### Camp Tuscola to re-open, state says

Camp Tuscola is expected to reopen by the end of the year, a decision that will bring back dozens of jobs lost when state officials closed the facility in the spring of 2005

Tuscola County Board of Commissioners Chairman Jerry Peterson said Michigan Department of Corrections (MDOC) officials have confirmed they plan to reopen the minimum security facility.

"This is tremendously positive news and could not have come at a better time because the county has experienced distressing job losses in the manufacturing, automotive and other sectors of the economy," he said.

Tuscola County Controller/Administrator Mike Hoagland said determination and persistence of county officials in meetings with the MDOC has paid off.

"We had many productive meetings with state officials, pleading our case, explaining the viability for re-use of the facility and explaining the importance of the facility to the local economy," Hoagland added.


"I believe our state officials appreciated our approach of working with them and not against them. 'We felt it was important to take this approach because, in many respects, county government is an arm of state government," he said. "Numerous meetings were held and tremendous amounts of information presented, and in the end we were able to convince the state of the benefits of reopening the facility.

"We are simply thrilled," Hoagland continued. "What could be more rewarding than to contribute to creating or reestablishing jobs for our citizens and rebuilding our economy?"

Jim McLoskey, Tuscola County **Economic Development Corporation** (EDC) executive director, estimated the return of 50 corrections jobs will infuse some \$11 million annually back into the county's economy.

Income from the reestablishment of these jobs benefits all sectors of the economy by cycling dollars into retail, real estate, services, etc., McLoskey said, adding this sort of positive development can be used to complement other job-creating ef-

### O-G, NH to share teacher

Owen-Gage High School will share a foreign language teacher with the North Huron Schools following action at a regular monthly Owen-Gage Board of Education meeting last week.

"We did agree to subcontract through North Huron for a Spanish teacher - his name is Stephan McIntosh," Owen-Gage School Supt. Dana Compton reported.

Compton said the one-year contract provides for McIntosh to spend 69 percent (3 hours per day) of his time at North Huron and the remaining 31 percent (2 hours per day) at Owen-

There is a demand for a foreign language class at Owen-Gage, according to Compton. "We anticipate it will be an on-going arrangement and we hope it will be," he said, adding school officials hope to eventually begin exposing younger students to foreign language as well.

The shared teacher arrangement fits perfectly with the educational direction Compton has embraced since he arrived in the Thumb.

"We want to work cooperatively with other districts, not competitively. We'll all be stronger and maybe save some dollars along the way," he said. "That's our philosophy at Owen-Gage. I believe in it.

'We need to cooperate district to for our students. We'd like to see more of that," Compton added. "Everybody benefits.'

Owen-Gage has been among the pioneers of Thumb schools entering cooperative agreements. The district already has athletic cooperatives with the Caseville Public Schools in which they share athletes interested in participating in varsity track, football and soccer along with junior high foot-

This fall Owen-Gage will share a student program focusing on drug and alcohol awareness with the Laker School District, and Compton said there are also plans to conduct a joint professional development program with the staff at Caseville.

"I think we need to do more of that," he said. "Dollars are tight within the state of Michigan, and we all have our priorities of educating students, district to provide the best education and by cooperating, we can do that much more efficiently

# Move over

#### Some motorists ignore law designed to protect responders

It's a simple law designed to protect police officers and other emergency responders on highways, side streets and country roads.

But many motorists either aren't aware of Michigan's Emergency Vehicle Caution Law, or they allow themselves to become distracted or are simply careless as they approach a police cruiser, ambulance or fire truck on the side of the road.

And people who put their lives on the line every day to protect their fellow citizens are dying as a result.

Many people think that police officers are most at risk when they approach a stopped motorist who could be armed or intoxicated, but that's not the case, according to First Lt. Doug Lautner, commander of the Michigan State Police posts in Caro and Bad Axe, who has seen his share of violations of the Emergency Vehicle Caution Law.

"The real danger is the bullet that your vest can't stop," said Lautner, who just recently had his own close call while conducting a traffic stop on M-53. He recalled the driver of an oncoming vehicle tried to pass another vehicle and "almost clipped the mirror" on the police cruiser.

