A community remembers all of the heroes

When Pete Gamet returned home from Operation Desert Storm back in 1991, he was distraught.

He had lost 2 friends in Saudi Arabia. "I didn't want anything to do with a weapon, the uniform, nothing, I realized that I wasn't alone and slowly got more involved with the community and the VFW."

Since then, he has been a VFW member at post #3644 for the past 4 years and as of July 1 will be the VFW post commander, where he will oversee all committees.

Gamet was among hundreds of people that paid tribute Monday to the yeterans that died serving their country and those who lived to tell their

The village commemorated the sacrifices of its veterans with the annual parade and memorial service.

Spectators lined Main Street Monday morning for the annual Memorial Day parade, clapping and cheering as the veterans passed by.

The parade briefly paused at the stoplight while a wreath was placed on the

Cass City War Memorial for the unknown dead.

A crowd of an estimated 1,000 people gathered at the Memorial Service, held at the conclusion of the parade, at Elkland Township Cemetery.

Master of Ceremonies, Mark Zmierski, gave a speech that focused on honoring his predecessor, Jack Esau, who had been in charge of the Memorial Day event for nearly half a century.


Pastor Keith Misany of the Living Word Worship Center spoke at the Memorial Service, leading prayer for all that have ever fought for the United

"Memorial Day is not just for the deceased- we are to express thanks to those that remain," he said. "Our debt today is not in dollars. Our debt today is not in cents. Our debt today is not in money- it is in thanks for those that have dedicated themselves to our national security," Misany said.

VFW member Chris Pawloski said the ceremony brings people together and reminds them of the meaning of patriotism.

The number of veterans here-look around here in this crowd. This is a good way to honor them. It's one day of the year that you can sit and honor them." Palowski said.

Immediately following the ceremonies, a luncheon was held at the VFW hall.

Wilson: state fix a Band-Aid

Michigan school officials may get a financial break after all, at least in terms of not losing significant state funding just before the current fiscal year ends in June.

That's good news, but local school officials say the state's solution is no more than a "quick fix" and doesn't bode well for the future.

State officials announced that a partial deal tentatively worked out by legislative leaders and Gov. Jennifer Granholm Friday would help to settle part of the state's \$800 million budget deficit this year and at the same time spare public schools a planned end-of-the-year pre-ration, or fund-ing cut of \$122 per student.

For Cass City Schools, \$122 per stu dent adds up to roughly \$180,000, while the Owen-Gage Schools would lose about \$25,000 and Kingston Community Schools \$81,000

lier this month, saying they would take effect in June if the state Legislature didn't come up with a solution. State Rep. Terry Brown (D-Pigeon), said Friday that the agreement reached Friday not only maintains public school funding, but would also prevent a threatened government shutdown and protect funding for police and fire protection along with job creation programs.

"Today, the House voted to protect our community schools from cuts, and we avoided a government shutdown," said Brown, who represents Tuscola and Huron counties. "We've made terrific strides in fixing Michigan's budget crisis and getting our economy back on track.

Brown said the plan to resolve Michigan's budget deficit: *Cuts \$317 million from the state budget while preserving funding for K-12 education, health care, and police and fire protection. *Allows for the use of one-time

funds from the tobacco settlement proceeds *Eliminates "double dipping" for retired public education employees by requiring them to freeze their pensions if they go back to work for the

*Facilitates consolidation of local

government services. *Requires government audits to streamline spending and save taxpayer dollars.

Cass City School Supt. Ron Wilson called the plan a Band-Aid solution. "I think it's nice for the schools that we're not going to be pro-rated this year — but the legislators are relying on a one-time fix to pay the bills," said Wilson, who added the

plan doesn't give him any confidence in the state's long-term financial health, which in turn affects local governments and schools.

Wilson said the state needs to ad-

dress the bigger issue — increasing revenues — and that means raising taxes, something legislators haven't shown a willingness to do.

For now, Cass City Schools should be able to carry over a fund balance of about \$300,000, up from a projection of \$111,000, into the next fiscal

"The pro-ration made a bad situation worse. Not taking that away now doesn't solve the problem," Wilson said. "We've dodged the bullet this year, but they're telling us we're go-ing to get a zero-percent (funding) increase next year."

