A freak accident over the summer forever changed the life of an area man who built a reputation for always being there for family and friends.

Now, his friends are working hard to be there for him.

## Veteran Dazzlers team ready for another run at national model rocket competition

If Mark Hansen was a football coach, chances are good the Deford area resident would be talking to the media about returning a veteran squad of starters to the field this year. Hansen isn't a football coach, but

he and his wife, Patricia, are seasoned leaders who led a winning group of young model rocket enthusiasts to a national competition last spring, thanks to plenty of determination, skill and hard work.

And, the Hansens do have a veteran "team" — all members of the Deford Dazzlers 4-H STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Club — returning for the coming

year's model rocket competition. Those "veterans" include students Catherine Gordon, who serves as the 4-H club's rocket team manager and safety supervisor; Dustyn Parrish, payload specialist; Peter Hansen, payload specialist; Chrysler Parrish, safety and recovery specialist; William Webster, engine section specialist; and Christopher Hansen, engine and simulation software specialist. Newcomers this year are Caroline Gordon, payload specialist, and Alexander Hansen, propulsion specialist and data collection/presentation specialist.

"The season for most teams is just beginning since the largest majority of teams are backed by high schools, so they begin their meetings after the new school year is in session. Therefore, most are just now getting their registrations in and organizing their first meetings," noted Mark Hansen, who said the Deford Dazzlers' team is ahead of the game this year.

investigations continued to rise in Michigan last week, although the number of confirmed fatalities did not increase, according to Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) officials.

"As of Oct. 12, Michigan's case count of individuals associated with the multistate meningitis investigation is 41 cases total, including one epidural abscess, one joint infection, 39 cases of meningitis, and 3 deaths," said Angela Minicuci, public information officer for the depart-

The number of meningitis case Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Food and Drug Administration (FDA) on the multi-state cases of fungal meningitis among patients who received steroid injections.

Officials had confirmed 25 cases in Michigan associated with the outbreak as of Oct. 9, including the deaths of a 56-year-old Genesee County woman, a 67-year-old Livingston County woman, and a 78year-old Washtenaw County woman.

Nationwide, there were 119 cases and 12 deaths reported in 10 states as

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



## Don't forget: get a flu vaccination

For many Michigan residents, fall ranks near the top when it comes to living in the Great Lakes State, with color tours, hay rides and camp fires all a part of enjoying the cool days and nights that autumn brings to the region each year.

Just don't forget, though, that Old Man Winter won't be far behind, nor will the coughs, stuffy noses and congestion that inevitably arrive with the change in seasons.

Okay, so you've heard this speech before, but because flu is unpredictable and how severe it is can vary widely from one season to the next, we figure it's worth reminding our readers to protect themselves from a few days of misery or worse this year.

Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, even death.

Officials with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) along with the Michigan and local health departments say the best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine every year.

The options include "flu shots", inactivated vaccines (containing killed virus) that are given with a needle. The regular seasonal flu shot is "intramuscular", meaning it's injected into the muscle and is approved for use in people ages 6 months and older, including healthy individuals, those with chronic medical conditions and pregnant women. The vaccine protects against the 3 viruses that research suggests will be

A high-dose vaccine for people ages 65 and older was first made available during the 2010-11 season, and for the first time, an intradermal vaccine (injected into the "dermis" or skin) for people ages 18 to 64 years of age is being made available this season.

Another option is the nasal-spray vaccine, a vaccine made with live, weakened flu viruses that is given as a nasal spray. The spray does not cause the flu and is approved for use in healthy people ages 2 to 49 years of age who are not pregnant.

It takes about 2 weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop that protect against influence virus infection.

Experts say the best time to get a flu vaccine is as soon as it becomes available. In other words, now.

Those at highest risk for developing flu-related complications include kids younger than 5, but especially children younger than 2; adults ages 65 and older; pregnant women; and those with a variety of medical conditions ranging from asthma to chronic lung disease to organ disorders. People who live in nursing homes and other long-term care facilities also should be vaccinated, as should those who live with or care for persons at high risk for contracting the flu.

Who should not be vaccinated? Anyone with a severe allergy to chicken eggs, people who have had a severe reaction to the flu vaccine in the past; children young than 6 months of age, those with a moderate or severe illness with a fever, and people with a history of Guillain-Barre Syndrome.

