"While continuing the investigation, deputies discovered packets of heroin along with cash, a debit card and other items in a shoe of Lewis' wife," Hanson said. "His wife, Tiffany R. Glaza, age 23, whose last address was Ubly, was later arrested and lodged in our jail for possession of the heroin. Eventually more drug paraphernalia was located and seized. Their 2012 Nissan rental car was also impounded."

Lewis was arraigned in Huron County District Court on a misdemeanor charge of domestic violence and a felony larceny charge stemming from the alleged theft of a log splitter in Huron Township earlier this month. His bond was set at \$13,500 and he remained lodged in the county jail.

Glaza was arraigned on a felony charge of possession of heroin and 2 felony counts of breaking and entering stemming from an alleged crime last February, also in Huron Township. Her bond was set at

"Last month our office recovered approximately \$5,000 in stolen property from a Lincoln Township residence that was related to last February's breaking and enterings." Hanson said. "This residence was also believed to have been the site of a suspected meth lab earlier this year. Our belief is that the property had been stolen in order to purchase drugs. # Student enrollment on track with projections

The 2013-14 school year is still young, but the latest enrollment figures for the Cass City Public Schools are in line with district officials' projections earlier this summer.

The Cass City Board of Education heard a brief report Monday night on student numbers from school Supt. Jeff Hartel, who reported the current enrollment totals 1,056 students --564 in the elementary grades and 492 at the junior-senior high school.

"I think we're kind of seeing a leveling off," said Hartel, referring to several years of falling student numbers both locally and throughout the Thumb region and state. Hartel noted Cass City has roughly 4 students more than school officials anticipated when they adopted the district's current budget in late June.

involved in the formula on which schools depend on to calculate their annual revenues, making it more difficult for them to estimate what their income will be. In past years, state officials "blended" enrollment counts taken by all public schools matters, Klosowski presented a twice a year; once during the previous February and again in the fall. However, this year's fall student tally will be blended with the count conducted next February.

Under the previous formula, schools could begin estimating their revenue for the fiscal year following the fall count, according to Mike Klosowski, chief financial officer for the Cass City Public Schools. Now, he said, "you won't know until the fiscal year is just about over."

The state's blending formula places the greatest emphasis on the fall count, which is worth 90 percent of In spite of that good news, state the total blended enrollment, which

officials have revised the timing is then multiplied by the schools' "foundation allowances" -- Cass City, for example, is slated to receive \$7,066 per student -- to determine how much revenue they will receive for the year.

Turning to other finance-related monthly financial report that shows spending and revenues are in line with estimates built into Cass Citv's 2013-14 spending plan, which went into effect July 1.

The school board approved a lean budget calling for general fund revenues totaling \$9.078 million, just \$5,255 more than planned expenditures, which are expected to total \$9.073 million over the next several months. The district ended 2012-13 with a fund balance of nearly \$787,000, or an amount equal to 8.3 percent of the budget. That figure is

First you have to assemble the necessary tools: swimsuit, several large towels, shampoo, blow dryer, a few dog treats and a bowl.

When you finally locate the swimsuit last worn 15 years ago and realize the elastic has completely deteriorated, opt for an old pair of shorts and a t-shirt. This is for you, not the dog.

Place the shampoo in the shower stall along with the bowl.

### Put down the phone, look out for children

Local law enforcement officials spend a fair amount of time reminding motorists about the dangers of distracted driving — multi-tasking on the roadways with a burger in one hand and a cell phone in the other, for

It's good advice, and with school back in session, there isn't a better time to rethink your driving habits for the sake of our youngsters.

Tuscola County Sheriff Lee Teschendorf recently offered the following tips to help ensure a safe fall for everyone:

### Tips for Students

Always arrive at the bus stop early.

Prior to boarding, wait until the bus has come to a complete stop, the door is opened and the bus driver says that it's OK to board.

Once on board proceed quickly to your seat and stay sitting until the bus arrives at your school or other drop off location.

