Dry wells the focus of meet **Monday night**

State Rep. Kurt Damrow, Michigan agricultural experts and area residents met Monday night at the Colwood Church near Caro to continue discussions regarding residential wells running dry in the area.

The forum featured several guest speakers, including Abby Eaton from the Michigan Department of Agricultural and Rural Development, Dave DeYoung from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, Tip MacGuire from the Tuscola County Health Department, Jim Byrum from the Michigan Agri-Business Association, Jason Walther from Walther Farms, and Jim McLoskey representing Sen. Mike Green's office.

DeYoung was the first on stage, offering an overview of regional hydrolo-

gy. "(In the state of Michigan) we have what's called a basin structure," he explained, adding the layout itself looks like a set of bowls being placed inside one another. He said there are 3 different formations that make up the aquifers underneath this region of the state.

DeYoung said roughly 90 percent of the wells in the area are drawing water from these 3 formations, while less than 10 percent of the population is able to hit sufficient amounts of water in the glacial material which is the area directly above the formations.

Although a number of residents suggested that irrigation needs to halt in the area, Byrum made it clear that simply is not an option.

"Nobody wants to debate whether or not there is a problem," Byrum said. "Irrigation isn't new in Michigan."

Byrum pointed out that irrigation is a key factor in crop production, now

The renewal will bring in roughly \$118,000 annually for operations, according to library Director Kate Van Auken.

Voters in the local library district previously renewed a .75 mill tax in **Board taps** 2002. In the same year, residents authorized the library to collect rev-enue from another .35 of a mill, Kreeger for which generates about \$30,000 for operations each year. Voters have since renewed that proposal twice.

Library officials weren't the only winners in last week's election. A number of townships also garnered their voters' support for various millage requests.

Ellington Township

Also during the primary election, Ellington Township voters approved a request of up to one mill for 5 years for fire protection services. The tax, approved on a vote of 160-116, will generate an estimated \$34,195 in the first year, costing the owner of an \$80,000 home about \$40 in additional taxes.

Kingston Township

In Kingston Township, voters said "yes" to the proposed renewal of 2 mills for 4 years for road maintenance. The measure passed 99-73. For the owner of an \$80,000 home, the tax adds up to about \$80 a year and generates roughly \$65,900.

Koylton Township

Koylton Township voters also sup-

ported renewal of 2 mills for 4 years to pay for road improvements and maintenance. The tax passed by a vote of 128-79. The owner of an \$80,000 home pays about \$80 annually for the improvements, and the tax generates a total of \$80,000 annually.

Novesta Township

In Novesta Township, voters Elmwood townships who cast ballots approved a proposed renewal of one mill for 4 years to pay for ditching, grading, graveling and paving roads. The vote was 134-99. The tax raises about \$31,757 a year and costs the owner of an \$80,000 home an estimated \$40 annually.

The Cass City Board of Education will officially welcome its newest member during the board's next regular meeting, slated for Monday, Aug. 27, at 7 p.m. in the high school library.

The board recently met in special session to interview prospective trustees following the resignation of board Treasurer Jim Veneziano, who is moving from the area to western Michigan. Veneziano nearly finished his first 4-year term. He attended his final meeting last month

School Supt. Jeff Hartel reported the board interviewed 3 district residents — Jeff Loomis, Janie Meeker and Chad Kreeger — over the course of the hour-long special meeting. In the end, the board selected Kreeger to fill the vacancy.

Kreeger will serve through Dec. 31, which marks the end of Veneziano's term. After that, the individuals elected to full, 4-year terms in the

Study: Cass **City Schools** doing it right

Cass City High School was ranked among the top in the state. The Mackinac Center for Public Policy recently did an evaluation on all of the schools in the state. The evaluation, which was the Michigan Public High School Context and Performance Database, ranked schools using a number of different factors including school enrollment, percentage of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch, graduation rate, ACT test scores and Michigan Merit Examination (MME) scores.

