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Report: Thumb area children still at risk

There were fewer births to teen moms, fewer repeat births to teens who are already mothers, and fewer premature births in Tuscola County in 2011 compared to 2005.

However, the county saw a jump in the number of unwed mothers and low-birthweight babies born during the same period, according to the latest Michigan League for Public Policy's Kids Count in Michigan Project report.

The report concludes that Michigan has much work to do to give infants the right start in life, with little progress made in improving maternal and infant health from 2005 to 2011. One immediate opportunity, using federal dollars for health care for low-income uninsured women in Michigan, could drive improvements, the report authors say.

The report ranks the state's 54 Great Start Collaboratives, or GSCs, on 8 maternal and infant health measures. Livingston GSC topped the list at

number one, while the Genesee and Wayne GSCs tied for last place.

In the Thumb, Tuscola County ranked 20th overall. Sanilac County came in 15th and Huron County, 30th

Statewide, the largest increase in risk was in more births to unmarried women, rising from 36 percent of all births to 42 percent, an 18 percent jump.

In Tuscola County, the number of unwed mothers increased by 17 percent. Sanilac County also saw a 17percent hike, while the percentage of unmarried mothers in Huron County increased by nearly 30 percent.

"High unemployment, particularly among men, has been cited as a major reason to delay or reject marriage," said Jane Zehnder-Merrell, Kids county in Michigan Project director. "Unfortunately, children born to single mothers are much more likely to face economic hardships and insecurity. Policies that grow opportunities for low-income workers will help.'

The most positive change was a 9percent improvement in repeat teen births, to teen moms who already had a child, showing that public policy can make a difference, Zehnder-Merrell said. She noted Michigan's teen birth rate has been halved since 1990 as a result of a sustained public health and education campaign.

Repeat teen births fell by 12 percent in Tuscola between 2005 and 2011, according to the report, which states Sanilac County saw a whopping 44percent drop in that category. The number of repeat teen births in County).

Huron County, meanwhile, increased by 26 percent.

In other categories, overall teen births fell by 4 percent in Tuscola County (down by 13 percent in Sanilac County and 19 percent in Huron County), with pre-term births falling by 10 percent (down 10 percent in Sanilac County and 2 percent in Huron County). The number of low-birthweight babies, however, increased by 2 percent (the figure fell by 7 percent in Sanilac County and dropped by 12 percent in Huron

In spite of the bad news included in the report, Gilda Z. Jacobs, president and CEO of the Michigan League for Public Policy, says there is reason to be optimistic. "It's important to note that when we have the will, we can find the way to improve a child's chance for success in life," she said.

"This information will be given to local and state policymakers to highlight successes as well as areas where improvements are needed to help guide resources," Jacobs added. Of the 8 indicators, 5 could be

Producers' progress is slow, sure

Thumb area farmers took advantage of a recent string of warm, breezy days to begin catching up on planting chores delayed by a cool, wet spring.

Michigan Farm Bureau officials called producers' progress slow but steady, an assessment Huron County MSU Extension Field Crops Educator Bob Battel agreed with Thursday.

'Some guys started (planting sugar beets) as early as Wednesday or Thursday a week ago, so sugar beets are going in very well. A handful of folks have finished, and I'd say a lot of them are finishing them today,' said Battel, who estimated that 75 to 80 percent of the crop had been planted as of late last week.

"As far as corn goes, a number of people have started (planting). A handful have maybe up to half of their corn in, and then I wouldn't doubt that a few have some soybeans

Hicks, 87, of Deford, died Thursday at the Timberline AFC Home.

Hicks started her public career in the Tuscola County Clerk's office, working for her father-in-law, Archie Hicks, who served as the county's clerk for about 10 years along with stints as a township supervisor and school officer.

When he died, Elsie was elected clerk and served with distinction for 18 years

After a brief retirement, she accepted an appointed to complete the term of then-District 2 Commissioner Kim David Glaspie after he was elected Tuscola County District Court judge, a position he's held for the past several years.

After finishing Glaspie's term as a commissioner, Hicks again retired from public service, but she was called back in 1991 to serve as a commissioner after Mary Lou Burns was named the Tuscola County Friend of the Court.

Hicks ran for office in 1992 and was elected. In her long career she was never defeated at the polls.

Hicks was born July 17, 1925, in Ellington Township to Glen and Eva Mae (Vandemark) Tousley. She married Gerald Hicks May 18, 1946, in her parents' home in Deford. He preceded her in death Sept. 25, 2012.

A Caro High School graduate, she and Gerald were recognized as a Tuscola County "Honor Couple of the Year". She was a member of the Deford United Methodist Church for many years and later attended the Novesta Church of Christ.

Hicks was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and Methodist Women's Society of Christian Service.

Woloshen organizes "fly day" for kids

The skies over Cass City were filled with Red Hawks recently, but it wasn't an invasion, or even an annual migration.

