Blowing in the wind

Thumb wind farms promise jobs, investment

By fall of 2009, Huron and Sanilac counties may be exporting their own

energy Two different alternative energy companies have selected the 2 counties as sites for commercial-scale wind farms, which will create jobs and yield millions of dollars in long-term investment. "It kind of follows the county zoning in that it is a way to preserve farm land and a way to extract energy from the wind," said Carl Osentoski, Executive Director of Huron County Economic Development Corporation. "It's a way for participating farmers to receive payments for the turbine, a way to diversify the farm economies. 7 to 10 new jobs are created out of each park. And it provides a tax base

Noble initially decided which townships to focus on in 2005, based upon wind resources and the ridge that runs through them. Company representatives began speaking with officials at township meetings about creating ordinances for wind that year. Among them include: Bingham and Sheridan townships in Huron County; and Delaware, Marion, Minden, Washington and Bridgehampton townships in Sanilac County. "Since '05 we've worked with them and all but one in Sanilac have their ordinances in

place," Hagen said.
The wind farm development projects are broken down into 2 phases- Huron County's project is called "Phase One" and Sanilac County is referred to as "Phase 2."

If all goes as planned, Phase One will be completed by next fall and Phase 2 will be completed by the fall

Benefits in Huron County include the creation of 10 permanent jobs, a minimum of \$6 million in property taxes paid by Noble in the first 20 years and hundreds of thousands of dollars paid to landowners each year. The Thumb will also be producing its own energy rather than having to import it from other parts of the country or other parts of the world. "It will

Jury convicts Taylor, life sentence likely

Judgment day has come and gone for a Cass City man charged with terrorizing a Lapeer County family and 2 friends, and shooting 2 of their dogs last November

Now, thanks in part to a past already marked by a criminal record, David D. Taylor, 35, faces the prospect of life in prison after a Lapeer County Circuit Court jury found him guilty Thursday on all 13 charges in the

Taylor along with another Tuscola County resident, Dwayne A. Rocca, 38, of Fairgrove, were both charged with 3 counts of armed robbery, 2 counts of torture, safe breaking, 2 counts of animal killing/torture, impersonating a peace officer, being a felon in possession of a firearm, larceny in a building, and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony.

It took the jury just over 40 minutes to convict Taylor, who will return to circuit court Aug. 13 to appear before Judge Michael Higgins for sentenc-

ing.
Rocca's trial is scheduled to begin

June 26.
"We're obviously pleased with the verdict. We're satisfied that the jury saw the evidence the way we did," said Lapeer County Assistant Prosecutor Steve Beatty. He noted the case marked the first successful prosecution of Michigan's new torture

statute in Lapeer County.

Armed robbery and torture are both punishable by up to life in prison, but Taylor also faces enhanced sentencing because of his status as an habitual offender (3 or more prior felony convictions) stemming from past convictions on charges of first degree home invasion, larceny and delivery/ manufacture of a controlled sub-

Lapeer County Sheriff's Department detectives say Taylor and Rocca were behind the bizarre crime at a Lapeer Township home during the early morning hours of Nov. 27, when the pair, posing as FBI agents, allegedly shot 2 of the family's pit bulls and then entered the home, using a stun gun against some of the residence's 5 occupants before fleeing with property and cash.

Sheriff's deputies were dispatched to the private residence at about 4:53 a.m. to investigate an armed robbery. Deputies arrived to find a married couple, ages 25 and 19, their 2-yearold son, and 2 male friends, both aged 17, who also live in the home.

Earlier that morning, the homeowner had let the dogs outside, according to detectives, who said the armed suspects were in the yard near the door and shot 2 of the dogs, one of which died. The suspects then entered the residence and used duct tape to secure the 3 males. The female, who was pregnant, and her son were placed in a separate room.

Prosecutors say Taylor and Rocca knew the homeowners, and that the men used a stun gun on 2 of the 3 males to obtain information on the whereabouts of money and other items.

The suspects were in the home for a few hours and left with stereo equipment, a Playstation, clothing and an undisclosed amount of cash

Two days later, investigators developed information that Taylor and Rocca were the suspects.

Taylor was arrested in the afternoon at a residence in Lapeer after 2 of the victims sought him out and beat him. He was hospitalized briefly with a collapsed lung before his arraign-

Rocca was arrested the same day at his residence in Fairgrove by deputies and officers from the Lapeer and Tuscola County sheriff's departments and Fairgrove police.

"While he (Rocca) continues to be presumed innocent, we look forward to giving him his day in court as well,"

The terms of 5 Cass City Village Council members are expiring, including a 2year term held by long-time Village President Bert Althaver, who has indicated he plans to retire this year.

