Feds reward state police, sheriff with forfeiture \$

Federal officials offered more than lip service when they gathered at the Michigan State Police post in Caro Thursday to congratulate troopers and representatives of the Huron County Sheriff's Department for a job well done.

They also came bearing gifts in the form of checks totaling more than a quarter million dollars, representing a share of forfeiture proceeds stemming from the prosecution of the owners of a large Huron County dairy farm who employed dozens of illegal aliens in 2007.

Acting Special Agent in Charge William Hayes, U.S. Immigration and Custom Enforcement's (ICE) Huron County Sheriff's Office to Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Detroit, presented the checks

\$250,652 to the Caro post and \$35,807 to the Huron County Sheriff's Department — during a press conference, saying federal investigators appreciate and recognize the important contribution state and local law enforcement agencies made in the investigation and successful prosecution of Aquila Farms near Bad Axe, which was staffed almost exclusively with illegal

Sanilac man arrested for attempted murder

A Sanilac County man was scheduled to appear in court early this week on a charge of attempted murder after firing shots at a Marion Township residence over the weekend.

According to Sanilac County Sheriff Garry Biniecki, the Marion Township suspect was taken into custody during the early morning hours Sunday at the home, located in the 2500 block of Mills Road.

"Central dispatch received a domestic disturbance call...at approximately 1:50 a.m.," Biniecki reported, noting the caller stated the domestic dispute involved use of a firearm and that shots had been fired.

Deputies arrived to find what they described as an intoxicated 52-year-old male attempting to flee the scene in a vehicle after firing a shotgun at his wife and her ex-husband.

"Deputies performed a felony traffic stop on the suspect vehicle near the driveway of the residence, and the suspect was taken into custody without incident," Biniecki said. "The shotgun was recovered at the scene and it was determined that shots had been fired but no one was struck.

The suspect was transported to the Sanilac County Jail, where he was being held on multiple charges, including attempted murder, assault with intent to commit murder, possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony, and possession of a firearm while intoxicated.

Bond was set at \$500,000 cash for the suspect, whose name was not released pending his formal arraignment in Sanilac County District Court.



Sebewaing. Troopers at the Michigan State Police post in Caro reported the incident unfolded Tuesday at about 7:30 p.m. when Huron County Central Dispatch received a 911 call regarding a "shots fired" call near the 100 block of Young Street.

Cancer screening may save your life

Probably few folks are interested in engaging in a conversation about colorectal cancer, but if more Michigan residents did broach the subject of screening for this silent killer, the state might not be ranked seventh in the nation in colorectal cancer deaths.

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month, and health officials are urging residents, especially those at high risk, to schedule a screening.

In a nutshell, most colorectal cancers can be traced back to "polyps", mushroom-like growths in the inner walls of the colon and rectum. The longer a polyp goes undetected, the greater chance that it will become cancerous.

Risk factors include a personal or family history of colon cancer or pre-cancerous colon polyps, age (90 percent of cases involve adults ages 50 and older), an Eastern European (Ashkenazi) Jewish background, a diet high in animals fats and low in fiber, not being physically active, obesity, diabetes, smoking and heavy consumption of alcohol.

Early colorectal cancer often has no symptoms, which is why screening is so important. Advanced disease may cause symptoms such as blood in or on your stool, dark or black stool, stomach pain, a change in bowel habits, onset of constipation or diarrhea that lasts for more than a few days, and unexplained weight loss. Anyone who experiences such symptoms is urged to see their personal physician as soon as possible.

Don't become a statistic. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), in 2009 there were 405 diagnosed cases of colorectal cancer and 159 documented deaths in the Thumb area (Tuscola, Sanilac, Huron, Bay, Saginaw, and St. Clair counties).

Before you dismiss the idea of screening due to cost, we'd like to point out there is a free colorectal cancer screening program available to both men and women in the Thumb. Eligible candidates are 50 to 64 years of age, are at average or increased risk for colorectal cancer, are low income and/or have inadequate or no health insurance.

