Storms damage property in Deford area Friday

No one would blame Dave Eady if he figured he's got to be one of the

unluckiest guys around. The truth is, he may be one of the luckiest.

Eady was inside his 40-foot travel trailer when a reported tornado slammed into an area just west of Deford early Friday morning. The twister picked the 18,000-pound trailer and tossed it like a toy, on its side, into a nearby pond - on top of Eady's rental car. He was due to pick up his truck, which had been in the shop,

Eady suffered some bruises and abrasions, but escaped serious injury. "It was sometime around 1:30. I was actually awake, watching the lightning from the bedroom. The wind kicked up so fast. It was loud, just - trains like what they say know?" recalled Eady, who went to the front door of the trailer with the idea of running to a nearby ditch and dirt mound to seek shelter.

But as a couple of trees slammed into the trailer, he headed for the bathroom, although he didn't make it that far, instead crouching down on the floor, "I knew I was in trouble, I had nowhere to go," he said. "I had no time. It was just unbelievably fast."

Eady didn't know the trailer had landed in his pond until he saw water coming into his livingroom. He was forced to break a window to escape

Brown City woman dies in accident

A pair of Brown City residents were critically injured in a 2 vehicle accident last Wednesday afternoon in Sanilac County's Greenleaf Town ship. The driver, a 20-year-old woman, later died of her injuries.

Troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Sandusky reported the accident occurred at about 3:06 p.m. at the intersection of Bad Axe and Bay City-Forestville roads.

Troopers said the 20-year-old Brown City woman was driving southbound on Bad Axe Road and failed to yield at the intersection. Her vehicle was struck by a westbound vehicle driven by a 28-year-old Harbor Beach woman

According to reports, the Brown City woman and her passenger, an 18-year-old male, also of Brown City, were both airlifted to St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw. She reportedly died of her injuries Thursday and he was listed in critical condition. The other driver was treated for minor injuries at Huron Medical Center in Bad Axe and then released.

Troopers were not releasing the names of those involved in the accident pending notification of family members.

Troopers were assisted at the scene by troopers from the Lapeer and Bad Axe posts, Bingham Township Fire Department and EMS, MMR Ambulance from Tuscola County, Central Huron North Ambulance, FlightCare from St. Mary's and LifeNet from Covenant Hospital in Saginaw

in the pitch darkness.
"I'm very lucky," Eady acknowledged Friday morning as he surveyed the damage, which includes the home he was rebuilding on the property. What was a second floor now lies piled in the mud. "The house was up, the garage was all up, they were going to sheet it this morning," he

Elkland Township Fire Chief Ron Pawloski indicated the scene looked like a war zone when his department arrived after being dispatched at 2 a.m.

"It was so weird, walking through that. Deckerville (Road) was totally blocked with trees. In fact, the fire department was on the east side and the ambulance was on the west end, and we couldn't see each other," he said of the affected area, about 2 miles west of Deford.

Pawloski said the National Weather Service hadn't yet inspected the damage to confirm the storm spawned a tornado, but Eady's convinced. "They can't tell me it's wind shear when I've got trees going this way and trees going that way and trees going that way," he said.

Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern, who resides in the Deford area, also felt the impact of the storm

'Trees are down everywhere. Every nice maple tree I had was knocked down. It must have broken 100 trees on my farm," Kern said.

"I got up at 2 o'clock this (Friday) morning and said to my wife, we bet-ter get downstairs," he recalled. "It didn't last long, (but) it was ferocious. It was unbelievable."

Kern said his home was not damaged, and a new pole barn on his property was narrowly missed by a falling tree. "I was quite fortunate."

The Associated Press reported the line of storms that ripped across Michigan Thursday night and early Friday morning generated at least one and as many as 5 tornadoes. One of the storms, in Kalkaska County,

Consolidation not new for area schools

Law targets shared services

A new Michigan law that went into effect Friday requires intermediate school districts (ISDs) across the state to conduct studies aimed at identifying ways they and local schools can share a host of services to cut

Area school officials say the law is a good idea, although Thumb ISDs and local school districts have been sharing many services for years.
The new law, called Public Act 63,

requires ISD officials to complete a study over the next 6 months to identify possibilities for consolidating a number of non-instructional programs, including pupil transportation, human resources administration, procurement of supplies, technology support services, professional development, accounting and other financial services, legal services, food and child nutritional services, event management, production printing and graphics, and shipping and receiving services.