A trio of 4-year council trustee terms are also expiring. They currently are being completed by Jenny Zawilinski, Jeff Gillig and Jim Heiser. Gillig was appointed to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Dale McIntosh, who moved out of the village. The same is true for Heiser, who was appointed when Dawn Karr resigned due to health reasons. Both men say they intend to seek election to 4-year terms. Zawilinski also plans to seek re-election.

In addition, a 2-year council trustee term is available due to Mick Kirn's appointment to the council following the resignation of Jon Zdrojewski, who resigned because he moved out of the village. Kirn said he intends to seek election to a 4-year term this fall.

The remaining council members, trustees Don Richards and Dwight Thabet, are completing terms that will expire in 2009.



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
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Rabbit Tracks

In its path it has left behind old tim-

ers in the business, much the same as the offset printing process has left hard type journeyman printers dangling in the wind.

As a kid working at the Pinconning Journal, I was familiar with the hard type operation when I arrived in 1951 and had little trouble switching to offset as it made inroads. Today's technology has put me in the class of the hard type printers.

In that way, newspaper production is much like farming today. Farms that produced a healthy income on 200 or o acres may have the same owners but for the most part are farmed by an operator that needs plenty of land to care for the expensive equipment

The same trend prevails in the news and printing business. At one time every newspaper had its own printng press and type setting equipment. With the arrival of offset many of them, including the Chronicle, junked the hard type printing press and went to a neighboring town that offered the "new" offset web press.

There was a time that I wondered if the Chronicle should have its own offset press and try to entice others to print in Cass City. History has proven that it was lucky that I never

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The back forty by Roger Pond

A TV newscast about fainting goats reminded me of the curious things folks harbor in their back yards. We see fewer emus, ostriches, and yaks than we used to, but there is always something new in the exotic livestock business

The fainting goat is a little different, though. These animals have been around a long time with very little fan fare until recently.

I've never seen a fainting goat in person, but I'm told they originated in Tennessee around the turn of the century. The fainting condition results from a genetic disorder (myotomia congenita) that causes the animal's muscles to tense up when frightened.

Something as innocent as a simple "Boo!" or a .44 magnum fired over their heads will cause these goats to fold up like an accordion. They stay down 10 to 15 seconds. Then, they get up and walk away just like a professional boxer.

Once the goats' owners realized this condition was heritable they began breeding these animals to protect other livestock from predators. The idea was for the goat to keel over at the sight of a predator. Then by the time the predator was finished with the goat, all of the other livestock has escaped.

This doesn't sound good to me, but nobody complained about it until re-cently. Now the animal rights activists are up in arms about folks breeding goats that faint. I don't know if it's genetic or not, but the only thing

that gets excited faster than a goat is an animal rights activist.

None of this would have happened if the goat owners hadn't become smitten with the urge to show off for their neighbors. Like all livestock proe ducers these folks wanted to prove their animals were better than some body else's. So they organized live stock shows where their goats could compete.

These folks scheduled contests with up to \$1,000 prize money for the goat that fainted the quickest or stayed down the longest. This was a bunnmer. Who wants to attend a livestock show where the Grand Champion may never get up?



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Little honored for service to Boy Scouting

Folks who know Richard Little will tell you that, even in retirement, he isn't the sort to just sit and watch television all day long. Not even close. If there's a cause Little believes in, you can count on him getting on board and being involved.

Examples aren't hard to find locally. The Cass City native has been instrumental in organizing relief concerts for victims of natural disasters, he was the man who transformed the Cass City War Memorial from an idea into reality, and he spearheaded formation of a tennis club at Cass City High School.

What some area residents might not know is that Little has been a huge supporter of Boy Scouting for nearly

The Blue Water Council for the Boy Scouts of Port Huron recently recognized his devotion and willingness to volunteer his time to the program, awarding him the Silver Beaver, the highest award a council can bestow on a fellow volunteer.

Little has been active with the Blue Water Council for the past 47 years, including serving as scoutmaster of Troop 132 in Yale for 40 years. He has also served as a unit commissioner, district committee member and Cub Scout resident camp director with the Blue Water Council. He currently serves as a unit commissioner

As a youth, he earned Boy Scouting's highest rank — the Eagle under the leadership of Harold Datley, then scoutmaster of Troop 194

School launching new summer lunch program this week

Recent increases in the number of free and reduced lunches created a demand for a summer lunch program.

