Teachers in the Cass City School District are more than a month into the 2013-14 school year, but still don't have a new contract.

Representatives of both the school district and the Cass City Education Association have been meeting to negotiate a new labor agreement since early spring, and they've

# Hospital building own retail pharmacy

Hills and Dales General Hospital officials have broken ground for a new retail and drive-through pharmacy in town.

Expected to total 1,900 square feet, the new Hospital Drive Pharmacy will be connected to the MARC Building.

The facility will be staffed with at least one full-time pharmacist as well as a part-time pharmacist and three pharmacy technicians, bringing five new jobs to Cass City, according to hospital spokeswoman Danielle Blaine, who said the pharmacy will carry prescription as well as over-

agreed on much of what the new contract will include — with the key exception being teachers' salaries, according to school Supt. Jeff Hartel.

Hartel along with Cass City Board of Education President Craig Bellew and Trustee Dave Osentoski serve as the district's negotiation team, while the union is being represented at the table by teachers Mary Keroson, Jane Reif and Josh Stern.

Both sides were slated to meet again early this week in an effort to iron out the final details, Hartel said.

The teachers' previous two-year contract expired in mid-August. 'It's been rare that we've had to start the (school) year without a con-

tract. It's never a good climate," commented Cass City Education Association President Kris Milligan, a veteran educator of 34 years.

Although Milligan isn't directly

involved in negotiations, she said it's "Over the past 4 years, there has Milligan said. "This year we have her understanding that the union's bargaining team has tentatively agreed on portions of the new con-

As for the question of settling on economic issues, Milligan pointed out that local teachers made concessions when school officials were struggling financially a couple years ago. Now the outlook has improved, she said, and union officials feel the district is in a position to resume "step" pay increases, which are incremental salary hikes based on years of service.

"I would assume...that our (negotiations team) has asked for those steps back — that would be the bare minimum," Milligan said.

"When the district was in tight times, we took that pay freeze. We didn't get any steps," she noted.

Step One 4 years ago, you're still there. And the steps have not been increased in 6 or 7 years.

is not in dire straits. The school has them with what Hartel calls "offsaid that the fund balance is looking pretty good," Milligan said. "We've worked with the district. Now we want it (steps) back."

Milligan said the teaching staff is well aware of the financial challenges school officials have faced in recent years, including a significant loss of funding due to shrinking enrollment numbers. At the same time, however, teachers have also sacrificed to help meet those challenges, and the district isn't dealing with the same staff size it was a decade ago.

"In 2004 we had 90 teachers,"

> "It was just a way to give them some money," Hartel said. "It was a way of saying the district's not in a position to increase the steps, but here's some money. You're doing a good job.'

> Hartel agreed the district's bottom line has improved over the past several months, with school officials projecting a fund balance of roughly \$792,000, an amount equal to 8.7 percent of the 2013-14 general fund budget.

> In addition, the Cass City Schools received an additional \$60 per student in state funding this year. However, Hartel pointed out that rising costs and adjustments in other types of funding at the state level have erased that increase and then

# Cass City up 11 kids over projections in spending plan

As guesswork goes in budgeting, Cass City School officials came out on the positive side in the area of enrollment this fall following last week's biannual statewide student

"We budgeted for 1,052 (students), which currently means we are 11 students ahead from what we budgeted for," school Supt. Jeff Hartel reported Thursday, a day after the official

count. The Cass City Public Schools' total enrollment added up to 1,063 students — 564 in the elementary grades and 499 at the junior-senior

high school. In spite of the surplus of kids in the Cass City Schools — 11 students equals roughly \$77,286 in state funding — officials are no closer to estimating the district's total revenue for this fiscal year than they were when they adopted a 2013-14 budget at the

end of June. The reason lies in Lansing, where state officials have revised the timing involved in the formula which schools depend on to calculate their annual revenues, making it more difficult for school administrators to estimate what their income will be. In past years, state officials "blended" enrollment counts taken by all public schools twice a year; once during the previous February and again in the fall — state officials place a heavy emphasis on the fall tally, which is worth 90 percent of

# Chronicle honored with two 2013 MPA awards

The Cass City Chronicle was honored with two awards in the 2013

Michigan Press Association (MPA) Better Newspaper Contest. The contest results were recently announced in conjunction with National

Newspaper Week, Oct. 6-12. The observation annually emphasizes the importance of newspapers to communities large and small. This year's theme is: "Your Community, Your Newspaper, Your Life".

