Need for foster parents great

Jim Turner would remind the neglected children he dealt with so many times that they deserve to grow up as healthy and happy as possible, it almost became a mantra for him. For Turner, a Cass City resident who worked for the Department of Human Services (DHS) for 40 years and retired in December, it was important that someone reminded the children of their value, even when they felt they had none. “We have a responsibility as a society, as the representatives of

Michigan, (to say) we will take care of you,” Turner said of the youngsters DHS officials come into contact with on a daily basis. When it comes to foster parents and adoptive parents, there will always be a need, because there will always be children who are in need of a safe space to call home — even if it is for a little while — Turner emphasized. “It takes a special person or couple and a family (to foster and adopt), because when you bring other people’s children into your home, you bring their family systems into your home,” he explained. In Tuscola County alone, there are

51 foster homes. These homes could include a single parent or a couple, according to Tuscola County DHS officials. In Huron County, there are 6 foster homes. Because of confidentiality regulations, Tuscola DHS employees declined to be identified. Turner said there is an even greater number of foster children and adoptive children in need of services these days. “Over the last several years, adoptive/foster parents have increased because more parents are getting Please turn to page 8.

Resignation letters point to disrespect

The 3 Owen-Gage Board of Education members who recently resigned all voted against hiring former Bad Axe School Supt. Jim Wencel as Owen-Gage’s new, part-time superintendent. But those same board members say board unity — or rather a decided lack of it — and disrespectful behavior on the part of another board member is what prompted them all to tender their resignations earlier this month. The remaining 4 members of the school board, including Julie Good, who was appointed to fill a vacancy in early July following the resignation of then-board President Terry Muntz, last week voted unanimously

to accept “with regret” the resignations of former acting board President Kathy Champagne, board Secretary Loretta Schmidt and Trustee Mike Mandich. “(They) had some objections to what the public, what the staff and what the board had set as the administrative alignment for the 2011-12 school year — a part-time superintendent and a full-time principal,” former interim, part-time Owen-Gage Supt. Bob Drury said at the time. However, Mandich said the resignations had nothing to do with the proposed administrative alignment, Drury or the hiring of Wencel. “Based on observations made during the last year, it is obvious to me that some board members and mem- Please turn to page 8.

Election commission okays recall wording

If 2 Michigan men have their way, area voters will decide whether or not a pair of newly-elected lawmakers will remain in office. Tuscola County Clerk Margie White recently announced that the Tuscola County Election Commission has approved the recall wording filed against state Senator Mike Green (R-Mayville) by Omer resident Paul M. Piche. The Huron County Election Commission earlier this month approved the petition language in a

Pigeon man’s second attempt to recall state Rep. Kurt Damrow (R-Port Austin). Green, a former Tuscola County commissioner and state representative, is serving his first term as a senator, representing Arenac, Bay, Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties. In Piche’s first recall petition, the Arenac County man cited Green’s vote in favor of HB 4361, which he stated will “grant a tax reduction of up to \$1.8 billion per year to Michigan businesses while at the same time imposing an estimated \$330 million per year in new taxes Please turn to page 6.



Great test scores? It's not an accident

The Cass City Public Schools lost 60 more students this past year, and the only explanation we can come up with for the continued exodus of kids in recent years is the fact that so many families have left our small community.

We don't blame them — many have moved in hopes of finding greener employment pastures as Michigan's economy continues to struggle.

However, we're certain our local school system is not to blame.

In fact, Cass City's teachers, administrators and support staffers have excelled above and beyond the call of duty in and out of the classroom.

Not a small feat given our lawmakers' tendency to dump one unfunded mandate after another on public school officials throughout the state.

Any resident who doubts Cass City's record should check out the Michigan Merit Exam (MME) test scores recently posted by the Michigan Department of Education. Still in doubt? Look at the latest Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) scores of our kids.

Cass City students are clearly out-performing their fellow students throughout Tuscola County and beyond.

Case closed. The numbers say it all. Cass City High School juniors last spring marked the highest scores in every category in the county.

Here's what is most important: it was no accident.

Our students are achieving because our teachers, grades K through 12, are effective in the classroom. Let's face it, if a kindergarten student isn't learning what he or she should at that level, how can they move on to the next level and enjoy continued success? And so on, and so on.

