# Decker pair face charges in recent drug stings

A Decker area couple are among 4 suspects facing drug-related charges following separate drug trafficking operations conducted recently by the Sanilac County Drug Task Force.

The investigations target homes in the Decker and Brown City areas as well as in Carsonville, according to task force Director William Gray.

"Marijuana, scales, firearms, cash and packaging materials were seized, with criminal charges pending against 3 suspects in (the first 2) raids," reported Gray, who said the latest sting, conducted Friday in the Carsonville area, netted one arrest and the seizure of more than one-half pound of marijuana.

in the Decker area, drug task force is estigators recently executed a arch warrant in the 2500 block of Madley Road, where officers seized multiple bags of pre-packaged marijuana, scales, packaging materials and 100 in alleged drug sale proceeds.

The street value of the marijuana is about \$600, according to Gray, who said warrants will be sought charging a 40-year-old male suspect with possession with intent to deliver mariitana (second offense), possession of marijuana (second offense) and maintaining a drug house. Gray noted the man was previously arrested on cocaine distribution charges stemming from a 1994 drug task force investigation.

"A 38-year-old female at the raid site will face the same 3 charges but without the second offense penalty enhancement," he said.

The task force executed a search warrant in the Brown City area on the same night. Seized in a home there were multiple plastic bags of pre-packaged marijuana valued at \$900, scales, packaging materials and 3 firearms. Gray reported a 49-year-old male suspect will face charges of possession with intent to deliver marijuana, pos-

# Ubly's Ligrow ready to rest

In today's mobile society, it's un-common to find someone who has remained in the same community and in the same career for a lifetime.

Ubly's Fred Ligrow has done both, and he's never regretted it.

"That's something I'm quite proud of. I'm proud of the fact that I'm here

in Ubly and have stayed here this long," Ligrow commented last week as he talked about his upcoming retirement from the Ubly Community. Schools, where he has taught, coached and/or served as an administrator for the past 36 years.

"It was my first job and last job. I 'came here in '72 and didn't know if I was going to stay here or not, and the rest is history," added the Kinde

"I guess I got to live the dream 1 thought I wanted to. Now, it's time for me to relax. I'll be leaving, probably, sometime in the second or third week of June."

Ligrow's career began shortly after he graduated from Central Michigan University, where he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree, majoring in physical education with a health minor. Within 2 months of graduation, he found himself in then-high school Principal Fred Ruthko's office. Ruthko promptly hired him after a 20minute interview and a tour of the school facilities.

Ligrow started teaching physical education and health to grades 7 through 12, and later took on some elementary phys ed classes as well. But his teaching career, spanning 21 years, involved a great deal more than time in the classroom.

Aside from his major in college, Ligrow had been involved in sports himself in high school, and officials at Ubly took advantage of his interest in coaching. In fact, in his first year of teaching, he also coached junior high track, junior varsity football and basketball, and varsity baseball.

A few years later, Ligrow took on the varsity boys' basketball program as coach while continuing to lead the varsity baseball team. He opted to not continue coaching track and football, but he went on to put 15 to 17 years of coaching time in on the 2 varsity sports.

"That was fun - the coaching part was fun," said Ligrow, who recalled seeing the athletic talent grow in the early 1980s, enabling his basketball squads to win league and district titles in 1980 and 1984. His team reached the quarterfinals in 1986.

Ligrow later shifted gears, thanks to what he described as encouragement from peers and others to consider administration. He earned his master's degree in administration in 1990 after 2 years of study and was

## Exam policy challenged

# School may add staff positions

An improved financial outlook and tary and middle schools. However, federal No Child Left Behind rules prompted the Cass City Board of Education to consider adding 1 1/2 staff positions during a regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The board also approved, on a rare split vote and after much discussion, a pair of exceptions to the district's newly revised exam policy.

School Supt. Ron Wilson discussed the staffing adjustments, noting he made some recommendations during a meeting with the board's budget committee Thursday.

