Suspect sought in attempted abduction

A Silverwood boy knew just what to do when he was approached by a stranger near his home last week.

Now, troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Lapeer are asking Thumb area residents to keep an eye out for the man who reportedly attempted to lure the Tuscola County youth away from his residence.

According to reports, the attempted abduction took place Tuesday afternoon while the 12-year-old boy was



working in his yard in Silverwood, which is located about 7 miles southwest of the village of Kingston.

Playing it safe is a winning proposition

With the start of a new school year, athletic programs have new rules to follow to protect young athletes.

In June, Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder signed a law regulating sports concussions — a brain injury caused by a blow, bump or jolt to the head — for young athletes, making Michigan the 39th state to make a commitment to protect minors in athletic activities.

Under the law, there are a number of important directives that the organizing entity, parents and youth must follow, including removing young athletes from play if a concussion is suspected, and not allowing them to return to athletic activities until written clearance is received from an appropriate health professional.

The statute also requires that adults involved in a youth athletic activity receive training on sports concussions, and that all athletes and their parents or guardians receive educational information on sports concussions, so that everyone involved knows what signs and symptoms to look for.

Cass City Public Schools Athletic Director Don Markel says local school officials have been on top of the new rules from the start, although many of the precautions have been in place here for years.

And, he says, the new rules apply not only to student athletes, but also to all young people involved in organized physical activities, even school physical education classes.

"Our hope is that with more education, immediate action, and cautious return to athletic participation, together we can prevent the life changing effects that can result from a sports concussion," said Dr. Matthew Davis, chief medical executive with the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH).

It's about us. You, me - all of us and what we have become and what we are willing to recognize as acceptable public behavior. It is about a society that creates words like sexting and twerking; where blurred lines between good and bad – moral and immoral – are get-ting fuzzier by the moment; where being a bad girl is often more profitable and more desirable than being a good one.

Before I go any further, I know with complete certainty there will be those who adamantly disagree with me. These good folks believe it is their right to watch Miley or whomever shake her booty and engage in the new dance moves that would have been previously censored on prime time TV. Here's good, well, at least better, news from the Michigan State Police. Preliminary reports indicate four people lost their lives in 3 separate crashes during the 2013 Labor Day holiday weekend. In comparison, 8 people died in traffic crashes during last year's holiday,

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), U.S. emergency departments treat an estimated 173,285 sports and recreation-related concussions among children and adolescents each year, with the highest incidents reportedly involving boys' football and girls' soccer.

While the new state guidelines are an ideal way to bring everyone — coaches, student athletes and parents alike together on the same page, we hope the discussion won't prompt young people to walk away from the opportunity to participate in athletics.

A healthy fear of injury is normal, but let's face it, folks have accidents every day in places far from any football field or basketball court.

The key here is awareness to ensure that potentially serious — and long-term — injuries are treated properly and promptly.

It's nice to know that Cass City Public School officials are continuing to place the health and welfare of our student athletes at the top of their athletic department priority list.

That's the way it should be in every school district, because fully involving parents in the effort to play it safe can't be anything but a winning proposition.

Huron County teen charged after chase on stolen ORV

A Huron County teen is in hot water after leading sheriff's deputies on a high-speed chase on a stolen ORV early last week.

According to reports, Huron County Sheriff's Deputy Steven Bismack attempted to stop an ORV on Carpenter Road, near Schott Road in Dwight Township Monday afternoon.

"He had earlier witnessed the suspect exceeding the 25 mph ORV speed," Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson noted, adding the suspect, 17-year-old Shaun D. Nowiski, Kinde, fled northbound at a high rate of speed.

"While pursuing the ORV with speeds of 65 mph, the suspect decided to stop approximately 2

Reporter's notebook

Give me a visit with Down Memory Lane by Tina Pallas old friends anytime

A recent Sunday afternoon interview reminded me over and over of why I still enjoy my work as a newspaper reporter.

My visit with Val and Frank Kemp didn't last guite an hour, but I'll remember it for some time to come for a number of reasons, including the fact that the Cass City couple welcomed me into their beautiful Victorian home again (this wasn't our first meeting) just a couple weeks after Val underwent the left lung transplant that saved her life and, literally, gave her a new lease on the life she and Frank have come to love in this community.

The interview was informal, more like a visit with old friends than a newspaper assignment.

It was comfortable, largely because the Kemps, who owned and operated the McGregory Manor bed and breakfast on North Seeger Street for years before Val's health prompted them to close that chapter in their lives, have always been gracious hosts and know how to make just about anyone feel at home.

Having interviewed them before, I wasn't surprised by the couple's willingness to share their experiences with me. It isn't easy to talk about the mixed emotions that come when you know the call you've been hoping and praying for means a fellow human being has died, leaving potential gifts of life behind in the form of organ donation. And, yet, Val expressed her mixed emotions - then and now with a few tears, but without hesitation

I'm sure the Kemps will also relive in their minds, over and over, the moments just prior to Val's surgery, not knowing if they would look into each others' eyes again.

Interviews like these aren't just a matter of asking questions and scribbling notes; they're about listening, really listening. And observing.

Among other things, I saw a couple genuinely devoted to one another in the most trying circumstances, who have probably always known, without saying a word, that they will be there for each other no matter what life throws at them.

That sort of love and conviction is priceless in a society where relationships are often treated like disposable lighters.

Which explains why I left that interview with a feeling I never get from covering a school board meeting, a grand opening or a news conference, all of which are part of the job on a regular basis.

Like I said, this is the kind of story that keeps me in this business.

