

Driver pleads no contest in fatal accident

Gagetown woman could face up to 15 years in prison following her plea of no contest to a charge stemming from a fatal traffic accident that claimed the life of her fiancé nearly a year ago in Elmwood Township. Laura A. Raab, 45, appeared in Tuscola County Circuit Court last week and

entered the plea to operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor - causing death. A pre-sentence investigation was ordered in the case and bond was continued at \$10,000. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

A plea of no contest is not an admission of guilt, but is treated the same as a plea of guilty for sentencing purposes. Operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor - causing

death, is punishable by up to 15 years in prison and/or a fine of \$2,500 to \$10,000.

Raab, who was also originally charged with driving while her license was suspended or revoked, was the driver of a vehicle that left Hurds Corner Road near Dickerson Road, about 6 miles west of Cass City, Dec. 10.

Investigators said she lost control while traveling northbound. Her vehicle dropped off the roadway onto the shoulder and Raab overcorrected, causing the vehicle to leave the road, striking 2 trees. Raab's passenger and fiance, Gregory Scott Myers, 51, also of Gagetown, was partially ejected from the vehicle and died at the scene. Raab was transported to Covenant Hospital in Saginaw for treatment of injuries that included a broken ankle

Schools to receive \$96 fund boost

The state's new budget includes increased funding for 80 percent of school districts in Tuscola and Huron counties, including Cass City

and Owen-Gage. "The budget brings schools that receive the lowest state funding in line with higher-funded districts through increases in equity pay-" explained state Rep. Terry ments, Brown (D-Pigeon), who represents Tuscola and Huron counties

"Every school district in Tuscola County and two-thirds of the districts in Huron County will receive an increase of \$96 per student --- \$48 plus an additional \$48 per-student equity payment - because they currently receive the lowest level of state fund-

ing possible. Owen-Gage Schools, which re-ceived \$7,289 per pupil last year, will

regular firearm deer season gets underway Thursday, Nov. 15. "I think it's going to be very similar to last year. The deer are very abun-dant," said Arnold Karr, a wildlife habitat biologist who works out of the DNR's Cass City Field Office. "A lot of the bow hunters I've talked to have

been seeing quite a few bucks. "This should be a pretty good sea-son," Karr added. "I think the corn harvest is going to be on schedule or even a little early, so that should help hunters as well. It takes away one area of cover" for the deer.

Firearm season will continue through Nov. 30, and the muzzleloading season will be Dec. 7-23. The archery deer season began Oct. 1 and continues through Nov. 14. with archers allowed to continue hunting Dec. 1-Jan. 1. The late antlerless firearm season is slated for Dec. 17-Jan. 1 on private land only. Plentiful deer numbers in the Thumb have been reflected in crop damage reports this past year, especially in Sanilac and Huron counties, according to Karr. "It was the worst year we've even

had, and that's mostly due to the drought," said Karr, who explained the lack of water slowed plant growth and made them even more attractive to deer. "We issued more (crop damage permits) than we ever have. It was about 400.'

For 20 years the Cass City volunteers housed, fed and transported the musicians and helped with all the many tasks necessary to hold 4 concerts over the Thanksgiving holiday. There is little doubt that the dollar coin will have an appeal to collectors. The 38 coins featuring presidents that have been dead at least 2 years will

go on sale at the rate of 4 per year. Already \$1 coins with the likeness of George Washington, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson have been is-sued and James Madison coins go on sale Nov. 15.

What the government would like to do is substitute a coin \$1 for the paper dollar, but that just doesn't fly in the United States. In Canada the \$1 coin is in everyday use. Its popular name is the "loonie" because the back of the coin pictures a loon. There is also a \$2 Canadian coin that is in everyday use.

Using metal money is attractive to the governments because it doesn't wear out and is cheaper to produce

in the long run than paper money. The downside, evidently, and certainly with this writer, is that coins are heavy and burdensome to carry. Since selling the \$1 coin is a big revenue producer, the government hopes that they will be as attractive to collectors as the state quarters have proven to be.

