## Weyer takes over the reins of local agriscience program

As the 2012-2013 school year winds down, students, staff and parents/guardians are turning their focus to successfully wrapping up another educational calendar year.

While the month of May typically signals the upcoming summer break, this May welcomed a new face to the staff at Cass City Junior/Senior High School. Mr. Russell Weyer began serving as agriscience teacher and

FFA advisor May 1.

In April, Weyer graduated from Michigan State University with a major in environmental studies/agriscience and a minor in biology. Prior to beginning at Cass City, he finished his student teaching assignment at Maple Valley High School in Vermontville, Mich. Weyer was one of 5 Michigan State graduates certified to teach agriscience this year.

In addition to acclimating to a new school district, Weyer has a number of tasks specific to the Cass City

FFA program. One of those jobs is to finalize arrangements for the upcoming FFA banquet set to take place May 7. Weyer has been in contact with an FFA state officer who will be present for the festivities.

Another end of the year responsibility is preparing for the Region 3 Camp. There are 6 different FFA regions in the state, and Region 3 includes the Cass City, Tuscola ISD, Ubley, USA, Lakers and Sanilac ISD chapters.

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## Robbery suspect takes his own life

A Michigan man believed responsible for at least 2 bank robberies in the Thumb took his own life last week after law enforcement authorities cornered him in Georgia.

Sanilac County Sheriff Garry Biniecki said Thumb enforcement agencies joined efforts to track down the suspect, 53-year-old Jack David Kaiser of the Flushing/Owosso area, after Kaiser allegedly robbed the Capac State Bank in St. Clair County’s city of Yale.

“The ongoing investigation into the Brown City bank robbery (last month) took another twist,” Biniecki said of the April 27 robbery in Yale. “Croswell and Marlette police department’s Facebook post initiated multiple tips from Facebook users, identifying the suspect (as Kaiser).”

“Armed with the identity of the suspect, Detective Sgt. Darrin Siemen and Detective Mark Ruggles spearheaded the multi-jurisdictional investigation which included Brown City Police Department, Yale Police Department, St. Clair County Sheriff’s Office, St. Clair Major Crimes Unit, detectives from

Genesee County Sheriff’s Office, Sanilac County Drug Task Force and the FBI,” Biniecki said.

The search for Kaiser led investigators to several residences in the Flushing area in Genesee County and as far north as Clare and Grayling.

“Through investigative techniques including surveillance, it was determined that Kaiser had fled Michigan and was heading south to an unknown destination. Area broadcasts describing the suspect and vehicle were put out to southern states that he might be traveling through,” Biniecki said.

During the afternoon hours of April 30, investigators, using updated electronic data, located Kaiser, and Sieman directed authorities in Alpharetta, Ga., to his whereabouts, according to Biniecki.

“They (Georgia law enforcement officials) proceeded to attempt a traffic stop. In the attempt to apprehend the suspect in a parking lot, Kaiser fatally shot himself before local

## Electronics prohibited in courthouse

If you’re planning a trip to the Tuscola County Courthouse, plan to leave that cell phone or laptop at home or in your car.

Due to the widespread use of phones and cameras, the county’s trial courts have enacted a new policy banning all mobile electronic devices from the courthouse.

“Things have changed. It isn’t 20 years ago anymore,” said Chief Judge Kim David Glaspie. “These days, just about everybody that enters our courthouse has a mobile phone with a camera feature. Not only can those phones disrupt court proceedings when they ring, the availability of cameras taking still photos or videos can be a distraction.”

According to Tuscola County Court Administrator Donna Fraczek, individuals with a mobile phone, laptop computer, tablet computer or any other mobile electronic device will be sent away from the building until they no longer have the item on their person. “People with business at the courthouse are reminded to leave such devices at home or in their car before entering the building,” she said.

The new policy is an effort to update practices at the courthouse, making them consistent with

## A Legacy of Love Bolz shares local family history in kid’s book

Memories of childhood visits to the family farm on Cedar Run Road along with stories about her great-grandparents, passed on by

her mother over the years, have helped to keep Cass City close to Karen (Hendrick) Bolz’ heart.

It’s an appreciation Bolz is passing on to future generations in the form of a children’s book.