Sure, in the journalism community, "investigative reporters" are the guys (and gals) that grab the big headlines, and most of them deserve the credit they enjoy in the limelight.

But they can have it. I'll trade the glory for a visit with some old "friends" anytime.

Regulation changes on tap for approaching fall hunts in state

first rounds of deer season -the Liberty Hunt and the early antlerless deer season, Sept. 21-22 - are just around the corner.

There have been some significant changes made to deer hunting regulations for the 2013 season, so hunters expecting to go about business as usual this fall should take a few minutes to familiarize themselves with the rules.

The most significant change is the addition of 12 counties in the northwestern Lower to those with antler restrictions. Beginning this year deer hunters in Antrim, Benzie, Charlevoix, Emmet, Grand Traverse, Kalkaska, Lake, Manistee, Mason, Missaukee, Osceola and Wexford counties will be restricted to bucks with a minimum of three antler points on at least one antler. The 12 counties join Leelanau County, which has had that regulation for a decade.

The rule was adopted by the Natural Resources Commission after hunters from the area petitioned for the antler restrictions and Wildlife Division officials at the Department of Natural Resources conducted surveys indicating that at least twothirds of the hunters supported the change.

"The regulation will be in place for five years and we will evaluate support among hunters as to whether they would like to see it remain in place after that," said Brent Rudolph, the DNR's deer and elk program.

Hunters who opt for the two-tag combination license will still be restricted to one buck with at least four antler points on one antler if they choose to take a second buck.

The September early antlerless season and Liberty Hunt — the former hunts for 100 percent disabled veterans and youth - will run concurrently as they did last year. Youths, 16 years of age or younger, may participate, as well as hunters with disabilities who meet one of the following criteria:

· Is a veteran who has been determined to be 100 percent disabled or rated as unemployable by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs;

• Has been issued a permit by the DNR to hunt from a standing vehi-

• Has been issued a permit by the DNR to hunt using a laser-sighting device; or

"The early antlerless season is now two days and is open in much of southern Michigan, DMU 487 (the tuberculosis zone in the northeastern Lower Peninsula) and Charlevoix and Antrim counties," Rudolph said. "Last year hunters took a little more than 6,000 deer in September. In southern Michigan, they took 4,500 antlerless deer in the early season compared to about 17,000 taken during the muzzleloader season. Overall, hunters took 110,591 deer in southern Michigan, so in terms of the number of deer taken in the early antlerless season, it was never a huge percentage of the take. Two years ago, we did have quite a bit of hunting in September, but there were relatively few hunters participating in those hunts.

The Independence Hunt, Oct. 17-20, is restricted to those hunters with disabilities meeting the same criteria as for the Liberty Hunt. Hunters may take a deer with or without antlers.

All other DMUs in the Lower Peninsula are single counties

Wildlife Division will be conducting research in a few areas hard hit by last year's epidemic to help judge local recovery of deer populations."

co-chairs of Fall Family Days. "Everything went very, very well. We

got all positive comments," Hirn said. Hirn was still in the middle of the lengthy process of crunching numbers Monday morning. However, he said this year's attendance and income figures are looking very promising.

"We probably – gross income – we're probably going to match (or exceed) what we did last year, and last year was our biggest year," said Hirn, who had predicted the weekend attendance

would easily approach 15,000 people. Although the Friends of the Thumb Octagon Barn have accomplished a great deal over the past several years through fundraising efforts and donations, Hirn acknowledged the work will probably never be completed.

"We're working on that village out on the northeast corner of the property," he noted. "The school museum is about 90 percent done, and then that cider mill out back - we've got two guys from Port Hope that donated that cider press, and our game plan is to get that (building) done this fall. Now,

we're talking about putting an addition onto the grain mill."

Fall Family Days — one of the Thumb's largest fall festivals invites residents from throughout the state and beyond to step back in time to rural Michigan of the 1900s through 1950s

The celebration annually draws thousands of visitors and features a different agricultural theme each year this year's theme was soybeans and soybean products.

The Thumb Octagon Barn and nearby Purdy family farmhouse are located just east of Gagetown, north of Bay City-Forestville at 6948 Ritchie Road. The theme for the 2013 Fall Family Days - now in its 18th year focused on soybeans and related products.

Saturday and Sunday both featured a full slate of events and demonstrations, including a Michigan Soybean Association's display focusing on the soybean and the many food and nonfood products that have soybeans listed as an ingredient.

Available all weekend were homemade bean soup, cotton candy, fresh pressed apple cider, fresh fried hot cakes, homemade ice cream, lemonade and hog kettle popcorn, while the Eastern Michigan Music Makers provided old fashioned music under the trees near the farmhouse, just as they have from the very first Fall Family Days event in 1995.

The 7-bedroom farmhouse, former home of James and Cora Purdy and their two daughters, was open for guided tours. Built in 1922, the residence has been fully restored and is furnished with a variety of furniture, clothing and other items of the time.

The festival also treated guests to presentations by students and teachers all dressed in clothing representing the 1920s and 30s — in the Mast School, an authentic one-room country school.

As always, the grounds were packed with vendors — some 165 in all — displaying a wide range of arts, crafts and flea market items.

The list of activities and demonstrations was extensive and includes presentations on the history of the barn by Margaret Sergeant, a blacksmith shop, sugar shack, children's activity area, powerhouse, sawmill, farm animals and food preparation "the old fash-ioned way", a shingle mill and forge, stationary hay press, steam engines, broom making, a huge display of tracworking grain elevator.
