



Reporter's notebook

I still haven't figured out what possessed me a few weeks ago when Tyler Perry asked if I would be willing to portray one of the community's past citizens - Frederick Klump, founder of the Cass City Chronicle — in this year's Elkland Cemetery Walk Tours, which will take place in the fall.

Let's see. I detest public speaking and I tend to avoid anything related to funerals, including cemeteries.

So, naturally, I told Perry, "Sure. Why not? Sounds like fun."

In my defense, Tyler has a way when it comes to soliciting a "yes" out of a prospective volunteer. I couldn't say if that's because he's simply a very personable young man, or because he's as honest as the day is long, or the fact that he leads by example. But it's a talent.

Anyway, if you're not familiar with the cemetery walk, Tyler and Rawson Memorial District Library Director Kate Van Auken spearheaded the project last year.

The tours guided roughly 100 participants during two separate walks at the local cemetery, where they had the opportunity to "meet" 10 of Cass City's notable former citizens. Each character was portrayed by local actors who shared interesting facts about "their" lives in the com-

Something else Janssen likes doing is traveling. She previously held an internship in the Maryland/D.C. area, and has also visited Texas and will soon travel to



cent annually since the 2005-06 school year — school officials should probably be projecting a loss of 40 more students this year, Hartel said. However, he added, "This (year) is the first time we have had more kindergarten students entering than we have seniors leaving."

A reduction of 40 students would cost the district \$283,000 in state revenue, while a 30-student decline would translate into \$212,280 less in

The district's enrollment has fallen from nearly 1,500 students in 2005-06 to an estimated current enrollment of 1,058 students this year.

Aside from enrollment, Hartel noted, significant cost increases in the coming year include a negotiated step increase and 1.5-percent pay hike for teachers that adds up to \$126,000 in 2014-15. Hartel told the board he has approached the teachers union with a request that they consider accepting a pay freeze in the coming year.

Hartel also cited an increase in the health insurance cap (\$35,000), the loss of \$60,000 in additional state funding allocated to offset soaring health insurance rates before they were capped, and repairs to a backflow regulator, a problem that resulted in significant flooding at the junior-senior high building this year (\$10,000).

Hartel proposed a list of possible cuts/projected revenue increases that would offset the anticipated \$460,000 deficit.

They include laying off three teaching positions (\$180,000), a proposed state foundation increase of \$111 per student (\$115,218), eliminating the Title I position now held by Nick Moyer (\$65,000), elimination of textbook purchases in the new budget (\$20,000), a reduction in the state retirement fund contribution (\$10,000), and across-the-board cuts in technology expenses (\$5,000).

Under the proposed scenario, Hartel would take on the duties of Title I director, while one of the administrative positions would include AD duties along with those of assistant principal and transportation director.

General fund expenditures in the Cass City Schools' 2013-14 budget are estimated at \$9.56 million, nearly \$3 million less than in the 2005-06 school year. Likewise, revenues have decreased significantly since 2005-06, from \$11.2 million to \$9.6

million this year.

to maintain a fund balance equal to seven to 10 percent of the budget. This year's balance is projected at nearly \$980,000, or about 10.3 percent of the general fund budget.

Board members agreed to schedule a special meeting before conducting its next regular meeting at the end of June to adopt the 2014-15 spending plan, which according to state law must be in place by July 1.

*Acknowledged and agreed to send letters of appreciation for three financial contributions to the district, including what has become an annual donation of half the cost of employing a full-time school nurse, courtesy of Hills and Dales General Hospital in Cass City.

*Endorsed one of three proposals to hike gate prices for athletic events. Cass City Athletic Director Don Market explained the athletic directors in Tuscola County are discussing the possibility of increasing admission in one of the following ways: raise varsity and junior high prices by \$1; raising junior high admission only by \$1; or raising varsity prices only by \$1.

The local board endorsed raising both admission prices.

*Noted the terms of three board members — Dave Osentoski, Sloane Stimpfel and Alice Zaleski — are expiring. The seats will be filled in the Tuesday, Nov. 4, election, with anyone interested in seeking a term required to file the necessary paperwork, including nominating petitions, by Tuesday, July 22.

able value is, the rate of taxes will not increase," she said, adding that if land values go down, there will be less tax revenue, and if values increased, there will be a corresponding increase in revenue.

Cass City's real property values decreased this year by \$246,139, resulting in an \$11,785 decrease in 2014 tax revenues. However, personal property values rose by \$3,896,850, resulting in a \$21,145 increase in tax revenue this year. This means the gains in personal property tax offset the losses in real property tax, and the village saw a gain in taxable value of about \$3,65

Village officials anticipate an overall net gain of \$9,359 in tax revenues compared to last year, thanks to additions in new investments in personal