There are major differences. State quarters do not replace coins in use, they just augment the supply and attract collectors. Paper \$1 bills are easy to carry; \$1 coins are burdensome. There is a reluctance to adopt money

the \$2 bill usage without much success. It must be 30 years or so ago now that the \$2 bill was used in Cass City as a promotion tool. One day Walbro Corporation agreed

to pay wages in \$2 bills. When the bills were spent at area stores it would emphasize the role that industry in general and Walbro in particular played in the welfare of the community.

It worked, too. There were plenty of \$2 bills in the tills on Main Street. They were used by the employees, but still not adopted for everyday

It wasn't too long before the \$2 bills disappeared from general use and became as infrequently used as they always had been.

So if you plan to collect the presidential \$1 coins do it for fun, not for profit. The only way it figures to be profitable is if you get one with a flaw

when minted. There are a few out there and if one falls in your lap it's like winning the lottery, except that you won't lose any money no matter what happens.



I guess I missed the World Series this year. I don't follow baseball the way I used to. The game has changed so much I'm not sure I understand it anymore.

The players have changed, the equipment has changed — even the announcers have changed. My generation can remember the days when Pee Wee Reese and Dizzy Dean announced the games. Those guys knew what they were talking about. Dizzy and Pee Wee provided commentary that made sense, and ol' Diz even sang the Wabash Cannonball during rain delays: "I met a girl from Nashville. She was long, and she was tall. We rode on down to Memphis

on the Wabash Cannonball." Now a World Series game needs three announcers and a statistician just to remember who's up to bat. The players have changed, too. We have the drug controversies, and batters complaining about glare from the pitcher's earrings. That wouldn't

Maybe the pitchers should wear those Texas style belt buckles? You want glare, we'll give you some glare! And how about the equipment they

use these days? Some of that stuff is as bad as the jewelry. They've got gloves the size of garbage cans, high tech batting gloves, and bats made of pulpwood.

Where do the major leagues get those bats? I can remember when a broken bat was a rarity. One per game was more than we could stand.

If a batter broke his bat, he walked back to the dugout and everybody said, "Keep the trademark up, dummy That's the second bat you've broken since high school."

Nowadays the batboys collect wood shards after each game and ship them to paper mills in Japan. The Louisville Slugger has become the Louisville Splinter.

The players have been spoiled, too. Each time I see a guy snag a fly ball with his garbage can glove I start, yelling at my TV: "Two hands! Who do you think you are Willie Mays?"

Willie caught everything with both hands. Remember him running to the center field wall and making that basket catch over his shoulder? Both hands!

Willie threw the ball to the plate, too He didn't throw it to a cutoff man who throws it to the pitcher, who relays it to the plate.

The old time players didn't get paid for commercials, either. They got paid for playing, and nobody bragged about the size of his contract.

I suppose I'll watch the Series next year, but if I see a player painting his nails, I'm going fishing.

Most of my articles have been happy-go-lucky. My attention has been drawn recently to Methicillinresistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) infection, also known as a "staph" infection that has come into the school system.

In my research I have found that the original Staphylococcus aureus was common among hospitals and wasn't that hard to cure. Because of the overuse of antibiotics in the past, this "superbug" evolved to be resistant to most antibiotics, like Methicillin, making it hard to cure with limited drugs that do work on it.

The good news is that MRSA usually causes healthly people to get minor skin rashes, whereas those with poor immune systems have a more serious form.

The staph infection begins as red bumps on the skin that resemble spider bites, pimples, etc. These little bumps will change quickly into rashes and deep abscesses that are painful. If the infection is left untreated the staph bacteria could burrow down to bone and tissue and infect them there. The heart and blood flow could potentially be affected by the bacteria in a worst-case scenario.

The superbug is easily transmitted in younger children and teens. Through skin contact and/or open wounds, the superbug can spread quickly among younger people. Mr. Daniels, the high school princi-

pal, feels the information sent home with high school students was adequate

Some students, though, felt that the school should've done more to in-

threatened by the superbug, yet they don't have much idea as to what the staph infection is.