More information is available by calling the Huron County Health Department at (989) 269-9721 (ext. 182).

While we're at it, we'd like to note that the Huron County Health Department (serving residents with clinics throughout the Thumb area), also offers free breast and cervical cancer screening.

Officials project that more than 234,500 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed and more than 40,000 people will die from the disease in Michigan this year. New cervical cancer cases are projected at 12,340 for 2013, with more than 4,000 patients expected to die.

Those are sobering figures, but a diagnosis doesn't have to mean a death sentence. for example, if breast cancer is diagnosed and treated early, the 5-year survival rate is more than 90 percent.

Those are the sort of numbers we can all live with.

"Two wrongs don't make a right, but three lefts do." -

Whether you're turning a corner or signing your name, being left is hardly ever right. That's because lefties are in the minority. Only about 10 percent of the population

At my house that computes to one out of six. Some of the time. More on that later.

Left-handedness tends to run in families, but not ours. At least not in the traditional, legalistic sense. I am a righty, through and through. We all are. My husband, his parents and siblings, my parents and siblings, our children – all northpaws, except for one son who writes with his non-right hand.

Various theories involving techniques of caveman hunters, left-brain, right-brain thinking and ancient artwork all hypothesize why the hand usage thing is so skewed. Even the majority of chimpanzees are righthanded, so it's not a uniquely human mystery.

My son is in good company. There are lots of smart and successful left-handers – outside of baseball, even. Three of the last four U.S. presidents have been lefties. Albert Einstein and Leonardo (da Vinci, not DiCaprio) were southpaws. Even Bart Simpson is left-handed. At least he's drawn that way.

Fame and fortune aside, left-handedness has not always been an accepted trait. In days gone by, back when the schoolmarm slapped students' hands with a wooden ruler, left-handed children were taught (sometimes forced) to use their right hand. (They don't call them the good old days for nothing.)

While we no longer coerce left-handed children to follow the right-handed path and instead accept their journey on the road less traveled, the intricacies of our language make one wonder. If you describe something as out in left field, it is strange, or off course. A person can be left for dead, in the lurch, out in the cold, holding the bag and in the dark – none of them desirable. And we all understand no child wants to be left behind. Ever.

Yet, a person who is right on the mark, or makes all the right moves is doing things... well, the right way. When all is right with the world, it is a good day. Righteous,

Some might write off these observations as insignificant, but I'm a true believer in the power of words. I'm not advocating for substantial changes in the way we speak; I simply want to make sure my southpaw son realizes how leftastic and leftraordinary he is. Or isn't.

True lefties do everything left-handed. My son writes with his left hand, but he completes a number of other tasks with his right. He holds a hockey stick and golf club like a right-hander. He throws left, bats right and holds a fork and spoon with his left hand.

This mishmash of right-left preference is called mixedhandedness or cross-dominance. In reality, my son is neither left nor right-handed, but a little of both.

No one is sure what makes a person left or mixedhanded. One line of thought, called the vanishing twin theory, suggests left-handed people were originally half of a mirror-image set of twins with the right-handed fetus failing to develop sometime during early pregnancy. The fact that twins have nearly twice the frequency ed as half of a set of twins. It was something we'd never teams.

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Until we tried finding a hockey stick for his younger, right-handed brother. We naturally gravitated to the righthanded hockey sticks. They didn't work, because our youngest son uses a left-handed hockey stick. The same goes for golf, where he swings left. When throwing a ball, however, he is a righty.

In essence, wherever the older brother is left-handed, the younger brother is right, and vice versa. They are mirror images of one another, born six years apart - like twins who share everything, except a birthday. I find the coincidence intriguing and fascinating, or perhaps better put, leftriguing and leftcinating.

Some say it is a mixed up world. At our house, it is a mixed-handed world. We may be a little left of center, but for us it just feels right.

"The Michigan State Police at its core is a service organization. We have a long history of providing the highest quality of law enforcement services and public safety throughout Michigan," said First Lt. Mitch Krugielki, commander of the Caro

"We recognize that this investigation was a direct result of the cooperative efforts of all agencies involved," Krugielki added. "The Michigan State Police will continue to strive to work cooperatively with law enforcement partners in an effort to make our communities a safer place to live."

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson indicated his department shares the same goal, and he said the check presented Thursday is a welcome boost during a time when operating budgets are at a premium.

"The Huron County Sheriff's Office is a small rural department with limited resources, some of which were used to assist with the HSI investigation into Aquila Farms," Hanson said. "The asset forfeiture funds being awarded will help us to recover some of our investment by allowing us to update equipment, training facilities and community safety programs that may have not been possible due to budgetary constraints.'

The funds constitute a portion of the money obtained when the owners and the business itself, Aquila Farms LLC, were ordered to pay fines and court-ordered payments in lieu of forfeiture totaling more than \$2.7 million. The funds were distributed in accordance with HSI's asset-forfeiture program, which applies to assets obtained as proceeds in con-

junction with criminal activity.

The case first made headlines in May 2007 when HSI special agents executed search warrants at the farm look for evidence of mistreatment of as part of an investigation that resulted in the administrative arrests of dozens of illegal aliens.

began in early 2007 when they provided the lead to HSI Detroit of suspected illegal activity at the farm. After HSI initiated an investigation, troopers and the sheriff's department assisted in executing federal search and arrest warrants at the business owners' home and at the farm on 3 separate occasions.

The owners were sentenced Nov. 8, 2011, to 3 years probation and ordered to pay fines totaling \$234,000 after pleading guilty to hiring illegal aliens and aiding and abetting each other to do so.

The clerk pitched in a few dollars of her own and told the young woman not to worry about it.

True story.

Is there anything more heartbreaking?

For the record, the clerk didn't tell me this story, and I doubt she would have. But, I did hear it firsthand. I just happened to be standing nearby, minding my own business. Okay, so I was listening in (hey, I'm a reporter;

Ballard's foul troubles had him riding the pine for most of the third, but Cass City couldn't take advantage of his absence, namely because of the fine defensive effort inside by undersized Jake Beachy.

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DNR reports crossbow hunting on the rise

Although the overall number of hunters in Michigan has been on a slight decline, the Department of Natural Resources reports that a recent deer hunter survey shows growth in one method of deer hunting – crossbows.

In the past, only hunters with disabilities had the option to hunt with a crossbow. Beginning in 2009, crossbows were allowed in most areas of Michigan during the archery deer season in an attempt to expand hunting opportunities, retain existing hunters and recruit new hunters. Crossbow hunters were required to obtain a free crossbow stamp to determine the number of hunters who took advantage of the new method.

In 2009, the opportunity to use a crossbow was extended only to hunters 50 years of age or older in the Upper Peninsula and northern Lower Peninsula, while hunters of any age could use crossbows in the southern Lower Peninsula. In 2010 the age restriction was eliminated statewide.

The archery deer season runs statewide on public and private land and is divided into early and late season segments (Oct. 1 through Nov. 14 and Dec. 1 through Jan. 1). In the Upper Peninsula, crossbows are only allowed to be used in the early archery season.

"We have discovered that in 2011, 25 percent of the crossbow users had not hunted in the archery season in previous years," said DNR Deer and Elk Program Leader Brent Rudolph. "These hunters were newly recruited

hunting."

The opinion survey also revealed that hunting with a crossbow met most or all of the archers' expectations, and nearly all crossbow hunters planned to use crossbows again in the future.