Also vital is the fact that Cass City School officials are regularly monitoring the kids' progress through assessment testing 3 times a year, enabling them to intervene when a student is struggling and get them back on track.

Cass City Supt. Jeff Hartel probably said it best: "We know where every kid's strengths and weaknesses are, and we can do something about it."

Which is why the loss of some students to neighboring districts via Schools of Choice stymies us a bit.

Certainly, academic performance should be a priority in the mind of any parent, right? And it's difficult to believe that the range of curriculum here is unacceptable, considering the options available to students via the Tuscola Intermediate School District (TISD), cooperative agreements with area colleges, and learning opportunities utilizing the Internet.

We realize a number of area folks home school their children, but even those kids have the option of taking advantage of elective classes in the school district.

The bottom line is that Cass City School officials have continued to guarantee a solid education for kids here in spite of some pretty daunting financial challenges.

Parents would do well to keep that in mind when selecting a school for their children to attend.

Turtles on the road



Why did the turtle cross the road? This isn't one of those takes on the classic chicken jokes. My question is quite serious.

It's summer, and for our highways that means one thing besides construction zones: roadkill. We all witness our share of birds, squirrels, raccoons and deer. I've even seen - make that smelled - a dead skunk in the middle of the road. But, by and large, the unfortunate victims of late have been a different sort of critter: turtles.

I've come upon at least a dozen or so turtles, either trying to cross the road, or lying still and quiet after making what I assume was a valiant attempt to do so.

My family even encountered one instance of turtle migration up-close and personal. We found a four-inch painted turtle trying to cross the road near our lake cabin. Being the ecologically-oriented group that we are, we rescued him by carrying him back to the pond from which he came. He seemed to swim off eagerly, and we figured he'd just lost his way.

What a surprise it was the next day when we found him in exactly the same spot as we had 24 hours earlier - trying to cross a busy road. Again, we were rescuers, but this time our turtle didn't escape without a nickname. We decided to call him "Mr. Wrongway," because of his obvious lack of direction.

The third day, we didn't see Mr. Wrongway until it was too late. A car hit him, and his shell was irreparably cracked. He went from being Mr. Wrongway to Mr. Badluck, and we mourned his passing, which left us with the burning question:

Why did the turtle (try to) cross the road? After much (interesting and diverse) family discourse on the matter, we decided reptiles are not suicidal, and in nature there's only one word to describe an act that on its surface appears to be somewhat similar to a death wish: instinct.

Instinct can make us do some pretty wacky stuff. Just look at the praying mantis and black widow spider; the females eat the males after mating. There's a death wish of the worst kind.

But, back to turtles. By and large, instinct has to do with one key factor: proliferation of the species. In other words, animals do weird things so they can have babies. Still, the turtle's behavior seemed counter-intuitive. Instinct is supposed to help proliferate, not dese-

crate, a species.

I needed the truth, so I did a little research.

As it turns out, turtles do cross the road because of instinct. In early summer, they leave the comfort of their aquatic homes to seek out nesting sites to lay their eggs. This often involves crossing the hot, tarred road, which is not nearly as ancient as a turtle's egg-laying behavior. Turtles have been laying their eggs a lot longer than we've been traveling at 50 miles per hour with the windows down. In other words, instinct outdates the Interstate.

My research also told me that our Mr. Wrongway/Badluck wasn't a Mr. at all. Only female turtles lay eggs. He was a she.

Predation on turtle nests is extremely high. Even if a turtle does make it across the road (and back) there is a good chance that a predator will find - and eat - the leathery-shelled eggs hidden in the earthen nest. Despite the hazards, some turtles beat the odds and hatch from their eggs late in the summer. They are tiny and vulnerable. After a time in the nest, they emerge to (you guessed it) cross the road in search of a watery home.

And the cycle begins anew. In three or four years, they'll be ready to mate, which in turn means laying eggs, which in turn means crossing the road. Many will not make it. Some will.

Turtles have been around for thousands of years. They've faced surly predators, treacherous climates, and even hot, tarred roads. Through it all, they've persevered - slow and steady. It might not always win the race, but it certainly counts for something.