The Red Hawks were sixth grade students participating in a "Young Eagles Fly Day" at the Tuscola Area Airport in Caro. On a perfect morning, with sunshine, clear skies, and a light wind, these students took to the air to experience flying firsthand.

I met volunteer pilots and ground crew at the airport at 9 a.m. to organize the day in the air. Five pilots donated their time, their planes, and fuel to introduce these students to the excitement of flying a plane. Two volunteers ran the ground operation, ensuring that all ran smoothly.

Planes ranged from a Piper Cherokee, which coasted along at about 90 miles per hour, to a twinengine Baron BE able to move at 220 mph.



Raise some hope and foster dreams

Department of Human Services (DHS) workers are often unwelcome visitors when it comes to seeing to the welfare of youngsters in homes where they suspect neglect or abuse issues.

Those concerns aren't always confirmed, but when they are and a child must be removed from the home temporarily, it's vital that a foster family be available to care for that child while the adults in their life sort things out.

Unfortunately, the demand for licensed foster homes often exceeds the supply.

Sadly, some 14,000 Michigan children are in foster care at any given time.

"We need your help to find safe and nurturing homes" for these children until they can be returned to their families," said Kara Hunt, a Tuscola County DHS foster home licensing worker. "In some cases when children cannot be returned to their homes, foster parents are asked to provide permanent homes. At this time, Tuscola County is limited in the number of foster homes that it can offer to those in need."

Who can become a foster parent? If you are at least 18 years of age, have a defined source of income, can pass a health exam and criminal history check, and



I've been on the job for more than 21 years, without a only imagine how I react when one of my kids is bleedday off for longevity, illness, endurance or good behavior. I'm not complaining. I wouldn't want a day off. Not a whole day, anyway. Although I do appreciate 10 minutes under a hot shower within the solitary confines of my bathroom each morning.

If you're a newbie to the profession, you might feel tired. Heck, I'm absolutely certain you are tired. Don't worry. (There will be plenty of things to worry about during the next 18 years, believe me.) You'll get used to the brain fog – even learn to use it to your advantage. Besides, sleep is over-rated. It's one of the lessons motherhood has taught me.

There's more. Motherhood is practically a classroom, and some of the things learned within its confines are even more exciting than sleeping through the night. Like one concept I call the time conundrum.

Back when I was a rookie mom, friends, family and strangers at the grocery store predicted the next 18 years would zoom by faster than warp speed. I nodded my sleep-deprived head, tried not to yawn and failed to believe them. Other mothers fall into the same trap.

Here's why: When you are in the throes of colic, or potty training, or learning to ride a bike, or first day of kindergarten, or getting braces on crooked teeth, or taking a driving test, or going to prom, or moving into the dorm, it's hard to imagine anything beyond your current circumstance. Until the event at hand ends, and another consumes you faster than you can say, "Grab the car seat," and so on until you turn the calendar to another year filled with new adventures and milestones and before you can say, "Here are the car keys," your chubby toddler has become a gangly 16-year-old. Warp speed - a mystical, magical and practically supernatural reality for moms, hopefully not teenage drivers.

The time conundrum - whereby the years zip by speedy quick – logically brings us to our third lesson: Don't sweat the small stuff. And fourth: Ninety-nine percent of it is small stuff.

I kept fastidious track of when my kids learned to walk. The earlier the better! Look at the little guy go! He's got to be advanced for his age! My children now range from 11 to 21 and they all walk just fine. I'd be willing to bet a nickel no one could examine their gaits and determine who walked at nine months and who at 13. To tell the truth, I can't remember myself.

A bad grade in math, making (or not making) the team, messing up at a piano recital, stumbling in the race, squabbles with friends - they all seem important in the moment. But in the big picture, they are but a blip. While I understand this concept, I find it difficult to implement because as mothers we may be able to get by with less sleep, but when it comes to emotions – ours multiply. Lesson five: Motherhood changes you in ways you'd never expect.

I remember the first time I cried because of a TV commercial. My daughter was a newborn and I didn't know what hit me. In the midst of an actress promoting a product - ketchup, if I'm not mistaken - I felt a surge in my chest and tears running down my cheeks. You can



I entered motherhood prepared to teach my kids important lessons about things like being kind, the golden rule, respecting others, being on time, flushing and never leaving chewed gum under your chair. I anticipated molding and changing them for the better, never expecting they'd do the same to me. But they did. And I'm glad. In fact, if someone offered me the chance to go back and do it all over, I probably would. Then again, maybe that's the brain fog talking.

Sanilac County woman arrested in health care fraud investigation

Michigan State Police troopers arrested a Sanilac County woman last week following a lengthy health care fraud investigation.

According to Detective Sgt. Brian Ferguson of the state police post in Caro, officers arrested Sara Ylen, 38, of Lexington, who was later arraigned on several charges, including obtaining money/services by false pretenses, using a computer to commit a crime, and health care fraud.

Mercy Hospital. Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan had paid more than \$94,000 in hospice care for Ylen.

