Calling all volunteers

Community dinner on tap

A host of Cass City businesses, organizations and volunteers, young and old, know first-hand how to put the "community" into a community Thanksgiving dinner. And you're invited.

The annual Cass City Community Thanksgiving Dinner will be held Thursday, Nov. 27, starting at noon at the Cass City United Methodist Church, located just north of the village at 5100 N. Cemetery Rd.

According to Scott Mills, now in his 15th year of heading up an all-volunteer committee, the community dinner

has become self-driven in a sense, thanks to a handful of faithful area residents who organize the event, and to several others who join in to wash a dish, serve up some turkey and dressing, or clean up afterwards.

But that doesn't mean Mills isn't looking for more folks to lend a hand.

"As usual, we're always open to and hoping for volunteers for clean-up and serving," he said. "Generally, we need about, when we actually start to serve, anywhere from 25 to 30 people. We want to get the food out quickly because this is (served) fam-

ily style.

"You can just show up that day and we'll certainly find something for you to do," Mills added.

The dinner drew roughly 250 people last year, and Mills said organizers are preparing for 250 to 300 again this year.

The free community Thanksgiving dinner dates back more than 20 years, and volunteers have been very successful in promoting the meal for what it is - an opportunity to celebrate the holiday as a community, especially for those residents who might otherwise spend Thanksgiving alone.

The committee behind the event has also done an admirable job of explaining what the dinner is not - an all-hours restaurant (serving begins at noon, and those who show up later in the afternoon may be out of luck), or a soup kitchen for the poor.

"The idea grew out of people having to sit home, alone, people who don't have family in the area," Mills explained. "The purpose was to sit as a family and community."

The idea proved popular. About 80 dinners were served that first year, and attendance has steadily grown since.

And, the dinner has remained a community affair. All the food and labor is donated. The Knights of Columbus, for example, has traditionally purchased the turkeys. Local high school students, meanwhile, offer their assistance with meal preparation, as do employees at Hills and Dales General Hospital. Some area businesses donate to the cause, and most of the local civic clubs and churches are involved in one way or another.

It's a big job for such a small group of volunteers who, on average prepare and serve about 16 turkeys, 30 dozen dinner rolls, 180 pounds of potatoes, 2 roasters full of squash, 3 roasters of dressing, several pounds of cooked vegetables and dozens of pies.

"It doesn't seem like work. It's a joy to be part of," Mills said of the sup-

Local students first in Michigan to host high tech DWI simulator

Dozens of Cass City students are going to get behind the wheel of a car Friday. Buzzed, a little high, even drunk.

But parents in the community can rest assured that the experience will be a virtual one only, with state-of-the-art technology taking the place of actual alcohol. There will be no risk on the part of their children or other drivers "on the road."

They can also hope that the lessons learned will stay with the local teens, who are going to get a very real taste of the consequences - physically, emotionally and financially - of drinking, even a little, and then driving a car, or willingly getting into a vehicle driven by someone who has been drinking.

The experience promises to be as realistic as they come without actually drinking and driving. And if it saves just one life, school officials say, it will have been worth the effort and cost of bringing the P.E.E.R.S. (Professionals Encouraging Education Reform Statewide) AWARE III Simulator System to Cass City.

P.E.E.R.S., a national drug and alcohol prevention program, is scheduled to be at the local high school Friday, Nov. 21. The alcohol awareness event is slated for 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Along with general information regarding drug and alcohol abuse, P.E.E.R.S. staffers will introduce students to the AWARE III, a DWI (driving while under the influence) simulator system.

"It is an actual vehicle that has a simulator attached that will take the students into a virtual world where they can physically see, feel and experience the dangers of drinking and driving," explained Patrick Degrasse, executive director of P.E.E.R.S., a national corporation formed 4 years ago with headquarters in Grand Rapids. "You are not just shown the outward dangers of these factors, but you are shown the after-effect of drinking and driving incidences."

During the program, students will have the opportunity to sit inside the car and experience the effects - reaction time and judgment on the road, for example - of having ingested varying amounts of alcohol. The vehicle is locked into place and doesn't actually move.