At least it does with my family. We've realized, a little too late, that things aren't always what they seem. A turtle trying to cross the road may not be headed in the wrong direction. Most likely, instinct is telling her exactly where to go. And the next time we see her plodding along, we've decided to do just one thing: help her get to the other side.

Behind the scenes, Cass City Oil & Gas Co. and Bad Axe Ferreligas each donated 100-pound propane cylinders for the instructional workout.

Another prime example - this one, on cooperative agreements to share services and thereby reduce costs, is courtesy of the Cass City and Caro parks and recreation departments.

Local Parks and Recreation Director Sam Moore says the arrangement, which allows residents from both communities to now participate at the same rates as residents of either community, is a win-win situation for both communities.

You probably didn't notice a boost in the downtown traffic over the weekend. But there's a good chance many Cass City business owners and the staff at the Helen Stevens Memorial Pool did.

Visiting town were members and fans of 11 softball teams for the annual Cass City tourney. Originator Doug Hyatt says about 40 campsites were used Saturday night in the park and on Sunday the championship game was canceled, as both teams agreed to go use the pool.

The Michigan State Police reported 4 people lost their lives, all in separate accidents, during the recent July 4th holiday weekend. In comparison, 8 people died in traffic crashes during the 2010 July 4th holiday weekend.

Sadly, alcohol was a known factor in one of the fatal crashes, and one of the 4 victims was known to have not used restraints.

Deputies nab Owendale and Elkton men in area safe theft

Security video footage foiled a pair of would-be safe crackers in Huron County last week.

Huron County Sheriff Kelly Hanson reported Colfax Township homeowner Steven L. Craig told deputies he had just returned home after being away for 50 minutes and found that his safe was missing.

"He was able to produce security video that showed 2 subjects pulling up to his residence, knocking on his door and then entering his residence. The video further shows 2 male subjects pushing his medium-sized safe out of his garage and loading it into

their vehicle," Hanson said. "The safe contained collectable coins and other valuable merchandise, which had a face value of at least \$1,500." Hanson noted that Craig recognized one of the suspects as a former employee of his.

Deputies began their search for the men and learned the first suspect resides in Owendale, according to the sheriff.

"The 20-year-old male...was located and cooperated with the deputies," he said. "His companion, a 19-year-old male from Elkton, was also identified.

"It was learned that the 2 took the safe to the state game area off of Maxwell Road in Grant Township. Apparently, the safe was too heavy to get out of the car and they had to strap it to a guardrail and pull it out of the car by pulling the car forward. They then were able to push it into the weeds."

Deputies recovered the safe and transported it back to the sheriff's department.

Hanson said his department has requested that the Huron County Prosecutor's Office authorize home invasion charges against the men.

Inmate can't outrun trooper, long-distance runner McComb

Juan T. Howell had no idea who he was trying to outrun when he attempted to escape from the Huron County Courthouse last week.

County Circuit Court. The sentenc-

ing stemmed from several home invasions in Caseville, Lake and Hume townships since 2008.

"While he was being handcuffed outside of circuit court to be taken back to our jail, he broke free from 2 deputies and fled on foot with one handcuff on," Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said.

"Once outside the south entrance of the courthouse, he continued to flee westbound past our jail, into an alley and then northbound on N. Port Crescent," Hanson said. "Close behind him was myself and Michigan State Trooper Brian McComb from the Bad Axe post. Other deputies and officers from the Bad Axe City Police quickly joined in."

After a 3-minute chase, McComb and Hanson caught up with Howell at the corner of North Heisterman and East Woodworth streets. He was then transported back to the jail and placed in a solitary holding cell.

"Howell will now be facing possible felony escape charges to be determined at a later date," Hanson said, adding he will be turned over to the Michigan Department of Corrections.

Hanson noted he had no doubt that McComb would catch up to Howell.

"Unfortunately," he explained, "prisoner Howell didn't realize that he was fleeing from a marathon runner - Trooper McComb has been training and competes in marathons."

Damrow bill toughens penalties for military funeral protestors

The Michigan House recently approved legislation refining guidelines for protest rallies at military funerals or memorials.

House Bill 4284, sponsored by Rep. Bruce Rendon, makes it a felony to engage in any conduct within 500 feet of a funeral or memorial service that intimidates, threatens or harasses someone attending the ceremony. HB 4745, sponsored by Rep. Kurt Damrow, increases the felony punishment for repeat offenders.

