Operation and Maintenance Account, the Bond and Interest Redemption Account (except the Bond Reserve Account) and the RRI Account, shall be deposited in or credited to the Receiving Account. Interest income earned on the investment of funds in the Bond Reserve Account shall be deposited in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account.

Section 14. <u>Rates and Charges</u>. In order to provide that the rates and charges for the services of the System shall be sufficient to pay the costs of operating, maintaining and administering the System, to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds and to meet the requirements for repair, replacement, reconstruction and improvement and all other requirements. provided herein, and otherwise comply with the covenants as herein provided, the Village hereby imposes the following increases:

Four percent per year, with such additional amounts as shall be necessary to comply with uirements of this Ordinance.

The Village hereby covenants and agrees to fix and maintain at all times while any of the Bonds shall be outstanding such rates for service furnished by the System as shall be sufficient to provide for the foregoing expenses, requirements and covedants, and to create a bond and interest redemption account (including a bond reserve account) for all such Bonds. The rates and charges for all services and facilities rendered by the System shall be reasonable and just, taking into consideration the cost and value of the System and the cost of maintaining, repairing, and operating the same and the amounts necessary for the retirement of all of the Bonds and describing interest on all of the Bonds and there shall be cheared, such rates and charges as shall be into consideration the cost and value of the System and the cost of maintaining, repairing, an operating the same and the amounts necessary for the retirement of all of the Bonds and accruin interest on all of the Bonds, and there shall be charged such rates and charges as shall be adequate to meet the requirements of this Section and Section 12 of this Ordinance.

Section 15. No Free Service. No free service shall be furnished by the System to any individual. firm or corporation, public or private or to any public agency or instrumentality. Section 16. <u>Covenants</u> The Village covenants and agrees, so long as any of the hereby authorized remain unpaid, as follows:

(a) It will comply with applicable State laws and regulations and continually operate and maintain the System in good condition.

(i) It will maintain complete books and records relating to the operation and financial affairs of the System. If the Government is the holder of any of the Bonds, the Government shall have the right to inspect the System and the records, accounts, and data relating thereto at all reasonable times.

(ii) It will file with the State of Michigan Department of Treasury and the Government each year, as soon as is possible, not later than six months after the close of the Fiscal Year, a report, on forms prepared by the State of Michigan Department of Treasury, made in accordance with the accounting method of the Village, completely setting forth the financial operation of such Fiscal Year.

(iii) It will cause an annual audit of such books of record and account for the public accountant, and will cause such accountant to mail a copy of such audit to the Government, without request of the Government. Such audit shall be the Government, without request of the Government. Such audit shall be completed and so made available not later than six months after the close of each and all purposes for which said forms are required to be used by this Ordinance.

It will maintain and carry, for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds, insurance on all physical properties of the System, of the kinds and in the amounts normally carried by municipalities engaged in the operation of similar systems. The amount of said insurance shall be approved by the Government. All moneys received for losses under any such insurance policies shall be applied solely to the replacement and restoration of the property damaged or destroyed, and to the extent not so used, shall be used for the purpose of calling Bonds.

As long as the Government is the holder of any of the Bond, the Village will not borrow any money from any source or enter into any contract or agreement to incur any other liabilities that may in any way be a lien upon the Revenues or otherwise encumber the System so as to impair Revenues therefrom, without obtaining the prior written consent of the Government, nor shall it transfer or use any portion of the Revenues derived in the operation of the System for any purpose not herein specifically authorized

As long as the Government is the holder of any of the Bond, the Village will not voluntarily dispose of or transfer its title to the System or any part thereof including lands and interest in land, sale, mortgage, lease or other encumbrances without obtaining the prior written consent of the Government.

As long as the Government is the holder of any of the Bond, any extensions to or introduced in the System shall be made according to sound engineering principles and specifications shall be submitted to the Government for prior review.

To the extent permitted by law, it shall take all actions within its control necessary to maintain the exclusion of the interest on the Bonds from adjusted gross income for general federal income tax purposes under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, including but not limited to, actions relating to the robate of arbitrage carnings, if applicable, and the expenditure and investment of proceeds of the Bonds and moneys deemed to be proceeds of the Bonds.

Section 17. Additional Bonds The Village shall not issue additional Bonds of equal or prior standing with the Bonds except as hereinafter provided. The right is reserved in accordance with the provisions of Act 94, to issue Additional Bonds payable from the Revenues of the System which shall be of equal standing and priority of lien on the Net Revenues of the System with the Bonds The Village may issue Additional Bonds of equal standing with the Bonds but only for the following purposes and on the following conditions:

(a) To complete construction of the Project according to the plans referred to in Section 1. Additional Bonds may be issued in the amount necessary therefor.