"The simulator will allow students to drive sober and then 'intoxicated,'" added Degrasse, who said each participating student's gender, body type and drinks consumed per hour are programmed into the simulator. "Upon completion of the intoxicated drive, students will be able to view their results on how well or poorly they drove under the influence."

Degrasse said panoramic-simulated views of the road are presented to students via virtual reality goggles known as a head-mounted display (HMD). The scenery is computer generated by virtual reality software, which receives data from the wheels and gas and brake pedals of the vehicle.

"It's the most high tech simulator in the nation. There's nothing else like it. There are only 4 of these simulators in the nation, and we have 3 of them," said Degrasse, who noted the fourth belongs to the Arizona State Police, which uses the equipment to train its officers in detecting major as well as minor traffic infractions stemming from alcohol use.

Degrasse said Cass City is among a very select group of schools offered

the opportunity to host the P.E.E.R.S. simulator. In fact, while P.E.E.R.S. visits more than 600 college campuses nationwide each year, only 10 high schools are offered the opportunity annually, and Cass City is the first-ever high school selected in Michigan.

Degrasse estimated that 30 students will be able to experience the simulator per hour. At the same time, other students will be able to watch monitors that place them in a virtual passenger's seat.

In addition, P.E.E.R.S. will be playing a 55-minute impact video throughout the program. Degrasse said it's a real life video series that picks up where the simulator leaves off, with stories of drivers and passengers, ages 14 to 19, who have been in accidents involving alcohol. The videos show students what can happen, from the emergency room,

to a doctor telling parents that he doesn't think their child is going to survive his or her injuries, to seeing accident victims learning how to walk, talk and eat all over again.

P.E.E.R.S. will also set up a "pledge station" where students can pledge not to drink and drive. Those who include an e-mail address will receive more information and occasional surveys from P.E.E.R.S. counselors. Statistical information from those surveys, minus individual student names, will be sent to school officials as a tool to gauge alcohol and drug use among teens.

School officials have embraced the proposed visit by P.E.E.R.S.

"We hope to get as many of the kids through it as we can. I think it will be a good program," commented Cass City High School Principal Chad Daniels.