Each school was then given a ranking in regards to other schools in the state, a context and performance (CAP) grade, and also a percentage rank which is based on a school's ACT and MME scores. The assessment looked at information from the schools between the years 2007 through 2010.



Well, guess what! I got a phone message telling me that I won. Still skeptical, I put off returning the call until the next day, whereupon I was instructed to leave my name and phone number.



The Cass City Board of Education recently said farewell to first-term board member Jim Veneziano and prepared to welcome his replacement.



When he was elected to the board, Veneziano brought plenty of experience with him as a veteran educator and independent technology consultant in the Thumb.

But that didn't stop him from putting in some additional time of his own in the area of training designed to teach newcomers the ins and outs of serving as a school board trustee. In time, Veneziano took on the added responsibilities of serving as board treasurer, and he along with his fellow board members spent literally months and dozens of hours poring through and updating the district's entire book of policies.





Sheriff Lee Teschendorf reports senior citizens in Tuscola County continue to be defrauded of thousands of dollars of their hard earned retirement money. The latest scam happened Friday to a Mayville area senior who lost over \$8,000. The victim received a call from a person who pretended to be his grandson. He told the victim his car broke down in a foreign country and needed money. Over the course of several days the victim would receive calls asking for more money to be sent via Western Union to a foreign country. Even though the clerks in the local stores where the money was sent from warned the senior about it being a possible fraud, he continued to send out the money.

Sheriff Teschendorf reminds everyone, including our most vulnerable - seniors, that money sent to foreign countries is irretrievable.

The district proved its mettle over and over again with outstanding test scores and recognition at the state level.

Of course, the credit for those achievements goes to everyone involved, from the teachers to the building principals and Hartel, to the board itself.

But a board of education is no more effective than the contributions made by each member.



"Hi, I'm Mason Doerr. I'm wondering if you're still accepting applications for your summer internship." Those were the first nervous words that made their way out of my mouth as I found myself standing inside the

Cass City Chronicle's doorway a few months ago. I had never actually expected to be given the position, as most of the interns are already graduates of Central Michigan University. However, I felt that it was worth a shot, and what a great opportunity it turned out to be.

After dropping off my application

and a few newspaper clips I had acquired from working at the Delta Collegiate (Delta College's student newspaper) I was called in for an official interview, which was where I learned that I had been chosen for the iob

an A for their CAP grade and was given the percentage rank of 91 percent. The percent rank means that they scored better than the other 91 percent of schools in the state of Michigan.

These scores reflect highly on the education that the Cass City High School is giving and Chad Daniels, Cass City High School's principal, said that these kinds of tests mirror what the school strives for.

"We're doing things the right way," Daniels said. "You can make numbers say anything you want. What's more important to me is that whatever data vou use, Cass City is always mentioned in all of them.³

"It shows we have constant growth and we're excelling," he added.

Although the school doesn't receive any type of rewards other than being ranked for doing well on this test, it is important for schools to do well.

"There's a clear focus on where we're going to go and how we're going to get there," Daniels said, while mentioning that Cass City does a great job at providing support for struggling students. "It's an attitude that we've developed in the test itself."

"School is all about education," he added. "The number one purpose is for students to do well in society.'

Daniels mentioned that the quality of students was a big factor in the school doing well, however, he also made note that the faculty is another important key factor.

We have a good staff and we're really smart when it comes to our hiring," Daniels said, while mentioning that they've had to do a lot of revamping in the staff department due to the recent retirements in the past couple of years.

Due to the closing of Campbell Elementary School this coming year, the high school will be seeing an influx of students due to the 7th and 8th grade students being moved into the building. Although the school will have a new set of challenges to face regarding this change, Daniels looks at the situation in a positive way "I think moving the 7th and 8th grade up here allows for a better transition," Daniels said, while mentioning that these younger students will have an easier time adjusting to the high school than previous middle school students.

Within the first hour of my cardinal day, Clarke Haire walked over to my desk and laid down a piece of paper with a few notes and contact information on it and told me that he needed a full story in as soon as possible that morning.

