Board extends Hartel's contract School facing difficult times

The good news is that Cass City Public Schools officials expect to be sitting on a fund balance of more than \$744,000 when they approve their next budget in late June.

The bad news? In spite of having implemented a myriad of cost-cutting measures over the past few years, the Cass City Board of Education is facing the prospect of slashing hundreds of thousands of dollars more in spending in order to approve a balanced spending plan for 2012-13.

Mike Klosowski, chief financial officer for the Cass City Public Schools, outlined his latest financial report during the school board's regular monthly meeting Monday night. His report included an anticipated fund balance of \$744,611 by June 30. The total represents the equivalent of about 8 percent of the district's general fund balance.

However, school Supt. Jeff Hartel indicated the board has its work cut out for it in the coming months.

"We're looking at cutting another million bucks," said Hartel, who pointed out that the \$470-per-student funding cut implemented by state officials last year remains in effect, costing Cass City roughly a half-million dollars in revenue. In addition, other costs continue to escalate, with retirement expenses up another 3 for example, were proficient in readpercent, he added.

The board agreed to begin a series of finance meetings over the next several weeks to discuss cost-cutting options. The first of those special meetings — all open to the public – will be held Monday, March 5, at 7 p.m. in the high school library.

MEAP SCORES

Turning to the latest Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) scores, the board reviewed the latest marks posted by Cass City students. As expected, the numbers are dramatically lower due to new 'cut scores" implement by the Michigan Department of Education in an effort to raise the bar for student achievement.

State officials say the new cut scores better reflect how schools are preparing kids to be on-track for career- and college-readiness in high school.

Cut scores are the passing scores that distinguish between the 4 levels of student performance (advanced, proficient, partially proficient or not proficient) on a given test.

In spite of lower marks, Cass City students proved themselves to be among the best prepared for future academic success in most categories compared to their peers in the Tuscola Intermediate School District and across the state.

"Safe routes" project is nearing completion

A busy night for the Cass City Village Council Monday included authorizing Village Manager Peter Cristiano to execute all necessary documents for the local "Safe Routes To School" project.

Cristiano reported the village and Cass City Public Schools are at the final step of the 2-year undertaking, and bids for the \$200,000 construction plan will go out this week. The project, funded by grant money, will replace sidewalks on Ale Street, Leach Street and West Street from Garfield Avenue to Main Street. The strategy also calls for street lights to be placed on Ale Street from Rose Street to the high school. Construction is slated to begin this spring.

"In reviewing the MDOT agreement, we find that under a worstcase scenario it may cost the village an additional \$82,000," said Cristiano. "We do not have \$82,000 available for this project. If this happens, we will immediately reduce the scope of the project to keep it within the grant."

Turning to other money matters during the monthly gathering, council members approved the purchase of a Jet Vac Hydro Excavator and the sale of a police car.

"This truck will provide hydro excavating for water leaks, replacing fire hydrants, valves and other projects underground. The time saved and safety from hitting gas lines and electric utilities is immeasurable. The truck will save money, life and time needed in emergencies," said Cristiano.

Fredrickson Supply, Wyoming, Mich., submitted the winning bid for a new truck in the amount of \$239,750.

Also Monday, the council accepted the recommendation of Police Chief Craig Haynes and accepted the high bid in the amount of \$3,929 from Asia Motors for a 2008 Ford Crown Vic Police Interceptor.

Deputy hurt in altercation

A veteran Huron County Sheriff's deputy was on the receiving end of an unpleasant retirement gift Thursday when a defendant resisted arrest following a scuffle at the Huron County Courthouse in Bad Axe.

Lt. David Drossos, who officially retired from the sheriff's department Friday after 33 years of service, suffered a mild concussion during last week's altercation, according to Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson.

"At approximately 10 a.m....district court Officer Matt Blaine attempted to arrest a 23-year-old Pigeon man after he became disorderly in the courthouse," Hanson said. "Apparently, (the suspect) was meeting with his attorney, Jill L. Schmidt, during a pre-trial conference on assault-related charges, when he became belligerent in the hallway.

"Blaine attempted to arrest him for being disorderly, which led to a scuffle near the courthouse second floor north entrance. Deputies from our office responded, and in the process of affecting the arrest, (Drossos) received a head injury," added Hanson, who noted the lieutenant was transported by Huron Central Ambulance to Huron Medical Center, where he was treated for a mild concussion and then released.

Hanson said his department submitted reports and a warrant request to the Huron County Prosecutor for possible charges of assaulting, resisting or obstructing a police officer, and assault or assault and battery against the suspect, who remains lodged in the Huron County Jail.