Members of the Nebraska Press Association reviewed more than 3,100 entries submitted by 114 Michigan newspapers when they judged this year's MPA contest, which saw participation among the state's newspapers increase by 11 percent.

In the category of Local Columnist, Chronicle Editor Tom Montgomery was awarded second place in the Class D Weekly Newspaper division (circulation of under 4,000) for his weekly "Reporter's Notebook" column. There were a total of 19 entries among Class D newspapers in the category.

Montgomery also earned second-place honors among 52 entries submitted in the Feature Story category for his story entitled "No more cancer! — 6year-old Wyatt Sutton wins fight against lymphoma". The story, published in the Chronicle's Jan. 23, 2013, edition, focused on the Cass City boy's battle with and victory over Burkitt's Lymphoma, an aggressive cancer of the

What a heartwarming, wonderful story!" the judges commented. "This was such a tough category with lots of entries! This story was very, very good."

In all, the Chronicle has received 18 MPA awards over the past several years in various categories ranging from news and features to columns and editorials. In 2011, the local paper earned first-place honors in the Class D Weekly Newspaper General Excellence category.

more than a dozen years, was diagnosed with breast cancer last spring. She's since undergone two surgeries and is a couple weeks away from

completing radiation treatments. Dennis, whose diagnosis hasn't dimmed her bright smile or independent nature, is quick to say that facing her own mortality was a rude

awakening. But she'll also tell you she has no intention of letting cancer get the best of her, now or ever.

"It's not an option. I have 4 children and family in town. It's exhausting sometimes, but...it's just not a battle I'm ready to give up on,"

Dennis commented Monday. "I have amazing friends and family, and this community – just blew my mind over the weekend," Dennis added, referring to a fundraiser organized by her co-workers and attended by hundreds of area residents at Gilligan's Saturday after-

"I don't really have a word to describe it," she said. "I am surrounded by good people."

Dennis grew up in Detroit but has lived in Cass City since she was 14, graduating from Cass City High School in 1981. Her diagnosis of breast cancer came in April after scheduling a long-overdue check-up.

"I just felt something different. I wasn't sure if it was a lump," she said. "I hadn't been to a doctor in 15 years."

A lumpectomy revealed cancer in her left breast.

"It's incredibly scary. It's very emotional," she said of hearing the word "cancer" for the first time. "I wasn't afraid so much. The waiting was absolutely the hardest part."

Dennis, who immediately began doing her own research to learn more about her condition, later underwent two lymph node dissections, which enabled doctors to "stage" the disease to determine if the cancer had metastasized or spread. The news was good – the cancer had not spread to her lymph nodes.

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

More and more patients are beating breast cancer by following recommendations regarding undergoing clinical breast exams (women ages 20 and older should have one every 3 years) and mammograms (recommended for women 40 years old and older every year).

Early detection is the key, according to health officials, who say the five-year survival rate among women whose breast cancer has not spread beyond the breast at the time of diagnosis is 98 percent.

In fact, breast cancer incidence rates decreased from 135.8 per 100,000 women in 2000 to 119.8 per 100,000 women in 2009. Likewise, there has been a decline in mortality rates among women in Michigan, falling from 26.1 deaths per 100,000 women in 2001 to 23.8 deaths per 100,000 in 2010.

Still, breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths among Michigan women and is the most frequently diagnosed cancer.



# **Cass City enrollment better** than expected in fall count

the total. However, this year's fall tally will be blended with the count conducted next February.

Under the previous formula, schools could begin estimating their revenue for the fiscal year, which ends June 30, following the fall count. Now, however, school officials won't have a handle on revenue until the fiscal year is nearly over.

"We anticipate knowing what our true revenues will be in late April, early May, which is ridiculous," Hartel said. "They're (state officials) putting us in a pretty tough spot."

timing was approved in order to save the state some money based on shrinking enrollments in schools across Michigan. However, in terms of the impact on K-12 public education, he said, "It's just another ding in the armor.

Cass City is among the schools hit hard by declining enrollment, but the district hasn't been alone in the Thumb. In fact, the combined enrollment of all 9 public school systems within the Tuscola Intermediate School District fell from 10,759 students in 2007-08 to roughly 9,200 kids two years ago.