In April, the Cass City Public Schools School Lunch Program saw participant numbers increase, with more than 50 percent of Campbell Elementary and nearly half of Cass City Middle School taking advantage of the meals. "Gas prices rising may have had something to do with that, said Shari Bock, Cass City Schools Food Supervisor. "That 50 cents extra is 50 cents that goes into parents gas tanks instead of their kids.

Cass City Schools Supt. Ron Wilson, who assisted with the project, said the decline in population numbers is affecting percentages.

He said in the past 3 years, about 100 students, or 40 families have relocated from the area. "The families that had the better jobs, people were college educated and more mobile and because of that left. I don't think we're suddenly seeing more people of lower income moving to Cass City," he said.

Free meals will be made available to children 18 years of age and under or persons up to 26 that are enrolled in an educational program for the mentally or physically disabled that is recognized by the state or local public educational agency. The meals will be served in the Campbell Elementary cafeteria from 11:30 a.m.- 12:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday from June 11 through August 9, excluding the week of Fourth of July.

Bock said food variety will depend upon participation. "Basically, we're going to start with the sack lunch program. We don't know what to expect so we need something quick and easy - some hamburgers and hot dogs and peanut butter and jelly.

Bock said this is the first time a pro ram has been needed. It will be federally funded and Cass City Schools will not incur any costs.

Wilson said the summer lunch program will afford the community the opportunity to apply for more grants and for the public school system to work more closely with the village.

"It shows positive initiative," he said. "Even though we're struggling, we're reaching out and trying to recoup state and federal dollars.

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Taking flight

Local teen gearing up for aviation academy

It's been years since Jonathan White first felt an overwhelming burst of complete freedom from the interior of an airplane

For the 15-year-old Cass City resident, the sensation that comes with flying at several thousand feet midair has become an obsession, one that has not been overlooked.

Chapter 159 of the Experimental Aircraft Association of the Saginaw Valley area has agreed to sponsor the young pilot during his attendance at the EAA Basic Air Academy in Oshkosh, Wis., paying half of his

said chapter president Ken Hecht. "There's nothing else he plans on doing

From June 21 through 26, White will live among 47 other young aviation enthusiasts where he will learn the general mechanics of an aircraft, how to construct an airplane and how to plot and map flight courses. EAA's Director of Museum and Resident Education, Bob Campbell, said the 5-day and 6-night camp is designed to give its students firsthand knowledge of aviation, sparking the beginning of a career for many of those that at-

"Most of the kids we get have desire and drive to be in some kind of aviation career. They cover a lot in 5 days, which broadens their under-

standing of both aviation and themselves," he said. White said he hopes the camp will

help to broaden his career choices, which he currently believes are limited to crop dusting, commercial flight or joining the Air Force.

More importantly, he is looking forward to learning more about plane construction, a project he began on his own sometime last year.

White bought the first piece of his RV-7 after taking a private flight on a plane that was built by the man who flew it. The tail end kit cost him \$2,000 online and is the beginning of an \$85,000, 2,500-working-hour endeavor. White insists it's affordable in the long run and will go to great lengths to pay for his dream.

Between the cost of his airplane, his half of the academy tuition and flight lessons at \$110 a session, he has a large bill to pay. But if things go as planned, on July 4, his 16th birthday, he will be sitting in the cockpit of a plane at Huron County Memorial Airport in Bad Axe, preparing for his first solo flight, his driver's test the last thing on his mind.

The secret to his funds is genuine hard work.

From May 17 through 24, White and his 19-year-old sister, Summer, lived in the Minnesota wilderness planting tree saplings for the Pot Latch paper company. After 2 days, the siblings felt tremendous pain in their legs, backs and arms from just bending over and standing up all day long.

White stayed strong with his goals in mind, working 12-hours during the day at a rate of 3 cents for every tree he planted, and sleeping in a refrigerator trunk at night.

His mother, Darcy, said the trip earned him a total of \$2,000.

"We are so proud of him," she said. "He's done this all on his own - we don't even have to encourage him. He can fly a plane earlier than he can fly a car. He seems to be much more mature in a plane.

It will take at least 40 hours of flying time and several hours worth of aviation-relevant reading to earn his private pilot's license by age 17. And getting his commercial pilot's license would mean that he could be flying jets at age 18, even though he wouldn't legally be able to rent a car

It seems the only thing standing in his way now is his airsickness, something his flight instructor said is improving.

"Human beings aren't naturally supposed to be in the air. When you're n a plane, you're scared tense, White explained. "You just have to Beckert (right) presents Jonathan White with his relax and pretend like you're driving a car."

To the Residents of Cass City:

In 2004, the federal government mandated that drinking water must not contain more than 10 parts per billion (equal to 10 micrograms per liter) of arsenic in the drinking water of all water systems in the United States. With proper approvals, Cass City was advised to have this corrected no later than January 2008.


