"We do not want this program to end. Instead, we are looking at this as an opportunity to grow and provide even more services. We know God has a bigger plan and we are willing to do as He leads," she added.

Hanson: beware of mail, phone scams

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson is warning area residents to beware of a variety of mail and phone scams that have been reported to his department over the past 3 weeks.

"All of the cases could have been avoided if the victims would have recog-

nized that they were scams," Hanson said. "Examples of these are where one county resident was told that she had won a car along with cash," he added. "In order to get it, they had to send a fee. They sent \$700 in the form of a money gram to an address in Texas. They actually did this twice. They went back a third time and were told by store personnel where they were getting their money gram that it probably was a fraud. Just like that, they were out \$1,400."

Hanson cited other examples, including scams involving the sales of cars on Craig's list.

"One county resident paid \$4,000 for a pickup that never showed, and another individual bought an ORV that never came," he said.

"It's just this simple; if it sounds too good to be true, it more than likely is," the sheriff continued. "Before you become a victim of a mail or phone scam, make sure you have good verification on who you are dealing with.

"Our suspicion is that there are a lot more cases out there like these that we are unaware of," he said. "We believe this to be because the victim just was too embarrassed to report it. The unfortunate reality of these situations is we, as in law enforcement, can do very little to recoup money that has been sent to other states.'

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
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


Dales celebrate 50th wedding anniversary



Dear Mr. Little --it's not your fault

This year's Freedom Festival parade in Cass City left a bad taste in the mouths of some area residents, who took offense at the Colwood Bar's float, featuring a pair of scantily-clad women dancing in a champagne glass.

One mother voiced her displeasure in a "letter to the editor" in last week's issue of the Chronicle, and we don't blame her. No parent should have to be concerned about what their children might see during a family-oriented parade/festival.

Unfortunately, the criticism, while warranted, prompted festival parade Director Richard Little to tender his resignation last week.

We think that's a big mistake.

The truth is, Mr. Little had no idea the float would appear as it did (see his "letter to the editor" on this page). And, by the time he was made aware of it, the parade was already underway.

Mr. Little's contributions to Cass City reach far beyond organizing a huge parade, a thankless job if there ever was one.

Need an example? Richard Little's fingerprints can be found on a number of positive projects in the village, including our impressive war memorial located just west of the municipal building. Little took on the fundraising and planning for the project, and even helped with the construction. Since then, he has cared for the landscaping, ensuring visitors to our community view a memorial that stands for respect and love of the men and women who have served our country.

Little has also devoted a lifetime to the Boy Scouts of America. An Eagle Scout, he served as a scoutmaster for 40 years, earning the coveted Vigil Honor in 2001 along with the Silver Beaver award.

So, Mr. Little, please don't resign.

Volunteers like yourself are hard to come by. This community appreciates your efforts, and should not blame you for something you had little control over. This incident will be forgotten in a matter of days, unlike your contributions to our community, which will be remembered for years to come.

We encourage other members of our town to personally share that same message with Mr. Little.

Circuit court news

Several charged with felonies

Tuscola County Circuit Court last week on various criminal charges:

•John R. Smith, 38, Marlette, was sentenced to 3 years and 9 months to 15 years in prison for his plea of guilty to falsely reporting a felony (carjacking/unlawfully driving away an automobile) Sept. 17, 2007, in Dayton Township. He was also convicted of being an habitual offender (3 or more prior felony convictions).

In addition to prison time, he was ordered to pay court costs and fines totaling \$628 plus restitution of \$1,416.40.

•Michael Robert-Lee Ernst, 20, Cass City, received a one-year delayed sentence for his plea of guilty receiving and concealing stolen property valued at more than \$1,000 in June 2009 in Caro.

He was ordered to pay \$1,228 in costs and fines.

•Nathaniel G. Brock, 23, Akron, was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail for his plea of no contest to breaking and entering - illegal entry without permission March 17 in Wisner Township.

He was also ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$200.

•Scott F. Hall, 46, Fairgrove, stood mute to charges of possession of a controlled substance, subsequent offense, and possession of marijuana, subsequent offense, June 17 in Fairgrove Township. He is also charged with being an habitual offender (one prior felony convic-

A pre-trial hearing was ordered scheduled in the case and bond was continued at \$2,000.

•Robin S. Powser, 49, Fostoria, pleaded guilty to interfering with electronic communications and assault or assault and battery June 16 in Watertown Township.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered in the case and bond was continued at \$3,000. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

• James R. Sanger, 49, Mayville, stood mute to a charge of violating the Sex Offenders Registration Act by failure to provide local law enforcement with a correct address before leaving prison May 15 in Fremont Township. He is also charged with being an habitual offender (2 prior felony convictions).





Clay started showing when he was 10 and is in the senior division for steers and lambs and intermediate division for feeders.

start showing, the (showing) rules were changed and I had to wait until I was 10," Clay said.

He hopes to get into the senior division for pigs this year.

At last year's fair, Quinn won Champion Homebred honors for her 1,310-pound steer, which was purchased for \$1,500.

Clay's 1,295-pound steer sold for \$2,000 and he won Reserve Champion Beef and Champion Intermediate Showman honors.

Both Quinn and Clay decided to become involved with 4-H because they were always around steers. Once they started going to shows and saw the other animals, they knew it was something they wanted to start doing.

Quinn and Clay's favorite part about being in 4-H is meeting all the people at the shows and the competitiveness that everyone brings.

Clay said there is a lot of work that goes into taking care of and maintaining the animals to prep them for

"(We) wash them every day to grow their hair and keep them clean and get up every morning to feed them,"

Quinn added she exercises the lambs by running laps with them around the yard.

"The lambs got heavy, we have to manage weight and feed them correctly," Quinn explained.

Clay said they also spend time during the day working with the feeders to make them tame and better steers.

Both Quinn and Clay said that at times it can be frustrating when the animals are non-cooperative, but they love what they do and have fun at the shows.

"If 'not wanting to do it anymore' ever crossed our minds, it changes once we are with our animals and at shows," Quinn said.

Quinn and Clay's father, Greg Daily, helps with maintaining the barns and animals, but said his kids do a lot of the work as well.

"Being in 4-H has taught them responsibility, being self-sufficient, work ethics and being independent," He added sometimes Quinn and

"When they need each other, they are there," Greg said

Greg, who was in 4-H for about 15 years, said there is one misconception about having a family in 4-H.