Michigan's public schools depend on student numbers for the lion's share of their revenue each year. The dollars are distributed to schools by the state in the form of a "foundation allowance", a funding amount multiplied by the number of students in each district. The Cass City Schools, for example, receive about \$7,026 per pupil. Coming up with an accurate esti-

mate of state funding isn't the only concern Michigan school officials are facing these days.

According to Hartel, the state Senate's recent failure to adopt a resolution authorizing funding to implement the Common Core State Standards in Michigan has put at risk federal dollars schools depend on to fund a variety of programs. The res-

olution in question was required to be in place when the state's fiscal

year began Oct. 1. In Cass City, the funding adds up to about \$700,000 and pays for, among other things, the salaries for 19 paraprofessionals.

Most states across the nation have adopted the Common Core State Standards, which are designed to provide a consistent, clear understanding of what students are expected to learn, so teachers and parents know what they need to do to help

In the end, according to Hartel, school officials continue to face financial pressures in the form of increasing costs across the board, one unfunded mandate after another from Lansing, and the need to look at major purchases and upgrades involving areas such as transportation and technology. "Even though we have \$700,000 in fund balance, that could go quickly," he added.

The teachers just want a fair contract — they really feel it's time to have the steps increased so it's officially on the books," the superintendent acknowledged.

'We really feel that we want to give the teachers a fair contract. They're good at what they do. I respect the teachers," he said. "But you give what you have."


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We may not want to admit it, but Michigan journalists tend to get a little giddy at the end of September.



some coordination in the final days before the DFA Board was to make its final decisions.

We worked with great officials and workers from Cass City and Tuscola County, representatives from Michigan Economic Development Corporation, and the Michigan Departments of Agriculture and Transportation. While in Washington, Senators Stabenow and Levin helped pave the way with USDA

I worked with our House Chair of griculture Policy Kevin Daley (R-Lum), who also understood the importance of the project for our region. "It's a pleasure working across the aisle with Terry, who knows how important agriculture and jobs are to the greater Thumb area," Daley said.

The city, the county, and the state all committed the resources over time necessary to get to the "harvest." Next fall the 33,000-square-foot plant will process up to 3 million pounds of fresh milk each day and we expect additional high-demand, value-added products in the near future, all produced in an environmentally friendly way, recovering and re-using water in its operations.

Initially there will be at least 25 fulltime people working in the plant along with many others in farms and other agriculture support industries locally. And we expect that number to grow considerably.

The community will have new infrastructure, including improvements in their water and wastewater treatment facilities at no cost to them.

I can't tell you how rewarding it is to see this tremendous economic development for our region come to fruition, looking back at those days when 'experts" told me we couldn't do it. And wouldn't you know it, when it came time for the groundbreaking it happened on a session day in Lansing.

Although I would have loved to be celebrating at home, I'm not crying over spilled milk. You elected me to represent you by voting at the Capitol, and that's where I was debating and voting on things that will also provide a harvest down the road as we continue to work together.

# Small-game season underway

Small-game hunting season began Sept. 1 with the opening of the early Canada goose season and continues until rabbit and hare season ends on March 31. Department of Natural Resources wildlife biologists across the state say hunters should find conditions similar to last year in Michigan's wood lots, farm fields and wetlands.

Rabbits

Season: Cottontail rabbits and varying (or snowshoe) hare can be hunted from Sept. 15 - March 31, statewide. The daily bag limit is five in combination with a possession limit of 10. Outlook: Roughly 60,000 hunters reported pursuing rabbits in 2010 (the most recently completed harvest survey) and about 15,000 hunted hares. Cottontail populations are good throughout their range over much of the state. Concentrate on thick cover, such as briar patches and brush piles, often near agricultural fields. Snowshoe hare populations are down somees and brush piles, often hear agricultural fields. Showshoe hare populations are down somewhat from historic levels. Look for early-successional forests (such as aspen stands) and low-lying swamps with blow-downs and brush piles in the northern two-thirds of the state.

Squirrels

Season: Sept. 15 - March 1. The daily bag limit is five per day with 10 in possession.
Outlook: Both fox and gray squirrels are at moderate to high levels across much of the state.

