School okays lean spending plan for 2014

There was little fanfare as the Cass City Board of Education adopted a budget for the 2013-14 school year Monday night.

And that suited board members and school Supt. Jeff Hartel just fine after struggling with making cuts totaling up to \$1 million on more than one occasion over the past few years.

That's not to say the district is rolling in cash. In fact, the new spending plan now in place and slated to take effect Monday, July 1, is

estimated at \$9.078 million, just \$5,255 more than planned expenditures, which are expected to total \$9.073 million in 2013-14.

"The good news is, we're in the black again this year," commented Mike Klosowski, the Cass City Public Schools' chief financial offi-

Klosowski presented the board with an amended 2012-13 budget totaling \$9.427 million. The spending plan ends with a fund balance of nearly \$787,000, or an amount equal to 8.3 percent of the budget. That figure is expected to grow slightly, to just over \$792,000 (8.7 percent of the

CPA Angela Burnett reported the village's financial statements received an "unmodified opinion" the highest level of assurance that acceptable accounting practices have been followed — and that "no material weaknesses" were discovered in the village's internal controls, and there were no "material instances of noncompliance."

Still, despite an increase of over \$11,000 to the general fund balance in 2012, last year's financial statements revealed an overall reduction of nearly \$18,000 in the village's total government fund balances over the course of 2012.

In the general fund, revenues topped expenditures by \$64,310, leaving a healthy 2012 year-end fund

In regular meeting of the village coun- the Local Street Fund, the fund balance dropped from \$30,201 to \$24,204 during 2012, although other financing sources provided an additional \$55,000 in working capital to the Local Street fund during the course of last year.

Looking at the village's proprietary funds, Sewer Fund revenues increased 6.6 percent from 2011, while expenditures increased 3.9 percent during the same time, resulting in a \$54,296 of fund balance money being used in 2012. In the Water Fund, a 1.9 percent reduction in revenues, coupled with a 2.7-percent reduction in expenditures, added \$28,109 to its fund balance entering the current year.

Burnett lauded village officials for their financial planning during the past year. "Budgeting is working well here", she said, noting the differences in budgeted and actual fig-

Messings running farm of the future

Messing Farms in Ubly is a farm from the future.

The family dairy operation, run by Greg, his wife Shelly and the couple's daughter, Ashley Kennedy, recently installed 4 Lely Astronaut A4 robotic milkers. These robots give both the Messings and the cows some independence.

"The cows can go to the robots 24 hours a day, whenever they said Ashley. explained the robots mimic the natural feeding of a calf. "The cows love it, they are free to do wnatever they want. Each cow milks on their own schedule."

The Messings built this new area for milking in 2008 and currently milk roughly 220 cows. Greg and Shelly have been farming for 28 years, and their daughter has been helping out full-time for the past 2 1/2 years.

Ashley said the family used to have a typical well-scheduled farm life, but since they've installed the robots, they have

"It's been going really well and the cows have adjusted well," Ashley said. "It's nice to not have to get up at 4 a.m. and work until 9 p.m. We're much happier peo-

Motorcycle hits deer, driver hurt

Troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro are continuing their investigation into a motorcycle crash Thursday night that left the driver seriously injured.

Officers were dispatched to Bevens Road, east of Burmon Road in Kingston Township, at about 10:20

Troopers reported the lone male motorcycle driver was traveling westbound on Bevens Road when he struck a deer. The 36-year-old Kingston Township resident, whose name has not been released, was ejected from the motorcycle.

The driver sustained multiple injuries and was airlifted to St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw.

Troopers, who were assisted at the scene by Fairgrove MMR personnel, the Kingston Fire Department and FlightCare, stated alcohol is believed to be involved in the accident.

The Owen-Gage Board of Education discussed and reviewed adjustments to the school's 2012-13 general fund budget and adopted a proposed 2013-14 general fund budget during its regular meeting last Wednesday.

The Owen-Gage School District's revenues 2012-13 totaled \$1,759,850, while their expenditures came in at \$1,749,924. Despite the rise in expenditures from previous years, the district is ending the fiscal year with a surplus of nearly \$10,000, boosting the general fund balance to an estimated \$189,102 at the end of this month.

"We are finishing this year with an additional \$10,000 added to our fund balance," Owen-Gage School Supt. Bob Drury noted. "This fund balance represents approximately 10 percent of our yearly budget."

"While this is a significant amount of money, it is even more significant that our district is currently in the black financially and has not had to lay off staff or reduce educational

Trying to quit? Ask your physician how

There's little debate when it comes to the serious health risks attached to smoking cigarettes, but tobacco is powerfully addictive, making it a difficult habit to break.

