Archery in Schools

Kingston School officials launch national after-school program for district's students

It's not uncommon to hear excited voices coming from an elementary school cafeteria or gymnasium on just about any weekday. It's also not uncommon for schools to offer after-school programs to enrich the educational experience for its students.

What was unique about the activity taking place after school Thursday in the Kingston Elementary School cafeteria was the type of program engaging the attention of the rotating groups of participating students.

The Kingston Community Schools recently implemented the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP). Some 160 Kingston students in grades kindergarten through sixth were introduced to the program Thursday.

Archery in the Schools promotes student education and participation in target archery.

"We want to provide our students with as many opportunities to learn and grow as possible," explained Kingston Elementary Principal Lane Walker.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) implemented the Archery in the Schools Program in 2004. There are currently 500 schools in 78 counties that have adopted the program.

Prior to launching a local archery program, Kingston School officials were required to complete a number of steps, including retaining a teacher on staff who is a certified NASP instructor. Kingston had 10 teachers volunteer to become certified instructors.

According to the Michigan DNR, the instructors must understand how to:

*Set up an archery range and shoot in a safe direc-

tion.

*Utilize waiting, shooting and target lines.

*Adhere to internationally accepted whistle commands.

*Move students safely about the range, and

*Handle, inspect and repair all archery equipment to prevent injury to themselves and others.

The next part of the process was aided by the support and guidance of Dale Terbush from the Caro branch of Whitetails Unlimited. Terbush was on hand Thursday to help kick off the program at Kingston.

The Caro branch of Whitetails Unlimited donated \$3,000 towards the training of instructors and the purchase of equipment. Kingston Community Schools then received a matching grant from the DNR. The money for equipment along with reduced rates from the archery industry, enabled the area school district to purchase bows, arrows, targets, safety nets, bow hanging units and repair kits.

"Originally it was something we were just going to start in the elementary," Walker noted, "but after talking with the DNR, they offered us a matching grant (and) we were able to go district-wide."

As part of the DNR grant guidelines, the archery unit curriculum is taught during the school day in grades three through 12 during physical education classes in the Kingston School District.

Walker explained that the after-school program is an added bonus that the school is offering. He also cited the district's desire to be part of the NASP.

"The reasons we wanted to bring archery to Kingston are because it's safe and fun," he said.

Students, including fifth grader Jessica Stoll, agreed. "It's fun they have a club that I can go to after school," Stoll commented.

Home explosion claims resident

Investigators are continuing their probe into an early morning house explosion over the weekend that claimed the life of one person in Tuscola County's Columbia Township.

Tuscola County Undersheriff Glen Skrent reported the Unionville Fire Department was dispatched to a home on Rick Road at about 12:41 a.m. Sunday.

The Akron and Elmwood Township-Gagetown fire departments and ACW Ambulance personnel also responded, according to Skrent, who said one person had been inside the house at the time of the explosion and was later found deceased.

"The state fire marshal was called in to investigate, and preliminary reports point to a gas leak that caused the explosion," Skrent added.

An autopsy was scheduled to be performed Tuesday to confirm the identity and cause of death of the victim, whose name was withheld pending completion of the investigation.

Blaze levels vacant home near cemetery

Flames leveled a vacant two-story house behind the Elkland Township Cemetery Thursday afternoon.

The Elkland Township Fire Department was dispatched to the scene just east of Cass City at about 4:40 p.m. Fire fighters knocked the blaze down quickly, but curious onlookers didn't make their job an easy one, according to Fire Chief Glenn Guilds, who said a number of

passersby drove into the cemetery, hindering fire trucks making their way to the structure.

"It's just one of those things that can cause trouble. People just have to remember" to steer clear of roads and other areas being used by emergency response personnel, Guilds added. He lauded the Cass City Police Department's assistance at the scene.

Guilds described the blaze as suspicious. "There were no utilities what-

Grant paves way for maple syrup curriculum in Sanilac Co. schools

Sanilac County students will get a sweet taste of the maple syrup business — from boiling sap to marketing the finished product, thanks to a \$10,000 grant recently awarded to the Sanilac Intermediate School District (ISD).