Last year's mast crop was poor, so squirrels gravitated to areas adjoining agriculture. This year's mast crop appears to be abundant, so squirrels should be widespread in areas with beech, oak and hickory trees. About 70,000 hunters pursue squirrels each year.

Ruffed Grouse

Season: Sept. 15 - Nov. 14 and Dec. 1 - Jan. 1, statewide. The bag limit is five per day/10 in possession in the northern two-thirds of the state, three per day/six in possession in Zone 3

Outlook: Grouse populations are cyclical, typically rising and falling over a 10-year period, and indications are that we are coming off a peak and into decline. The spring drumming survey showed a statewide decline of 13 percent from last year with the highest counts in the Upper Peninsula. Michigan boasts about 85,000 grouse hunters.

Grouse typically inhabit early successional forests; young to moderate-aged aspen stands (fine to 15 years old). Food courses are important but began and wild fauit production is about

(five to 15 years old). Food sources are important, but berry and wild fruit production is abundant this year. Grouse are most numerous in the Upper Peninsula and northern Lower Peninsula, but hunters may find local populations in areas with good habitat in southern Michigan, too. Grouse and woodcock hunters are asked to assist the DNR in monitoring populations by reporting their results. Cooperator forms can be found on the DNR website at www.michigan.gov/hunting– select Upland Game Birds and then Ruffed Grouse.

Woodcock

Season: Sent 21. Nov 4. statewide. The daily had limit is three with a possession limit of

Outlook: Although woodcock populations are in long-term decline because of decreasing habitat quality, hunters can expect about the same results they enjoyed last year, when roughly 35,000 hunters; often in conjunction with grouse hunting; said they pursued woodcock. Found in all parts of Michigan, woodcock are migratory, and although their population densities are higher in the northern two-thirds of the state, they often can be found in good num-

Iy 35,000 hunters; often in conjunction with grouse hunting; said they pursued woodcock. Found in all parts of Michigan, woodcock are migratory, and although their population densities are higher in the northern two-thirds of the state, they often can be found in good numbers in southern Michigan later in the season as the birds head south. The best habitat is young cover along streams and on swamp edges; the long-beaked birds feed by probing the earth for worms and other invertebrates in moist soils. Peak migration occurs in mid-October in the northern portions of the state. Hunters are reminded that they must have a Harvest Information Program (HIP) endorsement printed on their small game licenses to legally take woodcock. See the 2013 Michigan Hunting and Trapping Digest for details.

Sharp-tailed Grouse

Season: Oct. 10-31 in the eastern Upper Peninsula, east of M-129 and east of I-75 north of M-48. The limit is two daily, with four in possession; six per season.

Outlook: This is the fourth season of hunting after nearly a decade of closed seasons. Sharptails are birds of grasslands and associated shrubby habitat (think pheasant habitat).

Often found in small flocks and sometimes difficult to approach; sharptails can require relatively long-range shooting compared to ruffed grouse. Sharptail hunters are required to have a (free) sharp-tailed grouse endorsement on their hunting licenses. Last year, 3,200 hunters acquired the endorsement, but only 394 reported hunting, killing 156 birds.

Pheasants

Season: Oct. 10-31 in the Upper Peninsula in Menominee County and portions of Iron, Marquette, Dickinson and Delta counties, Oct. 20 - Nov. 14 in the Lower Peninsula and Dec. 1 - Jan. 1 in selected areas of Zone 3. The limit is two cocks daily, with four in possession. Outlook: Pheasant populations have been in decline for a number of years, primarily because of changes in agricultural practices and/or urban sprawl, though this summer rural mail carrier brood index was the best since 2004. Typically, the best ha

Hunters who enjoyed success last year should find similar hunting conditions in the same areas. The best counties for pheasant hunting occur in south-central to mid-Michigan and into the Thumb, though locally abundant populations can be found almost anywhere. Look for warm-season grasses, especially idled farm fields. Late-season hunters can have success in cattail and shrub lands adjoining picked agricultural fields. An estimated 27,000 hunters pursue pheasants in Michigan.