"Both agency investigations were presented to the Sanilac County Prosecutor's Office," Ferguson said. Ylen was subsequently arraigned on the charges in Sanilac County District Court, where District Judge Greg Ross set bond at \$10,000 (10 percent cash) and remanded Ylen to the custody of the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department.

A Community Message... 谷 **TUSCOLA Mental Illness and the Perception of Violence** Bebavioral Health Sustems

Through education and awareness we can eliminate the stigma and the perception of mental health that individuals and society may have. People do not realize that a person's mental health is just as important as their physical health. Based on a survey conducted from 2001 to 2003, that reflected the entire adult population of the United States, one in four adults have been diagnosed with a mental health disorder in any given year - equivalent to 57.7 million people in the United States.

The primary source of knowledge regarding mental illness is the mass media where people with mental health disorders are often portrayed as dangerous or potentially dangerous. Unfortunately, most media sources have the wrong perception of mental illness; therefore placing a stigma on mental health issues as a whole. Individuals with a mental health disorder are no more likely than a member of the general population to commit a crime or a violent act. Across the nation, violent acts committed by individuals with mental illness represent a small fraction of crimes, yet are frequently sensationalized by the media. Research also shows, people with a mental health disorder are far more likely to be victims of violence than perpetrators. Researchers at North Carolina State University and Duke University found that people diagnosed with schizophrenia, bipolar disorder or psychosis are actually 2 1/2 times more likely to be attacked, sexually assaulted or mugged than the general population. Research has also shows that the vast majority of people who commit violent acts/crimes do not suffer from a mental health disorder. Individuals with a disability or a mental illness are generally more at risk of violence geared directly toward them. Violence and abuse against anyone is not acceptable.

Public perceptions between mental illness and violence are central to the stigma and discrimination individuals may feel. Individuals that may be in crisis are skeptical of friends or relatives who offer assistance because of the stigma associated with mental illness which may delay treatment. Many individuals suffer in silence rather than risk the discrimination or ridicule from family, friends and the general public if they seek help. Stigma has varying degrees that affect all areas of life from housing to employment to establishing relationships. Worst of all stigma may result in the person internalizing negative attitudes about themselves.



started," Battel added.

The start of the 2013 growing season has been almost as late as last year's was early. Numbers recently released by the USDA National Agriculture Statistic Service (NASS) showed crop planting and development well behind schedule coming into May, compared to a 5-year average.

However, the state's farmers can be in good shape for a better year than 2012, according to Bob Boehm, commodity and marketing manager for Michigan Farm Bureau (MFB).

"Remember, last year at this time we were about 4 weeks early and, as a result, had already lost most of our tree fruit crop," Boehm noted. "Now we're almost 2 weeks late compared to 'average'. All things considered, it's a far better situation than last year."

Cold temperatures and a lot of rainfall have rendered scant few days suitable for field work until recently. As of May 3, only 10 percent of Michigan's sugar beets had been planted, and none of the corn or soybeans.

Prescribed burns help to manage habitat

Motorists traveling on M-81 west of Cass City May 2 drove past a plume of smoke that, as darkness set in, gave way to an orange glow.

Normally, fire eating away at the contents of a field would send a wave of panic through the landowner, but this particular fire didn't raise the anxiety level of the owner. In fact, the owner, Tom Lounsbury, welcomed the blaze. Lounsbury had contacted Don Schank, owner of Michigan Fire Pros, LLC of Clifford, to perform a prescribed burn on a 40acre mixed prairie grass field located on Lounsbury's property.

The purpose of the prescribed burn was to improve the wildlife habitat located within the field.

"It really revitalizes prairie grass and cleans out the thatch. It also puts nutrients back into the soil." explained Lounsbury. Schank added, "It's a cheap and natural way of maintaining habitat."

Lounsbury maintains 3 large fields of prairie grass on his family's farm. Each spring a different field is burned which creates a 3-year burning cycle. Lounsbury explained that fire cleans out dead grass and natural debris that hampers the growth of new grass. Schank said a prescribed burn also helps create a longer growing season for the prairie grass because it leaves the blackened to 6 members remain busy handling remains which draw heat thus warm- the duties that accompany a burn. ing the ground up quicker.

Schank points out timing is a key element.

"Timing is crucial. It goes back to your objective," he said, noting woody material such as autumn olive and willow can withstand a burn if it's early enough in the spring that their buds are closed. If the buds are open it can set their growth back or even kill them.

Schank has plenty of experience when it comes to prescribed burns. This is the fourth fire season for his company. Prior to starting the business, he worked as a keyman fire fighter for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for 15 fire seasons

During his time providing prescribed burns, Schank has worked with 3 main types of burns intended to enhance wildlife habitat. The burn that took place on Lounsbury's property was considered a prairie burn. Schank also conducts woodland understory burns and marsh burns; he once took part in a marsh burn that covered 313 acres in southern Michigan.

Typically the fire season for Schank falls during the summer months. "Basically it's once the snow leaves until fall," he said. During the fire season, he and his crew of usually 5 Once the landowner contacts