(No I don't feel safe) They (the school) didn't really tell us anything...they gave us a piece of paper from the Health Department, Foster Maggard, 17, said of the infection. "They gave out warnings .. CJ Warmbier said of the school's actions, "The fact that it (staph infection) has happened to us, (and) they gave out warnings so our parents understand (shows that the school handled it well)."

Chantal Field doesn't feel threatened by the superbug, "The school claims to have sterilized everything the student came in contact with, she said adding that she believes the infection started at the middle school. When I asked for their interpretation of what the infection was, they didn't have much of an idea of what to say. As far as contact goes, Chris Childs said, "Yeah, I feel safe. I hygiene well... and if I was a wrestler I'd be scared...I don't feel threatened at all.'

The wrestlers would have some thing to be afraid of. Skin contact is one way the bacterium is transmitted. Researchers have found that the superbug can colonize a person without that person feeling any of the effects of MRSA. Being a bacterium, MRSA is easily transmitted.

I hope this article informs my fellow students a little more than a "piece of paper" did. But who am I to say? This is a "piece of paper" too.

Farm land value averages new record

The value of Michigan farm real es-tate, including land and buildings, has averaged a new record high of \$3,950 per acre. That's up 12.9 percent from 2006 and 25.4 percent from 2005, according to an analysis of data received as of Jan. 1 by the Michigan Field Office of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS)

Broken down, Michigan's cropland value rose 15 percent from the previ-ous year to \$3,450 per acre. Cropland cash rent, at \$73 per acre, is up \$8 from the previous year. Michigan's pasture value rose 19.5 percent from last year to \$2,570 per acre.

The news brings with it a mixed bag of emotions, says Bob Boehm, man-ager of the Michigan Farm Bureau (MFB) Commodity and Marketing Department. On the plus side, the rise reflects an increase in the prices farmers are paid for their commodities and a healthy agricultural economy. On the down side, land prices are going up along with nearly every other farm production expenditure, including dramatic increases in costs for energy products such as fuel and petroleumbased fertilizer.

"Crop prices have a fairly rapid impact on cash rental rates, as the peracre returns increase the level that can be allocated to land costs," said Boehm. "With the general rise in com-modity prices of both crops and livestock, an improving profitability picture creates additional demand for armland, which has pushed prices higher. Also, low interest rates over the period mean the same cash flow can support a higher purchase price with less of the payment allocated toward interest."

Recent Michigan cash bids for corn have averaged around \$3.50 bushel, as compared to an average of about \$2 a bushel a year ago. The Michigan cash bid for a bushel of soybeans has ranged from about \$8 to nearly \$9, up from a high of around \$6 a bushel at this time last year. Mean while, recent Michigan cash bids for winter wheat have fetched more than \$8 a bushel, up from about \$5 a bushel at this time last year.

In the livestock sector, the price of milk has shown the biggest gain. Currently, farmers can receive more than \$20 per hundredweight (100 pounds) of milk as compared to less than \$15 a hundredweight a vear ago.

In times like these, farmers have more incentive - and more financial wherewithal - to expand their acreage, and this growing demand from agricultural buyers and renters drives up prices as well. This runs counter to the norm because most often farmland brings a higher value for its residential or commercial development potential, not its use for agricultural production. But in today's climate, keeping land in agriculture can be just as profitable as selling to developers

"The weaker economy in Michigan has taken some of the pressure off conversion for development and rec-reational use," said Boehm, "but apparently not significantly enough to offset the positive prospects in agriculture

While the U.S. Department of Agriculture predicts U.S. net farm income will reach a record \$87.1 billion this year, total cash farm expenses are pegged at \$222 billion, an 8.5 percent

increase from 2006, due in large part to rising energy prices which have driven up fuel and oil prices 4.5 percent and fertilizer 17 percent.