Those adjustments include hiring a full-time social worker for the middle school, a position previously cut by the board due to red ink in the district. Since then, Campbell Elementary School Social Worker Beth Howard has covered both the elemen-

Wilson said, there is a very real need at the middle school.

Wilson recommended other adjustments to meet the No Child Left Behind law. They are the addition of a math instructor at the high school, and reinstatement of industrial arts at the high school along with a life skills/computers class at the middle school.

Wilson explained those changes can be made, in part, by moving one English teacher from the high school to the middle school - he noted the change would leave more than adequate coverage in English at the high school - and by having an existing half-time high school math instructor also take on industrial arts

# **Energy** wise

## O-G students part of pilot program launched nationwide

Owen-Gage High School math teacher Ricky Behm and several of his students are hoping to save the district more than 5 percent on its annual electricity bill.

But they're relying on much more than hope to accomplish that goal. Behm, a Grand Rapids native who is finishing his second year of teaching at Owen-Gage, has managed to involve the district in a nationwide pilot program, headquartered at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Ind., designed to give high school students the opportunity to tackle community service projects with an emphasis on engineering.

The project has delivered some \$18,500 in funding to Owen-Gage, where Behm and his students are focusing on electricity usage and ways to reduce that usage.

Behm explained the project is part of the national Engineering Projects in Community Service (EPICS) model founded at Purdue University in 1995. "The EPICS program was started at the college level because employers were getting engineering students

from colleges and universities who are really smart, but they lacked communication skills," he said, adding Purdue officials decided to expand the program to include high school stu-

The pilot program, Behm pointed out, involves a total of 15 high schools - 8 of them in Huron County, includ-

Behm learned about the program while attending a weeklong seminar at Purdue University last summer. The program was led by Purdue Professor Dr. William Oakes, a former Harbor Beach resident.

According to university officials, the focus of EPICS is, in part, on community service agencies, which face a future in which they must take advantage of technology to improve, coordinate, account for, and deliver the services they provide, and they need the help of people with strong technical backgrounds.

Undergraduate students, meanwhile, face a future in which they will need more than solid expertise in their discipline to succeed. "They will be expected to work with people of many

Before Christmas I was chatting online with my daughter-in-law Shelley (I thought). I was about to discuss some super secret Christmas stuff when I discovered it was not Shelley, but grandson Drew. (That's one disadvantage of PC messaging. You can't see who is on the other

After this revelation, I told him I was glad I hadn't let the cat out of the bag. He thought that was hilarious, apparently not familiar with the expression. Had I said "spilled the beans", he probably would have had the same reaction.

Anyone who takes English phrases literally must be perplexed by some of our common expressions, which causes one to wonder how they came

The other day Stan heard a TV character threaten to "box someone's ears," a phrase he hadn't heard since his mother used it long ago. With 13 kids, I'm sure she had ample opportunity to do some ear boxing. That reminded me of a "Wheel of

Fortune" show in which the contestants were trying to solve the phrase "lick and a promise." What made it 4-H Exploration Days will be held hard was that not one of them recognized the phrase even after it was revealed.

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# TNU "stings" sex operation

Thumb Narcotics Unit (TNU) officers arrested a pair of women in a prostitution sting at an Imlay City hotel last week.

According to a news release issued by the drug team Thursday, TNU officers, acting on a tip and in cooperation with the Imlay City Police Department, arrested a 29-year-old female from Clinton Township and an 18-year-old female from Grand Rapids Tuesday night.

TNU Commander Detective Lt. Mark J. Opra reported that both women had allegedly posted ads on the Internet for "sensual massages", and male subjects would reply to the ads either over the Internet or by phone and set up an appointment time.

"Once they met, a price and specific sex act was agreed upon," said Opra, who noted the suspects occupied

separate rooms at the hotel.

