Rawson Memorial Library stacks up

If you haven't been to Rawson Memorial District Library in Cass City in a few years, you haven't been to Rawson Memorial District Library.

Today's library offers much more than a wide selection of books, magazines, reference materials and video/DVDs; its services also range from special programming to high-speed Internet access.

How does Rawson Memorial compare to its peers across the country?

The OCLC (Online Computer Library Center), a non-profit computer research and service organization based in Dublin, Ohio, earlier this year released its report, "How Libraries Stack Up: 2010", which takes a close look at how today's patrons go to their local libraries to not only borrow books, journals, music and movies, but also to find jobs, create new careers, help to grow small businesses and learn to use the latest technology.

Judging by that report, Rawson Memorial District Library definitely stacks up, and then some.

Did you know most public libraries provide free wireless Internet access to their patrons? Or that, nationwide, business owners and employers use resources at public libraries some 2.8 million times a month to support their small businesses?

Libraries, including Rawson Memorial, also offer free technology classes, free career assistance, a myriad of special programs and use of meeting rooms.

Libraries in the United States circulate as many materials every day as FedEx ships packages worldwide.

In Cass City, the numbers are equally impressive, in spite of the fact that officials — like their counterparts in area school districts and local governmental units — increasingly find themselves working to maintain and expand services with limited revenue.

"Our service area has increased from 8,589 to 9,140 due to the addition of Grant Township," Rawson Memorial District Library Director Kate VanAuken recently reported.

"Internet use is up over 10 percent from 2008-09, programming is up 3 percent, program attendance is up 9 percent, total circulation is up 14 percent, from 52,006 to 60,049," she said. "Internet usage over 3 years has grown 21 percent, (and) the number of active library card users was 6,605 in 2007, 7,277 in 2008 and 7,792 in 2009."

We hope Michigan's legislators will take note of what Rawson Memorial and its peers offer residents, especially now as the Department of Education Subcommittee begins work on a new budget, which will determine how much state aid libraries will receive in the coming year.

After all, how many organizations in the state offer the sort of return on investment that libraries do? Locally, Rawson Memorial provides nearly \$7.50 worth of service to the community for every \$1 it receives, and is open 60 hours a week — twice the number of hours mandated for libraries in its class.

That sort of service and fiscal responsibility deserves to be acknowledged and rewarded in Lansing.

The back forty

It's easy to forget how much agriculture has changed over the years. Production levels have changed, techniques have changed, and most of all, equipment changed.

I was reminded of these things some years ago when I walked into a modern, swine-farrowing barn to photograph baby pigs. There they were, 10 or 12 pigs to a litter, all lined-up and attacking their dinner.

Some think confinement farrowing systems are cruel to animals, but I see them as much more humane than older methods of production. Modern swine systems restrict the sow's movement, which helps keep the baby pigs warm, well fed, and safe from the shuffling hooves and wafering impact of a 500-pound sow.

Good riddance to the days when we headed for the woods with a bucket of wet grain (slop) and a trough to feed the old sow who opted for a bed of leaves under a paw-paw tree — rather than the nice A-frame house we had provided for her.

If being stepped-on or otherwise mashed by a sow makes a pig feel good, I suppose some of those woods pigs were happier than the modern ones. I know a lot of them didn't survive until they got to the barn.

I can also remember a few Saturdays when my brothers and I were coerced into entering the old hog barn with a pitchfork and a shovel to throw manure into the spreader parked outside.

At times like these a boy

learns if he wants to heal people, he should become a doctor. If he wants to relieve suffering, he should be an agricultural engineer.

The hard part of cleaning the hog barn was throwing the stuff through a window that was a little too high and just slightly smaller than the shovel. If you tilted the shovel, the manure ran down the handle; and if you threw it too hard (or missed the window), you had better have your mouth closed. We didn't talk much when cleaning the barn.

Why not adopt a shelter dog?

After my dog, Brittany, died a few years ago, it didn't take long for me to decide I really wanted to have another dog.

My wife, Deb, agreed, but she suggested that this time we focus on finding a medium-sized pet (Brittany wasn't huge, but she was solid muscle. Picture a black lab with stumpy, 8-inch legs, but as loveable as any dog you could come across). Deb also made it clear she preferred a breed that doesn't shed.

I thought it might be a good idea to adopt a shelter dog, and shortly after I began surfing the Internet for just the right one, I spotted "Thor", a resident of the Sanilac County Humane Society in Carsonville. I knew he was the one.

I also knew that I was going to disappoint my wife.

Thor — we renamed him "Jake" was a young dog, but weighed a solid 50 or 60 pounds. He's a mix of vellow lab (labs are notorious shedders), golden retriever and huskie. Still, my wife agreed to go and take a look at him. Deb tried to steer me the kennel, but she knew it was hopeless, and I guess she didn't have the heart to tell me "no".

no idea how much the welfare of shelter animals means to those charged with caring for them. I figured we would just drop by, pick out a pet and walk out the door.

