## Free summer meals served to hundreds of Thumb children

You'll have to forgive Shari Bock if she looks a bit worn out these days. After all, she just wrapped up supervising the preparation of several thousand lunches over the past couple months.

And with just a week to relax, Bock is already gearing up to prepare plenty more meals — about 800 lunches and 250 breakfasts a day — as director of food service for the Cass City Public Schools

In addition to overseeing the nutritious meals served throughout the school year, Bock is director of the local "Let's Do Lunch!" project, now in its sixth year in Cass City. The program provides free meals to children during the summer months in a partnership with the

June 17 and concluded Aug. 16 at Cass City Elementary School.

Aside from preparing lunches for local children, Bock and her staff, made up largely of volunteers, also provided meals for youngsters at 3 meal sites in Caro and 2 others in Bad Axe.

"It went very well. Our numbers grew in Cass City, and the other sites went well, too," said Bock, who estimated the project provided roughly 10,000 lunches and another 3,000 breakfasts this summer.

Last year, the Cass City Public Schools served more than 8,000 meals during the summer to children

Investigators say the thief who smashed his way into an Owendale business during the early morning hours Friday spent nearly an hour stealing thousands of dollars worth of merchandise.

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said deputies were dispatched to Stack's Market just before

"(Deputies were) advised by the morning employee...that the store's front door glass had been broken out," Hanson said.

"Video surveillance revealed that a suspect went into the store around 3 a.m. with two duffle bags and removed several items, making a total of seven different entries and exits," the sheriff reported. "It is estimated over \$15,000 to \$20,000 worth of items such as cigarettes, liquor, chewing tobacco and others were taken. At one point the suspect actually used the store's trash barrel to remove stolen property.

# Village approves site plan permit for dairy plant

Village officials in Cass City met briefly Monday to approve the site plan for the Dairy Farmers of America development proposed in the industrial park.

Cass City Village Manager Peter Cristiano told village council members, during the regular monthly meeting, that the new development will be located at 4105 N. Division

"(On) Wednesday, Aug. 21, the planning commission met to review the site plan. David Marr, special project manager for the village of Cass City, asked (for) 4 conditions to be considered prior to the issuance of the site plan permit," said Cristiano.

The 4 items brought to the attention of the planning commission are:

1) Screen fence at property line near equalization tank needs to be a screen wall or berm landscape with

2) The signage is not approved, and shall be reviewed upon submission of a permit application.

3) Information for exterior lighting shall be submitted showing compliance with the zoning ordinance.

4) The parking calculations are that of 2 formulas, the greater result of which shall determine the parking required. The engineer used the formula that resulted in the lessor of the 2; therefore the parking provided (23) is deficient of the required 72.

The conditions are not major and can be corrected administratively,' Cristiano noted, adding, "In fact, they have already been reviewed with the Dairy Farmers of America manager and Spicer Group (officials), and an agreement has been reached."

The council then approved Trustee Jenny Zawilinski's motion that the Dairy Farmers of America site plan, with the 4 conditions as listed to be corrected by administrative services prior to the issuance of the site plan

President and CEO Rick Smith, in a member update bulletin, wrote: Our plant in Fallon, Nev., is scheduled to be up and running by the end of the year, opening doors for the cooperative in the global marketplace. ### School reviewing Micklash said \$700 will be awarded to an entity (schools, villages, activities in the greater Cass City area (within the boundaries of the Case City Public School Pictor)

Just when area parents were probably getting used to the terminology used by state officials when measuring their school district's performance, the state changed the terms.

Local school Supt. Jeff Hartel spent a portion of Monday night's regular Cass City Board of Education meeting briefly describing the new evaluation system along with Cass City's latest "grades".

Hartel explained that the term "adelonger being applied to schools that meet what the state deems acceptable in terms of student achievement/improvement based on standardized testing such as the Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) or Michigan Merit Exam (MME). Instead, state education officials are now labeling building scorecards with a designation of "Reward School", "Focus School" or "Priority School".

Reward schools — those receiving the best grade — are those in the top 5 percent in the state's top-to-bottom ranking, while focus schools are those with the highest achievement gaps, defined by the difference between the average score of the top 30 percent of students and the bottom 30 percent of students. Priority

schools are in the bottom 5 percent of the top-to-bottom ranking.