Of course, if you have any questions, consult with your personal health care provider.

## State says ABATE officials' conclusion on stats premature

Opponents claimed that amending choice in wearing a helmet or not would mean an increase in motorcyclist fatalities.

Recent data from the Michigan State Police and Secretary of State proves them wrong, according to members of ABATE (American Bikers Aiming Toward Education).

However, state officials say that conclusion is premature.

'We at American Bikers Aiming Toward Education — are concerned with motorcycle safety so we have been monitoring the effect of this helmet law modification to see what impact it has made," said Vince Consiglio, president of ABATE Michigan. "We used the Michigan State Police/Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning data which compares motorcycle data between Jan. 1 and Aug. 31 for the last 2 years, and the numbers speak for themselves.

From 2011 (pre-amendment) to 2012 (post-amendment) fatalities dropped from 89 to 85 — a 4.5 percent reduction. Adjusting the data to show fatalities as a percentage of motorcyclists involved shows a decrease from 3.24 percent to 3.05 percent, which is a 5.8 percent reduction.

During the same time period, the number of registrations increased from 261,658 to 266,589. If the fatality rate is adjusted to the total of motorcycle registrations it shows that the fatality rate has decreased from .034 percent to .0318 percent since the helmet-law amendment a 7 percent reduction, Consiglio said.

Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning officials recently issued an official statement regarding the reported decrease in motorcyclist deaths, noting "the state's traffic crash, injury and fatality information for the current year is provisional and changes on a daily basis. It is not possible to conduct an analysis or draw conclusions regarding motorcyclist deaths until the entire year's crash data is finalized sometime in the spring of 2013.

"Today's snapshot of motorcyclist deaths from Jan. 1-Aug. 31, 2012, shows 91 deaths compared to 89 deaths for this same period in 2011," the statement continues. "In addition, incapacitating injuries for this same period from a year ago are up by 14 percent (441 in 2011 and 504 in 2012). These figures will continue to change as additional crash reports are submitted by law enforcement agencies throughout the





ARTICLE \_\_\_\_ RENTAL REGISTRATION Purpose and Intent

The Village of Cass City recognizes the need for an organized inspection and registration program for rental properties located within the Village in order to ensure rental units meet all applicable building, existing structures, fire, health, safety, and zoning codes, and to provide an efficient system for compelling both absentee and local landlords to correct violations and maintain, in proper condition, rental property within the Village recognizes that the most efficient system is the creation of a program requiring the registration and inspection of rental property within the Village as defined in this Ordinance, so that orderly inspection schedules can be made by the Village or its Designate.

As used in this Ordinance, the following terms and words shall have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates that a different

"Owner" means the legal title holder or a Rental Unit or the Premises within which the Rental Unit is situated.

"Commercial not residential purposes" means any premises not used for one's residence.
"Village or its Designate" means the Village of Cass City or its Designate or any successor department or division that may be established.

"Dwelling unit" means a building, or portion thereof, designed for occupancy for living purposes and having cooking facilities and sanitary facilities, including single family residences and mobile homes.
"Landlord" means any person who owns or controls a dwelling, Dwelling Unit, or Rental Unit and rents such unit, either personally or through a

"Owner-Occupied Rental Unit" means a Rental Unit that is occupied in whole or in part by an individual whose name specifically appears on the deed for the property where the Rental Unit is located.

"Person" means any natural individual, firm, partnership, association, joint stock company, joint venture, public or private corporation, limited liability company, or receiver, executor, personal representative, trust, trustee, conservator or other representative appointed by order of any court. "Premises" means a lot, plot or parcel of land, including the buildings or structures thereon.

"Rental unit" means any Dwelling Unit or a unit containing sleeping quarters, including but not limited to hotels, motels, bed and breakfast establishments, boarding houses, sleeping rooms, apartments, residential, commercial, or industrial property, including structures which are leased or

rented by the Owner or other Person in control of such units, to any tenant, whether by day, week, month, year or any other term. "Responsible local agent" means a natural Person designated by the property Owner as the agent responsible for operating such rental property in compliance with the ordinances adopted by the Village

"Tenant" means any Person who has the temporary use and occupation of real property owned by another Person in subordination to that other person's title and with that other person's consent; for example, a Person who rents or leases a dwelling, dwelling unit, or rental unit from a land-

Section Requirements.