"It's really an awareness issue. To be aware of the dangers we face out here," said Lautner, a state police veteran of 25 years. "Your first instinct (as a police officer) is that this guy you've stopped may try to harm you, but statistically it's more likely you're the seat of your pants.' going to get hit by another car coming along.

Although Lautner couldn't recall an incident in which an emergency responder was injured or killed by a passing motorist in Tuscola County, he said officers have died in other parts of Michigan. In fact, 3 of the last 4 state police troopers to die in the line of duty were killed during traffic stops.

Just a few weeks ago, he added, a police officer was seriously injured when a motorist struck his cruiser. which then struck him during a traffic stop in Allen Park. The young driver was sending a text message when he plowed into the officer's car.

#### **MOVE OVER**

Also known as the "move over" law, Michigan Emergency Vehicle Caution Law was enacted 5 years ago.

The law states that drivers traveling on a highway with 2 or more lanes of travel in the same direction, who approach a stationary emergency ve-

hicle with its emergency lights activated, must carefully move into an open lane at least one lane away from the emergency vehicle. If that's not possible due to traffic, weather or road conditions, drivers must slow down and pass with caution, allowing the emergency vehicle as much space as possible.

Drivers traveling on a roadway: which has only one lane of travel must carefully move over into the open adjacent lane if possible. Again, if traffic, weather or road conditions prevent moving over, motorists are required to slow down and pass with caution.

The law carries some stiff penalties. Violators face a misdemeanor charge punishable by a fine of up to \$500 or 0 days in jail, or both.

Injure an emergency response worker and the charge is a felony carrying a maximum penalty of up to 2 years in prison or a fine of \$1,000, or both. Kill an emergency responder and you face up to 15 years in prison, a fine of up to \$7,500, or both.

The law is really about common sense and caution for any driver approaching a police car on the side of the road with its emergency lights on, or any other emergency vehicle, Lautner acknowledged.

"You would think so, but I think it relates to the way people treat construction zones - very rarely do people slow down to 45 in a construction zone," he said. "It's like they're trying to clean the side of their car on

During an hour-long patrol last Wednesday morning on M-81, west of Cass City, Lautner conducted a handful of traffic stops, most involving drivers who were speeding. To their credit, a majority of the passing motorists slowed and moved away from the police cruiser as they passed, but often they waited until, the last moment.

At least one motorist barely left the lane as he passed and failed to slow

'This guy moving half over in the next lane and doing 60 miles an hour is not in compliance with the law," Lautner said as he returned to the

He noted that police officers are trained to protect themselves in every way possible. That includes parking the cruiser behind and to the left of a stopped motorist, so the cruiser

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

Q: If I am on a two-lane road and see a police car on the shoulder and a car traveling in the opposite direction, what am I supposed to do? A: If it is not safe for you to move over into the adjacent lane, then you must

slow down and pass with caution, giving the emergency vehicle as much room as possible.

Q: Do I have to move over for a wrecker?


A: Yes. Under a change effective June 2, 2004, road service vehicles, including wreckers, are considered to be emergency vehicles for the purpose of this law only.

Q: What vehicles are considered to be emergency vehicles under this law? A: Police, fire, rescue, ambulance, and road service vehicles. Road service vehicles include wreckers and courtesy vehicles operated by the Michigan Department of Transportation.

Q. If I see an emergency vehicle on the side of the road with its emergency lights off, do I have to move over?


A: No. You do not have to move over if the emergency vehicle does not have its emergency lights activated. However, you should always pass with caution, giving the emergency vehicle as much room as possible.





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
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### Tuscola motorist killed in crash

A Tuscola County man lost his life in a car-motorcycle crash Thursday in Almer Township.

Troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro identified the victim as Aaron Blankenship, 25, of Caro.

The accident occurred at about 2:20 p.m. at the intersection of West Deckerville and French roads.