"Existing law raises questions about free speech, one of the most important rights our country is based on and what our fighting men and women put their lives on the line

for," said Rendon, R-Lake City. "However, family and friends also should have the right to honor and remember their loved ones with dignity, decorum and not in fear of those who show up to make a political sideshow. The legislation balances protection for both sides."

Rendon's legislation also makes it a felony to engage in conduct intended to incite or produce an imminent breach of the peace; disrupt the funeral or memorial service; or intentionally obstruct, hinder, impede, or block entry to or exit from a funeral or memorial service.

The Damrow bill revises sentencing guidelines so a first offense is still punishable by a 2-year maximum prison term, but additional offenses carry a four-year maximum term of imprisonment.

"These revisions take into consideration our foundation of free speech, while making sure that anyone who considers intentionally targeting families and interfering with their right to grieve knows this is a serious offense," said Damrow (R-Port Austin).

HBs 4284 and 4745 now go to the Senate for consideration.

Even though he might be shy with outsiders, when interacting with the people he knows he is very outgoing.


When going into a party he makes sure everybody knows he is there also.

upon the pensions of some Michigan residents. His vote also reduced the earned income tax credit provided to some working families by 66 percent."

Piche subsequently filed another recall petition with the wording,

"While serving in the Michigan Senate on May 12, 2011, Senator Mike Green voted yes on Michigan House Bill 4361 (S-5) as amended.

Based on the votes cast in last November's general election, White said, Piche will need to collect a minimum of 22,229 signatures for his recall petition.

In Huron County, meanwhile, county election commission officials have approved revised recall language submitted by Jack Jensen, Pigeon, who hopes to collect enough signature (a minimum of 7,679) to allow area voters the opportunity to unseat Damrow.

In his petition, Jensen stated he wants Damrow removed from office for voting in favor of legislation in the House and final House-Senate agreements "that can negatively affect families, senior citizens,

schools and local governments of the 84th District."

Jensen claims the legislation does the following:

- Imposes cuts to K-12 per-student funding.
- Expands the power of emergency financial managers in municipalities and schools.
- Replaces the earned income tax credit with a \$25-per-child payment to low-income parents.
- Imposes state taxes upon retiree pensions and reduces the homestead property tax credit.
- Eliminates the small business tax and limits the corporate income tax to 6 percent.

Damrow is serving his first year as the 84th District state representative. The district is comprised of Tuscola and Huron counties.

MDCH: get measles shot

The Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) is advising Michigan residents to get the measles vaccine now that there are more cases of the highly contagious disease reported in the country this year than any time since 1996.

"This is especially important for persons planning international travel, because the current U.S. situation is largely the result of measles outbreaks occurring elsewhere in the world," said Dean Sienko, M.D., M.S., acting chief medical executive, MDCH. "But it's also important that non-travelers be protected. We have to keep our guard up against measles by having as many of our citizens protected as possible. This is an easily preventable disease."

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), there have been more than 150 cases reported so far. In a typical year, there are about 50 cases. Cases have appeared in more than 20 states, and in some instances outbreaks have resulted. So far, there has been one case in Michigan.

Measles is very easily transmitted. The virus spreads to others when an infected person sneezes or coughs. A person is contagious before the


characteristic rash appears. It can spread through very casual and brief contact. But this year health officials are especially worried. They have been tracking large outbreaks of measles in several European countries as well as parts of Africa and Asia.

Most of the cases in the U.S. have been traced to travel or other connections in those areas. Since summer is a traditional travel season, officials say there are more opportunities for measles virus to be brought into the U.S.

Symptoms include a high fever, eye inflammation, a cough, and a runny nose, followed by an extensive rash. It takes about 2 weeks for symptoms to develop, and the ill person can spread the measles virus to others from 4 days before the rash appears to four days after. Some people can get much sicker from measles and may be hospitalized with pneumonia or, rarely, encephalitis.

All children routinely are vaccinated against the disease, receiving 2 doses by the time they start kindergarten. However, some may miss or delay measles vaccination. Adults must be sure they are vaccinated, also.

was Erika Mroz named to the all-conference second team infield and Lacie Prich who earned honorable mention praises.





their rights terminated," he said. He noted one major factor behind more children and teens being placed into the system is because of the economy, low employment and a slower recovery.