Always walk on the sidewalk when preparing to cross the street near a bus. Make eye contact with the driver so that you are sure he or she sees you.

Never walk behind the bus.

If you are walking beside the bus, make sure you are at least 10 feet (10 "giant" steps) away.

Take extra precautions to make sure that clothing with drawstrings and book bags do not get caught in the hand rail or door.

Never stop to pick something up you have dropped while the bus is stopped. Wait until the bus has driven off to avoid not being seen by the driver.

### Tips for Motorists

Remember that children are unpredictable in their actions. Take extreme caution when traveling in a school zone.

Be more aware of children playing near school bus

Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.

Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and care-

Reduce any distractions inside your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.

Put down your phone – don't talk or text while driv-

Slow down and prepare to stop whenever you see yellow school bus lights flashing.

Never pass a school bus when there are flashing red lights. This is a sign that children are getting off the bus – and it's the law!

### Traveling to and from School

Plan a walking route to school or the bus stop. Choose the most direct way with the fewest street crossings and, if possible, with intersections that have crossing guards.

Walk the route with your child. Tell him or her to stay away from parks, vacant lots, fields and other places where there aren't many people around.

Teach your child never to talk to strangers, accept rides from strangers or accept gifts from strangers. Remember, a stranger is anyone you or your children don't know well or don't trust.

Be sure your child walks to and from school or the bus stop with a sibling, friend or neighbor.

Teach your kids – whether walking, biking or riding the bus to school – to obey all traffic signals, signs and traffic officers. Remind them to be extra careful in bad weather.

When driving kids, deliver and pick them up as close to the school as possible. Don't leave until they are in the schoolyard or building.

If your child bikes to school make sure he wears a helmet that meets safety standards. Research indicates that a helmet can reduce the risk of head injury by up to 85%.

Be sure your child knows his or her home (or parents' cellular) phone number(s) and address. They should also know where you work, your work phone number, the phone number of another trusted adult and how to call 911 for emergencies.

Sure, you've heard it all before. Just keep in mind that no one heads out with plans to be involved in a tragic accident that could have been avoided.

In this case, an ounce of prevention could be worth a child's life.

In with the new. I moved Mr. Sleek and Flashy to

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

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The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) recently announced that its managed waterfowl hunting areas (MWHA) will host open houses in October to celebrate the Michigan Waterfowl Legacy.

The DNR invites the public and hunters to join the staff at various MWHAs to tour the areas and learn about the possibilities for hunting and other outdoor recreation. The closest open house location for most Thumb residents will be held at Tuscola County's Fish Point NWHA on Wednesday, Oct. 9 from 5:30 to 9 pm.

"The open houses will provide an opportunity for hunters and outdoor enthusiasts to learn about the areas and interact directly with DNR personnel," said Joe Robison, wildlife biologist supervisor for the DNR. "These areas offer first-class waterfowl hunting opportunities and various recreational activities that many outdoor enthusiasts can enjoy."

Guided tours will include observation of habitat improvements conducted to provide optimal habitat for waterfowl plus other wildlife management techniques that make these areas attractive to a host of wildlife. Additionally, the public can learn about the Michigan Waterfowl Legacy, a program intended to improve conditions for waterfowl and people who enjoy interacting with them. Waterfowl hunters will learn about how the area is run and what to expect when they come in for a hunt drawing, and visitors will have a chance to have questions answered during a Q&A period.

A limited number of childcare scholarships are available in Tuscola County through the Women's Caring

Child Care Commitment provides financial support for licensed care expenses (for children age birth to five years old) from low-income working families. This support is for families who are not eligible for childcare payments from another funding source, but still struggle to make ends meet. Eligible families must have at least one parent that is working, going to school, or a combination of both for a minimum of 35 hours per week.

Eligible families receive 40 percent of their annual cost of childcare for one child per family, up to a maximum of \$220 per month for 12 months. Monthly automatic deposit payments are made directly to the licensed childcare provider chosen by the parent.