Area farmers and the America's Farmers Grow Rural Education group are providing financial support for the project.

ISD officials are integrating a maple syrup lab into the district's math and science curriculum, enabling participating students to produce, package and sell their maple syrup at area farmer's markets throughout the year.

America's Farmers Grow Rural Education, sponsored by the Monsanto Fund, offers farmers the opportunity to nominate a local public school district to compete for a

grant of up to \$25,000 to enhance math and/or science education. More than 1,500 school districts submitted applications. Officials representing the Monsanto Fund say they will invest a combined \$2.3 million through America's Farmers Grow Rural Education grants this year.

"We have always held fondly to the idea that our students should be able to learn by doing," said Robert Sollman, a biotechnology instructor at the Sanilac ISD. "This grant will allow us to continue to teach students in a hands-on way. While many people might think of syrup making as only a springtime activity, it is really the final outcome of a year worth of work."

Nominated school districts across the country submitted grant applications in the spring. During the summer, a panel of educators from ineligible districts reviewed and evaluated applications based on merit, need and community involvement. The

strongest submissions were then sent to the America's Farmers Grow Rural Education Advisory Council — comprised of farmer-leaders with an interest in agriculture and education — which selected the winning applications from the pool of finalists.

"A record number of America's farmers stepped up this year to improve math and science education in farming communities across the country," said Deborah Patterson, Monsanto Fund president. "By nominating their local school districts to compete for this grant opportunity, these farmers demonstrated their dedication to growing the next generation."

America's Farmers Grow Rural Education was launched nationally in 2012 and has grown to include 1,271 eligible counties in 39 states. Since its inception, the program has invested more than \$4.8 million in rural school districts across the country.

Several charged with felonies

The following people appeared in Tuscola County Circuit Court last week on various criminal charges:

*Colleen Anderson, 43, Akron, was ordered to pay court costs and fines totaling \$325 plus attorneys fees of \$500 following her plea of no contest to a charge of home invasion, third degree, March 31 in Akron Township.

*Brittini F. Barette, 22, Vassar, was sentenced to 270 days in the county jail following her pleas of no contest to home invasion, third degree, and 2 counts of assaulting, resisting or obstructing a police officer June 23 in Caro.

She was also placed on 24 months probation and ordered to complete 200 hours of community service and pay costs and fines totaling \$1,964 plus attorneys fees of \$500. Restitution in the case is to be determined.

*Joseph T. Corning, 20, Flint, was sentenced to 2 to 15 years in prison following his pleas of no contest to

one count of second degree criminal sexual conduct involving personal injury to the victim and the use of force or coercion, and to one count of attempted fourth degree criminal sexual conduct involving a victim at least 13 years of age but under 16 years Feb. 25-27 in Tuscola Township.

He was also ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$248 plus restitution of \$150 and attorneys fees of \$500.

*Sara G. Ayres, 21, Vassar, entered pleas of no contest to charges of lying to a peace officer and attempted lying to a peace officer July 19 in Indianfields Township.

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered and bond was continued at \$10,000. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

*Corey P. Naracon, 35, Marlette, received a one-year delayed sentence following his plea of guilty to possession of a controlled substance (marijuana), subsequent offense, Feb. 7 in Arbela Township.

He was ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$898.

The skating rink building at Deford was burned Saturday afternoon. The fire started while workmen were repairing the roof with hot tar and Elmer Cross, one of the workmen, was quite badly burned. Geo. Bell, the proprietor, occupies residence rooms in the building and succeeded in saving nearly all his furniture, but lost clothing and canned fruit. The loss is estimated at \$2,500, partly insured. Mr. Bell says he will rebuild.