Cass City Junior-Senior High School was ranked as a Focus School, according to Hartel, who explained the building's upper grade students are exceeding state average achievement, but students in the lower grades are scoring at below state averages. It's the gap between the two that resulted in the school's ranking.

In response, school officials are implementing a 16-point plan of improvement designed to provide quate yearly progress" or AYP is no additional support for the younger students and to more closely monitor their progress, Hartel said.

Other schools in the county that were labeled focus schools include Akron-Fairgrove Elementary, Reese High School and Vassar Townsend North.

Cass City Elementary School. meanwhile, was named a Reward School, as were Kingston High School, Mayville High School, USA High School, USA Elementary and

Vassar High School. Hartel pointed out that the Focus School ranking for the local juniorsenior high building — based on achievement, improvement and achievement gaps in standardized test scores — isn't the only input the

### Collection set for household toxic waste

The Tuscola County Recycling Center in Caro will host a household hazard waste (HHW) and latex paint collection Saturday, Sept. 14, starting at 9 a.m.

Residents must make an appointment to participate. More information is available by calling the center at (989) 672-1673.

"Now is the time to clean out the unwanted hazardous wastes you may have in your house, garage or barn, said Mike Miller, recycling coordinator. "What is hazardous waste? It is a product that is toxic, flammable, caustic or chemically active."

Key words to look for include "danger", "poison", "warning" and "caution", according to Miller, who said items with such labels should not be poured down drains, onto the ground or put into the waste stream.

'Some examples include oil-based paints, stains, home repair products, cleaners, contaminated oil, pesticides, herbicides and mercury-containing items.'

The upcoming collection is free of charge to all Tuscola County residents.

"We encourage (everyone) to take part in this environmentally friendly program," Miller said. "Reducing the amount of hazardous waste you have starts with limiting the amount that you buy. Instead, look for items that are environmentally friendly."

# Wanted: a few good foster grandparents

The Human Development Commission (HDC) is looking to fill a few positions with folks willing to invest some time each week in a very special job.

Don't worry if you're no spring chicken. In fact, the like another word, but that's just my observation. Oh sure, plenty of banks claim to offer free checking, age eligibility for this position starts at 55. If you have a hankering to get back into the classroom, that's a plus, and if you enjoy spending time around youngsters, you may be a perfect fit for the job.

And the pay? Well, let's just say this job gives you the chance to reap rewards you just can't buy.

HDC officials are seeking residents interested in becoming "foster grandparents". Foster grandparents are volunteers who serve in several area schools, working with children who are struggling to succeed.

To become a foster grandparent, you must be at least 55 years of age, meet income guidelines, be physically able to serve 20 hours per week, and enjoy working one-on-one with young children. In return for their service, volunteers receive a small hourly stipend, a daily meal, initial and ongoing training, and assistance with travel expenses.

Most importantly, foster grandparents make a real difference in the lives of the children they serve.

No formal training is required — just a desire to help youngsters enjoy more success in the classroom. Foster grandparents help kids with basic reading and math review, counting and colors, social skills, manners, tying their shoes and much more. Both men and women are welcome, and by these politicians keep say-called, at that time, giving just a little of their time each morning or afternoon, they become an important part of a child's day.

HDC has been sponsoring the Foster Grandparent Program since 1978, when the agency received its initial funding from the Michigan Office of Services to the Aging.

Earlier this year, more than 150 people gathered at the Cass City VFW Hall to celebrate the program's 35th year in the Thumb.

There are 47 foster grandparents currently serving in host sites across Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola counties.



You may be familiar with free checking. He was a mainstay of the 1980s and 90s – following on the heels of free love from the 1970s. Free checking was a favorite act for many and a perfect combination of talent and showmanship. He provided us with a place to stash our cash and a checkbook, which we used to retrieve said cash at a later date. Free checking enjoyed a peaceful existence in our homes. We figured the relationship would last forever.