That kind of confidence that Clarke and Tom Montgomery had shown towards me on my first day made everything seem a little more reassuring.

Although I was much younger than most of the interns, I had a key advantage. I grew up in the area. It was a huge asset having already known, or at least heard of, most of the people that I had to interview throughout the summer. It was also nice getting to know the people that I was not formerly acquainted with. Some of my colleagues from school went on to pursue internships at much larger newspapers than I did, however, after sitting down and talking with them I realized I gained much more this summer than they did

Instead of writing up press releases that came in daily, I had the opportunity to be on the scene when the fire whistle started blaring. Instead of forwarding a tip on a news story to another writer, I was that writer. And most importantly, instead of being treated like a student intern who didn't know what they were doing, I was treated and respected as if I was a full time employee who was already expected to know what to do. There was nobody constantly standing over my shoulder and keeping me in check. Instead, everyone at the Chronicle assumed I was working at my full potential, would have my work in on time and that my work would be up to snuff.

After each edition of the paper came out I was frequently approached by people in the community who said they always read my work. So many of these conversations drifted towards the same 2 questions that I found myself answering over and over again throughout my internship's entirety.

'So, do you want to work for the New York Times?'

At first I didn't really know how to answer this question, but I later realized that the size of the newspaper that I end up working for really isn't that important. What matters is that I will enjoy my job, regardless of the size or reputation of the newspaper.

The other question, which for a brief second made me reconsider all of my post high school graduation decisions, bothered me even more and Harmony for always reading than the first question.

The Chronicle itself made me feel even more confident about my chosen path. Seeing a handful of people stop in on Tuesday mornings before the paper had even arrived was shocking to me at first. 

"We only have about 60 kids in our


and we have 19 out for football that's pretty good," Peters said, noting that the Bulldog player count is total kids; not 19 players just on the varsity team.

more than ever, because farmers are simply producing much higher yields today.

"Growing that crop (170 to 200 bushels per acre) takes more water. Folks don't irrigate just for the sake of irrigating," he said. "We're going to see more irrigation, there's no question about it, because yields are going to continue to increase.

We have to compete and be able to be profitable," he added. "We're seeing more and more of it in Huron County and we're seeing more of it in Sanilac County."

One of the major farms in the area that irrigates is Walther Farms, and they aren't new to this kind of issue. In fact, they dealt with a similar situation in Saginaw County back in Damrow, an effort is underway in 2002 when residents started reporting wells running dry.

"We probably did indeed involve some of the impact for some of the struggling residents. wells," Jason Walther commented. "We ended up supporting over 30 local wells. We worked with resi- Damrow said. dents on a one-on-one situation.

"We want to do what's right here in Tuscola County," Walther added, noting they surveyed the Saginaw County wells in order to assess the amount of water being drawn by the farming operation. "We're working to do a similar study so we can figure out exactly what's going on with the local aquifer here.'

"If you do indeed have an issue with a well, please contact that local farmer," he added.

Although Walther Farms did prove to be a contributing factor to some of the dry wells in Saginaw County, the problems have been resolved and they haven't had any problems in the area since.

Walther said a group 8 area farmers



are pooling their resources in an effort to help out their neighbors and to also conduct an analysis in the area to obtain more information, both short and long term.

Although there currently aren't many options for community members whose residential wells have run dry, besides taking the issue to court, some temporary relief is available.

Huron County Commissioner Steve Vaughan has built a temporary system to bring water to residents' homes. The system is basically a hose that runs through a house, allowing residents to use the water for hygiene purposes. The water is not recommended for consumption.

According to state Rep. Kurt Tuscola County to create 8 to 10 of these systems, which cost about \$1,500 a piece, to provide relief for

Damrow met with Gagetown area residents last week to discuss the issue.

Since a previous gathering, held a couple days earlier, Damrow said he had received more calls regarding wells running dry.

"Over the past 2 or 3 weeks we've had about 50 complaints from homeowners in the area," he added. "Over the past week we've taken that number up to about 70."