Brown lauded Friday's agreement,



ing his own life. That's the official word on the case from Tuscola County Prosecutor Mark Reene, who recently issued his final report on the investigation into the March 21 incident, which unfolded just south of Caro.

"Trooper Horn acted lawfully and professionally through the course of his duties," Reene said in his report, which outlined 4 conclusions

*Horn was shot at initially by a then-unknown assailant who through his actions placed Horn's life in jeopardy.

*Horn fired his service weapon only

after being shot at.
*The subsequent collision between the suspect's vehicle and the patrol ing his brakes in the middle of the

roadway while being pursued.
*All physical findings at the scene corroborate Tuscola County Medical Examiner Dr. Kanu Virani's autopsy results showing the suspect, Mathias Ringle, 23, of Caro, died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound and was not struck by any of Horn's

"He (Horn) has established an exemplary record of conduct throughout his 11 years of service with the Department of State Police. The incident he was confronted with on this occasion highlights the daily, real jeopardy faced by each of Michigan's law enforcement officers."

Horn's close call with death took place on M-24 near Bevens Road at about 11:45 p.m. after he initiated a traffic stop on Ringle's 1992 Chevrolet Blazer. After pulling his vehicle to the shoulder of the roadway, Horn, who was working alone, approached the Blazer and saw Ringle looking back over his shoulder and opening his door. As he was about to contact Ringle, Horn felt what he described as a sudden impact to his lower left side, and he heard a gunshot.



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holder that was attached to his gunbelt.

Prosecutor: trooper acted

Horn, who is assigned to the Michigan State Police post in Caro, immediately sought cover behind the Blazer and returned fire. One of the rounds shattered the Blazer's rear window, and Horn said he could see Ringle leaning over as he was going to exit the vehicle.

Instead, Ringle remained in the vehicle and fled southbound, and Horn resumed his pursuit. He (the trooper)

closed the distance between the pa trol car and Blazer, Ringle suddenly spiked his brakes. Horn had no time to react and his patrol car struck the Blazer. The Blazer then continued at a slow rate of speed, swerving across' the northbound lane of M-24 and entering a ditch.

Fellow Michigan State Police troopers along with Caro police and Tuscola County Sheriff's Department arrived to assist, and they discovered Ringle dead inside his Blazer. Virani's autopsy concluded that Ringle died from a self-inflicted wound from a 16-gauge shotgun.


Top scouts and derby champion recognized

"This is a nice, nice project, and it's been a community project," Owen-Gage School Supt. Dana Compton said of the effort.

Bills target high prices for gasoline

As residents of Michigan prepare for the summer driving season, Congressman Dale E. Kildee (D-MI) recently announced that the House of Representatives passed 2 bills that would give the federal government new tools to fight record high gas prices.
"It is an outrage to see such high

gas prices hurt Michigan families who are struggling to make ends meet. I see no reason for oil companies to charge such high gas prices white making historic profits," said Kildee. "I was proud to join my colleagues. this week to help crack down on price gouging and fight against those who attempt to fix the price of oil and stick

the American people with the bill." The House passed the Federal Price Gouging Prevention Act. The bill would give the Federal Trade Companission the authority to investigate and punish companies that artificially: inflate the price of gas. It sets crimes nal penalties for price gouging, and, permits states to bring lawsuits against wholesalers or retailers who engage in such practices. Kildee is

an original cosponsor of the bill.

Also, with Congressman Kildee's support, the House yesterday ap proved the No Oil Producing and Experience Cartels Act of 2007. This legges islation would authorize the Depart! ment of Justice to take legal action against Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) that participate in conspiracies to limit the supply, or fix the price, of oil. Nations or organizations that limit oil supply can artificially inflate the cost of gas. and hurt American consumers.

While a bipartisan majority in Congress supports these bills, President Bush has threatened to veto both. pieces of legislation.

Currently, American families are paying an all-time record high of \$3.22 a... gallon on average for regular gason line - up 89 cents from the beginning... of the year. Last year, families paid \$1,000 more on average for gasoline than in 2001. In the state of Michigan gan, the price of regular gasoline was, about \$1.42 per gallon in 2001. This year that price is about \$3.47.

The high cost for families come as oil companies continue to prospense. The 6 largest oil companies and nounced \$30 billion in profits for the first quarter of 2007. This is on top of the \$125 billion in record profits they made in 2006.

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



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