During a surveillance conducted by TNU detectives, several male subjects were observed leaving the rooms occupied by the 2 suspects.

"An undercover detective made contact with one of the suspects and arrived at the hotel at the agreed time. A price and act were discussed and agreed upon, at which time Thumb Narcotics detectives and Imlay City police officers arrested the 2 suspects," Opra said, adding the Lapeer County Sheriff's Department also assisted in the operation.

Both suspects were released after being issued court appearance tickets. Warrants for both are pending.

I've always liked the little mom and pop stores where you can tell the owner or an employee what you want, and they go get it for you. If the employees are all busy the other customers will help you out. There's none of this wandering around staring at shelves like we do at the megastores.

Most musicians in an Emo band tend to play with their backs to the audience during the quieter parts. During the loud exploding parts, the musicians: generally tend to jump and shake spontaneously causing themselves to knock things over. With all of these stage actions, singers often fail to make it to the mike in time to sing, deciding to just scream at the top of their lungs? wherever they are when the moment comes, meaning that an entire show may pass without the audience being able to fully experience the vocals. If, however, the band has a lot of screaming during the quiet parts, this can be an extremely powerful tactic.

Because these are things that a lot of emo people have," said "Pixie and TomZ." "As such, like-minded people are able to find each other, and the emo community blooms.'

As emo music evolved, it became not only a music genre but also a clothing style and way of life for many people. Most emo people are described as feeling upset, angry, ostracized, left out, confused, depressed, or any other normal emotions that are overemphasized in order to describe a way they

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

Russian fishing lures by watching John Krameranko of Bay Port back in the early 1930s.

"Krameranko had been making ice fishing lures for many years, as (did) other Russians who had immigrated about the same time Krameranko did," said Misico, a descendant of the original Russian immigrants who traveled to Huron County during the first decade of the 1900s.

Misico recently presented a 3-hour program at the Burns Gallery in Sebewaing, featuring his lure-making skills. About 40 people attended.

"(The) demonstration consisted of making the lures from pre-1964 United States silver quarters, hammered out to the proper thinness, cut to shape," Misico explained. "The hook was soldered on and a wire leader attached. Then the lure was polished to be mirror smooth and highly reflective.

"Everyone was very pleased that they came to see the art and method of making Russian ice fishing lures, which is usually secretive and kept in the family," added Misico, who noted his goal was to help others learn how to make their own Russiandesigned lures so they can catch more and larger fish.

Towards that end, Misico organized a silent auction for some of his handmade lures - each initialed and numbered. The event auction will continue through Monday, March 31, with the highest bidder receiving the "number one" lure.

Misico said he will donate all proceeds to the Burns Gallery in appreciation for allowing him to display over 75 pieces of his artwork, as well as for hosting his demonstration on the art of making Russian ice fishing lures and Russian fishing poles, and how to make fishing line from horsetail hair.

Misico pointed out that each lure to be auctioned off is one-of-a-kind. Area residents interested in placing

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

# School may add jobs

The bottom line, he continued, is the adjustments would result in an additional 1.5 teaching positions at a cost of roughly \$60,000 a year. It would also enable the district to bring back some classes that were eliminated due to budget constraints.

The board is expected to take action on those recommendations next month.

In an interview earlier Monday, Wilson said reinstating staff positions is being made possible by a more favorable financial outlook, although he cautioned that outlook could be drastically affected by the outcome of the district bond issue election in May, and by upcoming teacher and support staff contract negotiations.

"Things are continuing to improve financially, for now," he said, adding he believes the district could sustain the projected loss of 40 students next year and still maintain what he now believes will be a fund balance of some \$800,000, up from the estimated \$580,000 figure he has cited in recent months.