1. No Person shall lease, rent, occupy, or otherwise allow a Rental Unit within the Village to be occupied, unless all of the following requirements have first been met.

2. The Owner of the Rental Unit shall have registered the Rental Unit with the Village or its Designee by completing and filing a current registration form with the Village or its Designee, as provided in Section \_\_\_\_ of this Ordinance.

3. An inspection shall have been completed to the satisfaction of the Village or its Designee.

4. A valid certificate of compliance shall have been issued by the Village or its Designee.

5. The current certificate of compliance shall be maintained at the office of the Responsible Agent or on the premises

6. All fees charged by the Village or its Designee for the registration and inspection of the Rental Unit shall be paid in full.

It shall be unlawful for any Person to lease, rent, occupy, or otherwise allow a Rental Unit within the Village to be occupied without first registering the Rental Unit with the Village or its Designate and designating a Responsible Local Agent.

•Registration shall be made upon forms furnished by the Village or its Designate and shall require all of the following information.
•The street address of the Rental Unit(s);

•The number and types of Rental Units within the rental property;
•The residence address, telephone number, and where applicable an e-mail address, mobile telephone number, and facsimile number of all proper-

ty Owners of the Rental Unit(s);

Name, residence address, telephone number, and where applicable an e-mail address, mobile telephone number, and facsimile number of the •Responsible Local Agent designated by the Owner;

•The maximum number of tenants permitted for each Rental Unit;
•The name, address, telephone number, and where applicable an e-mail address, mobile telephone number, and facsimile number of the Person authorized to collect rent from the tenants:

•The name, address, telephone number, and where applicable an e-mail address, mobile telephone number, and facsimile number of the Person authorized to make or order repairs or services for the property, if in violation of Village or State codes, if the Person is other than the Owner or

Accurate and Complete Information.

All information provided on the registration form shall be accurate and complete. No Person shall provide inaccurate information for the registration of a Rental Unit, or fail to provide the information required for such registration. The registration form shall be signed by both the property Owner(s) and the designated Responsible Local Agent. Where the Owner is not a natural person, the Owner information shall be that of the president, general manager or other chief executive of the organization. Where more than one Person has an ownership interest, the required information shall be provided for each such Owner.

Change in Registration Information or Transfer of Property.

Except for a change in the Registered Local Agent, the property Owner of a Rental Unit registered with the Village shall re-register within sixty

(60) calendar days after any change occurs in the registration information. If the property is transferred to a new Owner, the new property Owner of a registered Rental Unit shall re-register the Rental Unit within sixty (60) calendar days following the transfer of the property Property Owners shall notify the Village or its Designate of any change in the designation of the Registered Local Agent, including a change in name, address, mail address, telephone number, mobile telephone number or facsimile number of the designated Registered Local Agent within 30 days of the

If a transfer of ownership occurs and there is a current certificate of compliance on file, then the new Owner will only have to pay the registration

Registration Term and Renewals Registration of a Rental Unit shall be effective for three (3) years. All registrations shall expire three (3) years from the date of issuance of a cer-

tificate of compliance. The property Owner shall reregister each Rental Unit with the Village or its Designate, thirty (30) calendar days prior to the

Responsible Local Agent.
•The designated Responsible Local Agent shall be responsible for all of the following:

•Operating the registered Rental Unit in compliance with all applicable Village Ordinances;
•Providing access to the Rental Unit for the purpose of making any and all inspections necessary to ensure compliance with the applicable Village Ordinances; maintaining a list of the names and number of occupants of each Rental •Unit for which he or she is responsible; and accepting all legal notices or services of process with respect to the Rental Unit.

Section \_\_\_\_Inspections.

Rental Units shall be inspected and shall comply with the standards and provisions of the ordinances and codes adopted by the Village.

Except as provided in subsection 5-250(a)(3), all Rental Units shall be inspected by the Village or its Designate at least once every three (3) years.

Prior to conducting inspections of those occupied
Rental Units, the Village or its Designate may issue a temporary certificate of compliance as provided in Section 5- 251(b). The inspection shall

not, however, eliminate an owner's responsibility to register such Rental Units every three (3) years.