The number of hunters who obtained the free crossbow stamp by vear is:

- 2009 45,692
- 2010 64,340 • 2011 - 74,120
- 2012 88,565

Although the expanded opportunity increased the number of archery hunters, the amount of deer harvested overall during the archery season did not increase each year. Harvest of deer over all seasons combined declined or was similar to previous

"With close to 800,000 hunters in Michigan annually, we know deer hunting is a strong tradition held by many," said DNR Wildlife Division Chief Russ Mason. "The expanded crossbow regulations met all the expectations we hoped for. Our primary goal is to do a good job managing the deer herd, and if new hunting

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

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Spring migration brings avian airshow to Thumb

swallows returning to Capistrano, but Michigan will witness spring migrations in the coming weeks that will offer bird fans an opportunity to see noteworthy numbers of avian creatures returning to their summer homes – or at least passing through as they move further

Spring migrations aren't always as noticeable as fall migrations - certainly the waterfowl hunters are not out in the marshes taking advantage of the ducks and geese moving through – but they are every bit as moving and can be just as enjoyable, if you know what to look for.

Need an example? Tundra swans will soon move through, winging along the state's eastern shoreline, often settling in to rest en masse in suitable habitat. Doug Reeves, assistant chief of the Department of DNR Wildlife Resources' Division, said the swans will often take up residence in prodigious num-

It may not be quite as dramatic as bers at Fish Point State Wildlife Area viewing areas, available species and tours, reservations are recommend- wildlife biologist Joe Robison, who on Saginaw Bay in Tuscola County.

> Fish Point – a 3,700-acre area comprised of farm fields, floodings and coastal wetlands and prairies – has been dubbed the "Chesapeake of the Midwest" because of the abundance and variety of waterfowl that move through. What makes Fish Point special for birders is a 20-foot-tall observation tower that boasts a view of much of the management area. The tundra swans are usually visible from the tower during a 2- to 3-week period in early to mid-March.

Fish Point is one of 121 areas listed in the Michigan Wildlife Viewing Guide, which can be found on the website

by choosing Viewing Wildlife from the left-hand menu. The guide lists

the best times to see them, maps and directions, and descriptions of the them at a time," Reeves said. "It can sites and facilities available at them. The guide is divided into three geographical areas (Upper Peninsula, northern Lower Peninsula and southern Lower Peninsula) for easy access to information on nearby viewing opportunities.

Michigan is probably most famous among birders as the summer home of Kirtland's warblers, a rare species that winters in the Caribbean but nests in northern jack pine forests. Kirtland's warblers attract thousands of viewers from all over the world who flock to the northern Lower Peninsula to get a glimpse of these endangered birds.

For those interested in a bit of help catching sight of the Kirtland's warbler, the U.S. Forest Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and www.michigan.gov/wildlife the Michigan Audubon Society offer (starting in mid-May) guided tours. Because of the popularity of the

In addition to the swans and warblers, far less exotic species attract crowds in other parts of Michigan,

Timberdoodle Festival at the Hartley Outdoor Education Center in St. Charles celebrates the woodcock, a game bird that is related to shorebirds but inhabits upland habitat. Woodcock return to Michigan from their wintering grounds (mostly in early successional forests and will be seen as soon as the snow is gone.

Early successional forests are young-growth forests – often created naturally by fire or flood or by human activities like timber harvest – that offer a dense habitat of shrubs and saplings, as well as scattered openings (critical for woodcock reproduction). Woodcock, in particular, prefer aspen stands because they provide the right cover for nesting and brood-rearing and offer moist soil and plenty of earthworms.

Woodcock are known for their elaborate courtship ritual when males move into openings and begin calling, or peenting, to broadcast their presence. After calling, the birds rise their wings, chirping and circling, and then stopping abruptly to coast back to the ground. The sky dance is a magic spectacle of spring. Best yet, woodcock can be found statewide, anywhere there is suitable habitat of thick stem density with appropriate openings.

One of the most popular birding areas in Michigan is Pointe Mouillee State Game Area on the shores of Lake Erie. The area is notable both for the number of birds that use the more opportunities to see numerous area, as well as for some rather unusual visitors, too.

"We've got bald eagles that nest here, osprey that nest here, and we have one of the largest blackcrowned night heron rookeries in the Midwest," Robison said. "We've got white egrets, great blue herons, Forster's terns, common terns, and that's not to mention the waterfowl – thousands of canvasback and redheads, bluebills and goldeneyes and mergansers. And lots of tundra swans.'