The state also requires the ISD reports to include a detailed description of the average cost per constituent district within the ISD for each of those services.

Once those reports are filed with the state, the Michigan Department of Education will have up to 2 months to compile the information and submit a summary to the standing committees of the legislature having re"A lot of things, we've done, we've worked on," Tuscola Intermediate School District (TISD) Supt. Carol Socha said of the list of shared services in the new law.

Socha said she and other ISD su perintendents across the state will learn more about the law next month at a workshop scheduled to discuss the new requirements as well as to formulate a reporting format that all ISDs can use.

Socha said the TISD for years has provided a variety of programs to the

However, school Supt. Ron Wilson and auditor Gary Anderson of Anderson, Tuckey, Bernhardt & Doran, P.C made it clear the school will continue to walk a financial tightrope, especially with no decision out of Lansing yet regarding how much the district will receive in state funding this

According to audit figures, Cass City Schools ended the 2006-07 fiscal year with total revenues of \$12,550,349 and expenditures of \$11,945,638. That left a surplus of more than \$600,000, but \$223,168 of the total was wiped out by a remaining deficit from the previous year.

Anderson said the remaining fund balance of about \$381,500 equals about 3 percent of the district's bud-

An annual audit report Monday night get. "It should be between 15 and 20 percent, so you should try to keep increasing that," he added.

At the same time, Anderson noted the school has sustained a loss of 112 students since 2002-03, plus another 86 students this year, which translates into more than \$1 million in state revenue.

Wilson said Monday that Cass City could lose another 45 to 50 students next year, judging by senior class and

kindergarten enrollment numbers. Cass City's financial woes last year turned it into what the state classifies as a "deficit spending district", requiring school officials to file monthly budget reports with the state. Cass City was one of 22 school systems in Michigan in that position last year, and is one of only 2 districts to shed the classification this year, according to Wilson, who said



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



Several appear in court

The following people appeared in Tuscola County Circuit Court last week on various criminal charges:

•Theodore E. Walker, 35, Millington was sentenced to 10 to 15 years in prison for his plea of no contest to second degree criminal sexual conduct involving a victim under the age of 13 years between January 2005 and

January 2006 in Vassar Township. Walker was also ordered to pay court costs and fines totaling \$540.

*Bonnie M. Frank, 44, Caro, was sentenced to 365 days in the county jail and 60 months probation for her pleas of no contest to assaulting a police officer and domestic violence March 25 in Caro. She was also convicted of being an habitual offender (one prior felony conviction).

In addition to jail time, she was ordered to pay \$2,075 in costs and fines.

•John Robert-Hamilton Sanders II,

27, Flint, was sentenced to 90 days in jail, with work release, and 24 months probation for his plea of guilty to possession with intent to deliver marijuana March 12 in Almer Township.

To really find out what happens, you have to watch the movie. Of course, the good guys win, but you never know how it will occur or what will go on before the ending.





Bill targets right to forego helmets

by Tom Montgomery

Motorcyclist groups Thursday called on Gov. Jennifer Granholm to support a plan that would revise Michigan's mandatory helmet law, saying the proposal would boost motorcycle tourism and raise revenue for public safety programs, while requiring the highest safety standards.

Some area law enforcement officials, however, disagree, saying the proposed law won't increase the level of safety and, ultimately, will cost all motorists more in the long run.

The state Senate voted 23-15 to approve House Bill 4749, which would allow motorcyclists to ride without helmets provided they meet certain requirements. The vote came a week after the bill won support in the

'The Legislature has spoken in support of a common sense plan that can move Michigan forward. Now, we urge Gov. Granholm to listen to the

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dated helmet law and help turn the Great Lakes State into the Great Motorcycle State," said Jim Rhoades, legislative director for the American Bikers Aiming Towards Education (ABATE - Michigan).

"For too long, millions of dollars have left Michigan on 2 wheels be-cause of a bad law based on bad science," Rhoades said. Today's victory, thanks to overwhelming support from a growing coalition, will help Michigan compete in today's economy.

Rhoades said the bill has received support from a growing coalition that includes the Deputy Sheriff's Association of Michigan, the Michigan State Police Troopers Association, a group of top business and financial xecutives called Boardroom Bikers of Michigan, the Michigan Licensed Beverage Association, the Michigan Harley-Davidson Dealers Association, and others.

among the nation's toughest require-ments for a motorcyclist to ride helmet free. Under the plan, motorcyclists who want to ride helmet-free must:
*Purchase an "H" permit for \$100 a

year or \$200 for 3 years.

*Carry at least \$20,000 in personal

injury health insurance *Be 21 years or older, have at least 2

years of riding experience and complete safety training. Supporters say the bill could gener-

ate at least \$25 million for law enforcement and safety programs — \$5 million would go to the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards, which provides officers with training and other support; \$1 million would go to secondary road patrols for sheriff's departments; and the remainder would go to the Traffic Law Enforcement and Safety Fund, which helps pay for state police troopers.

Allowing motorcyclists to ride helmet-free could also generate more than \$1.2 billion in new revenue, according to a 2004 Michigan Consult-

ants economic study.

Revenue aside, Tuscola County Sheriff Tom Kern indicated the law doesn't make sense in terms of safety on the road.

In 37 years in law enforcement, Kern said, "I've seen a lot of head injuries. Some of them survive. They won't live, though, if they don't wear a hel-

"If they want to do it (ride without a helmet), let them, but I'll say this: if they get a serious head injury from that, they don't get state money. We don't take care of these guys," Kern added. "There's a lot of people who

do it, but they're crazy."
"I would not be in favor of any changes in the helmet law. In fact, I would be in favor of stricter enforcement of the existing law," said First Lt. Doug Lautner, commander of the Michigan State Police posts in Caro and Bad Axe. "There are a lot of people wearing novelty helmets," he added, referring to what he called beanie-style helmets, which are ille-

This is a bad idea," Lautner said of the proposed law change. "Helmets are a safety feature like bumpers, seatbelts and air bags. This is one of those things where we're trying to protect people from themselves."

And, it will cost taxpayers, he added. "Motorcyclists do not carry collision insurance. If you're driving and you hit a motorcyclist, your insurance pays for damage and injuries to the motorcyclist. It's going to raise everyone's insurance rates in this Everybody that's driving a

vehicle is going to pay for this."
Rhoades disagrees. "HB 4749 has the highest safety standards, requires \$20,000 in insurance coverage and goes further than anything be-fore it," he said. "Modernizing Michigan's outdated helmet law will bring in much-needed revenue, jobs and investments. This is a responsible, common-sense proposal that will raise money for important law enforcement and safety programs without raising insurance and other costs to the citizens of Michigan."

Rhoades said the new law would also attract motorcyclists from neighboring states to Michigan, something they have avoided because of Michigan's mandatory helmet law, the only one of its kind in the Great Lakes

Thirty states have modernized their helmet laws, including our neighbors, and Michigan shouldn't be left behind," said Deputy Sheriffs Association of Michigan Executive Director Larry Orlowski. "This plan does more to address safety than anything before it. This proposal is a step forward that will put more money into law enforcement and safety, and also allows Michigan to compete in today's economy. We support this common-sense plan."

In an Oct. 11 memo urging support of the proposal, Michigan State Police Troopers Association President Michael Moorman said: "This legislation puts in place appropriate protection for Michigan's citizens while generating much needed revenue which will support the services pro-vided by the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and the Michigan Department of State

Rep. Bert Johnson (D-Detroit), one of the key supporters of the plan, said: "Outdated mandatory helmet laws do not improve safety, they do not reduce deaths and they do not lower insurance rates. What they do is make Michigan lose out on economic opportunities. We believe this plan is good public policy and balances safety with opportunity.'

The bill is expected to go to the governor after the House formally concurs with some Senate changes.

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
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
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

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Food prices up a little

ket increased slightly in the third quarter of 2007, according to the latest American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) Marketbasket Survey. The informal survey shows the total cost of 16 basic grocery items in the third quarter of 2007 was \$44.03, up about 2 percent or \$1.08 from the second quarter of 2007.

Of the 16 items surveyed, 8 increased, 7 decreased and one stayed the same in average price compared to the 2007 second-quarter survey. Compared to one year ago, the overall cost for the marketbasket items showed an increase of about 7 per-

For the second quarter in a row, regular whole milk showed the largest quarter-to-quarter price increase, up 48 cents to \$3.94 per gallon; fol-lowed by cheddar cheese, which rose 35 cents per pound to \$4.07.

Other items that increased in price were: Russet potatoes and corn oil up 23 cents each to \$2.57 for 5 pounds and \$3.01 for a 32-ounce bottle, respectively; bacon up 16 cents to \$3.60 per pound; vegetable oil, up 7 cents to \$2.73 per 32-ounce bottle; toasted oat cereal and Red Delicious apples, up 4 cents each to \$2.90 and \$1.49 for a 10-ounce box and 1 pound, respec-

Pork chops showed the greatest decrease in price, down 24 cents to \$3.39 per pound. Other items that decreased in price were: sirloin tip roast, down 13 cents to \$3.86; ground chuck, eggs and white bread, down 4 cents each to \$2.81 per pound, \$1.51 per dozen and \$1.54 for a 20-ounce loaf, respectively; and flour and may-onnaise, down 1 cent each to \$1.91 for 5 pounds and \$3.42 for a 32-ounce jar, respectively.

"Dairy products continue to increase in price," said AFBF economist Jim Sartwelle. "Strong competition from overseas consumers for U.S. milk products has helped drive prices to current levels. On the other hand, was a pretty tough summer for beef and pork demand here at home. This is reflected in the third-quarter price slide for sirloin tip roast, ground beef and pork chops.

As retail grocery prices have gradually increased, the share of the average food dollar that America's farm families receive has dropped over

'In the mid-1970s, farmers received about one-third of consumer retail food expenditures on average. That figure has decreased steadily over time and is now just 22 percent, according to Agriculture Department statistics," Sartwelle said.

Using that percentage across-theboard, the farmer's share of this quarter's \$44.03 marketbasket total vould be \$9.69. According to USDA statistics,

Americans spend just under 10 percent of their disposable income on food annually, the lowest average of any country in the world. AFBF, the nation's largest general

farm organization, conducts its informal quarterly marketbasket survey as tool to reflect retail food price trends. A total of 77 volunteer shoppers in 31 states, including Michigan, participated in the latest survey, conducted during August.

Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers across the United States recently began tracking retail prices for different types of milk and eggs.
For the third quarter of 2007, shop-

pers reported the average price for a half-gallon of regular whole milk at \$2.40, up 18 cents from the prior quarter. The average price for I regular whole milk was \$3.94, up 48 cents from the second quarter. Comparing per-quart prices, the retail price for whole milk sold in gallon containers was 21 percent lower compared to half-gallon containers, a typical volume discount long employed by retailers.

The average price for a half-gallon of rBST-free milk was \$3.01, the same price reported in the second quarter but 25 percent higher than the current price for a half-gallon of regular milk, reported at \$2.40.

The average price for a half-gallon of organic milk was \$3.43, down 22 cents compared to the second quarter but 43 percent higher than the current price for a half-gallon of regular milk, reported at \$2.40.

average price for one dozen regular eggs was \$1.51, down 5 cents com-

pared to the second quarter. The average price for "cage-free" eggs increased 56 cents to \$2.78 per dozen. "Cage-free" eggs cost 84 percent more per dozen than regular eggs in the third quarter.

"Booming dairy exports are driving the retail price surge in fluid milk," said AFBF economist Jim Sartwelle. "That being the case, level prices relative to the second quarter for rBSTfree milk and the price drop for organic milk could mean we're close to

discovering the outer retail price point for a half-gallon of milk.

Said Sartwelle of eggs: "The widening retail price gap between conventionally produced and 'cage-free' eggs reflects variations in costs for different production practices. Although food and fiber producers typically are not able to pass higher production costs along to consumers, it is happening to some extent with 'cage-free' eggs, which command a miniscule market share.



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

claimed the life of a 29-year-old man trapped inside his home, which was demolished. In addition, several homes and overturned vehicles were reported across the state.

He shook his head slowly as he looked around. "I don't even know what we'll do now. It has not been a good year," said Eady, a 25-year vet-eran of the Metamora police and fire departments (he serves as fire chief and road patrol sergeant). "I was in a motorcycle accident in July '06 and haven't been able to work since, and the house burned down in February

'After all the problems I've had this past year, I'm sure the insurance guy's not going to be real happy.'

Still: Eady knows this stroke of bad luck could have been much worse. You look inside there (trailer). I can't believe I'm still here." he said.

His wife, who is also a fire fighter and EMS worker, agreed. "He's lucky," she said.

9 local districts in Tuscola County. Paid for by a combination of state, federal and millage funding, they include career technical education, special education and general education (instructional services). Socha noted the TISD is among the leaders in some areas, adding, "This ISD has more special ed programs than any other ISD in the state."

The TISD provides local districts with access to a number of professionals such as school psychologists and physical and speech therapists.

There are many other examples, such as the TISD Technology Information Department, which offers lo-cal districts computer and computer network support. And professional development conferences each year target the county's administrators

and teachers.
The TISD also shares personnel such as a tech center counselor who also works part-time in the Millington School District.

The Huron Intermediate School District (HISD) provides similar programs for its member schools, including the Owen-Gage School District, which has taken advantage of special, vocational and education services, as well as shared distance learning, professional development, substitute teacher contracting, and an alternative education program for students unable to succeed in a regular classroom.

Without those opportunities, Owen-Gage simply could not provide many of those services, according to Supt. Dana Compton.

'We could not run our own alternative education program," he said, adding the district might have 2 or 3 students who need such a program, but the state aid for those students wouldn't add up to more than \$25,000. "We couldn't hire half a teacher for that."

The sar chologist who works with Owen-Gage students. "You're probably looking at (a salary of) \$55,000 to \$60,000 for that one person," Compton said. "We have them here twice a week. Where would we get the extra funding for that?"

Owen-Gage is also entered into cooperative agreements with other schools. For the past 2 years, the district has shared a foreign language teacher with North Huron.

A growing trend, Socha pointed out, is cooperative efforts with other counties

She said the Tuscola and Huron intermediate school districts have partnered on several projects, including providing literacy services and coordinating the curriculum-based student achievement model used by several area school districts. The TISD also has a shared contracting service with the Bay-Arenac ISD and losco ISD to provide substitute teachers.

"We have been, I think, working more and more towards collaboration of services because there are fewer (education) dollars," Socha said.

She noted superintendents from throughout the county meet regularly and have formed committees to explore shared services covering issues ranging from student achievement to

Although a law is now in place re-

quiring ISDs to explore these and many other avenues of consolidation, Socha and other school officials say the economy and little in the way of increased revenue from the state for school operations has been the driving force behind partnerships among

"We haven't had a choice. Schools have already had to become much, much more frugal, so we've looked at ways not to be redundant in services," said Cass City School Supt. Ron Wilson.

"I think the idea behind the (new) law is good, to share services. It works out pretty well," Wilson added. "The problem you run into...is there are certain things that are hard to share. For example, my transportation director is also my bus mechanic, and we have the largest geographical bus district in the Thumb-we travel 1,000 miles a day - so we're covering a lot of ground."

Still, Wilson and other school offi-cials have made great strides in cutting costs. And, Socha believes, there will be even more partnerships struck in the future.

'There's always room for a lot more collaboration. Always. And that's not only among districts in one county, but with other counties," Socha said. "It only makes sense if we can save money" that can be used to educate students in the classroom.

School district in the black

nearly 60 schools are expected to become deficit spending districts in the coming year.

State Rep. Terry Brown (D-Pigeon) earlier this month announced a House plan to give the state's lowest funded schools more money to keep teachers in the classroom, minimize class sizes and provided necessary educational tools for students.

The plan, he explained, is designed to close the gap between the state's maximum guarantee of \$8,385 per student and the lowest foundation grants of \$7,108 now set for many districts, including Cass City, which will receive \$23 more per pupil this year, or an increase of some \$31,000.

Brown indicated the plan should give schools an even larger funding increase, but legislators continue to struggle with a multi-million dollar deficit, and with no firm budget in place, Wilson indicated it's impossible to know what additional increase, if any, Cass City will receive. Projections at this point range from 3 more per student to as much as \$119 per student.

Based on the student count numbers, Wilson said, board members may be looking at cutting just over \$250,000 in expenses this year.