Then, along came regulation, which is basically a 50-cent vocabulary version of rules. Regulation cracked the whip on freedom, making it practically an endangered species. I've never been a big proponent of rules, unless they pertain to an early bedtime for my kids or a tax credit for moms who drive minivans.

I don't pretend to understand regulation. It's sort of like an elephant in the room. Big and cumbersome, but not something anyone wants to talk about. Let's just say it changed the way banks do business. Regulation regulated the "free" right out of "freedom," leaving us with "dom," which when spoken out loud sounds a whole lot

but be wary of illusions. There's almost always a price tag on the free sticker. Many consumers may be unaware of the costs of free checking because free can be a relative term – like your great aunt Sophie who smiles to your face but then talks behind your back. Some things aren't what they seem.

Nowadays, most free checking comes with numerous stipulations – a.k.a. "strings attached." In other words, to qualify for free checking, one must often jump through more hoops than a circus poodle.

To further complicate matters, the hoops at one financial institution are different from the hoops at the bank down the road. One place requires me to swipe my debit card many times each month. Failing to do so incurs a service charge, making free checking anything but. Another bank allows only a limited number of debit card swipes before charges kick in. If I forget which bank is which - a distinct possibility - I'm like a tightrope walker without a net. Banks are serious about their finance charges. They are not clowning around.


Some financial institutions require a minimum balance - approximately equal to half your annual income plus the age of your oldest child. Other hoops require you to have two separate accounts, with a regularly scheduled transfer from checking to savings (or vice versa; I can never keep that one straight). I've yet to figure out how the bank benefits from me transferring \$25 from one account to the other each month when my money's already in their vault anyway. I'm certainly not a numbers person, but this one is like a trapeze artist, swinging way over my head.

For the most part, the nice bankers will try to help you

meet their stipulations in the manner that causes the least pain. It's like they're saying, "Climb into the cannon, put on this clown nose, juggle these bowling pins and I promise you won't get hurt." I appreciate their efforts, but I'm questioning why they created rules that don't make sense in the first place. Why not get rid of them? (The rules, not

Free checking has become an oxymoron of sorts. Or maybe the word itself is a typo. Perhaps the free is supposed to be fee, or maybe the "R" is silent - like in February. Either way, things have changed and those of us opposed to change miss the good old days when free was free and if you wanted to experience the chaos and confusion of a three-ring circus, you bought a ticket; you didn't visit your bank.

# Thieves take \$21,000 in tools

Huron County Sheriff's deputies are seeking the public's help in solving the reported theft of more than \$20,000 worth of tools from a construction site in Huron County's Sebewaing Township early last

Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said deputies were dispatched to the construction site,

located at the corner of Bay Port and Sebewaing roads, Tuesday morning. "What was learned from the victim, Dean T. Deering of Owendale, who is the contractor working at that site, is that he arrived...and found that his utility trailer had been broken into," Hanson said. "The suspect or suspects cut a lock off of a door to gain items included a Tap Con Laser valued at \$7,000 and several other power tools, which all together the victim claimed value over \$21,000."

The theft is believed to have taken place between Monday at 7 p.m. and Tuesday at 8 a.m. "It is believed that a pickup was used, as indicated by tire tracks found near the trailer,' Hanson said.

When companies, according to troopers, the homeowner agrees, the scam artists proceed to either apply a thin layer of asphalt that breaks away in a few days, or use a substance other than asphalt.



# Pondering life and death these days

I usually avoid the topic of death like the plague.

Seriously. If you see me at a funeral, either I REALLY liked/loved/respected the individual who passed away, or I've gone on to my own reward.

Still, it's a part of life, a reality we must all eventually face.

It just seems there's been far too much reality in this community in 2013. Too many violent, senseless deaths on the roadways, too many longtime area residents suddenly taken by disease or simply age. Too many.

Maybe it's silly, even pointless, but I'm always left wondering why one person can survive a horrific car crash, and another dies in what appears to be little more than a fender bender. A heart attack robs a 40-year-old healthy-eating jogger of his life, and yet a couch potato with 60 years of living behind him or her survives a cardiac emergency, spends a couple days in the hospital and then heads home to crack open a 6-pack and enjoy another family-size bag of chips. Why?