“My family was one of the original settlers in Ellington Township,” said Bolz, of Milan, Mich., who grew up in the Thumb and still has a number of relatives living in the area.

“The book is titled, ‘A Legacy of

Love’ and it is the story of Orson and Fannie Hendrick,” Bolz said of her great-grandparents. “It starts out in Ohio, where they knew each other as children, and then Orson’s family moved to Ellington Township in 1866. Eventually, Fannie’s family moved to Novesta Township and a romance began. A very sweet story.”

“Actually, some of what this is based on was an article that the Chronicle did on them at the time of their 65th anniversary back in 1939 — that and stories my mother told me about them,” Bolz added. “I, unfortunately, never knew them.”

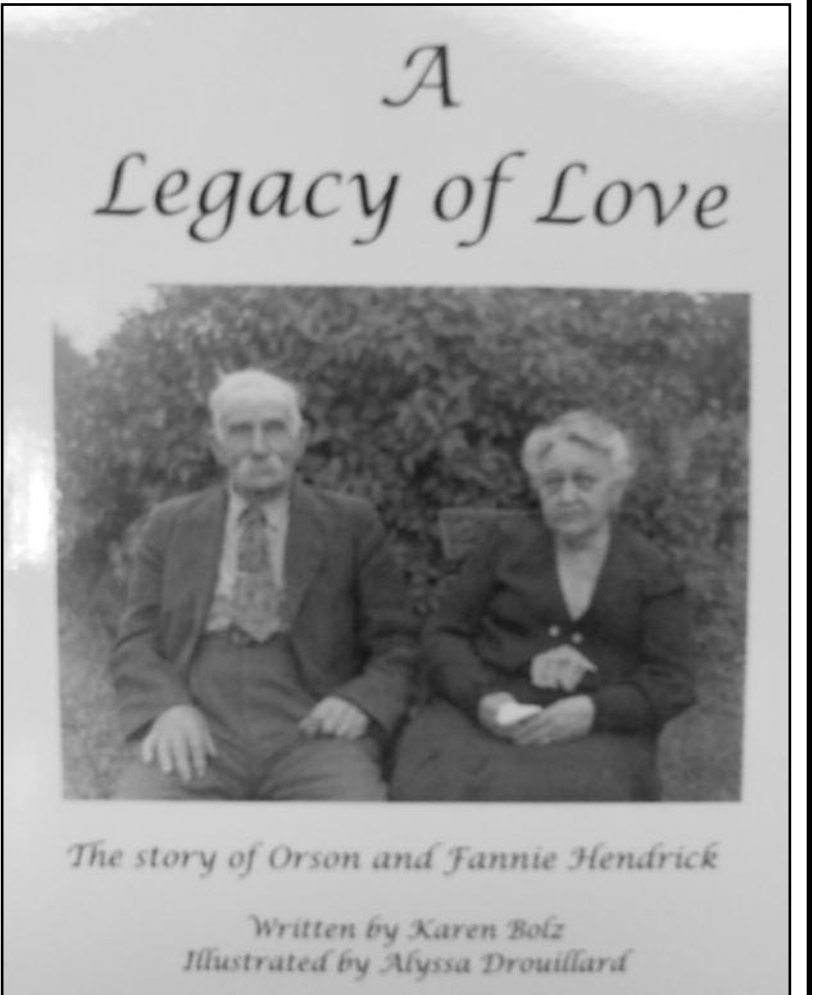
Bolz grew up with a strong sense of family and her roots.

“I have always had a great love for Cass City,” she said. “As a child growing up in Dearborn, my greatest memories were of the visits we made to the farm on Cedar Run Road. I was the happiest child ever when we moved there.”

“And, I love history, especially family history,” Bolz added. “I have always loved the stories of how when our ancestors bought the farm it was all woods and they worked hard in clearing all the trees to make it into a farm. And I always loved the family picture that we have of Orson, Fannie and their children in front of the log cabin. Mom used to tell me the story of Orson and Fannie, and so it was always special.”

