Fall bittersweet for veteran teacher, now in retirement

It's been a bittersweet fall for Linda Rose.

For the first time in more than 3 decades, Rose has watched a new school year get underway without stepping into a classroom.

"It's been hard," confided Rose, whose career in education spanned 33 years -32 in the Cass City Public Schools, including 27 years as a first grade teacher. "It's just been my life, as an adult. It's been my life, being with kids. And I miss the camaraderie with the staff. They've been wonderful to work with."

A Davison native, Rose moved to the Thumb area with her husband, John, when she was hired to teach at the former Evergreen Elementary School in 1978.

"He said he'd do anything but sell cars, and he ended up selling cars in Sandusky," recalled Rose, a Sandusky resident who worked as a substitute teacher in Davison and Millington before accepting the position at Evergreen. "He's now a financial broker. He has his own business.'

degree in elementary education at Spring Arbor College, now Spring Arbor University, taught kindergarten as well as grades one, 2 and 3 at Evergreen through 1986. She then split her days teaching

kindergarten at Evergreen and the former Deford elementary schools until 1990, when she took on a first grade classroom at Deford.

After school officials closed the building, she set up shop in a first grade classroom at Campbell Elementary School in Cass City, where she remained until her retirement last spring.

Rose said she decided on a teaching career while she was in college. It was a natural choice in many ways. "I toyed with it a few years, but my grandmother was a teacher and principal, my parents were teachers, my aunts and uncles were teachers," she added. "I kind of grew up with it, but I also felt the need to help children, and I could see how my parents were making changes in kids' lives. I thought I could be a positive influence on children's lives."

Rose says her choice of careers was a wise one for her, because she so

Rose, who earned her bachelor's enjoyed working with youngsters. At that age, she noted, they're very honest and not shy about expressing themselves.

"I think that's what I'll miss the most, talking with them, being with them. Every day you would go home with a chuckle," she said.

"In first grade, I loved seeing them develop as readers, and (listening to) the questions they had about life in general, and I wanted them to be somewhat independent in their thinking, finding the answers themselves," Rose continued. She smiled and added, "They come in very dependent and leave thinking they know everything."

Among Rose's priorities in retirement are spending more time with her family, including her parents, who reside in Davison and Florida.

She and her husband also have 3 sons. The oldest, Kristopher, and his wife, Carrie, have a 4-year-old son, Winston, and live in Colorado, although Kristopher is currently serving his third tour of duty overseas, in Afghanistan. The news wasn't good — the Cass City Public Schools lost another 46 students. However, during the same period a year earlier, the district lost more than twice as many kids, 94 in all. "So if you look at the numbers, we've cut our decline in half," Hartel noted.

And, he pointed out, "We already we were going to lose that many kids."

Cass City isn't alone in facing the challenge of an exodus of students, but the local school system has suffered a significant decline in student numbers in recent years.

In fact, while each of Tuscola County's 9 public school districts lost students between the fall of 2007 officials reported an enrollment of and February 2010, Cass City's loss

In Cass City's case, the decline over the past 4 years as added up to 15 percent of the district's enrollment.

As for last week's bi-annual statewide count, Cass City's enrollment totaled 1,163 students, with 432 at Campbell Elementary School, 316 at the middle school and 415 at the high school.

In other area schools:

Supporting airport benefits everyone

The Cass City Village Council last week approved an annual financial allocation to help support the Tuscola Area Airport Authority, but the contribution roughly \$9,300 this year — wasn't supported by all.

Both council Trustee Don Richards and Cass City resident Ray Donaldson questioned the local contribution, indicating they don't believe the village is getting its money's worth.

However, we wonder if Mr. Richards and Mr. Donaldson have really done their homework on this issue.

Don't get us wrong. Questioning the use of taxpayer dollars is every citizen's right and responsibility. But criticism backed up with more emotion and hearsay than fact is a waste of time at best, destructive at worst.

So, what are Cass City residents getting in exchange for the village's annual payments to help support the airport?