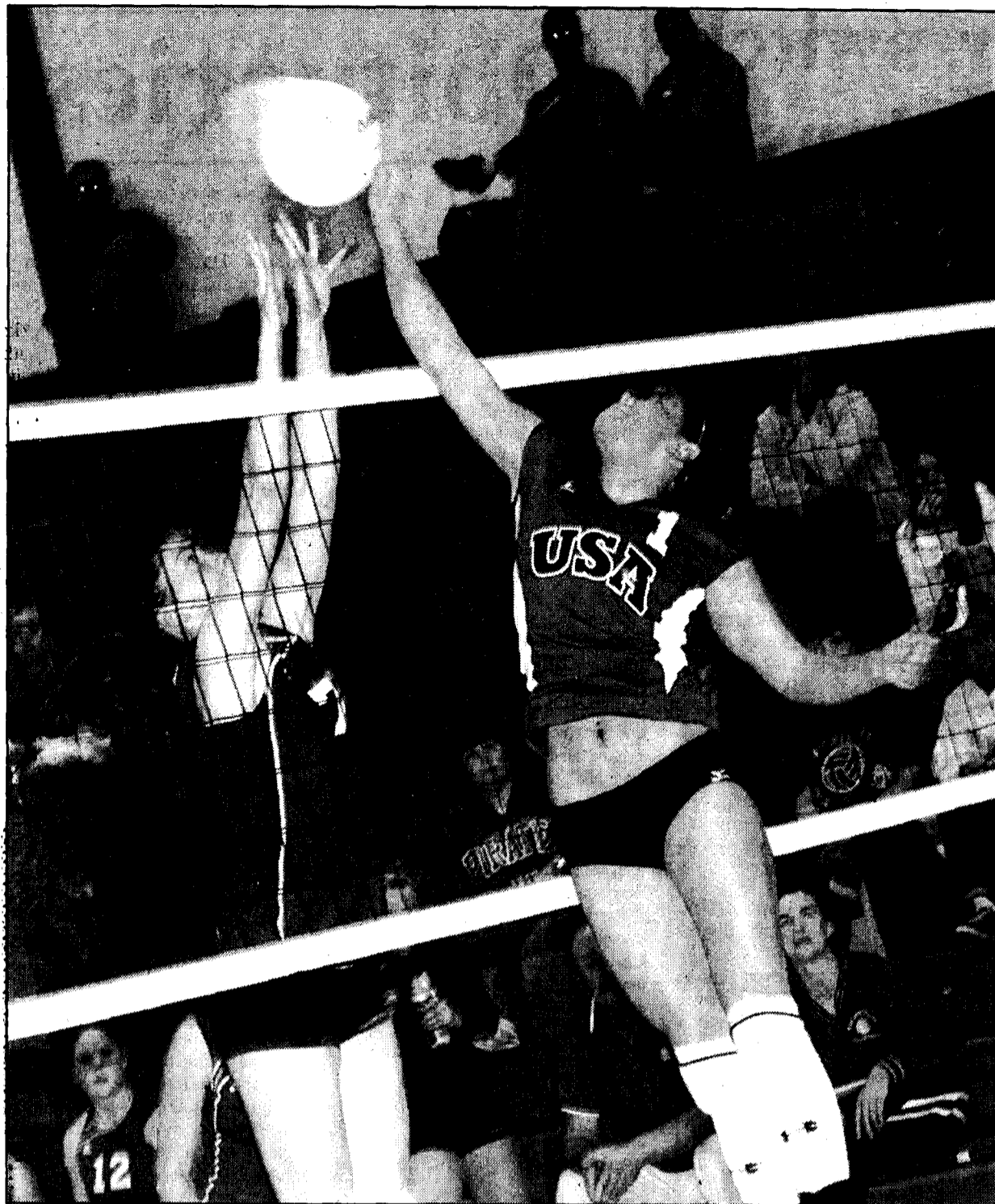

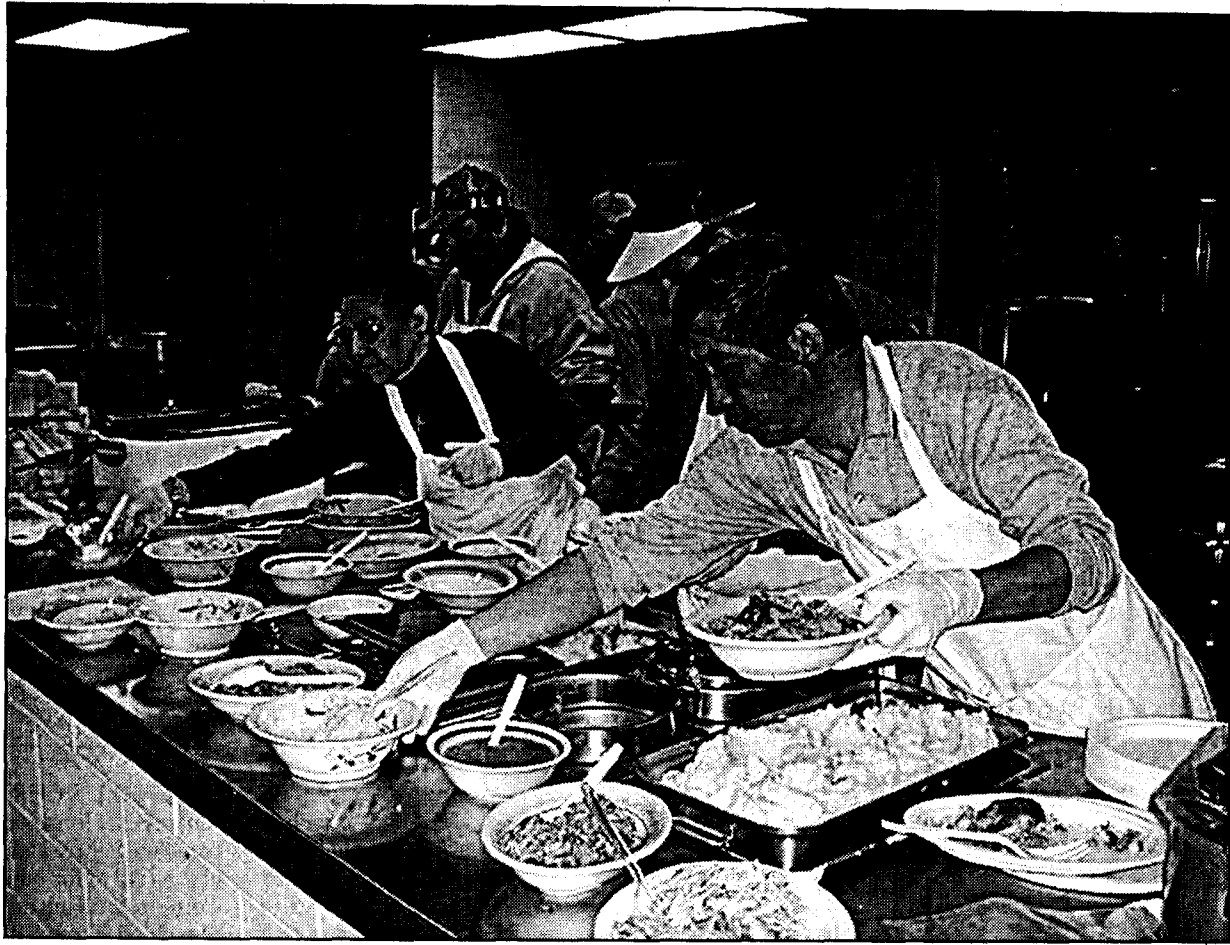
which is nice. It makes it easy," he added.