It was those memories that eventually prompted Bolz to put pen to

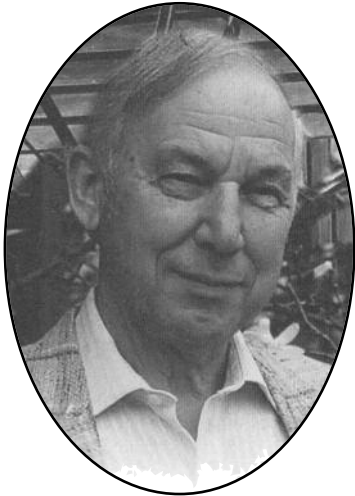

## Avoid ticks, Lyme Disease outdoors

*We understand area residents are just starting to get used to the idea of finally storing their winter gear with the arrival of long-awaited warm weather, but it’s not too early to remind everyone to take some precautions before venturing out this summer.*

*We’re talking about the health risks presented by ticks and Lyme Disease.*

*May is Lyme Disease Awareness Month, and health officials are reminding everyone that the illness can result in a variety of symptoms, including a rash that only appears in about 58 percent of cases and not necessarily at the site of a tick bite. Flu-like symptoms such as fever, muscle aches, headaches, fatigue and weakness may also appear.*

*If gone untreated, Lyme Disease can lead to severe heart, neurological, eye and joint problems.*

*In 2011, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recorded more than 30,000 cases of the illness in the United States, although officials say those statistics are grossly under reported, putting the actual number of cases occurring annually at around 300,000. Michigan physicians reported 105 cases in 2011, 98 cases in 2012 and 40 so far this year.*

*Lyme Disease and other tick-borne illnesses are transmitted through the bite of an infected tick. Ways you can protect your family this summer include:*

*\*Wear light-colored clothing, allowing you to spot ticks more easily.*

*\*Wear a hat and long-sleeved shirt. Tuck your clothes in — shirt into pants, pants into socks.*

*\*Use an insect repellant with DEET on exposed skin.*

*\*When hiking, stay in the middle of trails and try to avoid underbrush, fallen trees and tall grass.*

*\*Always perform a tick check when returning inside from the outdoors or when outdoors for extended periods of time.*

*\*Place clothes in a dryer for 15 minutes on the hot cycle to kill ticks on clothing before washing.*

*\*If you do find a tick, use a pair of fine-pointed tweezers, grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible, and pull gently and firmly until the tick releases. Avoid crushing or killing the tick while it is still attached to the skin. Once removed, clean the area with an antiseptic such as alcohol.*

*\*Save ticks for testing. Directions and forms can be found at [www.mlda.org](http://www.mlda.org).*

## The bond of preschool

It was a party 14 years in the making. Attendees included nine moms who met when our kids were in preschool. Now, we came together to anticipate and celebrate those same preschoolers’ high school graduations.

We sat around a long table at a local restaurant, passing old photos and wondering aloud where the time went.

Fourteen years is a significant span during which a preschooler goes from practically in diapers to practically in college. A mom, however, doesn’t change a bit – well, at least not her hairstyle (as one of the ladies in attendance pointed out).

To our kids, the 14 years of childhood probably elapsed at a painstakingly slow pace. From a mom’s perspective, it passed in a heartbeat. Cliché, I know, but sometimes being a mom is cliché – often, in fact, just ask my teenager.

Friendships forged during preschool run deep. My son will room at college with another boy from the class. The same boy is going to prom with one of the girls from the group. Two boys from the class had their eighteenth birthdays around the same time and promptly went together to get their first tattoos. Deep waters start as trickling streams.

For us moms, it began in a narrow hallway outside the preschool classroom where we stood three times a week waiting for our children to be dismissed. We had just minutes together – 10 on a good day – yet we managed to share and bond and build connections lasting more than a decade.

We no longer possess the luxury of 10 minutes of togetherness and chitchat in a hallway three times a week, but we’ve kept in touch in the sporadic manner that old friends can.

Fourteen years does not unfold in a vacuum. Much has happened since our 4-year-old sons thought they wanted to marry us someday – and we, for our part, believed 35 was old. Our kids have grown up (or nearly so) and we’ve got more life experiences under our (slightly widening) belts.