Ouail Season: Oct. 20 - Nov. 14. Quail can be hunted only in Branch, Calhoun, Clinton, Eaton, Genesee, Gratiot, Hillsdale, Huron, Ingham, Ionia, Jackson, Kent, Lapeer, Lenawee, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Montcalm, Oakland, Saginaw, St. Clair, St. Joseph, Sanilac, Shawassee, Tuscola, Washtenaw and Wayne counties. The bag limit is five per day/10 in pos-

Outlook: Quail hunting often is associated with pheasant hunting in Michigan, and bird populations are patchy at best, though spring nesting conditions were ideal. Fewer than 1,000 hunters report hunting quail.

Season: Sept. 15 - Nov. 14 in 11 management units including the entire Upper Peninsula (except Isle Royale) and all counties to the south of and including Oceana, Newaygo, Mecosta, Isabella, Midland, Bay and Huron (except Wayne and Monroe); and Emmet, Cheboygan, Charlevoix, Antrim and Otsego. Beaver Island is included in two management units. More than 50,000 licenses are available; 5,150 general licenses that may be used on public or private land and 46,700 licenses for private land only. Licenses are issued by lottery, though leftover licenses are available over the counter on a first come first served best until management.

leftover licenses are available over the counter on a first-come, first-served basis until management unit quotas are met. The limit is one bird of either sex per license.

Outlook: Fall turkey seasons are only held in areas where populations are stable to increasing, so prospects are very good. Roughly 16,000 hunters pursue wild turkeys in the fall hunt,

many of them during the archery deer season.

Ducks
Seasons: Sept. 21 - Nov. 10 and Nov. 23 - Dec. 1 in the North Zone (Upper Peninsula); Oct. 5 - Dec. 1 and Dec. 14-15 in the Middle Zone; and Oct. 12 - Dec. 8 and Dec. 28-29 1 in the South Zone.

The bag limit for ducks is six per day with no more than four mallards (no more than one hen), three wood ducks, three scaup (bluebills), two redheads, two pintails, two canvasbacks and one black duck. Five additional mergansers (no more than two may be hooded mer-

and one black duck. Five additional mergansers (no more than two may be hooded mergansers) may be taken. Possession limit is two days' daily bag limit.

Outlook: Prospects for Michigan's 40,000 duck hunters are excellent. Continental populations are down 6 percent from last year, but remain 33 percent above the long-term average. Locally, spring surveys indicated a decrease in the Great Lakes mallard population, despite an increase of wetlands of 32 percent from last year. Opportunities for puddle ducks; especially wood duck; in beaver ponds and small inland floodings should be good as it's been a rainy year. Diving ducks, which usually begin arriving in good numbers around mid-October, should be plentiful on the Great Lakes, but bluebill numbers are down 20 percent; leading to a reduction of one in the daily bag limit. The daily bag for canvasback, however, has been raised by one. The possession limit has been increased from two daily bags to three days bag.

Seasons: The early season is Sept 1-15 except in the Upper Peninsula and Saginaw, Huron and Tuscola counties, where the season is Sept. 1-10. The daily bag limit is five.

The regular goose seasons are Sept. 11 - Dec. 11 in the North Zone; Sept. 21-29 and Oct. 5 - Dec. 26 in the Middle Zone; and Sept. 21-23, Oct. 12 - Dec. 8, and Dec. 28-29 in the South Zone, except in designated goose management units (GMUs). The daily bag limit is two. In the Saginaw County GMU, the season is Sept. 21-23, Oct. 12 - Dec. 8 and Dec. 28 - Jan. 27 with a daily bag limit of two. In the Tuscola/Huron GMU, the season is Sept. 21-27, Oct. 12 - Dec. 8, and Dec. 28 - Jan. 23 with a daily bag limit of two. In the Allegan County GMU, the season is Nov. 2 - Jan. 31 with a daily bag limit of two. In the Muskegon Wastewater GMU, the season is Oct. 16 - Nov. 13 and Dec. 1-22 with a daily bag limit of two.


The late goose season, in the South Zone excluding the GMUs, is Jan. 18 - Feb. 15 with a daily bag limit of five.

Hunters may take 20 snow, blue or Ross geese daily during the recular.

Hunters may take 20 snow, blue or Ross geese daily during the regular goose seasons in all

ones and GMUs.
Outlook: Resident Canada goose populations, which account for more than 70 percent of the state's total harvest, are above population goals, so hunters should find plenty of geese, with as much opportunity as ever.