If the first inspection is in compliance with the Village's Property Maintenance Ordinance and all other Village Ordinances, such Rental Units will have their next inspection waived. If a complaint is filed with the Village and the Rental Unit is found to be in violation of this Ordinance, there-

Nothing in this section shall preclude the inspection of any Rental Unit more frequently than once every three (3) years.

Any current property with a valid Rental Registration certificate shall continue enforced until expiration when the property shall then be re-inspect-

Inspections may be made to obtain and maintain compliance with the standards of this Ordinance based upon one of the following:

A complaint received by the Village or its Designate, the Village of Cass City Police Village or its Designate, any member of the Tuscola County Sheriff's Village or its Designate or a State agency, indicating that there is a violation of the standards or the provisions of any ordinance adopted

by the Village of Cass City or any state law;

An observation by the Village or its Designate, a State Agency, Village of Cass City Staff, Elkland Township Fire Chief, of a violation of the standards of a violation of

A report or observation of a Rental Unit that is unoccupied and unsecured or a dwelling that is damaged by fire;

The registration, re-registration and certification of a Rental Unit as required by this Ordinance; The need to determine compliance with a notice or an order issued by the Village; An emergency observed or reasonably believed to exist;

A request for an inspection by the property Owner; or Requirements of law where a Rental Unit is to be demolished by the Village or where ownership is to be transferred to the Village.

Once the Village or Designate has determined that a Rental Unit is in compliance with all of the ordinances adopted by the Village and state law. the inspection required for issuance of a certificate of compliance shall be satisfied. The inspection shall then be valid for a period of three (3) years from the date the certificate of compliance is issued.

If, upon completion of an inspection, the premises are found to be in violation of one or more provisions of applicable Village ordinances and State codes, the Village or Designate shall provide the Registered Local Agent and/or Owner with written notice of such violations. The Village or Designate shall set a re-inspection date before which such violation shall be corrected. If such violation has been corrected within that period, the inspection required for issuance of a certificate of compliance shall be satisfied. If such violations have not been corrected within that period, the Village or Designate shall not issue the certificate of compliance and may take any action necessary to enforce compliance with applicable Village If there is a complaint filed on property with the Village or Designate, the Owner and/or Responsible Local Agent will be notified in writing. In

the event that the complaint is of an emergency nature, as determined by the Village or Designate or Village of Cass City Police Village or Designate, it will require immediate compliance with adopted Property Maintenance Ordinance. If the complaint is not of an emergency nature, the Owner will have fourteen (14) calendar days to correct such violation, unless a longer period of time is granted by the Village or Designate, after which a reinspection or written verification from Owner and/or Responsible Local Agent and complaining party that the violation has been corrected, will be required. If a violation is not corrected by the property Owner as required by this Ordinance, the Village or Designate may revoke the certificate of

If an inspection is initiated by a complaint and no violation is found to exist, no inspection fee will be assessed against the Owner of the inspected Rental Unit in compliance Where a re-inspection must be made to ensure conformity with this Ordinance or before a certificate of compliance is issued for those Rental Units

that have been issued violation notices, the Village will charge a separate inspection fee for every inspection when the violation has not been abat-If an inspection is scheduled and the Owner or Responsible Local Agent fails to appear, an inspection fee shall be assessed against the Owner

and/or the Responsible Local Agent, and no inspection shall be completed until the inspection fee is paid in full

Transfer of Ownership Inspection. When there is a transfer of ownership of any Rental Unit, including an owner-occupied Rental Unit, and a current certificate of compliance exists for the unit, the Village or Designate shall require a new inspection. The new Owner shall comply with the requirements of Section 5-249(c) of this

Ordinance by re-registering the Rental Unit within sixty (60) calendar days following the transfer of the property.

When there is a transfer of ownership of any Rental Unit, including an owner-occupied Rental Unit, then a current certificate of compliance does not exist for the unit, then the Village or Designate shall conduct an inspection within thirty (30) calendar days following the notification of the transfer of ownership as required by Section 4(c). If violations of this Ordinance or any other Village ordinance, code or State code or law are found, a notice of violation shall be issued to the Owner.

If ownership of any Rental Unit is transferred contrary to subsection (d) or (2) of this Section, or if the new Owner fails to re-register a Rental Unit as required by Section 5-249(c) of this Ordinance, the certificate of compliance and Rental Unit registration shall be deemed to expire within sixty (60) days of the transfer unless appropriate steps are taken to obtain a Rental Unit registration and certificate of compliance.

Within sixty (60) calendar days of the transfer of ownership of a Rental Unit, the new Owner shall notify all residents of a Rental Unit which

undergoes a transfer of ownership while the individuals are residing in that unit, including a owner-occupied Rental Unit, of the transfer of owner-

Section Certificate of Compliance.

No Person shall own, operate, lease, rent, occupy, or otherwise allow a Rental Unit within the Village to be occupied unless there is a valid certificate of compliance issued by the Village or Designate for the Rental Unit. A certificate of compliance shall be issued for each building and Rental

A certificate of compliance shall be issued only after all of the following requirements have been satisfactorily completed

Registration of the Rental Unit with the Village or Village Designate. Designation of the Responsible Local Agent;

Payment in full of any and all required fees for registration, plus any penalties that may have been imposed on the property; and Inspection by the Village or Designate resulting in a determination that the Rental Unit and the property complies with all Village Ordinances and

Posting of the Certificate of Compliance

Temporary certificates of compliance may be issued without prior inspection by the Village or Designate for those occupied Rental Units which have not been inspected. Such temporary certificates of compliance may be issued as of the effective date of the initial registration and continue until an inspection date is established, to allow property Owners to operate such Rental Units until such time as an inspection may be made by the Village or Designate. At such time as an inspection is made and the Village or Designate has determined that provisions of this Ordinance have been complied with, the temporary certificate shall expire, and a certificate of compliance shall be issued according to this Ordinance

Posting of the Certificate of Compliance.

The certificate of compliance shall be maintained at the office of the Responsible Agent or on the premises.

The Village Council shall establish by resolution an appropriate fee for registration and inspections.

If an inspection is initiated by a complaint and no violation is found to exist, no inspection fee will be assessed against the Owner of the inspect-Where a re-inspection must be made to ensure conformity with this Ordinance before a certificate of compliance is issued for those Rental Units

that have been issued violation notices, the Village will charge a separate inspection fee for every inspection when the violation has not be ed or corrected

Maintenance of Records.

All records, files and documents pertaining to the Rental Registration and Licensing and Rental Unit Inspection Program shall be maintained by the Village or Designate and made available to the public as required by State Law. Section Appeal, Severability and Captions.

Should the Village or Designate determine that the property is not in compliance with the Village Property Maintenance Code as adopted by the

City, from time to time, and/or any other Village Ordinance, as amended, and for that reason deny the issuance of a certificate of compliance, or should a certificate of compliance be suspended or revoked upon a determination by the Village or Designate that the Owner has failed to maintain the property in compliance with the aforementioned codes, laws and/or ordinances, the Owner shall have the right to appeal such determination in the following manner:

The Owner shall file the appeal with the Village Council, in writing, within 15 days of the date of the determination from which the Owner is

appealing. Filing of the appeal with the Village Council shall stay the suspension or revocation of the certificate of compliance until such time as the Village Council issues its final decision. The appeal shall contain a short and plain statement of the matters asserted by the Owner, including factual and legal bases upon which the Owner relies. Upon receipt of the appeal, the Village Council shall schedule a hearing and provide notice of the hearing to the Owner by sending written notice by first-class mail to the address listed on the Owner's application form. The Owner may appear at the hearing in person, by agent or by attorney. If the Owner, or his agent or attorney, fails to appear at the hearing after proper notice, the Village Council may proceed with the hearing and make

its decision. The Owner shall be given an opportunity to present oral and written arguments on the issues of law and policy and an opportunity to present evidence and arguments on issues of fact.

The Village Council shall issue a final decision, in writing, setting forth its findings within a reasonable period after the hearing is concluded. A copy of the decision shall be sent by first-class mail to the address listed on the Owner's application form and to the agent or attorney that appeared

Affirm the determination of the Village or Designate in refusing to issue, or in suspending or revoking the certificate of compliance; or Reverse the determination of the Village or Designate and order the issuance or reinstatement of the certificate of compliance.

If the Village Council affirms the determination of the Village or Designate or there is no timely appeal, the Property shall be vacated until a certificate of compliance is issued by the Village or Designate.

The Village Council shall have no power to vary or modify any rules, regulations, provisions or ordinances.

Any Person who violates this Ordinance shall be responsible for a municipal civil infraction fine of \$500.00, subject to the procedures and sanc-

tions contained in Village of Cass City Municipal Code, Chapter \_\_\_ . Increased civil fines of \$200.00 shall be imposed for repeated violation, which means a second or subsequent municipal civil infraction violation committed by a Person within any twelve (12) month period and for which a Person admits responsibility or is determined to

be responsible. After the third violation of this Ordinance committed by a Person within any twelve (12) month period shall be punishable by a fine

All resolutions, ordinance, orders or parts thereof in conflict in whole or in part with any of the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed.

Section \_\_\_\_\_ Administrative Liability.

No officer, agent, employee or member of the Village shall render himself or herself personally liable for any damage that may occur to any person or entity as a result of any act or decision performed in the discharge of his or her duties and responsibilities pursuant to this Ordinance

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred at the time this ordinance takes effect, are saved and may be onsummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.

Section 5:01 Effective Date.

This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days from and after approval and publication in a newspaper, general circulation, by the Village of Cass City.

Proposed Ordinance No. 171:

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE VILLAGE OF CASS CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES, TO REPLACE THE CODE CHAPTER 22, ARTICLE VII, (OFFENSES AGAINST PUBLIC SAFETY), SECTION 202 OF THE VILLAGE OF CASS CITY, ENTITLED "SALE, POSSESSION OR USE OF FIREWORKS" IN THE CASS CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES, AS FOLLOWS.

SECTION 1: In accordance with Section 202 of Chapter 22 of Article VII of the Code of Ordinances of the Village of Cass City, this Chapter of the Code of Ordinances is hereby replaced, which is entitled "SALE, POSSESSION OR USE OF FIREWORKS", and read

CHAPTER 22, (OFFENSES), ARTICLE VII (OFFENSES AGAINST PUBLIC SAFETY), SECTION 202 SALE, POSSESSION OR

USE OF FIREWORKS Sec. 22-202.1 Definitions. For the purposes of this chapter, the following words shall be defined as hereafter stated

(a) CONSUMER FIREWORKS means fireworks devices that are designed to produce visible effects by combustion that are required

to comply with the construction, chemical composition, and labeling regulations promulgated by the United States consumer product safety commission under 16 CFR parts 1500 and 1507, and that are listed in APA standard 87-1, 3.1.2, 3.1.3, or 3.5. Consumer fireworks do not include low-impact fireworks. **(b) DISPLAY FIREWORKS** means large fireworks devices that are explosive material intended for use in fireworks displays and designed to produce visual or audible effects by combustion, deflagration, or detonation, as provided in 27 CFR 555.11, 49 CFR 172, and APA standard 87-1, 4.1.

(c) FIREWORK or FIREWORKS means any composition or device, except for a starting pistol, a flare gun, or flare, designated for the purpose of producing a visible or audible effect by combustion, deflagration, or detonation. Fireworks consist of consumer fireworks, low-impact fireworks, articles pyrotechnic, display fireworks, and special effects.

(d) LOW-IMPACT FIREWORKS means ground and handheld sparkling devices as that phrase is defined under APA standard 87-1, 3.1, 3.1.1.1 to 3.1.1.8, and 3.5. (e) NOVELTIES or NOVELTY means that term as defined under APA standard 87-1, 3.2, 3.2.1, 3.2.2, 3.2.3, 3.2.4, and 3.2.5 and all

1. Toy plastic or paper caps for toy pistol in sheets, strips, rolls, or individual caps containing not more that .25 of a grain of explosive content per cap, in packages labeled to indicate the maximum explosive content per cup.

2. Toy pistols, toy cannons, toy canes, toy trick noisemakers, and toy guns in which toy caps as described in subparagraph 1 are used, that are constructed so that the hand cannot come in contact with the cap when in place for the explosion, and that are not designed to break apart or be separated so as to from a missile by the explosion.

3. Flitter sparklers in paper tubes not exceeding 1/8th inch in diameter

Sec. 22-202.2. Prohibition on Use of All Fireworks Except as Allowed; Exception. No person shall ignite, discharge, or use any fire-

works within the village except as allowed by this chapter Sec. 22-202.3. Prohibition on Use of Display Fireworks; Exception. No person shall ignite, discharge, or use display fireworks within

the Village at any time, unless the following are true:

1. It is a professional, licensed fireworks company; AND 2. The Village Council of Cass City approves the issuance of a license or permit.