Many folks believe only the good Lord holds the answers to those questions, and you can count me among them.

The atheist might call that sort of thinking simply a coping mechanism to deal with life's harshest reality, but I just don't believe for a moment that death is a random event for anyone.

I suppose my fascination with all of these questions stems from own brush with death. It was back in May 1971. I was 9 and walking along a gravel road from my home to the bus stop one spring morning when my attention was drawn to some construction going on nearby. I was mesmerized by the dump trucks and

I can remember hearing a faint car horn, and then everything when black. I may have been just a kid, but I will never forget how it must feel to lose your life in an instant. A fraction of a second.

The car struck me from behind, launching me into the air. I landed on my head and woke up a few moments later in a pool of blood from several lacerations on my scalp. I could have easily been critically injured or worse, but there were no broken bones — only a giant black and blue bruise that pretty much covered my

I was spared. I have no idea why, but that experience has made it easy for me to believe that every one of us is here for a reason, probably many reasons, and we all leave this life only after we've touched all of the other lives we were meant

As consolation goes, that sort of faith doesn't erase the sting of losing a loved one, but it does make me want to hold my wife's hand more often, offer my kids a few more words of encouragement and give my grandchildren a hug every time the opportunity presents itself.

In fact, Cass City Junior-Senior High School was recently again named the top high school in Tuscola County following an annual assessment of Michigan school districts, conducted by the Mackinac Center for Public Policy in conjunction with the Michigan Public High School Context and Performance (CAP) Database.

Among high schools in Tuscola County, Cass City was the only building to receive an "A" grade. The Mackinac assessment also placed Cass City in the top 91 percentile in the state.

#### IN OTHER BUSINESS

In other business Monday, the board:

\*Met in executive session to discuss on-going teacher contract negotiations. Representatives of the board and the Cass City Education Association have been meeting since last spring, but still aren't near agreement on a new pact. The teachers' previous 2-year contract expired earlier this month.

\*Learned the Cass City School District's annual state aid loan of \$1.3 million was awarded to Mayville State Bank, which offered the low interest bid of .75 percent among 4 Thumb banking institutions. The CCPS Coordinated Health Team will be sponsoring, "National Walk to School" for all students to be held in October. Incentives will be given to students that participate.

#### **Transportation**

Parents are asked to call 872-5618 to inform the transportation department if students will not be riding busses due to extended illnesses or to make special requests regarding carry on items. Additionally, inflated balloons are prohibited from all busses due to safety consideration.

Changes in enrollment and a geographical shift in student population within the Cass City Public School District has facilitated the need to restructure several of our bus routes. However, we need your help to ensure a smooth and safe transition. Parents are encouraged to have students ready to board buses early for the first few days of the school

Also students are allowed one (1) pickup address and one (1) take home address. Adjustments to balance the bus loads will be made as soon as possible. The following bus polices have been adopted by the Board of Education.

#### Student Responsibilities

1. Students and parents must understand that the school day does not end until the student is dropped off at the take home location. Therefore, students are expected to observe classroom conduct with the utmost respect for the bus driver and the rules that pertain to riding the bus.

2. To occupy the seat assigned by the driver both feet on the floor while the bus is in motion.

3. To be at the pickup place designated at the scheduled time

4. To wait until the bus comes to a complete stop before attempting to get on or off 5. To keep all parts of your body inside the bus at all times.

6. To cross a traveled highway, if necessary after leaving the bus, by walking in front of the 7. To leave or board the bus only with the

consent of the driver and only through the proper door.

8. To immediately report to the driver any

damage to the bus. 9. To help keep the bus clean, sanitary and orderly and the aisles free of any obstruc-

10. To obey the driver cheerfully and to refrain from unnecessary conversation with the driver while the bus is moving.

#### Parent Responsibilities

1. To take all precautions necessary for the protection of their children while going to and from the bus stop.

2. To work in a cooperative manner with those responsible for pupil transportation.

#### **Bus Discipline Procedure**

1. First violation - The driver submitting the violation report will deliver it personally to the Principal of the building the student attends. The Principal will arrange a conference at which the student, driver and Principal will be in attendance. A written communication regarding the violation and disciplinary action taken will be sent to the parents.

