> Last week's official count was almost identical to the numbers Hartel reported during the Cass City Board of Education's Sept. 22 monthly meeting, when the enrollment totaled 1,059 kids, with 570 students in the elementary grades and 489 at the junior-senior high school. The figure included 99 Schools of Choice students.

> School officials anticipated a loss of 20 students when the adopted their 2014-15 budget July 1, which translates into roughly \$145,000 in state revenue. The loss of five students would equal about \$36.250.

## Oh deer! Motorists reminded to be alert

The arrival of October in the Thumb brings cool weather, the smell of burning leaves, pumpkins and an amazing display of color in the trees.

October also marks the first of the two most dangerous months of the year for car-deer collisions, which account for one out of every five traffic accidents in Michigan.

More than half of all car-deer accidents occur in southern lower Michigan. Last year there were 49,205 cardeer crashes in the state, up from 48,918 in 2012.

Oakland County recorded the highest number of accidents – 1,801 – but Sanilac County was among the 10 Michigan counties with the most car-deer crashes -1,071(up from 999 in 2012). The number of crashes totaled 874 in Tuscola County (down from 903 in 2012) and 967 in Huron County (down from 1,082 in 2012).

*In 2013, a dozen motorists were killed and another 1,200* were injured in collisions with deer in Michigan.

In addition, car-deer accidents are at least a \$130 million problem in this state. The average collision causes roughly \$2,100 in damage, usually to the front end, often leaving the vehicle undriveable.

Experts say most of the injuries and deaths occur when motorists veer to avoid deer. When a deer crash is unavoidable, it is important to have your hands on the in translation. steering wheel, slow down and stay in your own lane.

Michigan has a 1.75 million-strong deer herd. The animals frequently travel in groups, so if you see one crossing the road, chances are good there are others nearby.

And while deer are often seen calmly feeding near highways, when they panic they can appear in front of your windshield in no time at all, which is why drivers must be prepared by keeping an eye out for movement along roadways, and by slowing down if they see a deer cross the road – in case they attempt to double back after they have moved out of a traffic lane.

Keep in mind that hunting seasons and the mating season have the deer herd on the move in the fall, making an encounter on the road more likely.

However, safety experts say motorists can minimize their risk for car-deer accidents. Their recommendations include wearing a seatbelt, keeping your eyes on the road and not relying on gimmicks, flashing high-beam headlights and honking your horn in an effort to deter deer. Another key is the time of day—while car-deer crashes are a problem throughout the year, 80 percent of the accidents occur at dawn or dusk on two-lane roads, so it's important to be especially alert at those times.

## How can Medicare and hospitals justify dollars?

Dear editor,

RE: Hospitals, Medicare and insurance.

Recently my husband had a heart catheterization at a hospital in the Bay City-Saginaw area. Our appointment time was 12:30 p.m., and we were on our way home at 7:30 p.m.

Then the bill came from the hospital – almost enough to cause a heart attack! Then the explanation of benefits arrived. The hospital bill was \$41,435.45. Medicare sets the prices for participating hospitals they said \$9,472.16, and we had already met our deductible for 2014. Medicare paid \$7,868.70 and our secondary insurance paid \$1,603.46, a grand total of \$9,472.16.

The hospital bill (adds up to) \$5,919.35 an hour. How can they justify that? On the other hand, paying only \$9,472.16 - how can a hospital stay in business? Both cases are absolutely absurd!

Plus, when we arrived, we were told they could not take Dick for at least an hour. It was longer than that. If I bought a new top-of-the-line washer and dryer for

\$1,200 and paid \$276 (23 percent), do you think the store would consider it paid in full? Absolutely not. So the worry about Medicare going broke is a big joke. More likely is hospitals will shut down. Then what? Also, for the record, Medicare cut their prices for 2014 by 20 percent. Go figure.

While the Cass City community is in the midst of its annual Pinktober celebration to raise money for the American Cancer Society (ACS), state officials are also doing their part to shine the spotlight on breast cancer.