A permit shall not be issued under this act to a non-resident person, firm, or corporation for ignition of articles pyrotechnic or display fireworks in this state until the person, firm, or corporation has appointed in writing a resident member of the bar of this state or a resident agent to be the legal representative upon whom all process in an action or proceeding against the person, firm, or corporation may

Sec. 22-202.4. Prohibition on Use of Consumer Fireworks; Exception. No person shall ignite, discharge or use consumer fireworks within the village, except this prohibition shall not preclude any person from the ignition, discharge and use of consumer fireworks on the preceding, the day of, or the day after a national holiday consistent with Sec. 7 (2) of Michigan Public Act 256 of 2011. Consumer fireworks ignited, discharged, or used on the dates allowed by this section to be shall strictly conform to the definition of consumer fireworks as stated in this chapter and state statute by only creating visual but not audible effects by their combustion and if not so conforming shall be prohibited on said dates as well as all other times.

Sec. 22-202.5. Use of Consumer Fireworks. Low-impact fireworks shall be ignited, discharged, or used so as to not cause injury or damage to any person or property but shall not be ignited, discharged, or used inside any building or structure at any time without a license or permit issued by the Village Council of Cass City. Novelty fireworks may be ignited, discharged, or used without restriction but such shall only occur in a manner so as to not cause injury or damage to any person or property.

Sec. 22-202.6. Limitations on the Use of Low-Impact or Novelty Fireworks. Consumer fireworks use in the Village of Cass City is limited to the day before, the day of, and the day after, a federal holiday, contingent on the following:

i. Fireworks shall not be sold to a minor.

ii. No person under the age of 18 years shall use, possess, explode or cause to explode any fireworks, as defined herein, with the village.

iii. No person under the age of 18 years shall buy, purchase, acquire or obtain any fireworks, as defined herein, within the village. iv. A person shall not ignite, discharge, or use consumer fireworks on public property, school property, church property, or the property

v. For purposes of this ordinance, Federal Holidays are: New Year's Day, Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr., Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

Sec. 22-202.7. Penalty. Whosoever violates any of the provisions of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Title I, Chapter I, Sec. 1.110 in the Codified Ordinances of the Village of Cass City. SECTION 2: If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph, or part of this ordinance, or the application thereof to any person, firm, cor-

poration, legal entity, or circumstances, shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, such judgment shall not effect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance and the application of such provision to other persons, firms, corporations, legal entities, or circumstances by such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, section, paragraph, or part of this Ordinance thereof directly involved in the case or controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and to the person, firm, corporation, legal entity, or circumstances then and there involved. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provisions not have been included in this Ordinance

SECTION 3: If any provision of this Chapter differs from a provisions of any other applicable law, ordinance, rule or regulation, both the provision of this Chapter and the differing provision shall apply if possible. If the two (2) provisions are in conflict, then the provision establishing the higher or stricter standard shall apply.

SECTION 4: After publication, this ordinance shall be effective immediately.

ly that I was one of 7 judges to be selected for the program from judges all over the state of Michigan.

"The pilot involves providing the judge and the selected court with a tablet (ipod), the technical support, Internet, software, applications and necessary programming to allow us to receive, review and either approve or deny and return petitions to caseworkers or law enforcement officers," she explained.

"The benefits include...the technology and all of the elements that I mentioned, (and) caseworkers and police officers will no longer have to leave a home or location where children are potentially in danger to take a petition to a judge. This reduces the wait time for children, helps to diffuse the situation in a more rapid manner and, if children need to be removed for their safety, it gets them and the case workers and police officers out of a dangerous situation as quickly as possible," Roggenbuck said. "It also means case workers and police officers don't have to spend additional time driving from a situation to a judge and back, saving time and wear on vehicles, and also allowing them to get back to their jobs in a quicker fashion."

Roggenbuck indicated it's too early in the process to estimate the dollar value of the program.

"It would be almost impossible for me to gauge the...savings since the program has not been fully implemented yet. We don't have a total savings, (but) this would not have been possible for our county to accomplish on our own since we have very limited resources," she said.

The pilot program is scheduled to launch later this fall

The personal property tax (PPT) is one of the largest obstacles to job growth in the Thumb and around Michigan.