 "Of course, it's a great idea," agreed Cass City Police Chief Craig Haynes. "I think it will give them an insight as to the effects of drunk driving or impaired driving. As the police focus has been on drivers with lower BACs (blood alcohol content), I think it will be an awakening for the students participating that, number one, any amount of alcohol and trying to operate a motor vehicle is an unsafe thing to do."
 Haynes noted that the state's legal limit for drunken driving is a BAC of .08, down from the previous .10, and those that get caught face not only possible jail time, but also the loss of their driver's license and thousands of dollars in court costs and fines. Minors caught with any BAC reading also face penalties, including the loss of their driving privileges.
 Shari Bock, who serves as both food service director for the Cass City Public Schools and leader of the district's Coordinated Health Team, did much of the legwork involved in bringing the P.E.E.R.S. program to Cass City, but she is quick to credit the support of the Pinney Founda-

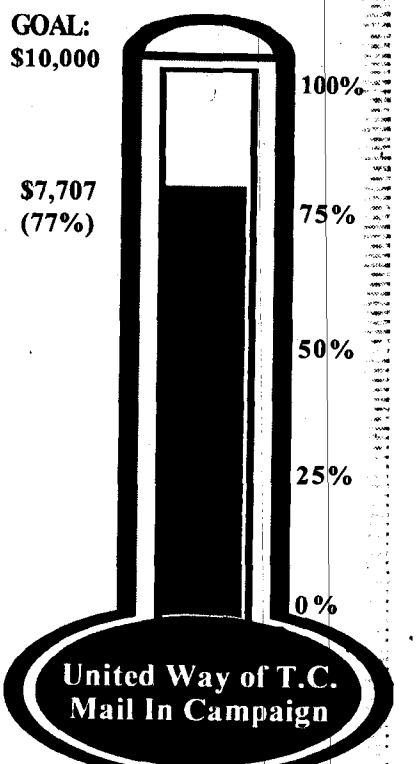
tion, which is paying the \$2,500 tab, as well as the support of the administration and board of education.
 Bock, whose family has been forced to deal with the aftermath of a traffic crash involving drinking and driving, indicated she wants students to walk away Friday with some lessons that could save their lives.
 "Hopefully, it will prevent some of them from getting behind the wheel

or being a passenger in a car where somebody's been drinking," she said. "They (teens) just think they're invincible and that it's not going to happen to them, and it does happen to them."
 Daniels echoed that comment. "I think kids don't understand - they think, 'it's not going to affect me'," he said. "They don't realize what a little bit of alcohol can do."
