Survivors in fatal crash recovering

The survivors of a deadly traffic crash that claimed the lives of a Thumb couple, one of their sons and another area teen last month are continuing to recover at 2 Michigan hospitals.

Family members and friends have indicated that Jarid R. Heck, 15, and Jacob A. Langley, 20, both of Pigeon, are recovering from multiple injuries.

"Jarid and Jake are progressing well at Hurley (Medical Center in Flint)," Lakers Secondary Principal Brian Keim posted in a Laker Public Schools Facebook message to the community Friday.

"Jarid still has a lot of pain in his chest because of the broken sternum, ribs, and heart surgery, so his release date will likely be moved back a few

days," Keim added. "Jake has undergone at least two successful surgeries on his shoulder and hip."

The other survivor and lone occupant in one of the vehicles involved in the crash, Andrew R. Braun, 22, of Ubly, is recovering at a Saginaw area hospital, but information on his condition was not available.

The July 27 crash — the deadliest traffic accident in Huron County since 1992 — occurred at the intersection of Stein and Maxwell roads.

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson reported the preliminary investigation revealed that a 2012 GMC pickup driven by Braun, and a 2011 Chevrolet crew cab pickup occupied by 6 people, collided at the intersection.

All four of the victims — Joshua C. Heck, 40, his wife, Jessica A. Heck, 38, and the couple's 13-year-old son,

Get tested for the "Silent Epidemic"

It's known as the "Silent Epidemic", but area residents can protect themselves against viral hepatitis by simply getting tested.

According to the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH), more than 4 million *Americans are living with viral hepatitis – many not* knowing it. Every year, some 15,000 Americans die from liver cancer or chronic liver disease associated with the disease.

Viral hepatitis is caused by a virus that infects the liver. Hepatitis A., B and C are the most common, and there is a vaccine to protect against Hepatitis A and B. Early detection and treatment can help reduce disease progression.

According to health experts, Hepatitis A virus (HAV) is spread by eating food or drinking water with HAV in it or from close contact with a person who has the virus. Hepatitis B virus (HBV) is spread through contact with blood or body fluids of an HBV-infected person, unprotected sex, or from infected mothers to their infants at birth. Hepatitis C virus (HCV) is spread through contact with the already if he can play video games. Consistency in parenting is key to success. Every mom worth her Pop-Tarts knows this. But, if we are being honest (and isn't that always the best policy?) consistency in parenting is consistently difficult to achieve with any sort of, well, consistency.

Despite diligent whisking and constant stirring, my gravy almost always ends up a little lumpy. I am lacking consistency, in everything from gravy to child rearing. Like a good swing of a tennis racket or golf club, it's

all about the follow-through. I've never been what you'd describe as athletic and find this aspect challenging, to say the least. Oh, I start out strong. When it comes to discipline, I enter the ring with both arms swinging: "You broke the rules and are now banned from TV until you turn 18, mister!"

Trouble is, statements like this are hard to implement when your child is 10. Discipline lasting upwards of a decade demands a level of consistency I just can't muster - and forces me to reconsider my strategy and redefine the punishment. In other words, I cave.

My husband pointed this out recently during a lively

discussion where terms like chaos and pushover were tossed about. I was the one being called a pushover, and have to admit he was right. It's all about my followthrough, which, if followed through would result in the desired outcome of consistency. Sort of like whisking a good batch of gravy.

My current situation started vesterday when son number three wanted a dish of ice cream - 30 minutes before supper. My husband and I told him to wait. A united front is another key aspect to top-notch parent-ing. Five minutes later, the adults in the family went outside to check the garden. We were brief and returned to the kitchen within a few minutes. Upon entering, we noticed a mysterious splotch on the counter that had not been present prior to our garden visit. After further investigation, the splotch was positively identified as none other than melting strawberry ice cream.

I found our snacking son in another room, with the suspicious smell of strawberries lingering on his breath. I made a polite request, "Hand over the ice cream," whereby he produced a small bowl and guilty frown.

I thought about exiling him to another country or maybe grounding him until high school, but I remembered about follow-through. And consistency. And being a pushover. So I said (calmly), "I told you if you broke a rule you'd lose video games. No playing tomorrow." I felt strong resolve in my words. Sort of like was being a good parent. Which I am. I think. Maybe.

Trouble is, today is tomorrow and I'm dealing with an immediate need for consistency. It's time for diligence and good parenting skills - not to mention willpower. This is definitely not the time to be pushed over, no matter how weekly and wobbly my legs (or resolve) might feel.

He's currently sitting on the couch attempting to appear extremely bored. He's doing a convincing job. I love him. He is cute.



I stick to my guns, but am feeling weak. What mom hasn't been tempted to rescue her child from boredom, bad choices, bad grades, bad friends, bad hair or bad any-thing? But if I do (and I might) I will eliminate the opportunity for him to learn from this experience. In the end, that is what consistency is all about. We help our children learn from their trials and successes. We watch as they grow into healthy and mature adults who know enough not to spoil their supper with a dish of ice cream. It's all I can hope for at this very (weak) moment. After that, the rest is just gravy.

How do you know if you're at risk? The MDCH encourages residents to check out the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) online Hepatitis Risk Assessment tool, designed to determine if testing and vaccination is recommended. The tool allows you to privately enter information and receive recommendations based on CDC guidelines.

Bottom line? Talk to your doctor about ways to protect your family from hepatitis. If you're diagnosed with the disease, meet with your healthcare provider to discuss treatment options.

Diaz enters no contest pleas

A Caro area man arrested in Cass City after he alleged broke into a local resident's garage, ran over a street sign and damaged police property had his day in court last week.

Kyle R. Diaz, 22, appeared in Tuscola County Circuit Court, where he entered pleas of no contest to a charge of malicious destruction of fire/police department property and 2 counts of attempted assaulting, resisting or obstructing a police offibe scheduled.

The incident took place June 6 in Cass City, where Police Officer Kevin Laming was dispatched to the Leo R. Gengler residence, 6817 Cass City Rd., during the early morning hours to investigate a suspect pounding on Gengler's door and demanding to enter the home.

Will small papers survive? Hope so

I'd like to think Central Michigan University Assistant Professor Jim Wojcik has some special insight into the future of newspapering.

Wojcik, who also serves as internship coordinator at CMU, was in town recently checking on the progress of CMU student and secondyear Chronicle intern Mason Doerr. Anyway, during our latest visit, he said he believes small town papers will be the "survivors" among newspaper casualties in the on-going downsizing of print media across the country.

Wojcik says community newspapers will survive because they have a vested interest in their communities.

I suspect he has something there.

After all, while readers may not like what we print sometimes (or even most of the time), they've come to expect our presence on the newsstands every Tuesday or in their mailboxes on Wednesday (or Thursday, or Friday, or Saturday, depending on the mail service on any given week).

They know, I hope, that we make a real effort to cover the good as well as the bad and the ugly. Sure, we're going to write about Uncle Jed if he's been bagged by a state trooper for a fourth drunken driving offense, but we're also going to faithfully print honor rolls, wedding announcements, photos of local spelling bee winners, features spotlighting the accomplishments and talents of area residents, along with the goings-on during the latest village council or school board meeting.

Maybe I'm a bit sensitive, but I always feel a bit violated when the big city media shows up in town to cover a "big" story - usually something horrific or tragic. They rarely rush to the Thumb to chase after the feature we publish on a teacher whose efforts in the classroom have earned him or her statewide accolades, you know?

The small town paper isn't without its faults, of course. But the good ones always strive to accurately inform their readers. They're also going to own up to their mistakes when they make them.

Veteran longtime journalist and former Chronicle intern Larry Werner, who recently retired after a 40-year career ranging from stints at big dailies to a chain of weeklies, may have said it best in his recent retirement column:

"When you work for a weekly, you meet readers. And you hear from the people about whom you write. Why? Because that newspaper is telling the story of the places where people live and play, where they adults, in Rawson Memorial send their kids to school and where, after they retire, they hang out at the local coffee shops," Werner wrote.

"The daily newspaper is a powerful institution. The community weekly is a friend."

Statewide, eight birds have tested positive for WNV so far this season. including six crows from Saginaw (4), Bay (1) and Midland (1) counties, one wild turkey from Gratiot County and one Coopers hawk from Wayne County. No WNV positive mosquito pools have been detected.

Infected birds and mosquitoes can provide an early warning of WNV activity in a community, re-enforcing the need for residents to take precautions to avoid mosquito bites. Citizens can report sightings of sick or dead birds on the West Nile virus website at www.michigan.gov/westnilevirus.

Michigan residents are encouraged to take the following steps to avoid WNV

*Maintain window and door screening to help keep mosquitoes out of buildings.

*Empty water from mosquito breeding sites such as buckets, unused kiddie pools, old tires or similar sites where mosquitoes lay eggs. *Use nets and/or fans over outdoor

eating areas. *Avoid being outdoors at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most

active. *Wear light colored, long-sleeved shirts and long pants when outdoors.

*Apply insect repellents that contain the active ingredient DEET, or other EPA approved product to

lowing the manufacturer's directions for use.

Choose a repellent concentration rated for the time you will spend outdoors. When applying repellent to children, apply it to your own hands and rub them on the child. Avoid the eyes and mouth and do not apply to children's hands because they sometimes put their hands in their mouths. Do not apply repellents to infants under six months of age and instead place nets over strollers and baby carriers

Most people bitten by a WNV infected mosquito show no symptoms of illness. However, some become sick three to 15 days after exposure. About one-in-five infected persons will have mild illness with fever. About one in 150 infected people will become severely ill. Symptoms of encephalitis (inflammation of the brain) and meningitis (inflammation of the spinal cord and brain linings) include stiff neck, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, muscle weakness, convulsions and paralysis.

People 50 and older are more susceptible to severe WNV disease symptoms. Physicians are urged to test patients for WNV if they present with fever and signs of meningitis or encephalitis, or sudden painless paralysis in the absence of stroke in the summer months.

The Michigan Foster Care Review Board Program consists of 27 local boards throughout the state. Each board is comprised of dedicated citizens who represent a broad crosssection of their communities.

Local boards meet one day a month to review cases of children who have been removed from their home and placed in foster care due to abuse or neglect. The purpose of the review is to support the local courts and child placing agencies in their efforts to ensure the safety and well being of the children while they are in foster care, and facilitate a plan for them to return to a safe, stable and permanent family as soon as possible.

Applicants must be 18 years of age, have a high school diploma, good reading skills, and a passion to serve their community's most vulnerable children and families. Employees of the Department of Human Services, family courts, or private child placement agencies are prohibited by law from serving on foster care review boards.

The Foster Care Review Program is administered through the State Court Administrative Office of the Michigan Supreme Court. Board members receive orientation and ongoing training, mileage and meal reimbursement.

Tina would have received a monthly benefit of \$754. Despite having paid federal income and social security taxes all her life, husband Brian received a Social Security lump sum death payment of only \$255.

He calls his efforts to secure the changes asked for by his wife "the good fight."

"I took Sen. Green's resolution after it passed and used it like a sledgehammer to get people's attention around the country," said Brian Moyer, a former resident of Green's district who now resides in Wyoming. "I sent copies to the media, to state legislators across the nation and to members of Congress. It has helped open doors and eyes."

Last week Sens. John Barrasso, (R-Wyoming), Mike Enzi, (R-Wyoming), and Sherrod Brown, (D-Ohio), introduced the Expedited Disability Insurance Payments for Terminally Ill Individuals Act of 2013. The bill would decrease the waiting period for people who are terminally ill.