In August 2006, the Village of Cass City broke ground on the required Arsenic Treatment Facility. At the same time, it was determined to replace the over 50-year old Department of Public Works (DPW) facilities with a combination building. With a loan from USDA/RD, the multi-use building and filtering system have been built.

The facilities were engineered by Spicer Group and built by Booms Construction as the General Contractor with sub-contractors all being Thumb area and Cass City companies. This project has been completed within budget and on time. Cass City residents now have water that averages two (2) parts per billion, well within the compliance numbers of the federal government.

The Village President, Trustees, Manager, DPW Personnel and Village Staff all want to say congratulations and thank you for a job well done. The residents of Cass City can be proud of this facility. The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has indicated the Cass City facility is outstanding. The USDA/RD has also said it is pleased with the facility.

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

AN ORDINANCE TO ALLOW THE PRIVATE SALE OF PUBLIC LANDS AND BUILDINGS

The Village of Gagetown City Ordains:

Sec. 1: The Village of Gagetown, upon ordinance of the council, may sell lands or buildings, acquired by the Village for any purpose, except park use, at a private sale to any purchaser upon such terms as it deems to be

Sec. 2: Should the sale take place by private sale, the private sale must be approved by the majority of the members of the council, and the vote shall be held in an open meeting.

Sec. 3: The Village shall give 28 days prior published notice in a newspaper circulated in the Village of its intent to consider a resolution authorizing such private sale of any publicly owned land or buildings.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed insofar as the conflicting portions thereof are concerned.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon publication.



Tuscola County officials ready for disease outbreak

Tuscola County is prepared for a disease outbreak.

Health Department officials made certain by holding a drill to test the Modular Emergency Medical System (MEMS) plan simulating a pandemic

influenza Thursday afternoon.
The objective of the drill was to set up the Neighborhood Emergency Help Center within 4 hours, a place that would serve as an alternate outpatient care site to keep people from going to the emergency rooms during a widespread medical crisis.

The alternate care facility selected was the gymnasium at the Ellington Church of the Nazarene, 2545 Lazell Road in Caro. "We've put the plan together in the past few years and the Modular Emergency Medical System plan hasn't been tested yet,' said Sharon Mika, Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coordinator at the Tuscola County Health Department. "When hospitals reach surge capacity, this plan goes into effect and we go to alternate sites. Hospitals are very small and can be over-

Fifteen people that acted as volunteers from emergency management, hospitals, The American Red Cross and the community helped to set up 25 cots, tables and medical stations for the help center, finishing in 56 minutes. "We were very pleased. (We) did not expect to get it done that quickly," Mika said. "If it weren't for the sheriffs' crew, it might not have happened, working with volunteers, you don't know and they did a very

whelmed very quickly.

Wind farms promise jobs, and investment

bring much needed economic resources to Huron and Sanilac counties without disturbing the agricul-Sanilac County's wind farms will

create more job opportunities for the community, but numbers are not vet known. When complete, Huron County will have 48 working turbines and Sanilac County will have 60. Each turbine is slightly less than 400 feet tall and will create enough energy to supply an average of 500 homes a

year.
Wind power has zero gas emissions and is an adequate way of diversifying the Thumb's energy means. "The wind is free. We don't have to negotiate with other companies or countries to get it. And it will not pollute the air or water or the land," Hagen

There have been some complaints, though. Many individuals that live near the soon-to-be wind farm sites have come forward with concerns regarding obstruction of visibility, noise control and dangers to wild-life. "A lot of folks that haven't been out to the wind parks are nervous about noise. It's very low noise levels- they say on average at 1,000 feet, they call it 50 DBA-it sounds like the hum of a loud refrigerator," Hagen explained, "You can only hear it if it is very calm- the wind obscures that sound.

Teams will continue to work towards the building of wind farms in the Thumb, but there are no concrete

Dick Fouliout of Caro and a board member at the Ellington Church of Nazarene said he volunteered to help with the drill to help meet the needs of the community. "The concept of ministry in the community is one that

you do anything you can do to help or benefit the welfare of the community," he said. Patrick Finn, Tuscola County Emergency Services Director said the scenario was built off of one that was recently conducted by the state, but on a smaller scale. Full supplies were not utilized and there were not people involved to act as victims. "In the event of a real emergency, it would take around the same amount of time to get the facility set up for inpatient care," he said. "It could take some amount of time to get people to the facility, but there are always more people to help during a real emer-

gency."
The MEMS plan was approved in February and was finally tested Thursday to ensure that the plan was
