Board terms to remain at 4 years in CC

The Cass City Board of Education Monday addressed Michigan's newly passed school board election rules and the state's freshly mandated anti-bullying policy requirements during their regular monthly meeting, which was advanced one week due to the Christmas holiday.

board elections be held in November of even years beginning in 2012. In order to implement the new election cycle, Cass City current board members' terms - who were originally elected in May - were extended by determined by the expiration date of their existing terms.

The effect of the new legislation locally extended the terms of Jim Veneziano, Kathy Leslie, and Alice Zaleski for 6 months, while Dave requirements, House Bill 4163 Osentoski, Sloane Stimpfel, Craig

Bellew and Dan Manwell were tagged for an additional 18 months of service on the board.

The resulting board member rotation schedule would be 4-3 beginning with the 2016 election, instead of Cass City present 2-2-1-2 rotation.

To help with the rotation switch, school Supt. Jeff Hartel suggested board members' terms increase from 4 to 6 years, which would accom-House Bill 4005 calls for all school plish a more manageable 2-3-2 rotation.

> However, it was the consensus on the board that 6 year terms are just too long of a commitment to serve on the panel.

"Finding people willing to run for 6 statute for either 6, 12, or 18 months years may be hard," said board secretary Stimpfel, while board treasurer Veneziano commented "there is a lot of stress" involved with serving as a board member.

Eight-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon wrote a letter to the editor of New York's Sun, and the quick response was printed as an unsigned editorial Sept. 21, 1897. The work of veteran newsman Francis Pharcellus Church has since become history's most reprinted newspaper editorial, appearing in part or whole in dozens of languages in books, movies, and other editorials, and on posters and stamps. We present it again to our readers for their enjoyment.

"DEAR EDITOR: I am 8 years old.

"Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. "Papa says, 'If you see it in THE SUN it's so.' "Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?

"VIRGINIA O'HANLON. "115 WEST NINETY-FIFTH STREET."

VIRGINIA, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except [what] they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be more for this water men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, VIRGINIA, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no VIRGINIAS. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Just when you think that life has was diagnosed; either take her home struggling with what you think are All of a sudden, your situation isn't time. so bad after all.

In case you missed last week's issue of the Chronicle, Lexi's story is heartbreaking. The Campbell Elementary School first grader was recently diagnosed with an inoperable brain stem tumor, and she's undergoing radiation treatments that her family hopes will give her a little more time — quality-of-life time. According to Gagetown Police Chief Gene Bucholtz, Gagetown resident Jerry Wooters, 6462 Cleaver St., called federal authorities last Wednesday at about 12:40 p.m. after finding the shells in a crawl space inside the home he rents. The bomb unit personnel removed the devices and transported them to a gravel pit, where they were disposed of safely, according to Detective Sgt. Steven Hickman of the Michigan State Police Bomb Squad out of Grayling. Hickman said the shells were both from the World War II era. He said one of the shells was not live, but it's not known if the other one was, because of the method used to destroy them. "That's the safest way