The Sanilac County Humane Society folks emphasized, in no uncertain terms, that the welfare of their animals is first and foremost in their minds, which is why the adoption process includes an application, personal and vet reference checks, and a brief interview. Whew!

We paid the \$175 adoption fee (keep in mind, we adopted a dog that had been fixed, in accordance with state law, as well as kept up-to-date on all of his shots and other medical needs). We nervously took him home, not sure what to expect, even after the experts at the shelter offered plenty of advice and encouraged us to contact them if we had any prob-

lems or questions. I bring all of this up because May 2-8 is National Pet Week, and a num-

pet gurus are suggesting a visit to an area shelter by those who are considering adding a dog to the family. These folks include Diane Pomerance, who has a Ph.D. in communications from the University of Michigan and is widely regarded as a pet expert.

In a recent article on the subject, Pomerance dispelled a number of myths about adopting shelter pets, including: most shelter dogs are sick or aggressive from abuse, pet shop dogs are better quality animals, and most of the dogs that

are euthanized wouldn't make good pets anyway.

Simply not true, according to Pomerance, who says the truth is that shelter pets aren't "damaged goods" and improve the quality of our lives.

"We should also realize that getting a family pet should not be a decision or choice that is taken lightly. You're not buying a car or getting a new electronic toy to play with," she says. "These are living, breathing, loving creatures with whom we share our world."

impact of current Medicaid reimbursement rates by offering the subcommittee several statistics.

"Our annual total cost of operations is approximately \$19 million, so we would be considered a pretty small hospital," he noted. "For our fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, 2008, the percentage of our patients that were Medicaid beneficiaries was 12.8 percent. Our total cost to treat those beneficiaries was \$2.65 million. We were paid \$880,000 by Medicaid. That represented more than \$1.7 million less than our cost of treatment. We sustained an \$850,000 operating loss for the year."

The next year, Falatko continued, the Cass City hospital's percentage of Medicaid patients increased to 14.1 percent, and the total cost to treat those patients was \$2.85 million, while Medicaid reimbursements added up to only \$736,000.

So far this year, the percentage of Medicaid patients is 16.8 percent, according to Falatko, who pointed out that the hospital's Medicaid reimbursement rate was cut by 8 percent this year.

"I anticipate that the loss on our cost of treatment will exceed \$2.6 million," he told the subcommittee. 'That will compound our operating loss for the year. This financial trajectory is absolutely unsustainable."

Falatko said the state's ongoing recession has created a glut of caregivers, making it possible for the hospital to sustain the layoffs and get by with per diem workers. However, recession eases.

Her name was Mrs. Lee. She was my preschool teacher, but to me she was an archaeologist extraordinaire.

I mean, what preschool teacher would take their class on an excavating trip to their own backyard? None, I was sure, and so I came to regard her as a scientist, an expert on finding dinosaur fossils.

My classmates and I were so excited to go on this excavating trip with her THE CASS CITY High School Science Team placed first in that we didn't even question whether undiscovered fossils could really have been at her house for thousands of years.

This week is teacher appreciation week, so as I reflected about my own experiences with teachers, I asked students about their unique memories of their teachers, whether these memories taught them a lesson or have just stuck in their minds over the years.

Vicki Spencer, a junior, said, "Mr. Walker's class really sticks out in my mind. My friend Kendra and I made a rap and got to sing it to the class; he showed us respect and talked with us about anything.'

I do not know where she is now, or if she is even still a teacher. Nor do I believe she would expect me to remember such a field trip so long ago, one









May 11 the deadline for candidates

Secretary of State Terri Lynn Land reminds candidates for federal, state and local offices that 4 p.m. Tuesday, May 11, is the filing deadline to qualify for the Aug. 3 primary ballot.

"Many people have already made the commitment to pursue elective office in order to serve their communities," said Land, Michigan's chief elections officer. "Our democracy thrives on those who stand up and get involved. For those who have not yet filed for office but are considering it, I encourage you to do so quickly, as time is running short."

The deadline applies to partisan candidates for governor, U.S. House, state House and state Senate, and county and township offices. Precinct delegate candidates are also required to file by May 11. It does not include judicial candidates, write-ins, or candidates without political party affiliation, who file under different time frames. Candidates have until 4 p.m. on May 14 to withdraw their names.

Candidates for the township offices that will be filled this year file with the township clerk. Candidates for the county offices that will be filled this year file with the county clerk.

Candidates for the state Senate, state House of Representatives or the U.S. House of Representatives, whose district is wholly contained in one county, file with the county clerk. Candidates for governor and those state Senate, state House and U.S. House candidates whose districts fall in more than one county file at the Bureau of Elections in

All candidates must file Affidavit of Identity forms, which can be obtained from any local clerk or the Bureau of Elections. They also are available on the Department of State website at www.Michigan.gov/sos.