Which is why we support a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) initiative that encourages smokers to talk to their doctors.

The initiative is part of a CDC campaign, "Tips From Former Smokers", which not only tells the story of how real people's lives were changed forever due to their smoking or exposure to secondhand smoke, but also motivates people to quit.

"Michigan continues to struggle with chronic diseases, many of which stem from tobacco use," says James K. Haveman, director of the MDCH. "We are committed to helping individuals make the right choices, but that also means helping physicians have the right conversations. This new initiative is a great step forward in making sure that communication is occurring between the patient and their doctor to ultimately help them change their behaviors and protect their health."

Nationally, about one in five U.S. adults (43.8 million) are current cigarette smokers. The good news is that more than 70 percent of smokers want to quit, and about 50 percent try to quit each year.

Physicians play an important role in helping motivate patients to quit. Advice from a doctor more than doubles the changes that a patient will quit successfully. Health care professionals should routinely ask patients whether they use tobacco and encourage those who do to quit, and patients should feel empowered to talk with their doctor for help.

In addition to talking with their physicians, smokers who want help quitting can call the toll-free Michigan Tobacco Quitline, 1-800-QUIT-NOW (1-800-784-8669) or visit the website www.cdc.gov/tips for help quitting.

The objective here is simple; to encourage all smokers to take a serious look at quitting now, because it's never too late to reap the benefits of a healthier lifestyle. Even better, if you don't smoke, don't start.

A conversation with your doctor could be the first step in living a longer, smoke-free life.

Pass the ketchup

We were out of ketchup – or catsup, depending on your preference. You say tuh-may-toe; I say tuh-mah-toe.

The word ketchup is sometimes associated with a particular brand. I buy lots of generic products, but not generic ketchup. When it comes to red condiments, my family practices purebred, pure-brand loyalty. At least

Although ketchup is an American icon, the sauce originated in China in the 1600s. It was made with pickled fish and spices and didn't even contain tomatoes; the ingredient was added when the condiment came to the United States sometime in the early 1800s. By 1837, a guy named Yerks had modified and commercialized the product and marketed it nationwide. The American love affair with ketchup had begun. For most of us.

Some people don't like ketchup. They don't live at my house. We love the stuff – high fructose corn syrup and

What's not to like? Inside the bottle, you'll find food flexibility at its finest. Depending on your culinary needs, you can use it as an ingredient (meatloaf) or condiment (cheeseburger). While the jury is still out on nutritional legitimacy, in some circles our tomato-based friend is considered a vegetable – even though tomatoes are technically fruits, but I've never been able to keep

I've witnessed creative ketchup use in the kitchen and beyond. My son likes it with macaroni and cheese. I enjoy dill pickles dipped in ketchup. I even know one friend who pours the sauce on his pancakes. He seems to enjoy it; I say to each his own on that one. (Please pass the syrup.)

The red wonder is more than just food and can resemble pretend blood on Halloween or other festive occasions when one wants to fake significant injury. Ketchup can get rid of chlorine build-up on hair and shine tarnished metal (but not at the same time). I've also heard rumors it enhances the flavor of French fries, but that idea sounds a little extreme - sort of like putting ketchup on pancakes.

Most ketchup consumers fit into one of two categories: dippers or squeezers.

I am a dipper. I like to squirt a round puddle of the sassy sauce on my plate and dip my burger, hot dog or baloney sandwich right into the mix. This creates ample disbursement of the condiment and the flavor it imparts. My husband is a squeezer. He lifts the bun off his sandwich and squeezes the desired amount of ketchup onto the bread in a zigzag pattern. The idea is to create an even layer of ketchup throughout the sandwich. Squeezers enjoy consistency in their condiment distribution; it's all about control.

In order to dip or squeeze, you've got to keep a supply of the red spread in your fridge. We were plum out. At our house, running out of ketchup is serious business. 

The Lely Astronaut A4 allows the cow to enter a closed-in area to be milked up to six times per day. Once the cow enters the area, the robot reads a special collar that collects about 200 data points about the cow, including temperature and quality of

Having all of this information about each cow gives the Messings better and earlier warning signs of sickness, compared to traditional means. If there is a serious issue with a cow's milk, that milk isn't combined with the rest.

"There's nothing better than getting all of that data every day from them," Ashley said. "It really helps to check on each cow individually."

After the cow is securely in place, a robot moves in below the cow and utilizes lasers to search the udder for teats. Once the lasers have pinpointed the teats, the individual robot milkers attach to them and milk all 4 at the same time.

"In comparison to our parlor, cows will be in here about the same time." Ashley said, noting that when the cows enter the robot area, they are also fed.