POLICY CHANGES

Turning to other matters during the monthly board of education meeting, school administrators explained a pair of proposed policy changes

Middle school Principal Jeff Hartel outlined changes in the middle school promotion procedure. Currently, students who pass 2 out of 3 marking periods in each semester in all core classes (math, social studies, science and English-language arts) with a 63 percent or better, with a cumulative semester average of 60 percent, are promoted. Students failing one or 2 core classes are promoted if they make up the class by attending summer school

However, there are other exceptions, including promotion approval based on factors such as parental recommendation, and Hartel said the goal of the new policy is to close that loophole by requiring students who are failing a core class to successfully complete unfinished "Study Island" lessons, a web-based instructional and diagnostic tool that enables teachers to help students master state standards and prepare for their state assessments the following year. High school Principal Chad Daniels, meanwhile, explained proposed changes at the high school involv-

ing grading.
Under the plan, he said, semester grades would be determined via a formula of 40 percent for each marking period and 20 percent for final exams. All classes would require an examination, and teachers would use a uniform grading scale.

In addition, the opportunity for students to opt out of a final exam based on their grades would no longer be determined on a class-by-class basis. To qualify for the incentive, students would be required to have no more than 5 total absences in any class to opt out of exams.



\$130,400 grant goes to Caro

Michigan State Housing Develop-ment Authority (MSHDA) officials recently announced a \$130,400 grant to launch a major renovation of downtown buildings in the village of Caro.

'This grant will help business and property owners make their buildings more appealing, which will attract more people who want to live, work and invest in our area," said state Rep. Terry Brown (D-Pigeon). "Businesses want to set up shop in lively, modern-looking places, and downtown areas are often what they see first. Improving downtown Caro will help stimulate much-needed economic growth in our area and create more good paying jobs for our work-

The grant, which covers 8 buildings along State Street in Caro, is part of a project to create "Vibrant Communities" of all sizes throughout Michigan. The money can be used for a variety of exterior improvements such

as painting, windows, awnings and lighting.

The program is intended to stimulate other private investment in the areas of building and housing renovations along with job creation

The grant comes on the heels of Caro's designation earlier this year as a Blueprint for Michigan's Downtown Community. That designation earned the village a MSHDA grant totaling \$15,000 to develop a strategy to improve its downtown area.

The folks in Caro are to be commended for taking advantage of these opportunities to position the village as an active, dynamic place," Brown said. "Projects such as this downtown renovation are very deserving of major grants like this one."

Corn yields affected by dry weather

... With very little rain in Michigan in June and early August, many corn growers are seeing lower than average yields. Even though the state average bushels per acre has steadily increased, the lack of rainfall has caused lower than normal yields this year for much of the state

Michigan farmers planted 2.5 million acres of corn in 2007, which was about a 15 percent increase from last year. The 20-year range for corn acreage planted is between 2.1 million and 2.7 million acres. During this same 20-year time frame, the Michigan corn crop has grown from 112 million bushels to 288 million bushels per year.

Production is determined by acres harvested and average yield. The average yield per bushel has increased dramatically in the last 20 years from 70 bushels per acre to 147 bushels per acre. Although this year much of Michigan suffered from a drought, the current yield trend pre-dicts that Michigan has the potential to produce more than 147 bushels per acre, but is predicted to be at 113

bushels per acre this season. "Unfortunately Michigan has suftered from a drought, but nationally corn production is up from more than 1 billion bushels in 2006 to more than 3 billion bushels in 2007," said Jody Blok, Corn Marketing Program of Michigan (CMPM) executive direcfor. "The lack of water in Michigan thiring the critical time of the corn plant's growing season has lead to In impact of the final crop. This has caused about 70 percent of the corn grown in Michigan to be rated as a fair to poor condition crop."
Even with the lower yield, there will

only be about 15 percent less production because more acres were planted. Last year Michigan produced about 288 million bushels of corn, while this year the United States Department of Agriculture has predicted about 251.9 million bushels of production. If you take this year's crop and add the carry over, Michigan's available corn crop is 272.9 million bushels.

The center charges \$1 per tire (\$2 with a rim), \$5 per semi truck or trailer tire (\$10 with a rim), and \$20 per tractor tire (\$40 with a rim). The fees are double for out-of-county residents. The facility, county-owned and operated since 1996, is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.


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
