A Sanilac County man charged with hitting a man with his car and then fleeing the scene of the accident in the village of Kingston last September will spend the next year behind bars.

Nicholas J. Barron, 34, Marlette, was sentenced to 365 days in jail during his appearance in Tuscola County Circuit Court last week.

Brown, who previously pleaded no contest to a charge of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor - causing incapacitating injury, was granted permission to participate in the county's worksite/work release programs. In addition to jail time, he was placed on 60 months probation and ordered to pay court costs and fines totaling \$3,198 plus restitution of \$120 and attorneys fees of \$500.

The conviction stems from a traffic accident Sept. 14 in Kingston.

According to witness accounts and reports compiled by the Kingston Police Department and troopers from the Michigan State Police post in Caro, Barron was the driver of a red Grand Prix that struck Randy L. Felix, 46. Kingston, while backing up at an estimated speed of 30 to 35 miles per hour. The impact occurred on Washington Street, south of Curtis Street.

Barron's sentencing last week was based, in part, on his conviction of being an habitual offender. Court records indicate he was previously convicted twice on felony counts of fleeing a police officer - Oct. 22, 1999, and March 15, 2004, both in Tuscola County.

# **Tough enough**

### Cass City native Jeremy Klinkman promoted to ensign in the U.S. Navy, set to head for Guam

Highly motivated and a hard, hard worker.

Those are the first words that came to Cass City High School wrestling Coach Don Markel's mind when asked about former Cass City student and wrestling standout Jeremy Klinkman.

"Jeremy was a very hard worker, and the thing I remember about him most is, I often put him against the other team's toughest competitor, and he never complained," Markel recalled.

"He always performed to the best of his ability," Markel added. "In the long run, by the time he became a senior, he was a much, much better wrestler."

Markel figures the toughness Klinkman learned during his years as a wrestler in Cass City have served him well in adulthood.

It's likely the U.S. Naval officials would agree Klinkman, now 30, is both motivated and hard working, following his promotion from an electrician's mate first class to the rank of ensign.

A 2001 Cass City High School graduate, Klinkman, the son of Fred and Chevenne Klinkman, Cass City, was the focus of attention during his commissioning ceremony, held recently at Rickover Memorial Auditorium, Naval Nuclear Power Training Command, Charleston, S.C.

The military wasn't Klinkman's first career choice.

Following graduation from Cass City High School, he decided to attend Saginaw Valley State University, but he later decided that four more years of school was not the path he wanted to take. After talking to a U.S. Navy recruiter, he was sent to Recruit Training Command in January 2003.

Then-Petty Officer Klinkman completed his basic training before reporting to Charleston, S.C., for training at Naval Nuclear Power Training Command for Nuclear Field "A" School and Nuclear Power School. Klinkman Please turn to page 6.

# Several appear on charges

The following people appeared in fees of \$500. Tuscola County Circuit Court last week on various criminal charges:

\*Shane M. Koval, 24, Lapeer, received a one-year delayed sentence following his plea of guilty to one count of assaulting, resisting or obstructing a police officer Sept. 14 in Vassar Township.

He was ordered to pay court costs and fines totaling \$698 plus attorneys fees of \$500.

\*Joey L. Hutchinson, 32, Caro, pleaded no contest to a charge of breaking and entering a building with intent to commit larceny Sept. 8-10 in Indianfields Township. The defendant was also convicted of being an habitual offender (2 prior felony convictions).

A pre-sentence investigation was ordered in the case, bond was continued at \$20,000 and the defendant was remanded to the custody of the sheriff's department. Sentencing is to be scheduled.

\*Jason M. Curl, 43, Caro, was sentenced to 365 days in the county jail and 12 months probation following his plea of no contest to assault with a dangerous weapon (felonious assault) Oct. 10 in Almer Township. He was also convicted of being an habitual offender (3 or more prior felony convictions).

Curl's jail time was deferred, according to court records, which state he was ordered to pay costs and fines totaling \$698 plus attorneys

Schmotzer, 30, Deford, was sentenced to a mandatory twoyear prison term following his pleas of no contest to charges of receiving and concealing a stolen firearm, possession of a firearm by a felon, and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony Aug. 7-10 in Novesta Township.

then completed follow-on prototype training, resulting in qualification as a nuclear electrical operator, at Moored Training Ship 626, also in Charleston.

In December 2004, he reported to the U.S.S. Pittsburgh, a nuclear powered fast attack submarine homeported in Groton, Conn. While stationed aboard, he served as work center supervisor, electrical division leading petty officer, engineering department training assistant, engineering department 3M assistant, and command fitness leader.

During his stay on the Pittsburgh, Klinkman pursued several additional qualifications, including submarine warfare, electrical operator, shutdown reactor operator, departmental 3M assistant, engineering watch supervisor, and engineering duty petty officer, as well as many other subordinate watches. He completed an "engineered overhaul" at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, a dualmedia discharge, a dual theatre deployment to the South Pacific and Africa Command, a European command deployment, and man at-sea and in-port assessments, exams and upkeeps.

In 2010, Klinkman was selected as the U.S.S Pittsburgh'

Upon reporting, he was assigned to teach Electronic Fundamentals in Nuclear Field "A" School (NFAS) to prospective nuclear electrician's mates and electronic technicians.

After teaching only three classes, he was hand-selected to become a section leading petty officer and NFAS command fitness leader. As an SLPO (section leading petty officer), he was certified as a master training specialist and facilitator for alcohol and drug abuse for managers. After graduating his second class, he took over the role of NNPTC (Naval Nuclear Power Training Command) command fitness leader and completely overhauled physical training for staff and students.

U.S. Naval officials describe Klinkman as being a member of a select group of sailors known as "Mustangs" — officers who have been promoted up from the ranks of Navy enlisted personnel through an in-service procurement program, with no interruptions in their active duty status.

Mustang officers are typically career sailors who wear one or more this month in Newport, R.I., then Navy limited duty officers, chief homeported in Agana, Guam.

students in our various school districts," Volz explained.

"I think people have begun to realize that in our world today, students will need some kind of post-secondary training to help secure careers that will allow them to be successful. It could be a six-month training program, one to two years, or beyond," she added. "LCANs help parents and students navigate the process and identify resources that are available to guide their decision-making process.

Volz said the grant will enable her to attend various training sessions that demonstrate how to identify resources and services in the community that can be utilized.

"It will also provide funding so I can visit other LCANs around the state and learn from their process, and review programs that have been successful," she said. "I will also contact various organizations in the county that would be very invaluable in helping us establish an LCAN. Our group will also be establishing a common agenda for our area identify what our needs are and how we best can meet those needs.

"In other words, what do we need to a post-secondary plan and then are able to initiate that plan," Volz continued. "What tools do they and their parents need to make sure their plan is realistic and achievable?"

# **40 attend Sanctity of Life Memorial Sunday in Caro**
