Special bond vote set in Ubly to fund tech upgrades for students

Ubly Community School officials will soon ask taxpayers to invest in over-due upgrades that will provide students with the same quality of technology equipment and service enjoyed by their peers in neighboring districts.

Voters will be asked to approve a \$1.3 million bond issue to fund the improvements. Residents will head to the polls during a special election slated for Tuesday, May 6.

According to Ubly Community School Supt. Rocky Aldrich, the proposed tax increase adds up to just over a half-mill this year and would average about .6 of a mill annually over a period of up to 10 years.

For the owner of a home with a market value of \$60,000, the tax translates into an additional \$16 this year, while the owner of a \$90,000 home would pay roughly \$24 more

operating expenses.

Instead, the funding will be used to upgrade the infrastructure — including establishing a secure, dedicated server room — that supports the technology devices used by students and staff members, according to Tony O'Neil, Ubly's tech director.

"Our network infrastructure here is using technology that was put_in here, I believe, 15 years ago. The technology itself was introduced to the market over 20 years ago, so it's quite old," O-Neil said, adding the district's existing network simply can't support all of the computers in use. "We're using current technology on an outdated network. It's beyond slow.'

O'Neil said the devices depending on the network include about 150 iPads, 60 laptop computers, two computer labs (each with 30 computers), another 10 library computers, and the computers utilized by the staff — 50 or so in all.

Building sale in trustees' hands

It appears the Cass City Board of Education will be forced to make a ing the now-empty school building. decision one way or the other on the Campbell Elementary School build-

After months of discussing the future of the building, the school board last month voted unanimously to place the issue in voters' hands.

However, after consulting with the district's law firm, school Supt. Jeff Hartel informed the board Monday night that he's been told a public vote is not an option.

"We can't take the sale (decision) to a formal vote of the community," Hartel reported during the board's regular monthly meeting. against the law to move the responsibility of a fiduciary decision from an elected group to the people who elected them to make this decision.'

However, Hartel indicated school officials could seek community input as part of the decision-making

Board President Craig Bellew agreed to look into the legal opinion proposed sale.

It was board Treasurer Dave to build on to one of the district's Osentoski who suggested a public

vote during the board's regular monthly meeting in February, saying voters — not a seven-member board should have the final say regard-

"They decided to build it, they proposed sale of the former decided to put millage money into it multiple times," said Osentoski, who along with Trustee Janie Meeker have opposed selling Campbell. "If they say sell it, we as a board sell it."

Local school officials earlier in the month met with representatives of the Cass City Village Council and Dairy Farmers of America (DFA), which is in the process of building a \$40 million processing plant in the Cass City Industrial Park. The school board requested the meeting in hopes of determining the likelihood of the DFA project advancing to Phase II construction, resulting in a projected 300 new jobs and, presumably, an increase in local enroll-

"I will say that there was nothing we heard that change my mind, commented board Trustee Alice Zaleski, who has repeatedly voiced her support for selling the former school building.

Zaleski, who cited an annual utility further, but the board hasn't set a tab of roughly \$20,000 to maintain specific date to again address the the former school, suggested in February that it would be far cheaper

Monthly siren testing set to begin April 2 in Tuscola Co.

Thumb area residents are probably wondering if spring is ever going to arrive in earnest this year.

But it will, and when it comes to spring weather in Michigan, the only certainty is uncertainty.

Tuscola County Office of Emergency Management Coordinator Steven Anderson is all too familiar with that reality, which is why he is reminding residents that it's time once again to prepare for the worst Mother

Nature can dish out in the coming weeks. The threat of damaging thunderstorms and tornadoes each summer is behind Michigan Severe Weather Awareness Week, established by the Michigan Committee for Severe Weather Awareness and form Michigan

Gov. Jennifer Granholm. In conjunction with the observation, slated for April 6-12 this year, fire departments throughout Tuscola County will be preparing by testing their tornado sirens on a monthly basis, starting Wednesday, April 2, at 10 a.m. Tornado siren tests will continue on the first Wednesday of each month at

10 a.m. through October. A tornado warning is announced with a two-minute blast. The all-clear



A severe thunderstorm or tornado "watch" is issued whenever conditions exist for severe weather to develop. A warning, indicating that residents should seek shelter immediately, issued when severe weather or a tornado is spotted on radar or when a funnel cloud has been sighted.

