Sanilac boy pleads guilty in '13 accidental shooting

A Marlette boy charged in the accidental shooting death of a friend during a sleepover last November has pleaded guilty to a charge of careless discharge of a firearm.

The 12-year-old, whose name has not been released due to his age, entered the plea in Sanilac County Circuit Court Juvenile Division. He could face up to two years incarceration if he is sentenced as an adult. Sentencing in the case is scheduled for April 29.

The victim in the shooting was identified as Tyler Dunn, 12, a Marlette Elementary School student. The accident occurred inside a residence in the 4000 block of Howard Street as the suspect was showing Dunn a lever-action rifle, which discharged, according to Sanilac County Sheriff's Department investigators, who said there were no adults home at the time of the shooting. In addition to charging the juvenile, Sanilac County Prosecutor James V. Young has charged the boy's father with possession of a firearm by a felon, a felony punishable by up to five years in prison and/or a fine of up to \$5,000; and contributing to the delinquency of children, a misdemeanor that carries a maximum

penalty of up to 90 days in jail and/or a \$500 fine.

The father is scheduled to stand trial on the charges May 15 in Sanilac County Circuit Court.

"The boys had been left alone for a considerable period of time when the incident happened," Young said. "The lack of adult supervision, the presence of guns, and the failure to take appropriate measures to ensure the guns present in the house were out of reach, contributed to this (death)."

My oldest son occasionally loses money at the casino. My husband also loses cash but in a different way; it jumps from his wallet to the kids' pockets. We lose hockey games and the TV remote. Our batteries lose their charge. We lose socks in the dryer all the time.

Our home is like a black hole for any number of losable items and we're caught in the vortex. I thought we'd dislocated just about everything possible - until last Tuesday, when we entered new territory.

If you're like many folks, chances are good you have expired or unused prescription medicine just taking up space in your medicine cabinet. If so, The Tuscola County Sheriff's Department and Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will be more than happy to take them off your hands this weekend.

For the eighth time in 4 years, the agencies will be accepting old and unused prescriptions Saturday, April 26, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the sheriff's department, located at 420 Court St., Caro.

The collection program is designed to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding homes of potentially dangerous expired and unwanted prescription drugs. Residents are encouraged to drop off pills (must be removed if stored in blister packs), capsules and powders. Liquids, ointments and salves cannot be accepted.

Unwanted drugs can also be dropped off at the

Wildfire risk is no joke in the spring

With all the precipitation Thumb area residents have been shoveling in recent months, following by milder temperatures and still more wet stuff — this time in the form of rain — accidentally igniting a wildfire may be the last thing on your mind.

Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) officials, however, are reminding everyone that the risk of an outdoor fire getting away from you is no joke, especially in the spring.

In fact, fire fighters from numerous departments, including the Michigan DNR, have already been responding to multiple wildfires in the Lower Peninsula, prompting the DNR to urge the public to keep prevention

and safety in mind as they begin tackling spring cleanup chores on their property.

"Fire season is underway in the Lower Peninsula and will be coming to the Upper Peninsula soon," said Paul Kollmeyer, resource protection manager within the DNR's Forest Resources Division. "Where outdoor burning is permitted, we are reminding residents to stay informed of current conditions before they head out to burn their yard debris.

"The time frame between snow melting and green-up is

dangerous because brown grass, leaves and dead tree limbs from winter are dry, brittle and highly flammable," Kollmeyer explained, noting the unsafe burning of leaves, brush and other debris is a main cause of wildfires in Michigan.

Residents are required to get a burn permit prior to burning brush and debris in Michigan. You can obtain a free burn permit by visiting www.michigan.gov/burnpermit or by calling (866) 922-2876.

The DNR reminds people to do the following prior to Dear editor, burning yard debris:

*Obtain a burn permit,

*Choose a day that is cool and damp with little wind, *Burn in small mounds placed in areas that are clear of vegetation,

**Keep water close by*,

*Supervise fires at all times, and

*Always extinguish flames, coals and embers properly. Remember, embers can stay hot for days.

To help the public stay aware of current fire-danger levels this wildfire season, the DNR, in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service and the Michigan Department of Transportation, has constructed new, digitized Smokey Editor, the Bear signs in high-traffic areas.

If you're not sure conditions are suitable for outdoor burning, put the task on hold for a few days. Taking a *chance could result in fines, costly restitution and other* penalties should a fire get away from you

anything but his legs and head. He has been confined to a wheelchair and hospital bed since the injury. Mentally he is fine, totally aware and awake, but he has very limited motor movement and requires care 24 hours a day.

The need is for reliable transportation for John. We now have a 1993 Ford 150 raised roof van that was purchased for him by a businessman from Bridgeport, Michigan years ago when it was already 10 years old. It has a wheelchair lift which was transferred from our 1984 GMC

lift for the 1984 van until 1998. Before that, I lifted John in and out of his wheelchair and the van. John is 6' 4" and weighs 185 pounds and is difficult to move.

The 1993 Ford van is no longer reliable and is in constant repair besides rusting out. It has no working air conditioning and has limited

250,000 miles on it. I had no safely from the many trips we take. John likes to go and needs to get out and go. Knowing that we could be left on the side of the road with someone in a wheelchair is very discomforting.