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

For the past few years, there has been an increasing focus on the safety and health issues in Agricultural Confined Spaces. Several agencies are working together to develop safety and rescue programs dealing specifically with confined spaces.



The theme "Working Together for Safety in Agriculture" is one that hits home and reminds us that it is everyone's responsibility for safety both on the farm and the rural roadways of America. The new data for the Department of Labor shows the agricultural sector is still the most dangerous in America with 475 fatalities, which equals 21.2 deaths per 100,000 workers. When combining all labor sectors the death rate was 3.2%.

that receive money from the United Way were reduced by 20 percent due to lower-than-projected contributions at the end of the 2012-13 cam-

"That's really a tough pill to swallow, to be honest with you," said Heiser, who noted total United Way of Tuscola County's distributions are now projected at just over \$54,000, a

decrease of 10 percent. In spite of falling short, Heiser pointed out the United Way continues to have a positive impact on the citizens of Tuscola County. "Everyone we can make a difference for, we should be proud of," he said.

Thursday's kick-off also included a brief ceremony honoring longtime United Way of Tuscola County board member Ray Bates of Caro, who has resigned following a term of service that began in 1998, when he was among the original signers of the articles of corporation that created the county-wide United Way.

Heiser noted Bates was elected board vice president in 2001 and played a key role in getting the local United Way designated as an umbrella agency for the state, which paved the way for participation in the State Employees Charitable Campaign.

Bates also served as the local board president, and in 2004 also took on the duties of board secretary, according to Heiser, who said Bates attended more than 60 formal United Way of Tuscola County meetings during his 15-year tenure.

Also Thursday, the board recognized outgoing 2012-13 Honorary Campaign Chairwoman Sister Ann Ozog, and welcomed 2013-14 Honorary Campaign Chairman Brian Newcomb, a former longtime Michigan State Police Trooper who now serves as police chief for the city of Caro.

Current Board President Mary Kulis, area manager for Consumers Energy, also addressed the group, saying even modest donations to the United Way can make a big difference in the lives of others.

For example, Kulis said, a pledge of \$2 a week — \$104 a year – is enough to cover the financial aid for one Boy Scout or Girl Scout for a year, or 2 days of shelter for a runaway teen. The same amount, she added, is tap for Cass enough to pay for personal protection orders for 5 abused women, or could cover the cost of transportation assistance for a foster grandparent.

Heiser emphasized that the United Way of Tuscola County all-volunteer board has kept a cap of less than 6 percent on agency expenses, meaning 94 cents out of every dollar donated goes back into the commu-

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

"Basically, I do what I did for my kids."

Stephens, a Hamtramck native, has lived most of her life in the city including Royal Oak and Detroit as well as a six-month stint in New York City. She moved to the Thumb a decade ago, residing on a 3-acre spread west of Kingston where she cares for a barnyard full of critters chickens, a duck and turkey, 2 dogs and several cats.

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


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
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

### Michigan's Home Heating Credit deadline quickly approaching

Residents who qualify for Michigan's Home Heating Credit have less than a week left to apply for assistance, said state Sen. Mike Green.

The deadline to apply for the credit is Monday, Sept. 30.

"Michigan's cold winter is only a few short months away," said Green, (R-Mayville). "If you need help heating your home and are eligible for the credit, I encourage you to apply before the deadline so you can keep your family safe and warm this winter."

According to the Michigan Public Service Commission, eligible individuals must maintain their homestead in Michigan, must own or rent the home in which they live, and for the standard allowance, their income must fall within certain limits.

For example, a single person must have an annual income of \$11,929 or less to qualify. The income limit increases \$4,114 for each additional exemption. Special exemptions are available for individuals who are deaf, blind, disabled or over the age of 65.

Designed to help low-income Michigan families with the cost of heating their homes, the Home Heating Credit is federally funded through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance
