Archery in Schools

Kingston School officials launch national after-school program for district's students

It's not uncommon to hear excited voices coming from an elementary school cafeteria or gymnasium on just about any weekday. It's also not uncommon for schools to offer after-school programs to enrich the educational experience for its students.

What was unique about the activity taking place after school Thursday in the Kingston Elementary School cafeteria was the type of program engaging the attention of the rotating groups of participating

The Kingston Community Schools recently implemented the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP). Some 160 Kingston students in grades kindergarten through sixth were introduced to the program Thursday.

Archery in the Schools promotes student education and participation in target archery.

"We want to provide our students with as many opportunities to learn and grow as possible,' explained Kingston Elementary Principal Lane

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) implemented the Archery in the Schools Program in 2004. There are currently 500 schools in 78 counties that have adopted the program.

Prior to launching a local archery program, Kingston School officials were required to complete a number of steps, including retaining a teacher on staff who is a certified NASP instructor. Kingston had 10 teachers volunteer to become certified instructors.

According to the Michigan DNR, the instructors must understand how to:

*Set up an archery range and shoot in a safe direc-

*Utilize waiting, shooting and target lines. *Adhere to internationally accepted whistle com-

*Move students safely about the range, and *Handle, inspect and repair all archery equipment to

prevent injury to themselves and others. The next part of the process was aided by the support and guidance of Dale Terbush from the Caro branch of Whitetails Unlimited. Terbush was on hand Thursday to help kick off the program at

The Caro branch of Whitetails Unlimited donated \$3,000 towards the training of instructors and the purchase of equipment. Kingston Community Schools then received a matching grant from the DNR. The money for equipment along with reduced rates from the archery industry, enabled the area school district to purchase bows, arrows, targets, safety nets, bow hanging units and repair kits.

"Originally it was something we were just going to start in the elementary," Walker noted, "but after talking with the DNR, they offered us a matching grant (and) we were able to go district-wide."

As part of the DNR grant guidelines, the archery unit curriculum is taught during the school day in grades three through 12 during physical education classes in the Kingston School District.

Walker explained that the after-school program is an added bonus that the school is offering. He also cited the district's desire to be part of the NASP.

"The reasons we wanted to bring archery to Kingston are because it's safe and fun," he said. Students, including fifth grader Jessica Stoll, agreed.

"It's fun they have a club that I can go to after school," Stoll commented.

Grant paves way for maple syrup curriculum in Sanilac Co. schools

Sanilac County students will get a sweet taste of the maple syrup business — from boiling sap to marketing the finished product, thanks to a \$10,000 grant recently awarded to the Sanilac Intermediate School District (ISD).

Area farmers and the America's Farmers Grow Rural Education group are providing financial support for the project.

ISD officials are integrating a maple syrup lab into the district's math and science curriculum, enabling participating students to produce, package and sell their maple syrup at area farmer's markets throughout the year.

America's Farmers Grow Rural Education, sponsored by the Monsanto Fund, offers farmers the opportunity to nominate a local public school district to compete for a and community involvement. The try.

math and/or science education. More than 1,500 school districts submitted applications. Officials representing the Monsanto Fund say they will invest a combined \$2.3 million through America's Farmers Grow Rural Education grants this year.

'We have always held fondly to the idea that our students should be able to learn by doing," said Robert Sollman, a biotechnology instructor at the Sanilac ISD. "This grant will allow us to continue to teach students in a hands-on way. While many people might think of syrup making as only a springtime activity, it is really the final outcome of a year worth of work."

Nominated school districts across the country submitted grant applications in the spring. During the summer, a panel of educators from ineligible districts reviewed and evaluated applications based on merit, need

grant of up to \$25,000 to enhance strongest submissions were then sent to the America's Farmers Grow Rural Education Advisory Council — comprised of farmer-leaders with an interest in agriculture and education — which selected the winning applications from the pool of final-

"A record number of America's farmers stepped up this year to improve math and science education in farming communities across the country," said Deborah Patterson, Monsanto Fund president. Home explosion claims resident

Investigators are continuing their probe into an early morning house explosion over the weekend that claimed the life of one person in Tuscola County's Columbia Township.

Tuscola County Undersheriff Glen Skrent reported the Unionville Fire Department was dispatched to a home on Rick Road at about 12:41 a.m.

The Akron and Elmwood Township-Gagetown fire departments and ACW Ambulance personnel also responded, according to Skrent, who said one person had been inside the house at the time of the explosion and was later found deceased

"The state fire marshal was called in to investigate, and preliminary reports point to a gas leak that caused the explosion," Skrent added.

An autopsy was scheduled to be performed Tuesday to confirm the identity and cause of death of the victim, whose name was withheld pending completion of the investigation.

Blaze levels vacant home near cemetery

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

Oh deer! Collision risk high in the fall

Scanning road shoulders for movement and glowing eyes, especially at dawn and dusk, is a normal part of driving in Michigan this time of year.

With a deer herd estimated at some 1.7 million in this state, it should be.

Actually, car-deer collisions are a year-round problem in Michigan, but the fall brings mating season for whitetails, not to mention thousands of hunters combing woods and fields to bag some venison.

According to the Insurance Institute of Michigan and the Michigan Deer Crash Coalition, there were 48,918 reported car-deer crashes in the state in *2012*.

More than half of those accidents occurred in southern Lower Michigan, including the Thumb, where Huron County was among the five counties with the most car-deer crashes (1,082, down by 1,114 in 2011). Sanilac County, meanwhile, reported 999 accidents last year, down from 1,128 in 2011, and Tuscola County, 903 crashes, down from 920 the year before.

Car-deer accidents are at least a \$130 million-ayear problem here. The average collision causes an estimated \$2,100 in damage, usually to the front end, leaving the vehicle undriveable.

Car-deer crashes are not only costly, they can also be deadly. Last year, 8 people were killed in collisions with deer. Another 1,329 were injured.

The most serious accidents occur when motorists swerve to avoid a deer and hit another vehicle or a fixed object such as a tree, according to experts, who say that if a crash is unavoidable, motorists should brake firmly, stay in their lane, hold onto the steering wheel and bring their vehicle to a controlled stop.

Pull off the road, turn on your emergency flashers and watch out for oncoming traffic. Don't attempt to remove the deer unless you are convinced it's dead (an injured deer's antlers and/or sharp hooves can easily injure or kill a person). Report the crash to the nearest police agency and your insurance agent.

Here are some other common-sense tips for motorists:

*Stay aware, alert and sober.

*Remember that car-deer crashes occur throughout the year, but be especially alert in the spring and fall and at dusk and dawn.

*Pay attention to deer crossing signs, which are placed at known deer-crossing areas to alert you to the possible presence of deer.

"Keep in mind that deer are herd animals and frequently travel in single file. If you see one whitetail cross the road, chances are good there will be more.

*Always wear a seatbelt — it's not only the law, but also your best defense against injury in any roadway crash.

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