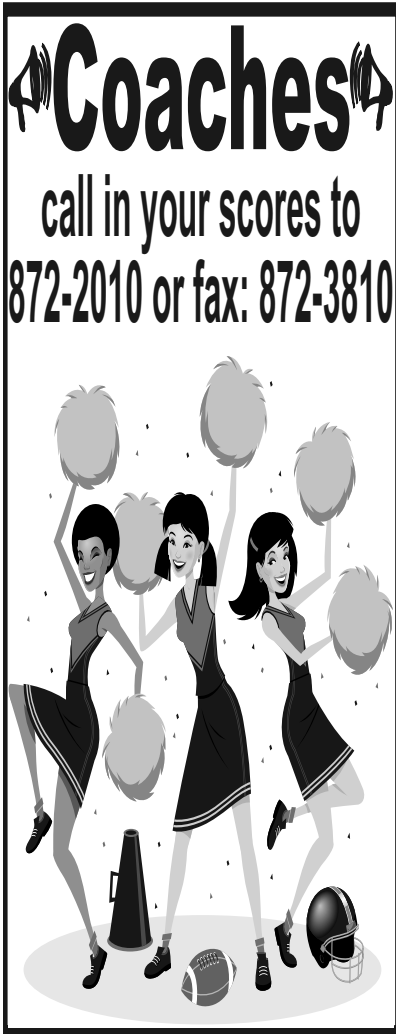

Changes to Michigan’s hunting and fishing license structure

Gov. Rick Snyder recently signed legislation that authorizes important changes to Michigan’s hunting and fishing license structure, simplifying the license options for outdoor enthusiasts – reducing the number of license types by more than 80 percent – and providing vital additional revenue for wildlife and fisheries habitat, conservation, outreach work and law enforcement.

Under the new structure, which takes effect March 1, 2014, anglers will no longer need to choose between restricted and all-species licenses, and hunters will now purchase a new “base” license.

“Effectively managing Michigan’s world-class natural resources and providing a variety of easily accessible outdoor recreation opportunities are key to the quality of life for residents and visitors to our state,” Snyder said. “This legislation makes it easier for hunters and anglers to get the licenses they need, and helps ensure that current and future generations will have the opportunity to explore and enjoy Pure Michigan outdoor recreation.”

House Bill 4668, sponsored by state Rep. Jon Bumstead, is now Public Act 108 of 2013. Highlights of the new law include:

- A reduction in the number of hunting and fishing licenses from more than 200 to just 42; and
- An anticipated \$18.1 million in additional revenue in the first full year of implementation. The Department of

Natural Resources will use these funds to improve fish and wildlife habitat, hire more conservation officers, and provide better outreach and education to hunters and anglers.

“The Snyder administration listened to the concerns of Michigan sportsmen and women, resulting in a license package focused on our priorities and firmly entrenched in accountability and transparency,” said Erin McDonough, executive director of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs. “Hunters, anglers and trappers are the backbone of natural resource management in Michigan. We are proud to support those resources for everybody’s benefit.”

DNR Director Keith Creagh said the new license structure will help keep Michigan’s costs competitive with other Great Lakes states.

“This improvement to Michigan’s hunting and fishing licenses is great news for our customers and for the natural resources we work hard to protect and promote,” said Creagh. “Moving from more than 200 licenses to just over 40 will create a purchase experience that is simpler and much more efficient for residents and visitors.

“Michigan is known for its world-class natural resources. With this revenue and working with our partners, we’ll be able to maintain and improve those resources for current and future generations.”

Under the new structure, hunters – both residents and nonresidents – will purchase a new “base” license. The

license will allow hunters to hunt small game and purchase additional hunting licenses for other species. Funds generated will be used to improve habitat, create hunting opportunities, conduct more outreach with hunters, and bolster law enforcement.

Anglers will no longer need to choose between Restricted and All-Species fishing licenses. All licenses, beginning March 1, 2014, will be All-Species licenses. Revenue generated will be used to improve habitat, increase lake surveys and conduct more outreach with anglers. The new fishing licenses – effective March 1, 2014 – can be found on the DNR website.

A similar license restructuring bill, which governs the restructuring of off-road vehicle permits, was signed in July. That legislation – HB 4669 – became PA 75 of 2013.

These license and pricing options take effect March 1, 2014. Costs and options for the fall and winter 2013 seasons remain unchanged.