The number of pellets is unique to each individual cow. That way they are receiving the perfect amount of food based on the amount of milk produced. The robot recognizes each cow by the data in its collar.

"As she's milking, she's eating oats, which is a draw for them to come. It keeps them from getting distracted," Ashley said. If a cow doesn't get milked after 8 to 10 hours, it's taken over to the milking area, where it won't be allowed to leave until it's

The Messings decided to make the switch over to robots for several rea-

"Good employees are really hard to find around here, so that's what kind of changed our mind," Ashley said, adding the family initially never expected to make the change to

robotic milking. "We started seriously researching the option in January after visiting farms with similar equipment."

The equipment was ordered and installed by Inbody Inc., Sandusky. The Messings said the company has been extremely helpful with setting things up and answering questions.

Aside from their help, if there is a malfunction with a robot, the robot has the ability to call for help by contacting Ashley or Greg's cell phone, and it lets them know what specific problem is occurring.

Despite only having the system for about a month, the Messing familiy is already elated with how everything is working. Ashley believes this is the future of family farming.

"I think that the robot is going to be huge for the small to medium-sized farms," she said. "I think they'll allow farms our size, or smaller, to

have a little advantage."

Although the Messings may be searching for something to do with the extra free time they now have, it was hard work getting the system set up initially.

The first week was very intense. The first milking that we did that day, we started at 10 a.m. and didn't get them all through until 1 a.m.," said Shelly while mentioning she had a lack of sleep for the first sever-

The Messings have also been utilizing a few other pieces of technology on their farm including a Lely Luna brush, which massages the cow's heads, and Lely Juno plow that runs just about every hour and pushes the cows' feed closer to them to encourage the cows to get up and eat, which subsequently increases milk produc-

programming," Drury said.

Turning to the preliminary 2013-14 general fund budget, projected revenues are \$1,737,482 and expenditures total \$1,779,700, leaving the district with a projected \$42,218 loss. The fund balance will make up the difference, giving Owen-Gage advantages, like other students in nearly \$147,000 in the bank.

Although the new budget predicts a deficit, Drury believes Owen-Gage will be in decent financial shape.

"While it is a fact that our preliminary 2013-14 general fund budget shows a deficit, we have projected revenues low and expenditures high at this point," he pointed out. "We have not received any final numbers in many of our revenue areas, and we do not know exactly how many students will enroll in the fall."

"I am confident that a significant amount of that projected deficit will be eliminated once we have better figures in September/October," Drury added.

Drury is a seasoned superintendent who has dealt with similar situations approach Owen-Gage's spending plan conservatively.

"This is a significant number, as only 44 signatures were required."

The proposed bond totals 2.9 mills, which means property owners would pay \$2.90 for every \$1,000 of taxable valuation if the request passes. School board adopts lean 2013-14 budget

budget), by the end of next June.

While school officials have a handle on what to expect in the way of state funding in the coming year, following Gov. Rick Snyder's signing of a new budget last week, there are still some key "unknowns" that could significantly impact school spending. Among those is enrollment, according to Klosowski, who told the board that the district's proposed budget is based on a projected loss of 32 kids next year.

The Cass City Public Schools receives \$7,066 per student in state funding. Hartel noted that, in spite of reports that the new state budget has more money earmarked for K-12 education, including a per-pupil hike of \$110, state officials are cutting education funding in other areas, reducing the impact of the revenue increase.

approved an annual resolution to borrow money that will be used to meet the district's cash-flow needs until state funding payments resume in the fall.

Klosowski outlined a detailed cashflow analysis for the board and requested authorization to borrow \$1.3 million this year, down by \$100,000 borrowed last year and \$200,000 less than the year before.

The board's discussion of finances concluded with a decision to switch custodial service companies.

School officials have contracted with D.M. Burr for the past 4 years, but a number of complaints related to the quality of work prompted the board to approve a 2-year contract with a local company, Schuette Services. The business is owned and operated by Randy Schuette, a Cass City School employee who handles the district's outdoor maintenance.

Schuette's bid of \$150,000 per year is higher than the \$135,000 paid to D.M. Burr over the past year. However, school officials say the increase is due to Schuette's plan to use better quality materials. He also intends to pay his employees more than Burr does in an effort to reduce worker turnover, which he says also affects the quality of work a custodial company provides.






"This event is an opportunity for us to thank those in the community for their continued support," said First Lt. Mitch Krugielki, post command-



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



"It's pretty cool to see the community work together," Perry said. "Just seeing everyone work together is a success."


Although this is Perry's first year as head of the parade, he isn't new to this type of work.

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

"A lot of these bands do it for the there was an opening," Sorenson said. "I think in music, with some of the local bands, people enjoy coming to see people they know.'