For starters, area citizens' dollars are going to help maintain and improve a facility that provides countless economic benefits by serving area businesses that depend on air service for speedy delivery of materials and personnel they need to do business, as well as convenient access to Tuscola County by their customers. In turn, these companies are able to remain viable and even expand, strengthening the county's economic base with jobs and money spent locally.

County businesses that depend on the airport in Caro include UPS in Cass City (yes, Mr. Donaldson, UPS, which utilizes a courier service to fly in packages for delivery every Saturday), Marshall Distributing, Walbro Engine Management, Michigan Sugar Company, etc. And the list goes on.

Task force collects 38 pounds of pills

Sanilac County Drug Task Force officials say a recent, collaborative effort between the drug team and the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) to collect old pharmaceutical medications was a huge success.

"(It surpassed) all expectations of drugs that would be collected in Sanilac County," said drug task force Director Bill Gray, who noted officers accepted old/outdated medications at 4 different collection sites in the county.

"The national Controlled Substance Take-Back Initiative provided an opportunity for the public to get rid of pharmaceutical controlled substances and other medications for safe destruction by law enforcement officers,'

"There was no prior experience in this first-time collection on which to gauge how well utilized this program would be," he said.

'In Sanilac County we collected 6, 30-gallon trash bags of bottled prescription medicines. Once the pills were removed from the bottle containers, the bulk weight of the pills without the containers was 38 pounds," Gray added. "That is 38 pounds of prescription medications that will not be flushed down the toilets into our groundwater or water treatment systems. That is 38 pounds of prescription medications that will not be going to our landfills.

"The one-day collection effort was so successful that the Sanilac County Drug Task Force feels that there appears to be a real public need for a longterm collection effort. The Sanilac County Drug Task Force is currently studying the feasibility of future establishment of a 24/7 collection site for use by the public to turn in outdated prescription medications," Gray said.

Summary of the proposed amendment:

The proposed amendments below are meant to strengthen the site plan review process in Cass City.

Section 46-485. Site Plan Review.

(a) The purpose of site plan review with the Planning Commission is to determine compliance with the provisions of this Zoning Ordinance, to promote the orderly development of the Village, to prevent the depreciation of land value because of uses or structures which do not give proper attention to siting or area protection, and to provide consultation and cooperation between applicants and the Planning Commission so that applicants may accomplish their objectives in the utilization of their land in conformity with the provisions of this Zoning Ordinance. (b) A site plan shall be submitted to the planning commission for approval for any use requiring offstreet parking, except one-family residential dwellings

(c) An application for site plan review shall be made by filing the application form, required information, and the required fee, including any fees to be deposited in an escrow account, with the Zoning Administrator. Once deemed complete, the Zoning Administrator shall forward the application and fee to the Clerk. Such fees are necessary to pay for professional services related to site plan review, engineering reviews, and staffing planning commission meetings. The application fee and any additional fees to be deposited in an escrow account to pay for professional planning and engineering services shall be set by resolution of the Cass City Village Council. (d) The following information shall be included on the site plan:

(1) Applicant and/or owner's names, addresses and telephone numbers.

(2) Professional seal of architect, engineer, surveyor, landscape architect, or planner, and their name and address, phone number and e-mail if available.

(3) Scale, north arrow, date of plan preparation, and date of each revision. Sheet size shall be at least 24"x 36" with plan view drawn to a scale of no greater than $1^{*}=50^{\circ}$ for property less than three (3) acres or no greater than $1^{*}=100^{\circ}$ for property three (3) or more acres.

(4) Vicinity/locational map drawn at a scale of 1"= 2,000' with north point indicated.

(5) Location of existing and proposed lot lines, including dimensions, gross and net acreage figures, and zoning classification of the site.

(6) Adjacent land uses, property owners, zoning and location of adjacent buildings or structures, property lines, rights of ways, abutting streets, drives, curb cuts, and access easement, and parking within one hundred (100) feet of subject property.