Last year alone, the average U.S. farm spent \$112,788 on production costs. On average, \$14,974 was spent on farm services; \$14,638 on feed; \$12,094 on livestock and poultry purchases; \$11,902 on labor; and \$8,783 on rent.

'The commodity price increases we're seeing are offset with escalating production costs for the basic necessities that farmers require to produce their commodities, and that includes buying and renting farmand," said Boehm

The high cost of farmland can be especially challenging for beginning farmers, as revealed in MFB's 2007 survey of MFB members between the ages of 18 and 35. MFB conducts the informal survey annually to gauge young farmer attitudes and thoughts on a variety of subjects

In ranking the top 3 challenges fac-ing them today, young Michigan farmers cited availability of land and facilities as their top challenge, un-changed from 2006. Overall profitability came in second, also unchanged from last year. In rounding out their top three challenges, young farmers this year identified competition from established or larger farms. Last year it was urbanization and loss of farmland.

"In today's marketplace it's not surprising to see young farmers express concern about competition from established or larger farms, especially as it relates to land availability and overall profitability," said Lori Cham-

berlain, manager of the MFB Young Farmer Department.

"Existing farms have built up capital and assets which give them a competitive advantage in bidding for high-priced land. They're also in a better position to ride out uncertain markets and can more easily absorb price spikes for agricultural necessi-ties such as fuel or livestock feed," she said

Hunters hoping to bag a whitetail deer this firearm season may be breaking the law if they are bringing hardwood firewood from home to their hunting camps. Hunters are reminded not to move hardwood firewood this hunting season to help stop the spread of the Emerald Ash Boren (EAB).

EAB, an exotic beetle native to Asia, is responsible for the death or damage of 25 million ash trees in Michi-

EAB larvae live and feed undetected beneath the bark of ash trees, making any piece of ash firewood a potential vehicle for the accidental transport of the insect. Firewood that may appear uninfested could be car-rying EAB larvae under the bark.

The Michigan Department of Agri-culture (MDA) will be stepping up vehicle inspections at the Mackinac Bridge in an effort to prevent hardwood firewood from entering the Upper Peninsula. The inspection station helps support the state's EAB interior quarantine by inspecting and restricting movement of regulated articles into the Upper Peninsula.

"Hunters are urged to use local sources of firewood, burn all they purchase, and not take any unused firewood back home or to their next location," said Don Koivisto, MDA director. "Many infestations in Michigan and surrounding states have been a direct result of people inadvertently moving infested firewood

Individuals or businesses found violating the state's EAB quarantine are subject to fines ranging from \$1,000 to \$250,000 and jail time of up to 5 years for moving regulated mate-rials, including firewood.

lar to last year. "With the addition of Huron County this year, the entire Thumb area (Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties) now has a late antlerless deer season," he said.

While this will be the first year for a late season antlerless hunt in Huron County, identical hunts have been held in Sanilac County for the past 2 years and in Tuscola County for the past decade

Karr said those hunts are important in terms of maintaining a healthy deer herd and minimizing damage to crops. "I don't think it's any coincidence that Tuscola County has had the fewest crop damage complaints," he added.

Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern, an avid deer hunter, is reminding hunters to follow the rules and play it safe this fall.

Those rules include: carrying a hunting license and the personal identification used to purchase it at all times all hunters must wear an item of clothing that is at least 50 percent "hunter orange"; hunting hours begin roughly 30 minutes before sunrise and end 30 minutes after sunset; safety zones include all areas within 150 yards of an occupied building, house, cabin, barn and other farm buildings; and it is illegal to drink or use intoxicating drugs before hunt-

"Familiarize yourself with the area where you will be hunting, never assume you are alone in the woods (and) never assume other hunters are acting responsibly," Kern said. "If sitting against a rock or tree, make sure it is wider than your shoulders so you are not mistaken for a target. Be 100 percent sure of your target before shooting.

"Reacquaint yourself with 'Michigan's hunting laws and follow these safety tips to prevent a tragedy from happening this year," Kern added.