First Lady Sue Snyder, a cancer survivor herself, along with Michigan Secretary of State Ruth Johnson and the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) are partnering to raise awareness of the importance of breast cancer screening and gathered Friday in Lansing to launch a "pink ribbon" license plate. The new plate is available now at Michigan Secretary of State offices.

A portion of the proceeds from license plate sales will go toward MDCH's breast cancer screening services program to help ensure that eligible women in underserved populations have access to this important, and possibly life-saving, health resource. In 2013, more than 29,000 Michigan women received breast cancer screening services through this program.

For the first time in six years, more Michigan communities report that they are better able to meet their fiscal needs this year than those who say they are less able to do so, according to a recent University of Michigan sur-

The survey, conducted April 8 through Oct. 10, 2014, polled top elected and appointed officials in the state's 1,856 units of government and found that 2014 marked a tipping point for them, with 36 percent better able to meet financial needs and 24 percent less able to do so. "Local government fiscal health was in a tailspin at the end of the Great Recession and it got even worse in 2010," said Thomas Ivacko, CLOSUP administrator and program manager. "But in 2011, the trend of gradual fiscal improvement began and has continued for a fourth year now.

Still, many communities continue to struggle with shrunken property tax revenue, cuts in state and federal aid and a rise in tax delinquencies and home foreclosures. The 24 percent of jurisdictions in financial decline represents 443 struggling local governments across the

## **DNR** reminds residents that wood permits still available

With winter quickly approaching, the Department of Natural Resources reminds residents that fuelwood permits are available for the 2014 season, which runs through Dec. 31.

"Days are getting shorter and as much as we don't want to think about it, it's time to start preparing for winter," said Bill O'Neill, chief of the DNR's Forest Resources Division. "Burning wood is an economical way for folks to heat their homes, cabins and hunting camps if they're willing to put in some work collecting firewood."

Mail-in order forms are available online at the DNR's website, www.michigan.gov/fuelwood.

Permits cost \$20 and are for use on designated state forest land in the northern two-thirds of the state and allow for collection of up to five standard cords of wood per household. Fuelwood collected with a permit can be used for personal use only and cannot be resold or traded. The permits are good for 90 days, but all permits will expire Dec. 31, 2014.

In response to residents' heating energy needs this past winter, the DNR conducted early permit sales -more than a month before the traditional starting date of April 1. Because of the unique winter, the DNR is allowing those who purchased an emergency permit to purchase another regular permit in the same calendar year.

Through the successful program, which has been in effect for decades, between 2,500 and 3,500 permits are issued each year.



## Reporter's notebook



This lady's outlook on life impressive

I didn't expect to have the opportunity to talk to Joyce Polega directly when I was asked to write a story on a fundraiser friends and family are planning for her this month. After all, she's battling a life-threatening disease that's going to require doctors to kill off her immune system in order to save her.

But I did talk to Polega, and I came away from the interview amazed at the Greenleaf Township woman.

When I heard her name, I recalled interviewing Polega and her husband, Harold, early in my career at the Chronicle for a feature story on the produce stand they've owned and operated off Bay City-Forestville Road in northern Sanilac County for many years. They were both friendly and welcoming.

I didn't figure this conversation would be nearly as easy to get through, because these sorts of interviews rarely are.

But Polega surprised me, talking about her diagnosis of Hypoplastic Meylodysplastic Syndrome (MDS) as if it was simply a big bump in the road of life - an inconvenience she's anxious to put behind her. Don't get me wrong, she's very aware of the seriousness of MDS – a condition in which a person's bone marrow is unable to produce its own white blood cells, red blood cells or platelets. However, she isn't about to crawl into a ball and feel sorry for herself.

Far from it. In fact, I suspect the disease had to work hard to get Polega's attention, given the full life she enjoys with her husband and their family – the couple have six grown children and 14 grandchildren. She recalled one of the symptoms was feeling tired, but she figured it was just a natural reality that comes with age.

Polega has since worked through the fatigue and undergone weekly treatments designed to keep her condition stable until she undergoes her bone marrow transplant, a procedure that will result in a hospital stay of three to five weeks followed by a couple of months of close observation.