"We're continuing to hold the line on spending," Wilson said. At the same time, he noted, Cass City Schools received an additional \$108 per student this year in state funding, and the latest reports indicate the district will receive an extra \$140 or so per pupil next year thanks to legislation reinstating a formula to give the state's lowest-funded schools additional revenue to "catch up" to

the highest-funded districts. One of the biggest question marks is the spring bond issue election, according to the superintendent. The bond issue would generate close to \$6.9 million for a variety of capital improvement projects, including several roof replacement projects. Should voters turn it down, school officials will be faced with about \$2 million worth of repairs that Wilson said must be tackled immediately.

## **EXAMPOLICY**

Turning to the exam policy, a parent's request for an exception for her 2 daughters, prompted a debate among board members.

The board earlier this year revised a section of the policy that allows high school students to opt out of final exams based on grades and attendance. The revisions limited the number of allowable absences in all classes to 5. Previously, students were allowed 6 absences and those were counted on a class-by-class basis.

Parent Deb Auten explained her daughters have exceeded the minimum allowed number of days off to opt out of exams. However, she pointed out the reason was that they both came down with chicken pox, which prevented them by law from attending classes for a few days.

Board member Randy Severance indicated he would be in favor of granting an exception given the circumstances.

Board President Michelle Biddinger, however, voiced concern about making exceptions to the new policy, rather than going back and taking another look at the rules for possible revisions. Final exams are not a punishment - they are an important part of the educational process, she said, adding she believes students should not be allowed to skip exams.

High school Principal Chad Daniels agreed, and Wilson pointed out that the revised policy doesn't mesh with the district's grading policy, which requires that 20 percent of a student's grade be based on final exams.

Severance's motion to grant exceptions for Auten's daughters was approved on a 4-3 vote, with Biddinger, and trustees Doug Lautner and Craig Bellew casting the dissenting votes.

## SCHOOL BUSES

A report on the condition of the district's school bus fleet led to discussion of concerns involving existing transportation policy.

Transportation Supervisor Richard Sattelberg outlined a pair of minor policy changes being proposed, including requiring parents to contact school officials in their child's building when arranging to have their student ride another bus.

The problem in recent weeks, Sattelberg explained, is that an increasing number of parents are requesting that their children be dropped off or picked up at different locations on different days of the week due to babysitting or job needs, for example. Special requests are allowed, but the growing number of those requests is making it difficult for the drivers to keep track, and many parents are not giving the district the required 3 days notice, he

During his report on the busses, Sattelberg said a recent MDOT inspection revealed some problems with the aging fleet, but he noted all needed repairs were made immediately, with no busses taken out of

Sattelberg acknowledged financial difficulties have forced school officials to abandon a schedule of purchasing new busses on a regular basis. Today, however, 80 percent of the district's busses have mileage readings of at least 100,000, and some 40 percent have hit the 150,000-mile mark. The average Cass City school bus is 10 years old.

Sattelberg pointed out the district's rural roads are hard on busses, and that factor is compounded by the fact that Cass City has the largest geographical area among schools in the upper Thumb, with the busses traveling an average of 17,000 miles a year. He urged the board to look at reviving its replacement program. "We've done well," he said, "but we're pressing our luck."

tions. Congratulated food service director Shari Bock on an excellent report following a state cafeteria inspection, and on the positive marks given the district through the Healthy School

## Environment Recognition Program. Plan would help boost employment

State Rep. Terry Brown (D-Pigeon) has thrown his support behind a plan to invest \$40 million to expand the No Worker Left Behind Program, a move that will allow the state to retrain thousands of displaced workers so they can land good-paying jobs available now in high-demand-

fields. "My top priority is getting our Thumb-area workers into good-paying jobs as quickly as possible, and the No Worker Left Behind program gives our workers the training they need to fill the jobs that are available now," Brown said. "There is a gap." between the kinds of jobs we have: open in Michigan and the types of skills that many of our displaced workers have.

The additional money for No Worker Left Behind (NWLB) comes from the refinancing of state bond debt, not from new taxpayer dollars. Through NWLB, eligible Michigan workers can attend a community col-. lege or university for 2 years tuitionfree to upgrade their skills so they can get good-paying jobs available in high-demand fields.