(7) Location and dimensions of existing and proposed buildings/structures; including intended uses, floor area, number of floors, width, length, height, number and type

of dwelling units (where applicable), and setback distances.

(8) Existing natural and man-made features to be retained and/or removed.

(9) Location of existing and proposed water bodies, watercourses, including County and Village drains, man-made surface drainage ways, floodplains and wetlands.

(10) The location of all existing and proposed access drives, street intersections, driveway locations, sidewalks, bike paths, curbing, and other walkways associated with the site, including general alignment, right of way, surface type, width and centerline.

(11) Location, number and size of parking spaces, including width and method of surfacing, dimensions of spaces and aisles, acceleration, deceleration and passing lanes and approaches.

(12) Proposed phasing of project.

(13) The location of all accessory structures, including light poles, flagpoles, storage sheds, transformers, dumpsters, including method of screening.

(14) Detailed signage and lighting plans, including locations and illumination patterns,

for both existing and proposed parking lots and structures.

(15) A landscape plan indicating the location, type and quantity of plant materials both existing and proposed. The location and description of all existing berms, fencing, walls, and other screening provisions.

(16) Location of outdoor storage/display areas including a description of the items to be located outdoors, as well as the location and description of required screening.

(17) Loading and unloading areas for commercial and industrial developments.

(18) Storage and containment areas, if the use of hazardous substances is involved.

(19) Location and size of all existing and proposed utility services above and below ground, to include water, electric, gas, phone, cable, storm water, storm sewer, catch basins, and fire hydrants.

- (20) Location and width of any easements (utility and other wise) on the site.
- (21) Designation of fire lanes.
- (22) Any other pertinent physical features.

(23) Existing topography with a maximum contour interval of two (2) feet. Topography on the site and beyond the site for a distance of one hundred (100) feet in all directions should be indicated. Grading plan, showing finished contours at a

maximum interval of two (2) feet, correlated with existing contours so as to clearly indicate required cutting, filling, grading, and the direction of drainage. Any other items as deemed necessary by the Zoning Administrator in order to ensure that the proposed development is in compliance with this Zoning Ordinance and other Village ordinances, as well as State and Federal e) Site Plan Review Procedure

(1) Once the application and fee are forwarded to the Clerk by the Zoning Administrator, the Zoning Administrator shall preliminarily review the submitted site plan for completeness. In the event that the site plan is not considered complete, the applicant shall be informed that the site plan needs to be updated and complete prior to review with the Planning Commission.

(2) At the next regularly scheduled meeting, Planning Commission shall review the site plan for conformance to the standards and requirements set forth in this Chapter.

- (3) Following its review of the proposed site plan, the Planning Commission shall take one of the following actions:
 - a. Approve the site plan if it is found to satisfy the requirements of this Zoning Ordinance.

b. Place conditions on the site plan approval to ensure that it satisfies the requirements of this Zoning Ordinance.

c. Deny the site plan if it is found that the proposed site plan fails to satisfy the requirements of this Zoning Ordinance. In the event of denial, the applicant shall be informed of the decision in writing, with the reasons for denial contained in the letter.

(4) The Planning Commission shall generally render its decision within 30 days from the date the application was received by the Zoning Administrator. The 30 day time period may be extended by the mutual consent between the applicant and the Planning Commission. (f) The Planning Commission shall review the site plan for compliance with the requirements of this Zoning Ordinance and conformity to the following general standards:

(1) All elements of the site plan shall be harmoniously and efficiently organized in relation to topography, the size and type of the lot, the character of adjoining property and the size and type of buildings. The site shall be developed so as not to impede the normal and orderly development or improvement of surrounding property for uses permitted in this Zoning Ordinance.

(2) The landscape shall be preserved in its natural state, insofar as practical, by minimizing tree and soil removal and by topographic modifications, which result in maximum harmony with adjacent areas. (3) All storm water shall be given to proper site drainage such that the controlled release of storm waters will not adversely affect