River testing offers hope for the future

In 1831, Alex de Tocqueville, a reporter for a Paris newspaper, was sent to America to write about the edge of civilization, "the last frontier", wherein his travels brought him to Saginaw, Mich. On that trip he wrote of his impressions of the Cass River:

"A turf covered point projecting above the river in the shade of great trees served us as a table and we sat down to luncheon with a view of the river, whose waters clear as crystal, snaked through the wood."

Crystal clear? Not these days.

While de Tocqueville's description no longer fits the Cass River, his observations more than 180 years ago served to inspire a group of area residents to form the Cass River Greenway Committee back in 2007. The organization's goal? To improve the quality of the watershed, which winds its way through the heart of the Thumb.

Today, the committee is gearing up to launch a comprehensive water sampling/testing project in an effort to achieve its goal.

We applaud the organization's goal as well as its success in securing a \$43,455 grant from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to fund the 2-year project, slated to get underway this spring.

"The water testing...will serve as a complement to the (existing) watershed management plan by producing accurate, current and credible water quality information," explained Cass River Greenway Stars committee seeks Committee Chairman Bob Zeilinger, whose group has organized river cleanups and is working to develop the Cass River as a local tourist destination for outdoor recreation. Towards that end, the committee has enlisted partnerships with the non-profit Saginaw Bay Resources Conservation & Development Council (Saginaw Bay RC&D) and University of the past year. Down Memory Lane

All of the recent local headlines you they had fun using their drug of focusing on the use of a relatively new designer drug known as "bath salts", and its growing popularity in the Thumb, makes me wonder how the criminal justice and medical communities could most effectively deal with this issue.

My solution may not be realistic, but I suspect it might be effective.

Do you remember the old "Scared Straight" series, in which juvenile offenders get a hardcore taste of prison life courtesy of a visit to a maximum security facility and some strong, straight talk from inmates serving lengthy sentences?

Why not require young people caught experimenting with drugs to spend a little time in a chemical dependency treatment center?

Like I said, it's probably not a realistic idea. Addicts on the road to recovery don't need that sort of distraction. Plus, there are far more prisons than treatment centers. That's a shame — perhaps if there were more treatment centers, there would be less of a need for prisons. Still, I'd wager that such an experiment would leave some kids thinking twice about their drug and/or alcohol use. Let's face it, teens tend not to think about how their choices today affect their futures and see no harm in sneaking a few beers or smoking a joint now and then.

Most addicts or alcoholics will tell preventing a senseless death?

choice. Until the addiction took control of their lives without them even realizing it.

Hearing the stories is one thing. But watching a 19-year-old trying to kick a 3- or 4-year-old heroin habit is quite another. The nausea he or she feels is matched only by the severe body aches, sweating, heart palpitations, anxiety and sleeplessness that accompany withdrawal.

Same goes for the 40-year-old trying to sober up after 20 or more years of heavy drinking. This guy's hands and body are shaking, he can't sleep for more than 90 minutes at a time, he's so anxiety-riddled that he feels like he's trapped in a small cage, his skin crawling.

It isn't pretty.

Suddenly, drinking and drugging take on another hue. That's a lesson young people need to learn while they're still young, when they have the opportunity to spare themselves years of abusing their bodies and minds. For some, it's a cycle that ends in an early grave.

Who knows if that message would sink in during a visit to a treatment center?

Sure, some young people are going to use no matter what the consequences, but it's an idea worth pondering. After all, what price can you put on turning around one life and

Crop report released

The Michigan Field Office of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) National Agriculture Statistics Service (NASS) has released its annual crop summary. Highlights from the report follow:

• Corn for grain yielded a record 153 bushels per acre, 3 bushels above the previous record of 150 bushels per acre set in 2010. Grain production totaled a record 335 million bushels. • Soybean yield, at 44 bushels per acre, was up a half bushel per acre from 2010. Soybean production, at 85 million bushels, was down 4 percent from 2010.

• Sugar beet yield, at 24 tons per acre, was down 2 tons per acre from 2010. Sugar beet production totaled 3.7 million tons, down 4 percent from 2010.

• Dry bean yield per acre came in at 2,000 pounds, 200 pounds more than 2010. Dry bean production totaled 3.36 million hundredweight, about 21 percent less than 2010, largely due to fewer acres planted.

· Potato production totaled 15.2 million hundredweight, down 3 percent from 2010. The average yield was 345 hundredweight per acre.

• All hay production was 2.7 million tons, up slightly from 2010.
