Foster parents in short supply in Tuscola Co.

Department of Human Services (DHS) officials say people who open their hearts and homes to youngsters in troubled families have a unique opportunity to raise hopes and foster dreams.

Unfortunately, there's a shortage of foster care homes in Tuscola County, an issue local DHS workers face almost on a daily basis.

In spite of what may seem like an overwhelming challenge at times, officials haven't lost hope. In fact, they're working to educate and encourage area adults willing to make a difference by asking them to explore the possibility of becoming a licensed foster caregiver.

"One possible reason for our local shortage may be a lack of understanding over who can qualify to become a foster parent," said Jennifer Shores, Children's Services supervisor for the Tuscola County DHS

"You may be eligible if you are at least 18, have a defined a source of income and can pass a health exam and criminal history check," Shores pointed out. "Not owning a home does not disqualify an applicant, so renters may apply. Singles, married — with or without children — and even empty-nesters may apply."

Foster parents can have some input regarding the age range, gender and behavior patterns of children to be placed in their home, according to Shores, who said fostering can take place in several different ways. "Foster parents can provide long- or short-term care to children, offer emergency placement or even respite care, allowing other foster parents the opportunity for a well-deserved break," she explained.

Most importantly, applicants must express a sincere willingness to provide care for youngsters.

"When children enter foster care, they are scared and unsure of their surroundings," Shores said. "They need caring individuals to welcome them into safe, loving homes and provide them with comfort and reassurance.

"The strides a child can make when welcomed into a loving home are amazing," she added. "Nurturing foster parents are the key to enabling our foster children to grow socially, emotionally and physically. A foster parent can truly change the life of a child by simple acts many take for granted."

The need for foster caregivers might surprise some area residents.

More than 13,000 Michigan children are in foster care at any given time. "Safe, nurturing homes for these children are needed until they can be returned to their families," Shores said. "In some cases, when children cannot be returned to their homes, foster parents are asked to provide permanent

Rutkowski, 47, said in making the announcement. "As an elected official, I understand the signifi-



Over the course of his career, Rutkowski noted he has handled hundreds of legal matters ranging from traffic tickets and misdemeanors to felony criminal sexual conduct and homicide cases. His experience in the courtroom has included more than 90 jury trials.

A judge needs to be proficient in the rules of evidence and court rules, and have a practical understanding of their application, said Rutkowski, who indicated his work as a prosecutor — during years of appearing in probate, district and circuit court-



Board decision fair to all in community

The Cass City Board of Education's recent decision to look into the possibility of placing the future of the former Campbell Elementary School building in the hands of voters was a sound one, in our opinion.

School officials hope to ask residents in the near future to decide if the building should be sold or remain district property.

The decision came after months of debate over what to do with the building, which school officials closed two years ago in a consolidation effort designed to cut costs and take advantage of available space at the newer middle school building. A key consideration was the loss of hundreds of students over the past several years.

Some members of the board have pushed to sell Campbell in an effort to put an end to an annual utility bill of roughly \$20,000 to keep pipes from freezing, etc., and (hopefully) ensure the empty structure isn't left to decay and eventually cost the district an arm and leg to demolish.

Other trustees, meanwhile, have supported keeping the building, saying construction of the new Dairy Farmers of America (DFA) plant in town could boost Cass City's enrollment to the point of needing to re-open Campbell.

Neither side has backed off from its position, and we respect that.

But we also appreciate board Secretary Dave Osentoski's recent suggestion to let citizens make the decision at the polls.

Osentoski pointed out taxpayers' dollars paid for construction of the building in the first place, and the district has since paid for subsequent upgrades utilizing voter-approved bond funds. It makes sense for those who paid for the brick and mortar to decide the building's fate.

Osentoski and his fellow board members also Editor, deserve praise for setting a time limit on the effect of such a vote. Specifically, if district residents were to approve selling Campbell, the "okay" to do just that would remain in effect for, perhaps, two years, which means future school board members' hands would not be tied due to the actions of the current board.

Of course, some folks may say the board is simply "passing the buck", but we believe that would be an unfair criticism, considering the amount of time trustees have invested in the debate.

We're also convinced that school Supt. Jeff Hartel was spot on when he recently commented that, while board members sometimes disagree, they all share a common goal of doing what's best for the residents of this school district.

And in this case, giving all residents the opportunity to have their say in the matter seems like a fair decision for everyone.



"Smart diapers" aren't the answer





Researchers in Japan have come up with an invention I'm certain will revolutionize parenting: the "smart diaper".