Grief has landed on our doorsteps with the loss of mothers and fathers. We’ve weathered head injury, gallstones, cancer and teenage drivers. We’ve raised – or are raising – a total of 28 children between the nine families. For a few, the current graduate is their oldest, for others the youngest. We’re all still married, which is almost a miracle in itself. We will forever answer to the call of “mom” and over the last decade-plus have fostered a deep love for our own kids and an enduring affection for one another’s.

None of us have tattoos.

We’re a varied bunch – from talkative to introspective, energetic to calm, cool and collected. Some lead. Others follow. Our friendships are arbitrary; most of us met by chance simply because our kids attended the same preschool. Yet, we are connected by a common history that cannot be defined or replaced. There may be long periods of silence, but we know when one of us is in pain, the others will be there to help; when we celebrate, the others will share our joy.

Fourteen years ago, I don’t think any of us had cell phones. Now we pull ours out to show one another photos of prom dresses or our kids’ tattoos, not realizing –

in that moment – we have left a mark on one another that cannot be erased. Our simple dinner has taken three hours and we promise to meet again before another 14 years has passed.

Deep waters start as trickling streams, and on this graduation day, for a few moms at least, they will end with teardrops. While bittersweet, they will be tears of happiness for our own kids as well as those of our good friends.

To think it all started in preschool.

The Department of Natural Resources reminds hunters that applications for Michigan elk and bear hunting licenses are available now through June 1. There will be 200 elk licenses and 7,906 bear hunting licenses available for the 2013 hunting seasons.

Only Michigan residents are eligible to apply for an elk license. Bear licenses are available for both residents and nonresidents; however, no more than 2 percent of licenses in any bear management unit will be issued to nonresidents.

Hunters can apply online at [www.michigan.gov/hunt-drawings](http://www.michigan.gov/hunt-drawings), at any authorized license agent or at a DNR Customer Service Center. A nonrefundable \$4 fee is charged at the time of application. Hunters may purchase just one application for each species.

Applicants may call (517) 373-1263 by June 1 for assistance with their application and may check their drawing results online at [www.michigan.gov/hunt-drawings](http://www.michigan.gov/hunt-drawings) beginning June 24 for both species.

# Area “take backs” net pounds of unused prescription drugs

The Sanilac and Huron County law enforcement agencies are reporting success in their efforts to collect old and unused prescription drugs from Thumb residents.



**THE HURON County Sheriff’s Department has collected hundreds of prescription and other unused drugs during law enforcement “take back” events over the past several months. “We took in 55 pounds over the last 6 months, which includes around 4 pounds Saturday, for a grand total of nearly 175 pounds,” reported Sheriff Kelly J. Force is pleased to announce that the 2013 Drug Take Back Day resulted in citizens bringing in 14 pounds of unused/expired prescription medications,” said James H. Johnson, drug task force director.

“The drop-off location time at the Sanilac County Sheriff’s Office Corrections Lobby and residential pick-up by drug task force officers made for a successful day,” Johnson said. “The combined efforts on Saturday, April 27, along with the year-round collection commitment, resulted in just over 99 pounds of prescription medications being taken out of the hands of those it was not intended for and possible harm.

In Huron County, meanwhile, Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said his department recently collected 55 pounds of unused medications, for a year-round collection total of nearly 175 pounds.

The U.S. Department of Justice — Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Field Office out of Detroit took receipt of the drugs, which will be properly destroyed so as not to cause any environmental impact on land and sewer systems, according to Johnson.

“Sanilac County residents are reminded that they can continue to dispose of any unused or expired prescription drugs at the Sanilac County Sheriff’s Office Corrections Lobby or contact the Sanilac County Drug Task Force Office at (810) 648-4580 for pick up for those unable to travel.

I guess it was bound to happen after the atrocities we’ve all witnessed in recent years, from 9-11 to the murder of children at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut, to the Boston Marathon bombings.

From what I’ve read, a line of children’s bulletproof gear, now available in the United States from a variety of companies, is proving very popular. Companies are selling everything from bulletproof clipboards and backpacks to vests and shirts, all manufactured to withstand attacks from a variety of weapons, including knives, revolvers, pistols and even Uzis.

I couldn’t say what my grandparents would have thought about that, but I do know the trend leaves me uneasy at best.

It’s difficult to come to another conclusion when I’m left wondering how my own children and grandchildren are going to survive in a world where simply walking into a classroom or being a spectator somewhere could put their lives at risk.

In the final analysis, hate is hate, whether it takes the form of trying to wipe out a segment of the population based on prejudice, or killing and maiming innocent youngsters and adults in the name of a deity.

As long as there’s hate, I guess we’ll always wonder if, perhaps, the world really is going to hell in a hand basket.

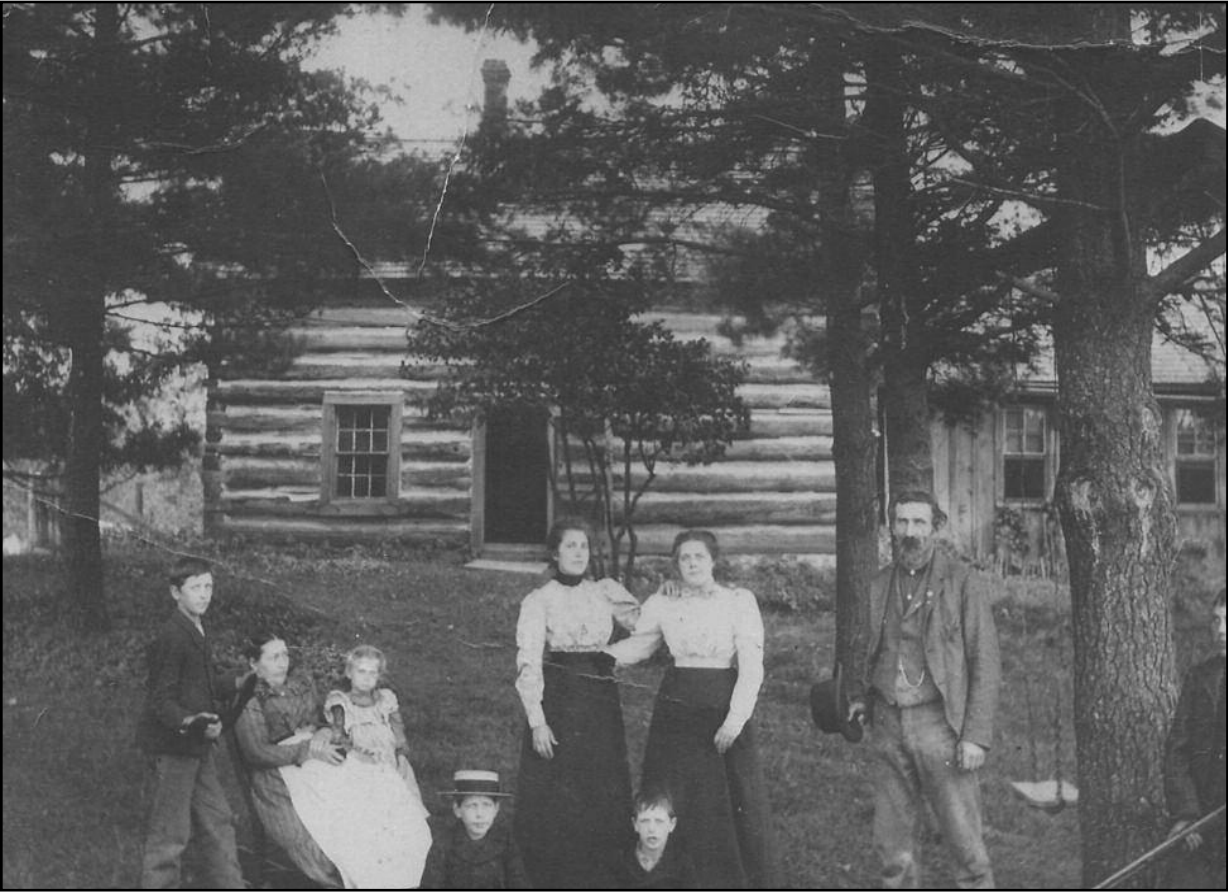

Mental Illness and the Perception of Violence

Through education and awareness we can eliminate the stigma and the perception of mental health that individuals and society may have. People do not realize that a person’s mental health is just as important as their physical health. Based on a survey conducted from 2001 to 2003, that reflected the entire adult population of the United States, one in four adults have been diagnosed with a mental health disorder in any given year - equivalent to 57.7 million people in the United States.