2. Second violation - The same procedure as Tana Shrader in the first violation. The minimum disciplinary action will be a three (3) day suspension from riding the bus.

3. Third violation - The same procedures as above with a five (5) day minimum suspension.

4. Fourth violation – The same procedures as above with a ten (10) day minimum suspension.

#### <u>Cafeteria</u>

A computerized debit system for the breakfast and lunch program has been ongoing for several years. This program operates with the student's pin number, which then generates a picture of the student on the computer screen while it accesses that student's account. One of the best features about this program is the security it provides. No one will be able to access another student's account.

Envelopes for this program will be provided to the students. Please fill out the information on the front of the envelope so the money is put in the right account. **Immunizations** Act 299, Public Acts of 1975, authorized the Director of the Michigan Department of Public Health to specify, by regulation, the immunizations and tests required of all children enrolling in Michigan schools for the first time. This year the following immunizations are required:

Diphtheria, Tetanus, Rubella, Pertussis, Measles, Poliomyelitis, Chicken Pox (Varicella) and Meningitis. In addition, each new school entry must have had a vision screening test.

The parent or guardian who, because of religious or other conviction, does not want his/her child protected from these diseases must, submit a signed statement to that effect. Waivers are available at the nurse's office.

As part of our school admission procedure for your child, we must enforce the law stated above. We must have the health record or a similar statement in order to admit your child officially to school.

#### **Guidance and Counseling**

The school guidance program is designed to assist students who have personal and social concerns, and to help students design academic programs to meet their individual needs and abilities. College admission and financial aid assistance is provided for students interested in continuing their schooling after graduation. One of the programs designed to benefit both the student and the community is the co-operative educational program. Under this program, some students are placed in on-the-job-work situations for part of each school day. Students and parents desiring more information are encouraged to contact the guidance offices.

#### Free and Reduced-Prices Student Meals

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals.

Applications forms are being sent to all

homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the form and return it to the school. Additional copies of the application form are available at the principal's office in each school. Households should answer all questions on the form.

NON FOOD STAMP HOUSEHOLDS: An application which does not contain all of the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total income by source for each household member (such as wages, child support, etc.); (2) names of all household members; (3) social security number of the adult household member who signs the application; and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

FOOD STAMP/FIP HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or Family Independence Program (FIP) for your child, you only have to list your child's name and Food Stamp or FIP case number and sign the application.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility, verifying data, or qualifying children for other federal and state programs, as authorized by the United State Department of Agriculture. Applications may be verified by the school or other officials at any time during the school

If children are approved for free or reduced price meal benefits, the household must report to the school increases in household income over \$50 per month (\$600 per year) and decreases in household size. Households may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If a household is not currently eligible but has a decrease in household income, an increase in household size or if a household member becomes unemployed, the household should fill out an application at that time.

In most cases, FOSTER CHILDREN are eligible for these benefits regardless of the household's income. If a household has foster children living with them and they wish to apply for free or reduced price meals for them, the household should contact the school for more information.

Under the provisions of the policy the building principal will review applications and determine eligibility.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. The household also has the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the fol-

"It's grown a lot. The first year we were hoping to average 35 kids per meal, and we ended up with 45 kids per meal," Bock recalled, adding these days, "the Cass City site alone is averaging about 100 kids a day.

This year we had several days where was 35 percent, and we went up to we went over 100 kids."

48 percent within a couple years," she said. "It shot up fast, but now it's leveled off" at about 53 percent.

The daily menu varies and offers fare such as hotdogs and hamburgers, ravioli, pizza and nachos. "Breakfast for lunch (French toast and sausage) is a favorite," Bock said. "It's pretty much the same things the kids get during the school year.'

The USDA provides the district with commodity foods as well as money to pay for the meals.

"It works much like our school lunch program," Bock explained. "When you reach 50 percent (of children qualifying for free and reduced meals), they want you to look at your area and see if you can do a summer lunch program.

'We have only 2 staff members that are paid," Bock noted. "It's not a for-profit program — it's supposed to be a break-even (operation), but it makes enough to help us maintain our equipment. It pays for itself."