(i) The augmented net revenues of the System for the Fiscal Year preceding the year in which such Additional Bonds are to be issued were 100 percent of the average annual dobt service requirements on all Bonds then outstanding and those proposed to be issued net of any Bonds to be refunded by

(ii) The holders of at least 75 percent of the then outstanding Bonds, consent to such issue in writing.

For purposes of this Section the term "augmented net revenues" shall mean the Net Revenues of the System for a year, adjusted to reflect the effect of any rate increase placed in effect during that year (but not in effect for the whole year), placed in effect subsequent to the year or scheduled, at the time the new Bonds are authorized, to be placed in effect before principal of and interest on the new Bonds become payable from Revenues of the System, and augmented by any increase in Revenues or decrease in expenses estimated to accrue from the improvements to be acquired from the new Bonds. The adjustments and augmentations provided for in the preceding sentence shall be established by certificate of an independent consulting engineer filed with the Village Clerk. If new Bonds are issued within 4 months of the end of a Fiscal Year, the determination made in subsection (b)(i) of this Section may be based upon the results of a Fiscal Year ending within 16 months of the date of issuance of the new Bonds.

The accounts herein established shall be applied to all Additional Bonds issued pursuant to this Section as if said bonds were part of the original bond issue and all Revenue from any such extension or replacement constructed by the proceeds of an additional bond issue shall be paid to the Receiving Account mentioned in this Ordinance.

Except as otherwise specifically provided as long as any of such Bonds herein authorized are outstanding, no additional bonds or other obligations pledging any portion of the Revenues of the System shall be incurred or issued by the Village unless the same shall be junior and subordinate in all respects to the Bonds herein authorized.

Section 18. Ordinance Shall Constitute Contract. The provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a contract between the Village and the bondholders and after the issuance of the Bonds this Ordinance shall not be repealed or amended in any respect which will adversely affect the rights and interests of the holders nor shall the Village adopt any law ordinance or resolution in any way adversely affecting the rights or the holders so long as the Bonds or interest thereon remains unput.

Section 19 Refunding of Bonds. If at any time it shall appear to the Government that the Village is able to refund any of the then outstanding Bonds held by the Government by obtaining a loan for such purposes from responsible cooperative or private credit sources at reasonable rates and terms for loans for similar purposes and periods of time, the Village will, upon request of the Government, apply for and accept such loan in sufficient amount to repay the Government, and will take all such actions as may be required in connection with such loans to the extent permitted by law. the extent permitted by law

Section 20 Default of Village If there shall be default in the Bond and Interest Redemption Account provisions of this Ordinance or in the payment of principal of or interest on any of the Bonds, upon the filing of a suit by 20 percent of the holders of the then Outstanding Bonds, any court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a receiver to administer the System on behalf of the Village with power to charge and collect rates sufficient to provide for the payment of the Bonds and for the payment of operation, maintenance and administrative expenses and to apply Revenues in accordance with this Ordinance and the laws of the State of Michigan.

The holders of 20 percent of the then Outstanding Bonds may protect and enforce the statutory lien on the Net Revenues and compel the performance of all duties of the officials of the Village including the fixing of rates, the collection of revenues, the proper segregation of revenues and the proper allocation of revenues.

Section 21. Ordinance Subject to Michigan Law and Government Regulation sions of this Ordinance are subject to the laws of the State of Michigan and to the provisions of this Ordinance are subject to the laws of the State of Princingan and to the present and future regulations of the Government not inconsistent with the express provisions hereof and Section 22. Fiscal Year of System. The fiscal year for operating the System shall be the Fiscal Year.

Section 23. <u>Village Subject to Loan Resolution</u> So long as the Government is holder of the Series 2006 Bonds, the Village shall be subject to the loan resolution (RUS Bulletin 1780-27) and shall comply with all provisions thereof.

Section 24. <u>Covenant Not to Defease</u>. As long as the Government is the holder of any of the Bonds the Village covenants that it will not defease any of the Bonds held by the

Section 25. <u>Conflict and Severability.</u> All ordinances, resolutions and orders or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed, and each section of this Ordinance and each subdivision of any section hereof is hereby declared to be independent, and the finding or holding of any section or subdivision thereof to be invalid or void shall not be deemed or held to affect the validity of any other section or

Section 26. Paragraph Headings. The paragraph headings in this Ordinance are furnished for convenience of reference only and shall not be considered to be a part of this Ordinance.

Section 27. Publication and Recordation. This Ordinance shall be published in ful and the Cass City Chronicle, a newspaper of general circulation in the Village, qualified under State law to publish legal notices, promptly after its adoption, and the same shall be recorded in the Ordinance Book of the Village and such recording authenticated by the signatures of the President and Village Clerk.

Section 28. Effective Date. This Ordinance is hereby determined by the Village Council to be immediately necessary for the preservation of the peace, health and safety of the Village and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required.

other rescue helicopter that was coming right at him.

With dozens of rescue helicopters in that area and no traffic control, he said, it was a dangerous operation. "We were picking people up all day every day for a week and a half, 2 weeks," said Houghton, who pointed out that Coast Guard pilots are used to conducting search and rescue over open water and don't usually have to watch out for hazards such as utility

Houghton is quick to give credit to his mechanic for his quick warning and support during their mission.

"He didn't get recognized to the same degree as I did, but he gets a Christmas gift from me every year now," he said.

Although Houghton hasn't lived in the Thumb area for many years, he has close ties to the Cass City community, which is home to several of his aunts and uncles, including Jack and Mary Lou Burns, Elaine LaJoie, Jeff and Winnie Jensen, and Mike and Ghris Diegel. His grandparents, Ted and Betty Klimek, reside in the Silverwood area.

"We come back quite regularly," Houghton, 32, said of his family, including wife Katherine and the couple's children, Hannah, 4, and Hunter, 10 months. "I probably come back one or 2 times a year. I love hunting up there."

Houghton's career in the armed services started with his enlistment in the U.S. Army right out of high school and came naturally - his father, Marvin G. Houghton, retired from the U.S. Army after 23 years of service.

"When I was in high school I had learned of the Warrant Officer Flight Training Program. I did some reading on that, and my dad was a former recruiter and he kind of knew the program. I've always wanted to fly," he

Although the flight training program typically accepts more experienced servicemen, Houghton was accepted after receiving his diploma from Westover High School, Fayetteville, N.C., in 1992.

After basic training at Fort Jackson, S.C., he began 6 weeks of training in the Warrant Officer Candidate School at Fort Rucker, Ala. He then completed Warrant Officer Flight Training

Later stationed with a unit at Fort Bragg, N.C., Houghton served as a scout helicopter pilot. "Our basic mission was reconnaissance. We were basically the eyes and ears of the commander," he explained of his

In 1997, just after having exchanged vows with his wife, Houghton was sent to Bosnia for a one-year tour of duty.

"It was an eye-opening experience," he said. "That's when I knew that there had to be something else."

After returning home, Houghton spent his last 2 years in the Army as an aeroscout instructor pilot at Fort Polk, La. He also spent time researching the Direct Commission Officer Program, which enabled him to leave the Army and join the U.S. Coast Guard. The change proved to be a perfect fit for Houghton, who had wanted to spend more time with his family.

tion Detroit, serving as a search and rescue aircraft commander, scheduling officer and public affairs officer. He was then transferred to his current position as a standardization instructor pilot in Alabama.

Houghton clearly enjoys his work, but he never expected to receive the Distinguished Flying Cross.

"It's quite an honor. I was pretty shocked. I never thought I'd receive," he said.

The honor didn't surprise family members in Cass City, including Mary Lou Burns.

"We're very proud of Greg," Burns said. "He sent us videos of his rescues, and that was very exciting."


Burns recalled that Houghton flew a helicopter into the Thumb for the 2004 Kingston Days Celebration. "The people were so thrilled - he took aerial (photos) for them and he explained the Coast Guard equipment," she said.

"The only thing we don't like about Greg is that he's in Mobile, Ala.," Burns joked. "He has always been just super. He has a wonderful wife and children. He has made us very proud."

Houghton is quick to say the Army was good to him, but he's also glad he made the move to the Coast Guard.

In the Army, training is a constant activity, and that's good, he said, but now, nearly every day is spent making a difference in the life of others in need, whether its rescuing stranded boaters or searching for survivors after a natural disaster.

"In the Coast Guard, every day is the real deal," he said. "It's always

the zoning board shall be removable for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance in office by the township board upon written charges and after public hearing."

According to Webster's Dictionary, misfeasance is "wrongdoing" and "specifically, the doing of a lawful act in a an unlawful or improper manner, so that there is an infringement on the rights of another or others."

Malfeasance is "wrongdoing or misconduct, especially by a public official" and "commission of an act that is positively unlawful."

Nonfeasance is "failure to do what duty requires to be done."

Dickson said he is unsure about what exactly will happen at the public hearing, but he assumes both sides will be able to present their cases. A date for the hearing has not be set yet. "If it was me, I wouldn't allow that

meeting (the public hearing) to happen," he added. "I would just resign."
Patera said the board will have more information after hearing from the lawyer.

However, he added that he would resign if serving on both boards is not permissible.

"If you can't be on both boards, you can't be," he said.