Well, now I've heard just about everything.

According to Shelly Palmer, Fox 5 New York's on-air tech expert, Takao Someya and a team of researchers at the University of Tokyo recently announced that they'd come up with flexible circuits, thinner than a piece of plastic wrap, that could be implanted in the body to monitor body temperature or blood pressure, or implanted on the roof of the mouth to be used as a touch pad for quadriplegics.

"Now they've applied their research to a truly worthwhile problem knowing when a diaper is soiled without having to undress the wearer first," Palmer reported in a recent article.

Okay, this is probably a stupid question, but don't most of us know when a diaper needs changing without the help of high-tech gadgets? It's the sort of thing that makes me wonder how our parents ever man-

The same thought occurred to me when I heard a radio commercial from a gal who evidently has developed a "program" that will teach parents how to deal with youngsters who misbehave and utter phrases such as "I hate you" to mom or dad.

Really? My parents had a program like that, and it was pretty simple; you took responsibility for your actions and when you messed up, you were punished. Showing respect for adults wasn't an option. Period. Occasionally you were even (gasp!) spanked.

As kids, I think we were better off, because we knew what to expect at home and at school (where, by the way, if we got into trouble, we knew it was going to be much worse when we returned home).

I don't ever remember a kid sneaking a gun into school and trying to blow away his classmates back in those days.

Seems to me that society has gone so far out of its way to protect children's "rights" that adults have lost many of theirs when it comes to parenting. Don't get me wrong — there's certainly a line where punishment becomes abuse, and that's not acceptable in any form. But when did we decide that youngsters are far too fragile to face a raised voice, lost privileges or a swat on the backside?

It's no wonder our teachers are expected to balance teaching with substitute parenting in the classroom these days. It's our own fault, you know. Folks have listened to far too many "experts", or worse — simply don't take the responsibility of parenting seriously in the first place.

It's no wonder future generations might need a diaper that tells them it's time for a change.

to those in need," she noted. "There are currently just 22 viable foster homes in Tuscola County through the Department of Human Services. Most of them have several children already placed with them, and there are 108 children in care from Tuscola County.

Among the area's veteran foster parents are Bert and Lin Hilborn, Silverwood, who have been caring for foster children since 1999. Over the past 15 years, the Hilborns have welcomed nearly 60 foster children into their home, some on multiple occasions.

"Growing up at home, we always had other people living with us. What was supposed to be a brief time could end up being several months. So our decision to open up our home to foster children was an easy one," the Hilborns said.

"Sometimes what a family needs is some respite time to get the help they need so they can be reunited with their family," they added. "Our intention is to make a difference in someone's life, to give them another chance.

"We have had a lot of children come into our lives. All of them touched our heart in one way or another. We often hear that their behavior is a learned behavior. So by being in a home where there is less stress, we try to focus on the positive, on the everyday things that come our way and by being consistent. We can make a different even if it just one life that we touch and help get them on the right path" said the Hilborns, who encourage others to consider getting involved.

"Think of what your strengths are and what you have to offer; it could make a difference in a child's life," they said. The Michigan Department of In total, 90 percent of all elevated Community Health (MDCH) recently announced \$850,000 in funding for lead-based paint hazard control, through the Michigan Lead Safe Home Program, available to families to assist in testing and remediating lead risks within homes.

Michigan Lead Safe Home Program has made more than 1,900 homes across the state lead safe and has prevented thousands of children from being lead poisoned.

'Protecting the health of Michigan's children is consistently a top priority for the Michigan Department of Community Health," said James K. Haveman, director of the MDCH. "Childhood lead poisoning is the most common yet preventable pediatric health problem in the United States, and these funds will go a long way to ensure that more Michigan children have safe, leadfree homes."

The presence of lead in decaying

blood lead levels result from lead paint dust and surrounding soil in homes built prior to 1978. Elevated blood lead levels cause irreversible brain damage in children including reduced cognitive ability, neurological damage, endocrine system dis-Since its inception in 1997, the ruption, growth rate reduction, aggressive behavior and hearing impairment. Unborn babies and youth under six years old are at the greatest risk.

> In addition to the medical risks, an analysis by the Economic Policy Institute estimates that every dollar spent on controlling lead hazards returns between \$17 and \$221 in avoided health care costs, lost lifetime earnings and tax revenue, reduced criminal behavior, and other benefits. An estimated 6,786 children under age six across Michigan currently have lead levels above the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention action level.