Troopers said Blankenship was operating a motorcycle westbound on Deckerville Road when a vehicle that was stopped at the intersection turned left from French Road to head eastbound on Deckerville Road. Blankenship's motorcycle struck the vehicle in the driver's side.

Blankenship was pronounced dead at the scene.

Troopers said the driver of the other vehicle was Marvin Curl, 71, of Caro. He was not injured, but his passenger, Sandra Curl, 63, Caro, was transported to Caro Community Hospital, where she was treated for minor inju-

Investigators believe speed was a factor in the accident, which remains under investigation by troopers and state police Third District accident reconstructionists.

The Caro Fire Department, MMR Ambulance personnel and Reese police assisted at the scene.

# The back forty

I don't know what came over me. I took one look at those zucchini plants and just ripped them right out.

That squash was so puny and pitiful I couldn't stand to look at it. So I put it out of its misery.

I don't think I've ever done that before: Pulled a zucchini plant.

My sweet corn was great, the potatoes are fine, and we've got pole beans coming out of our ears; but a person who can't grow zucchini must be the epitome of gardening failures.

I'm reminded of an agronomist's story about his uncle who farmed in Nebraska many years ago. Those were the days when they planted sweet corn in hills, and the uncle always planted four seeds in each hill.

The agronomist's uncle said he always pulled one stalk at the first weeding. That left three stalks in each

Then, if the weather stayed dry for a while he would go through and pull a second stalk at the next weeding. If it got terribly dry later in the summer the uncle would pull a third stalk. Then, in the really bad years he would just go back and pull the fourth stalk

That's what I thought about my zucchini. It wasn't really hurting anything, but I know when I'm whipped.

I'm not taking all of the blame for this, however. I planted one of the zucchini seeds, but my wife bought the other plant at the store. She must have got a sickly one.

Some years ago I read a Dave Barry column in which he mentioned some western Michigan gardeners who made the mistake of planting several rows of zucchini. These folks wound up with so many squash they started dropping them off a bridge over the Manistee River.

Then, they bet on whose squash would make it to the next bridge first. They call this "zucchini racing" in that part of the country. (Things carr get pretty dull around there during the

Zucchini must be the Rodney Dangerfield of vegetables: Nobody gives it any respect.

I got a kick out of a recent column by Brianna Walker, field editor for Agri-Times Northwest. Brianna likens zucchini to fruitcake: Something to be passed around, used as a doorstop, or handed down from one generation to the next.

Folks give their zucchini to the neighbors, leave it on porches, and feed it to the hogs. Even the hogs try to give it away if they can.

I know zucchini is good when mixed with onions and fried, but without the onions I'm not sure what we would do with it. I also know folks make zucchini bread and all sorts of delicious dishes with this type of squash. I won't be doing that, however. I

can't even grow the stuff!

Webster defines Islam as "the religious system of the almighty potentate Allah according to Muhammad; Muhammadism.'

But, who is Muhammad and from where did he come? Answer: Muhammad was born in Mecca in about 570 A.D. and he was a descendant of the Quraysh tribe in Saudi Arabia. The Quraysh tribe was particularly devoted to Allah, the moon god, and had the duty to keep the Ka'aba, which is Arabic for "cube" and refers to the square stone temple in Mecca where idols were worshiped.

Muhammad's father, Abd-Allah, died before his birth and his mother, Amina, died when Muhammad was only 6 years old. A grandfather, Abd-Allah-Muttabbe, took care of the young boy for 2 years, then he too died. Finally, Muhammad's uncle, Obied Allah, became custodian. These names reveal the personal devotion that Muhammad's pagan family had to the worship of Allah, the moon god.

The symbol of the worship of the moon god in Arabian culture and throughout the Middle East was the crescent moon, and it is displayed on their national flags and on top of their mosques. While they worshiped 360 gods at the Kabah in Mecca, the

Mecca was, in fact, built as a shrine for the moon god. This is what made it the most sacred site of Arabian pa-






This shall serve as a general notice to the residents and property owners of the Village of Gagetown, that all noxious weeds growing within the Village shall be cut or destroyed on or before



acts as a buffer between the officer and traffic.