Each year, more than 1,000 tornados strike the United States. Since 1950, more than 239 people have been killed due to tornados.

According to the National Weather Service (NWS), there

were two deaths and two injuries in Michigan from severe weather in 2013. The injuries resulted from severe thunderstorm winds. Flooding, severe thunderstorms and tornados were responsible for roughly \$277 million in damages last year, compared to \$210 million in damages in

In 2013, NWS officials said, southeast Michigan had an above average severe weather season, while the rest of the state recorded well below average activity. The state experienced less significant severe weather events in 2013 compared to 2012, but there were more days of severe weather. Even with the sporadic activity, the severe weather in Michigan took a substantial toll on the state.

Last year there were a dozen tornados confirmed in Michigan, just below the average of 15.

Smart choices now worth the memories

While most of us are lamenting the delay of spring following a brutal winter in the Thumb, hundreds of high school seniors are focused on something else: the countdown to their last day of classes, senior proms and graduations.

We can't blame area seniors for being excited. After all, graduation marks the beginning of a new chapter in their lives.

Unfortunately, the not-so-distant past has it. Now. (Please.) taught us that teens who allow celebrations to shroud their judgment can wind up losing everything — even their lives — in a tragic moment, barely before the ink on their diplomas has even dried.

First the good news: a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) study released a year ago revealed that U.S. high school students have shown significant progress over the past two decades in improving some health-risk behaviors.

For example, the national percentage of high school students who had driven a car during the previous 30 days after drinking alcohol fell from 17 in 1997 to 8 percent in 2011 (in Michigan six percent admitted to driving after drinking in *2011*).

And, from 1991 to 2011, the percentage of high school students who never or rarely wore a seatbelt declined nationally from 26 to 8 (in Michigan 5 to 9 percent of teens surveyed in Michigan stated they rarely or never wore a seatbelt in 2011).

Now the bad news: high school students still engage in risky behaviors that can be harmful to their health. The 2011 study found, for instance, that the use of technology among youth has resulted in new risks, specifically, one in three high school students had texted or emailed while driving a car during the past 30 days.

Statistics aside, we all know young people tend to not truly appreciate the potential conse*quences of their actions at times* — *and how long* those consequences may follow them through life. Even if they do, youths have a way of convincing themselves that "it will never happen to me."

But "it" — serious car accidents, sexual assault and other criminal acts committed while under the influence of drugs or alcohol, not to mention traffic crashes involving texting and driving or simply not paying attention — does happen. It happens in large cities and it happens in small towns, like ours.

Which is why we're encouraging young people to take a hard look at the promise the future holds for them, before all of the celebrating begins.

The next few weeks should be full of memories you'll cherish — not regret — for a lifetime.

I do not consider myself an excellent driver. I am good, or maybe just okay – around a B-minus to a C-plus if I were giving out grades. I am not great at maneuvering into tight parking spaces or knowing when it is my turn at a fourway stop. I am unsure of the direction to rotate my steering wheel when parking on a hill. Despite my shortfalls, I do understand roadway etiquette, or the unwritten standards of protocol every license-wielding driver should abide by. Trouble is, lots of them don't.

Speed is an issue when driving. Too much or too little can get you in trouble. The key here is moderation. If you go too fast, you are a danger. Another consideration, Trustee Dan Manwell pointed out, is what it would cost to meet current state and federal codes required to re-open the school, if that became a necessity.

Zaleski and board Secretary Sloane Stimpfel indicated they doubt the DFA plant will boost Cass City's enrollment enough to require reopening Campbell. "We've lost 50 students since the time we decided to close the building," Zaleski said.

The district closed Campbell Elementary two years ago as part of a consolidation effort to cut costs following a multi-year trend of declining enrollment that cost the Cass City District more than 500 kids over the span of a decade. In early 2013, the district began talks with representatives of a group of Thumb dentists who had proposed utilizing the building to house a non-profit Thumb Area Dental Clinic to serve Medicaid patients.

The dental group agreed to a threeyear lease — at a rate of \$500 per month — with an option to purchase the building. The dentists offered \$85,000 to buy the former school

For example, he said, school officials are looking at initiating a "oneto-one" technology program.

"It's a major push in education right now," added O'Neil, who explained the approach involves providing each student with a mobile device used to complete homework assignments, take notes, etc., both in the classroom and at home.
