Crop outlook good, in spite of new bug

Overall, the weather has been generally good for crops this season, but extension officials say a new bug might be a threat to the crops.

Bob Battel, MSU Extension field crop educator for Huron County said he has been monitoring the Western Bean Cutworm, which has been found in isolated parts of Huron and Tuscola counties.

"The corn is advanced enough so it won't affect the quality," Battel said, and added the cutworm could still affect the dry beans.

The Western Bean cutworm, a moth, made its appearance in 2006 and can be found in greater amounts in western counties such as Isabella and Gratiot counties.

"(They move) one tier of a county per year," Battel said.

He added they have traps for monitoring the moth, and plan to keep watching them next year.

Battle advised farmers to pay attention and look for damage on the podded dry beans and spray if necessary.

As for the weather, Battel said for the most part crops are doing well. Martin Nagelkirk, extension educator for Sanilac County, said the crops in his county are similar to the crops

in Tuscola County. Nagelkirk added the warmer temperatures and higher rainfall helped area codes are 809, 284 and 876. the crops grow ahead of schedule.

Because of the weather in June, Battel said it really affected the dry bean crop and they had to be re-

"It never really dried out," Battel explained. "There was root rot and they were not being re-planted in

ideal conditions. It was not a good combination and the dry beans will not recover.'

He added some of the corn in eastern Huron County also was hurt by the wet June.

"If you take out June, planting was great," Battel said.

Nagelkrik said the sugar beats, corn, soybeans and dry beans all look very good in Sanilac County.

"Yield was good and quality was mostly good," he added. In Huron County, other crops are looking good, such as the corn, Battel noted that they are way ahead

of schedule. Battel also said the soybeans are in their podding stages and will have a good crop as well.

Judy Hoelzle ends her lengthy teaching career

After years in the classroom, Judy Hoelzle will tell you she learned to measure her success as an educator not just by watching her students successfully hone their artistic skills, realize something about themselves that even they didn't know.

"I enjoy students who love art, and students when they don't know they love art, but discover they do," she

Hoelzle recently walked out of her classroom at Cass City High School for the last time, having made the decision to retire after 23 1/2 years of teaching, including more than 15 years in Cass City.



Councilman Richards' advice on the mark

There's no denying that swimming pools may endanger public safety unless carefully regulated and supervised. It was that reasoning in 1968 that led Cass City officials to draft an ordinance geared towards protecting our youth.

We see nothing wrong with efforts to keep our youngsters from harm's way. Nor do we fault current village officers for upholding the law. Failure to take action, says Village Manager Peter Cristiano, could result in jail time for the guilty.

When the Cass City Village Council was addressed by a frustrated citizen last month during its regular monthly meeting - claiming her family received a letter bringing to their attention necessary actions to take regarding a private swimming pool in their back yard being up to code - Cristiano was quick to respond.

That's been Cristiano's nature, both good and bad, since arriving 5 years ago.

On the plus side, his go-getter personality has led to many businesses that have either opened, expanded or relocated in town because of his persistence, which often came at a fast and steady pace.

Among the feathers in Cristiano's cap is helping to secure the opening of the Excel Group call center, Nick's Country Oven, the Busy Bees Child Care Center, VIP Salon and Cass City Antique Mall to name *just a few of the businesses who have spent thousands* of dollars to set up shop in Cass City.

However, there are often times when Cristiano's persona allows him to get defensive, usually when the actions under his leadership are questioned. That seemed to be the case during last week's citizen forum at the village council gathering when he challenged some of the dollar figures presented by the resident to obtain building and operation permits required to legally use a pool in town.

Although we believe with Cristiano's job title, the positives of possessing a Type A personality far outweigh the negatives, it was the advice of village council board member Donald Richards that impressed us

He told the city dweller that the rules in the ordinance aren't etched in stone and that, perhaps, it would be a good time to review the regulations.

Richards' suggestion led to meetings between the citizen and chief of police Craig Haynes. Together, they proposed some changes to be made to the village ordinance, which is now over 40 years old.

One thing that won't change with the ordinance, however, is keeping the well being of others at the forefront.