The primary source of knowledge regarding mental illness is the mass media where people with mental health disorders are often portrayed as dangerous or potentially dangerous. Unfortunately, most media sources have the wrong perception of mental illness; therefore placing a stigma on mental health issues as a whole. Individuals with a mental health disorder are no more likely than a member of the general population to commit a crime or a violent act. Across the nation, violent acts committed by individuals with mental illness represent a small fraction of crimes, yet are frequently sensationalized by the media. Research also shows, people with a mental health disorder are far more likely to be victims of violence than perpetrators. Researchers at North Carolina State University and Duke University found that people diagnosed with schizophrenia, bipolar disorder or psychosis are actually 2 1/2 times more likely to be attacked, sexually assaulted or mugged than the general population. Research has also shows that the vast majority of people who commit violent acts/crimes do not suffer from a mental health disorder. Individuals with a disability or a mental illness are generally more at risk of violence geared directly toward them. Violence and abuse against anyone is not acceptable.

Public perceptions between mental illness and violence are central to the stigma and discrimination individuals may feel. Individuals that may be in crisis are skeptical of friends or relatives who offer assistance because of the stigma associated with mental illness which may delay treatment. Many individuals suffer in silence rather than risk the discrimination or ridicule from family, friends and the general public if they seek help. Stigma has varying degrees that affect all areas of life from housing to employment to establishing relationships. Worst of all stigma may result in the person internalizing negative attitudes about themselves.

paper in order to share the stories she had heard time and time again.

“After mom died in 2006, I got all her family history over the years, and one of the articles was one done by the Chronicle in 1939 featuring Orson and Fannie’s 65th wedding anniversary. So I have had the story in my heart a long time,” she said.

“About 2 years ago, I was driving my then-7-year-old granddaughter back to her home near Kalamazoo. We were telling each other stories, and so I told her the story, and when I finished, I told her that it was true and that it was her great-great-great-grandparents. She said, ‘Grandma, you should write a book about that.’

Bolz took her granddaughter’s advice to heart and started work on what would become a 32-page children’s book, illustrated by her cousin’s granddaughter, Alyssa Drouillard, a great-great-great-granddaughter.

“Orson and Fannie knew each other as children in Saybrook (Township), Ashtabula County, Ohio,” Bolz explained. “When the Hendricks moved to Ellington Township, Orson was 11 and Fannie Downing was 9. They promised to write to each other and they did for several years. In 1871, Fannie’s father, Harlan Downing, bought a farm in Novesta Township and moved his family there. Fannie and Orson were reunited and 3 years later, in 1874, they were married. Fannie taught school for those 3 years at the Cedar Run

School.”

Bolz said it was her great-great-grandfather, Joel T. Hendrick, who purchased the family’s original 100 acres on Cedar Run Road in 1866. “My grandfather, Theodore Hendrick, was Joel’s grandson and he was born on and lived on that farm until his death at age 91 in 1984,” she noted. “My mother, Irene Hendrick O’Dell Tracy, was born and raised on the farm and moved to the Detroit area after she was married. This was during the depression and she remained there until 1967, when we moved to Cass City. She had a house built on the farm — I was 11 years old.”

Bolz graduated from Cass City High School in 1974. She then attended Central Michigan University, where she met and married her husband, Jim Bolz, in 1976. The couple, who have lived in Milan since then, have 3 daughters and 5 grandchildren.

Bolz said she still has family members residing in the Cass City area.

Orson and Fannie had 10 children. Two died as infants,” she added. “I have one brother, Duane O’Dell, that lives in Deford, and several cousins still live in and around Cass City. You may know Dick Hendrick, owner of the Cass Theatre — his grandfather was one of Orson and Fannie’s sons.”

Anyone interested in seeing Bolz’ book can do so at Rawson Memorial District Library in Cass City, as Bolz is donating a copy to the library.