Polega will miss her family's traditional Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday gatherings this year, but she never mentioned it during our interview. She also didn't talk about anxiety or fear or any of the other emotions you might expect when the best shot for a cure will first eliminate your body's ability to defend itself against even the most common of germs.

Instead, the Thumb native talked about getting on with her life, and how grateful she is for the support of her family and friends during this ordeal.

"I'm ready for a transplant," Polega told me confidently. "I'm looking for a complete 'fix' on this. I'm looking forward to a successful transplant."

Her words were genuine and she acted as if she had all the time in the world to talk to me. Talk about human spirit and determination not to allow some disorder – even a potentially fatal disease — to rule every breath.

Maybe that's the key to beating something like this. Maybe putting everything you have into making the most out of every moment, regardless of the challenges that come your way, is the best defense against something like

If it is, I'll wager Polega will enjoy many more years of a life that she's obviously living well.





## Sanilac Co. Sheriff's Department K-9 sporting a new protective vest

The Sanilac County Sheriff's Department's K-9 officer will be wearing the latest in safety gear, thanks to a gift from a partnership involving an out-of-state charity and a Michigan company.

Sanilac County Sheriff Garry Biniecki recently announced that his department has been awarded a ballistic vest for K-9 Baki by Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., a Massachusetts non-profit organization, along with Armor Express, a Michigan-based manufacturer.

Armor Express of Central Lake, Mich., to Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., has provided 13 law enforcement dogs in seven states with ballistic vests," Biniecki explained. threw a wrench into school financing when they revised the timing involved in how schools are able to calculate their total annual state revenues, which makes up the lion's share of their income. In past years, the state "blended" enrollment counts taken by all public schools twice a year; once during the previous February and again in the fall. However, now the fall student tally is blended with the count conducted the following February.

Under the previous method, schools could begin estimating their revenue for the fiscal year following the fall count. Now, school officials can only guess until the fiscal year is nearly over.

The state's blending formula places the greatest emphasis on the fall count, which is worth 90 percent of the total. The blended enrollment number is multiplied by schools' "foundation allowances" - Cass City, for example, is slated to receive about \$7,250 per student – to determine how much revenue they will receive for the year.

### VITAL VOTE

Hartel said he's now focusing his attention on another vital piece of the Cass City Public Schools' revenue package - the proposed renewal of the district's 18-mill non-homestead tax that will go before voters during the Tuesday, Nov. 4, general election.

Towards that end, Hartel plans to visit local service clubs with an informational program designed to help educate the community on the proposal.

Hartel's biggest concern is that residents may be confused and believe a "yes" vote will mean higher taxes. In fact, the 18-mill levy is a renewal for the next 10 years, 2015 through 2024, that will be assessed only on nonhomestead properties (industrial and commercial along with some agricultural property and second homes). Primary family residences are not affect-

The non-homestead millage is a requirement of Proposal A, the state's school funding structure requiring that the 18 mills on non-homestead property cannot be collected unless it comes before voters in an election.

"We're not asking for a new millage or bond," said Hartel, who pointed out the amount of funding at stake is significant – roughly \$770,000 annually. "If we don't get it, our district's bankrupt in two years," he added.





## Harvest season requires caution on the roadways

With leaves changing and grain ripening, Michigan's rural roadways are soon to see their annual uptick of slow-moving farm traffic, creating potentially hazardous traffic snarls where motorists least expect them.

No matter how slow and bulky it is, farm equipment has as much right to the roadway as passenger vehicles, so it's time for motorists to take caution and exercise patience and restraint.

Tractors, combines and trucks towing wagons move dramatically slower than the average vehicle. A car going 55 mph can take 300 feet of breaking distance—that's a football field—to avoid rear-ending farm equipment traveling 15 mph. That means only about five seconds to close the gap, according to Craig Anderson, manager of Michigan Farm Bureau's Agricultural Labor and Safety Services Department.

"Motorists have to be alert and allow enough room and time to slow down," Anderson said. "Farmers will pull over and allow motorists to pass when they can-when it's safe to do so-but patience is key. Don't expect the farmer to move aside immediately just so you can pass.