It's like the old minister used to say, "Don't be too quick to confess your sins. If you're that bad, everyone already knows about

My lack of training explains my difficulty writing good leads for stories. The famous writer, James Thurber, described a similar defect in a classmate of his.

Thurber's classmate, an agriculture student, had a terrible time coming up with anything interesting to write about. In desperation, his journalism professor sent him over to the university horse barns to dig something up.

The professor's instructions were, "This university owns more horses than any other school in the Big Ten. Now get over there and find something interesting — and I want to see a catchy lead this time!"

The ag student did as he was told. He soon returned with a hot story about a disease that was causing blisters on the backs of horses in the university herd. His story began, "Has anybody noticed the horses' backs lately?"

So what's wrong with that? It reminds me of the frogs around my house. Has anybody noticed there's a ton of frogs around my house?

It seems a person can confess I never took a hardly pick up a magazine or newspaper these days without reading about the demise of the frogs. They're going extinct, growing extra legs, jump-

ing sideways. Somebody needs to tell my frogs they are going extinct. These frogs are reproducing like crazy, crawling under everything, and jumping straight up and down just like they always have.

My frogs have all of their appendages, too. That's because these are little. bitty tree frogs. If they were big, fat bullfrogs this might be a whole different

I was surprised to read the Tuscola County Advertiser's article about a tea party organization being granted "official party status." The last line was very revealing: "Limited information on this story was available as of press time." Mark E. Kevin L. Haley, Sr., 41, of Saginaw, died Sunday, July 25, 2010 at St. Mary's of Michigan after a brief ill-


He was born March 4, 1969 in Bad Axe, the son of Ivan and Joyce



Reporter's notebook

I won't forget this note any time soon

Although I've heard plenty of criticism over the years regarding how I handled this story or that story, I occasionally receive a note from someone who really appreciated an article or column we've published.

But I can't remember receiving a more heartfelt letter than the one emailed to me recently by a career U.S. Army veteran, formerly of Cass City and now living in Greece.

Richard Nolan wrote to say he was attending a memorial this summer in Gagetown for his brother, the late-Hank Nolan of Cass City, when he had the opportunity to see a column I had written about Hank. I came to know Hank during our 23 years of being next-door neighbors, and his sudden death last fall came as a real

Now, Hank wasn't a typical neighbor — in a nutshell, he may have lacked in the social graces and paid little attention to the junk accumulating in his yard over the years — but he was, simply, one of the nicest individuals I've ever known. And I came to know him fairly well during our regular visits on long summer evenings, standing in our front yards, shooting the breeze.

Hank looked like the stereotypical motorcycle gang member, but his quick sense of humor, down-to-earth personality and willingness to lend a hand to anyone defied his appear-

"I have been away from Cass City since 1975 and have lived all over the world," Richard Nolan wrote. "Your tribute to my brother brought tears to my eyes. While I knew Hank mostly from afar, it was nice to hear what an impression he had

made on his neighbors.

"One hopes that their siblings were special people to others and, in Hank's case, he obviously was.

"I have spent my entire adult life working for the U.S. Army in some way, shape or form, and Hank once told me how much he respected my decision of how to spend my life,' Nolan continued. "I only wish that I could have known him in the ways that you knew him, but your words told me all that I needed to know about my big brother, Hank, and his big heart."

I understand that some folks might be quick to think I wrote that column in hopes of getting a pat on the back. But the truth is, I wrote it for selfish

You see, Hank died at home after suffering a massive heart attack. What gnawed at me most in the days that followed his passing is that he died alone. No one should die alone, and writing about the laughter and examples of humanity he brought into my life was wonderful therapy. It also opened the door to conversations with other area residents who also knew the man and felt the same

I guess the most important lesson here is that you really never know when something you say, write or do might touch another life.

Hank's brother thanked me for writing about his brother, but I'm the one who's thankful, first for the opportunity to know Hank, and secondly for having the ability to put into words what Richard Nolan already knew: that Hank was a great, big brother.

Like many other folks, there are days when I hate my job, and then there are days when I receive a note like the one Richard Nolan sent me. Sort of makes it all worthwhile.