THE BOOK was illustrated by Bolz’ cousin’s granddaughter, Alyssa Drouillard, whose work above depicts Orson and Fannie saying goodbye. The 32-page children’s book also features some family photos.

time — in a special election planned for Sept. 24 — in hopes that residents will approve the bond issue to generate funding for a number of long-overdue infrastructure improvements.

Owen-Gage voters earlier this year rejected a proposed 2.95-mill request by a 9-vote margin, 184 to 175. That vote came a year after residents turned down a similar proposal by just 7 votes.

Asked what school officials will need to do different this time to win citizen-approval of the bond issue, Drury responded, “I guess we need to do a better job of selling our needs to the voters based on what is essential to operation a school building, and there are some serious needs — a roof, boilers.”

Although school officials are not planning any new construction, the repair and replacement needs are many, including a new lighting system, electrical service upgrades, interior repairs and replacement of an outdated telephone system. “There’s quite a list. We are way behind technology-wise when it comes to exposing our students to what’s out there,” Drury pointed out. “We have technology infrastructure needs and there are what I’ll say are student hands-on technology needs.

“Hopefully we can convince enough people so we can be success-

ful this time,” Drury said of the election in September. “I think a little more work and a little better explanation...the key is to get those passionate parents out” to the polls.

Drury had no difficulty hitting the ground running at Owen-Gage, where he previously served as interim superintendent in 2010-11. It was a productive year in which he helped the district overcome its deficit-spending status. He acknowledged Owen-Gage’s current financial outlook is much improved.

“We should have a balanced budget this year,” he said, adding the district’s \$1.7 million budget includes a fund balance totaling roughly \$170,000.

Drury started his career in education back in 1969, retiring in 2002 after a 30-year stint in the Lakers School District, where he taught and served as a junior high principal, business manager and athletic director before starting a 14-year tenure as superintendent. He then worked for Scheurer Hospital in Pigeon for 3 years before returning to Lakers as an interim superintendent for 7 months.

Drury indicated it didn’t take very much convincing to return to Owen-Gage.

“I love to be around kids, and I like the challenge of having a need or a problem, and helping to resolve that,” he said. “And certainly the bond issue is greatly needed here.”

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# Oncology rehab services offered at local hospital

attention to their shoulder function. It has been my honor to treat cancer survivors and help them get back to a life that is pain free and learn to embrace their new normal.”

While at the camp, officers from the Cass City chapter will take part in team building activities to enhance their leadership skills. They also plan a program of activities for the next year. Weyer will help oversee the experience for the Cass City officers. “I believe we need to have a strong support system. I believe we need to support our kids,” he said. A big influence on Weyer’s decision to choose the position at Cass City Junior/Senior High to begin his career in education was its close proximity to his family in Lapeer County. The rural setting of Cass City, with an emphasis on agriculture, provided him with a sense of familiarity. Weyer said his experiences while growing up near the southern Thumb area can help him relate to students who enjoy similar activities. Another draw was the availability of the Cass City Ag Learning Lab and the possibilities it can provide. “I

expect to use the animal facility to help teach students about agriculture,” he said. Even though he is still learning about his new role and locale, Weyer has already begun to work on future plans that will enhance the students’ learning experiences. He would like to incorporate a greenhouse into the agriscience curriculum at some point in the near future. A greenhouse could expand the horticulture aspect of the program by allowing students to actively take part in the plant growing process, Weyer said, adding, “Students want to know where their food comes from.” As Weyer transitions from his student teaching experience to his new teaching position, he enthusiastically welcomes what the future holds. “I am very excited to get the opportunity to work in this school district, along with the other teachers, to provide students with the opportunity to learn about agriculture,” he said.

# Judges prohibit electronics

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Supreme Court rules. In 1989, the Michigan Supreme Court issued an administrative order prohibiting photography or video recording of jurors and the jury selection process in order to avoid juror intimidation. The rules require that requests for “media coverage” of court proceedings must be made in advance, with notice to all of the parties involved in a case.

consist of 3 separate courts, each of which serves all of Tuscola County. The district court generally handles misdemeanor criminal cases, civil actions where the amount in dispute is no more than \$25,000, landlord-tenant disputes, civil infractions and small claims. The probate court, meanwhile, handles the disposition of wills, trusts and estates, the financial protection of incapacitated individuals, and proceedings under the mental health code. Finally, the circuit court hears felony criminal cases, civil claims involving more than \$25,000, divorce and custody cases, and cases involving the abuse, neglect or delinquency of minors.