Maneuvering farm equipment to the side of the road can be dangerous. Unlike most motorists, farmers are acutely aware of the condition of unpaved shoulders. Soft, wet or steep shoulders can cause some farm vehi-

Farm equipment's visibility is amplified with distinctive slow-moving vehicle (SMV) emblems—the bright orange, reflective triangles trimmed in red. SMV emblems warn motorists that the vehicle they're approaching is only capable of about 25 mph, and should therefore be approached with caution. Use of the emblem is required by law on all "implements of husbandry," including tractors, combines and other farm equipment. ate motor vehicle code.

### **Tips for Motorists**

•Normal traffic laws apply. Don't pass in no-passing zones or within 100 feet of intersections, railroad crossings or bridges.

•Farm equipment makes wide turns; watch for turn signals and hand motions

•Yield to wide, approaching vehicles. Farm equipment is often wider than a normal traffic lane. Approaching motorists should pull off in a safe location to allow it to pass.

•Don't assume the farmer knows you're there. Most are aware of the traffic around them, but their equipment is much louder than conventional vehi-

### **Tips for Farmers**

•Comply with all applicable laws. All farm equipment must bear an SMV emblem. Flashing lights or rotating beacons do not fulfill SMV emblem

•Replace faded SMV emblems and/or reflective material on outboard edges of implements. Add extra reflective material such as truck tape or implement

•Clean dirt from lights and reflectors to help ensure maximum visibility.

•Safety chains are required on all trailers, drawn vehicles and equipment. •Avoid heavy traffic times and bad weather whenever possible.


that engages thousands of youth across the country by conducting the National Science Experiment. The University of Arizona developed the 2014 experiment, Rockets to the Rescue, which will involve students building and launching their own rockets and learning about rocket science and aerospace engineering.

"In order to service the International Space Station with supplies, NASA in conjunction with private space industry companies is developing rockets with significant payload capabilities that can dock with the space station," said Mark Hansen. "We will explore the complexities of space travel and delivery by designing rocket payload sections. Students will also have a chance to meet the Deford Dazzlers 4-H TARC Rocketry Team and see many of the rockets they have designed and built for their competitions."

Registration for the upcoming gathering in Deford is now underway and will continue through Wednesday, Oct. 15. There is room for 40 youth to attend. More information and registration are available by calling (989) 872-3480 or 872-3870.

Hansen said the evening will include drawings for rocket and science kits. 4-H officials say STEM is the wave of the future. Experts credit technological innovation with nearly half of U.S. economic growth over the past 50 years, and nearly all of the 30 fastest-growing occupations in the next decade will require at least some background in STEM.

But, America is falling behind. Today, the United States ranks 27th among developed nations with college students earning science or engineering degrees. Only one percent of fourth graders, two percent of eighth graders and one percent of high school seniors are deemed "advanced" in science. Only 45 percent of U.S. high school graduates in 2011 were ready for college work in math and just 30 percent were ready for science.

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


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

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

## Technicians must now be licensed

Pharmacy technician will be a employee of a pharmacy or business licensed occupation in Michigan folon Senate Bill 92, legislation sponsored by Senator Mike Green (R-Mayville).

"Until now, Michigan was one of employees with access to large quantities of prescription drugs and narcotics to be certified or licensed pharmacy technicians," said Green. "This new law will give Michigan residents the peace of mind knowing that their prescriptions are being handled by a trained and knowledgeable professional under the supervision of a pharmacist."

Pharmacy technicians are responsible for a variety of functions depending on the pharmacy that employs them, including compounding drugs, receiving orders from a pharmacist and assisting in the dispensing process. Under current state law, any days.

with a pharmacy could essentially be lowing Gov. Rick Snyder's signature tasked with this duty without any special training.

SB 92 requires anyone assisting a pharmacist in their duties to be licensed by meeting certain training, only six states that did not require academic or work experience requirements. The legislation was strongly supported by pharmacists and pharmacy technicians.

> "We believe that having a standardized training certification program is a smart move to help improve patient safety in the medication delivery process, and licensure through the state will hold pharmacy technicians to the same level of accountability as the other licensed health care professionals," said Eric Roath of the Michigan Pharmacists Association.

> The measure is now Public Act 285 of 2014 and will take effect in 90