The \$40 million in state money will be combined with about \$37 million in federal funds that was used to launch the program last year. The funds will allow NWLB to train more workers and shorten the waiting lists that have formed statewide. Last year about 18,000 residents were enrolled in the program. To qualify, workers must be currently unemployed; have received a notice of termination or layoff from employment; or be working but have a family income that is \$40,000 or less per year.

different backgrounds to identify and achieve goals. They need education experiences that can help them broaden their skills." university officials say. "The challenge is to bring these 2 groups together in a mutually beneficial way.

With that mission in mind, Behm began putting together some ideas for his students at Owen-Gage.

"We had to create a project - find a problem in the community," he said. Ours is the cause of increased electricity usage in the (school) district, and we're using the school as our

"One year of electricity usage in our district is close to \$60,000," added Behm, who said the goal is to cut that bill by \$5,000, or more than 5 percent. "Five thousand dollars is a lot of money. We're looking at fueling buses for a month or 2. It's money we could put back into the school for other things.

Behm said \$10,000 of Owen-Gage's grant funding came from Purdue University, while a matching grant of \$8,500 was provided by the Convergence Education Foundation (CEF), an organization created by the Big 3 automakers to distribute grant fund-

"So far I've spent \$5,000 or \$6,000 in equipment - research equipment -2 laptops, a printer, data-collection devices," Behm explained. "We've started some of the research, but we haven't gotten any of the data back

He and 10 students in grades 9 through 11 are concentrating on the district's electrical circuits. "They (students) have done a lot of brainstorming - what circuits should we be testing, just things like that. We can figure out which ones are using the most (electricity) and which ones are using the least," he continued, adding the students will look at options such as fluorescent bulb replacement and the use of timers. A state Department of Energy offi-

cial has already worked with students to conduct an energy audit. "They do it on request and they do it for free. The report was very detailed. He sent them (students) a 40-page report on things that are good and areas (in need) of improvement," Behm noted.

One of the students' parents, electrician Ken Errer, has volunteered his time and expertise to install electricity monitors for the project.

Purdue University has guaranteed funding for the project for 3 years, according to Behm, who said he and his students plan to implement en-

session of a firearm in the commission of a felony, and maintaining a drug house.

In both raids, investigators were assisted by officers from the Peck, Brown City, Imlay City and Cass City police departments, and the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department.

In last Friday's raid, officers targeted a home in the 2500 block of East Sanilac Road (M-46) following what Gray said was a multi-week investigation into drug activity emanating from the Carsonville area residence.

"Investigators located the 48-yearold suspect and a second man in an outbuilding on the property. After gaining access to the residence, the suspect initially admitted to possessing only one-half ounce of marijuana for personal use," Gray said. "However, upon actual search of the premises, investigators located more than one-half pound of marijuana stored in a vacuum sealed plastic storage bag in a freezer. The suspect, who had been previously arrested, charged and convicted 15 years ago for marijuana distribution following a task force (operation) at his then-Port Sanilac business, was cooperative with investigators during this search."

Gray said the man admitted to growing the marijuana found in his freezer, but claimed he had forgotten it was

In addition to the marijuana, valued at roughly \$3,000, officers seized scales, packaging materials and 6 firearms, including a handgun.

The suspect was released pending crime lab analysis of the marijuana. A warrant is being sought charging him with possession with intent to deliver marijuana (second offense), possession of a firearm by a felon, possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony, maintaining a drug house and possession of marijuana (second offense).

Gray noted that the second man at the house will not be charged.

Residents can anonymously report suspected drug activity in Sanilac County by calling toll-free 1-800-544-DRUG(3784).

Behm acknowledged that collection of data can be a bit monotonous, but the students have shown a real interest and are looking forward to the time when they can put what they've learned to use and actually see some


results. "I think that's when they're going to get more excited.