"Low income creates more stress on the family, and now you've got most likely the male who was employed (but now) isn't employed and there is more stress between the partners, spouses and the kids — all that kind of thing," he said.

What follows mostly are spousal issues involving neglect, he said.

"If you don't have money, things are going to get cut and some people make poor decisions and put their children in jeopardy," he added.

In terms of need for foster care, most of the time there is going to be a greater need for older kids, according to Turner. "Let's face it, younger, cute kids are more desirable, and usually more families and individuals are willing to take the little child (or) babies."

Nowadays there is a pretty slim chance that foster parents will be able to take in babies, but Turner said one never really knows.

"That could change because all of a sudden we might have babies who come into care," he said.

Older children and teenagers could be less desirable because older teens can be more difficult to deal with, he said.

"You can understand why," he continued. "They are going to be older, physically they are bigger, you are going to have more to deal with and, if that child comes into your home, they are going to have issues."

With the courts, every county has a different mentality and perspective on adoptive/foster issues. "Each county has a different judge and prosecutor and that can make a difference," he said.

In rural areas such as Tuscola and Huron counties, Turner said the expectations are higher in terms of parenting skills.

"It comes down to volume because here there are (fewer) cases," he said. "You have a chance to get deeper into cases and more intricate" versus metropolitan areas, he said.

That doesn't mean the requirements to become a foster parent are any less stringent.

According to the DHS website, to be eligible to adopt a child, individuals need to be able to provide a safe and nurturing home environment for

children who have been placed out of their home due to abuse or neglect, the site said.

The family foster care program is designed to provide a substitute family life experience for a child in a household that has been approved and licensed by the Michigan Department of Human Services or in the home of a relative, it said.

A relative may become licensed or may be unlicensed.

Children may need foster care for a temporary or extended period of time. Yet, the primary goal during foster care is to reunite the child with his or her parents.

Under certain circumstances, a foster family may also adopt children in their care. When adoption is not possible, the goal is to prepare the youth for independent living, according to the site.

To become a Foster Care Parent applicants must: Complete a licensing application, successfully complete background clearances for all adult household members, provide medical statements for all household members, have an environmental inspection (when applicable), provide 3 acceptable references, pass on-site visits to the home by the licensing worker and attend training pertinent to foster care issues.

The process for adopting children is still through DHS, when children who have come through the state's care are in need of permanent homes.

"Some of these children have been abused or neglected and all of them have been removed from their home," the site said.

"A court has terminated their parents' rights after efforts to improve the family's situation failed," the site added.

Even though DHS does not handle all adoptions, parental consent adoption or "direct placement" adoption occurs when birth parents directly consent, in a court of law, to the adoption of their child by the prospective adoptive parent(s).

Turner added that when it comes to the parents who aren't exactly model material, about 99 percent of them still want their children to be happy and healthy. "Most of the parents want their children to be successful and they want to be a good parent. They just don't know how," he said.

bers of the community wish to travel the same turbulent road we have been on for the past 6 years. In my opinion, we, as a board, have let down our staff and, most importantly, the children in our charge," Mandich said in his letter of resignation.

"Working as a unified board has been made even more difficult with the conduct of a fellow board member, who in open and closed sessions continues to be rude and disrespectful to other members," he added. "Also, the tone of the last few board meetings leads me to believe that they have not learned from their mistakes. You should not continue to put the best interest of certain individuals ahead of what is best for our district."

Schmidt, meanwhile, emphasized her love of Owen-Gage and the staff "that have given my daughters a wonderful education.

"However," she added, "I will not be part of this board of education any longer. When you have a board member who treats other board members with such disrespect, it is an embarrassment to this school, and

what kind of message is that sending to our children? Some of you board members forgot why you were elected to this board and that is to keep the best interest of our students at hand," Schmidt stated in her resignation letter.

"This board has never worked as a team. We will not agree with each other on many issues, but you still need to treat each other with respect," she continued. "When you have a board member and an administrative employee know that there was a certain major financial problem and never informed other board members of the situation, that board member also needs to resign. Some of you also need to call our lawyer...and he will tell you the difference between an open board meeting and closed session..."