# Wildfire risk here

Wildfire Prevention Week is observed annually in order to focus attention on the increased wildfire risk that typically occurs during this period. “One out of 3 wildfires in Michigan is caused by someone burning debris who didn’t take the proper precautions,” said Bill O’Neill, chief of the DNR’s Forest Resources Division. “Even though many parts of the state are still snow-covered, there are areas in the southern Lower Peninsula where people are getting outdoors and starting to clean up their yards. With late April and early May being the most prevalent time for large wildfires, we’re urging folks to get their burn permit and be prepared in case their fire escapes. A little prevention can go a long way when it comes to wildfires.” O’Neill, who also serves as state forester, added that careless debris burning is the source of most wildfires across Michigan, which makes it all the more important to take the time to plan any burning activity before lighting a match. Ada Takacs, DNR fire prevention specialist, reminds residents that brush and debris burning in Michigan requires a burn permit. In the northern Lower Peninsula and the Upper Peninsula, residents can obtain a free permit online at [www.michigan.gov/burnpermit](http://www.michigan.gov/burnpermit). Those without Internet access can call 866-922-2876, toll-free, to obtain a permit. In southern Michigan, burn permits and information on burning can be obtained from local fire departments and township offices. Spring activities often include outdoor cooking and campfires as well as yard cleanup. Without proper precaution these fires can escape and cause a wildfire. The following tips can help prevent a fire from escaping:

- Clear away flammable material surrounding the fire so it won’t creep into dry vegetation.
- Keep campfires small, and do not leave before they are fully extinguished.
- Be sure and douse fires with plenty of water, stir, and add more water until everything is wet.
- Do not cover a campfire with soil; it may simply smolder before coming back to life.
- Embers can re-ignite. Make sure they are out completely.
- Consider composting or mulching yard debris rather than burning it.

“A little bit of pre-planning goes a long way,” Takacs said. “We can prevent a majority of Michigan wildfires by following these simple tips.” Out of the nearly 500 fires the DNR responded to in 2012, two-thirds of them were caused by people’s negligence. # TBHS participates

Michigan’s 46 Community Mental Health agencies are hosting “Walk-a-Mile In My Shoes,” a rally at the State Capitol today (Wednesday), and a number of Tuscola County residents plan to attend to lobby state legislators about mental health issues and to help combat the stigmas and prejudices associated with mental illnesses, developmental disabilities and substance use disorders. Eighty-three people who use community mental health (CMH) services, one from each county in the state, will deliver brief statements from the capitol steps about the status of the public mental health systems in their counties. The Michigan Association of Community Mental Health Boards (MACMHB), the educational and political arm of the community mental health system in the state, is organizing the rally. MACMHB expects 2,200 people at the event, including people who use CMH services, people who work in the CMH systems and mental health advocates from all areas. The inaugural event attracted 800 people in 2005 and has been growing annually, reaching more than 2,000 last year. The rally starts at 1:30 p.m. on the

front lawn of the Michigan Capitol. “The rally helps showcase the importance of addressing issues facing people with mental illness, developmental disabilities and substance use disorders,” said Susan Rickwalt-Holder, director of Marketing and Training at Tuscola Behavioral Health Systems (TBHS). “Tuscola County residents have participated in the rally since its inauguration in 2005. We are excited to become a part of the impressive 2013 Walk a Mile in My Shoes Rally, and we are eager to once again join advocates from across the state to bring our message to the public,” Rickwalt-Holder said. “There is a compelling need to continue to work and understand the realities of mental health and illness, in order to make improvements in our current system.” In Michigan, one in 5 adults will experience a mental health disorder at some point in their life, yet many of them cannot access the treatment they need. One of our goals is to make sure that everyone who needs treatment for mental health and/or substance use disorders in Michigan is able to receive treatment and to have the hope that recovery is possible.