Although the issue was thought to have been isolated to the Gagetown area, that may not be the case.

"We've also had about 10-12 calls We've been pumping that aquifer from north of Elkton in Huron County," Damrow noted.

Senate Bill No. 1008, which involves aquifer protection and dishad always come back within 2 feet pute resolution, is in the process of of the original, he added. "There receiving a facelift with the help of Damrow, who stated the bill, with its amendments, will most likely be considered by the Senate sometime this fall. He also predicted about 80 percent of the bill will actually make the final cut.

Damrow also made it clear that he is not taking any sides in the debate and that he wants to get this issue resolved before the problem reaches a boiling point and people begin to pursue legal action against one another.

"What we're trying to do is clarify this so we know where everybody stands on both sides," Damrow he said. "It may take a little pushing and shoving, but I believe we'll get there."

One of Damrow's proposed amendments would require the aquifers in the state to receive a full check and evaluation. "Only residential well drilling is required to take any kind of test (right now)," Damrow said. He added that current law states that the irrigation taking place now is legal unless it is affecting a pond, stream or water life. However, under the Michigan Right to Farm Act, Public Act 93, farmers are not allowed to be a public or private nuisance. 'When you affect someone's aquifer you can be held responsible in one way, shape or form," Damrow said. "(Since the previous meeting) the Department of Agriculture has already met with farmers who are irrigating." There is also the reasonable-use doctrine for ground water in Michigan that states that some action can take place if a person's well runs drv due to another person or business. In some cases a business's water is cut off from ground water completely for abusing the system. Another hot topic at the meeting involved farmers whose wells have run dry receiving reimbursement for their large capacity wells, while other residents, at this time, have received no assistance. Farmers in the 84th district, which is comprised of Tuscola and Huron counties, will get some return compensation for their dry well and also for helping their neighbors who may need emergency water.

Victims of crime focus of legislation

Sen. Mike Green, (R-Mayville), recently introduced legislation in the Michigan Senate to strengthen the William Van Regenmorter Crime Victims' Rights Act.

Known as "Crime Victims' Right to Know" legislation, Senate Bill 1211 would expand the rights of crime victims by allowing them to present exhibits when testifying at parole or commutation hearings, which would enable them to more effectively portray the impact of the crime on their lives.

The measure would also require that, in addition to current parole hearing notifications, victims be notified when a prisoner has applied for reprieve, commutation or pardon; has absconded while on bail or other release; or has died while in cus-

"This measure builds upon Michigan's legacy as a leader in recognizing and protecting the rights of victims of crime and it strengthens those rights under state law," said Green. "Crime victims will have more tools, more information and more protection if this bill is passed.

In 1985 Michigan led the nation by William enacting the Van Regenmorter Crime Victims' Rights Act for victims of crime and juvenile offenses. The law was named after its sponsor, a longtime legislator and champion of crime victims' rights. In 1988, Michigan voters also approved adding crime victims' rights language to the state constitution.

SB 1211 would accomplish an important part of a comprehensive public safety plan proposed earlier this year by Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette, who has made crime victims' rights one of his major priorities. "Crime victims and their families have a right to know, and they deserve a sense of security," said Schuette. "If their perpetrator is on the run from authorities, they have the right to know, so they can plan for their own safety. If their perpetrator dies, they deserve to know so they can sleep more soundly at night. I applaud Senator Green for standing tall for those whose voice is often not heard." Bay County Crime Victim Rights Advocate Cindy Howell also praised the proposed changes. "The importance of affording crime victims participation in every aspect of their perpetrator's case-from arrest to release—-is imperative," Howell remarked. "These proposed changes would allow crime victims the full extent of input in Michigan Department of Corrections proceedings that they deserve and the notification they need to live safely and securely. "With the recent passing of Senator Van Regenmorter, Michigan's 'Father of Victims' Rights,' it is comforting to see Schuette and Green pick up the torch on behalf of victims of violent crime and continue to protect our most vulnerable citizens.' The bill has been referred to the Senate Committee on Judiciary.