"I have also made some mistakes in the past, but the worst mistake I made was to think this board could ever work as a team. We have lost many wonderful staff members and many students to other schools in the past years, and this is just inexcusable when some of these situations could have been prevented," Schmidt said.

As for Champagne, she also cited good experiences as a board member in her letter of resignation. "It's been a good ride," she said, later praising those at Owen-Gage who helped make her children what they are today.

At the same time, she noted, "I took the chance that I would be accepted here due to my love for the kids of Owen-Gage, and, at some points, I was, but that is not the case any longer.

"I can no longer sit on a board that is divided, and some are not looking out for the best interest of the students in our charge," Champagne stated. "Lack of respect from others is something that breaks my heart and I will not be a part of. Some may think that I have not done my best, but I have done nothing but love this school, tried to volunteer when at all possible, and support staff and others to make this a wonderful school."

After accepting the resignations, the remaining board members conducted officer elections. They appointed Dan Warack as board president, Julie Good as vice president, Deb Quick as treasurer, and Brenda Kretzschmer as secretary.

At annual livestock auctions

Wanted: prospective buyers

The Tuscola County Fair Board and the 4-H Livestock committees are inviting prospective buyers to the 2011 4-H Livestock Auction.

The auctions will take place Thursday, July 21 at the Tuscola County Fairgrounds in Caro. The Small Livestock Sale will begin at 9:30 a.m. and the Large Livestock Sale will begin immediately following, but not before 11 a.m.

Through participating in 4-H livestock projects, young people gain skills in raising, showing and marketing livestock. In the process, they learn fundamental skills that last a lifetime, such as record keeping, responsibility, financial accountability and animal care. Not only are the young people taught the responsibility

of caring for an animal, but they also get experience in the American free enterprise system and have an opportunity to benefit from their effort.

The 4-H Livestock Auction is the culmination of livestock members' efforts, when the animals they have raised are sold to the public. Each spring more than 100 Tuscola County youth ages 9 to 19 select animals for participation in the auction. This auction is the highlight of the project for most participants and its success is entirely dependent upon the bidders.

The 4-H Livestock Auction is open to the general public. Animals can be purchased by businesses or by individuals; in fact, 2 or more individuals

can also go together to purchase an animal by splitting the purchase price. Buyers who are not able to attend the auction can purchase an animal by authorizing another individual to bid on their behalf. You can set a limit on the amount you wish to spend and specify whose animal you wish to purchase; the 4-H office can assist you in finding a proxy bidder, if needed.

All prospective buyers must check in at the registration table, which opens at 8:30 a.m. Sale catalogs will be available at the registration table. Parking for bidders and buyers is available at the Michigan Sugar plant for the day of the sale. Gate passes are available upon request that will allow buyers to enter the grounds with ease on sale day. As a potential buyer, it is a good idea to plan to arrive early enough to register, review the sale animals, and talk to the 4-H/FFA members and other buyers.

Buyers at the 4-H Livestock Auction purchase high quality meat and have the personal satisfaction of supporting 4-H youth in their "learn by doing" projects. All buyers also receive public recognition and a banner for display. Those who purchase champions get considerable advertising and publicity. You may even qualify for a tax deduction; consult a tax advisor.

Buyers will receive a photo with the 4-H member and their project animal. A complimentary meal will be provided for auction supporters at the Farm Bureau tent across the road from the sale pavilion.

The Tuscola County Farm Bureau will be sponsoring an informal luncheon of grilled bratwurst and hot dogs between 11:30 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Buyers do not have to assume any responsibility for the animals they purchase. They have several options when determining what to do with the animals. One option is to have the animal processed for either personal consumption, as a bonus to employees, as a gift to customers, or for donation to a local food pantry. Buyers may also resell the animal at the local market price. A final option is to donate the animal back to 4-H with the proceeds going to support 4-H programs of the buyer's choice.

Buyers must close out their purchase at the auction, including specifying the packing company to be used for processing the meat; buyers must contact their packing company directly to provide processing instructions. This year, large livestock buyers will not be able to make changes after closing out the sale on Thursday, because United Producers auction staff will be working at other fairs on Friday and Saturday and Tuscola County livestock are shipped early Sunday morning.