Officers also must keep their eye on oncoming vehicles while at the same time paying close attention to the driver they've stopped.

"Every time, before we activate our lights, we're thinking about where the best place is to stop that vehicle," added Deputy Joshua Herman, a secondary road patrol officer with the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department. He said officers try to avoid hills and curves.

"It (risk of being hit) really is pulling you in a couple of different directions," Lautner said. "You're worried about the guy you're stopping and what he might do, and you also have to be very concerned about what's around you - the traffic.'

"It could be just a speeding stop, but all of a sudden the person has a felony warrant or is intoxicated," said

"You have to be aware. There's a real danger," agreed Cass City Police Chief Craig Haynes.

are distracted - talking on a cell phone, eating or drinking, or dealing with their children in the back seat.

"All the distractions - that's the biggest thing," said Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern. "We're actually having more problems with distractions than drunk drivers. People are even watching movies in their cars these days.

"It's gotten a lot better here, but we're also in a rural area here. I think we need to get more information out to the people," said Kern, who pointed out that young people learn about the law during driver's education, but there's still an information gap among those ages 20 to 60. That's a lot of drivers out there."

"I fault the state for that," Lautner said. "We usually rely on those kinds of statewide campaigns to get the word out. That just hasn't happened, unfortunately."

#### NO CLOSE CALLS

Herman said he hasn't had any close calls with passing motorists during traffic stops.

"I've been pretty lucky. The risk is always out there, though," he added. "Some people slow right down. Then there are others that continue to speed above 55.

"I have yet to issue any citations on it, but I have stopped vehicles for it they didn't know they had to slow down. It's not the easiest to enforce." Herman said of the law, adding it's difficult to catch a violator when an officer is already dealing with the individual he or she stopped in the first

Elkland Township Fire Chief Ron Pawloski has served with the fire department for 33 years and also put in 28 years as an ambulance emergency medical technician. He has also escaped injury over the years, but said there have been some close calls.

"When we're out working on the street, I've had semis go zipping by. I've had several experiences - close encounters of the worst kind," he said.

"It's human curiosity, people want to see what's going on," Pawloski said. "I know people get upset when we close the roads down, but it's for the safety of the emergency workers on the scene.'

Lautner said drivers should take into account the unexpected. For example, what if a stopped motorist shoots an officer - his vest protects him, but the force of the bullet knocks him into traffic. What about an irate motorist who decides to push his door open, forcing the officer into the path of oncoming traffic?

He explained that the county board,

EDC and MSU Extension have initiated economic development planning/implementation through a community assessment with an emphasis on job creation through entrepreneurship. The reopening of Camp Tuscola, McLoskey said, creates a positive mindset, giving county officials more grit and willpower to continue rebuilding the economy and creating jobs.

Peterson said county officials have the utmost respect for MDOC Director Patricia Caruso and her staff.

"They were good listeners and we appreciated their open-minded approach to problem solving, which ended up in positive results for the county," he said. "State Senator James Barcia and state Rep. Tom Meyer also provided tireless assistance in securing the re-opening of this facility."

The state closed Camp Tuscola in April 2005, citing budgetary constraints. Prisoners and state corrections officials at the facility were transferred to Lapeer and other correctional units, costing Tuscola County 50 jobs.

According to MDOC officials. Camp Tuscola will continue to be operated by the state and will be used for what is called a residential re-entry facility. It will continue to be a "level one" prison, housing about 170 minimum security inmates.

Certain remodeling needs will be determined, and other operational details are being worked out by the state, but the facility may be brought back in full use by the end of the year. Another major benefit to reopening is that prisoner work crews will be reestablished. The crews have been utilized to assist local governments and other non-profit entities.

The Library Board of the Rawson Memorial Library District will hold a public hearing on a proposed increase of .0348 mills in the operating tax millage rate to be levied in 2006.


The hearing will be held on September 19, 2006 at 9:00 a.m. at Rawson Memorial Library, 6495 Pine Street, Cass City, Michigan.


