Marshall Distributing Inc. (MDI), a firm with local roots dating back to the mid-1960s, is now part of the Boise, Idaho-based Western Power Sports Inc. (WPS), which plans to utilize its purchase of the Cass City business to expand its own customer

which stated Marshall Shoemaker agreed to a deal after two weeks of negotiations that will see Marshall's become part of WPS Distributing by the spring of 2015.

The two distributors have been friendly competitors for many years, selling many of the same brands, and the move will serve to further strengthen WPS' position within the power sports industry – the ultimate goal being an even higher level of service and delivery to its dealer net-

"We're excited to continue the long-term relationships the group of fellow enthusiasts at Marshall established throughout the years," Shoemaker said. "Like WPS, Marshall has a long and rich history in the power sports industry, and throughout their many years created lasting relationships with industry leading brands. "Like Marshall, our dealers are not only our customers, but many are like friends and family. I am excited about bringing the two together.'

"The merger of the two companies will benefit our dealer network by providing the same quality service with the added advantage of a broader product line for the dealers to choose from," commented Marshall, who started manufacturing snowmobile windshields 46 years ago, the same year WPS started selling aftermarket snowmobile parts.

The immediate future will be "business as usual" at Marshall's, with its Michigan and New York distribution warehouses continuing to fill daily orders, and inside sales, customer service and tech support staff staying in place at its Michigan headquarters according to Marshall

Ubly among five districts

K-9s come up empty in drug searches at schools

Thumb area schools haven't "gone to the dogs", but specially trained law enforcement canines were given free rein in buildings in five districts Thursday to search for illegal substances.

"In a cooperative effort between our county's school districts and local law enforcement, five schools were searched...by two out-of-county drug dogs. The searches began mid-morning and included Ubly, Lakers, Caseville, North Huron and Harbor Beach schools, with our office present, as well as members of (local) police departments," Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson said.


"Fortunately, no illegal drugs were found," Hanson reported. "However," he added, "the dogs unfortunately 'hit' on approximately six different lockers throughout the five-hour event, which normally is an indication that a scent of an illegal drug was present.

'In a lot of those cases, a scent is on clothes, coats or book bags of a student who has contact with someone, whether friend or family, using illegal drugs. School officials then investigate," the sheriff explained.

"Our office arranged for the out-of-county drug dog assistance to come from the St. Clair County Sheriff's Office and the Shelby Township Police Department," Hanson said. "Their dogs have the ability to pick up scents of marijuana, cocaine, methamphetamine, crack, heroin and ecstasy.'

Hanson reminds parents to always be on the lookout for illegal drug use with their children and to watch for warning signs of suspected drug use.

"(We) always encourage illegal drug tips by calling our office during regular business hours at (989) 269-6500 or Huron Central Dispatch's nonemergency number anytime at (989) 269-6421. Confidential callers can use our TIPS Line of (989) 269-2861. We're also available on Facebook through our Huron County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force Facebook page.

Editor A collision involving a pickup truck and a farm tractor early last week in Sanilac County's Lamotte Township left a Cass City woman injured, according to sheriff's deputies, who arrested the driver of the tractor after

man is an illegal immigrant. The accident occurred Monday afternoon on M-53 (VanDyke Road) near Mushroom Road, according to Lt. Charlene Washkevich, who reported deputies along with Lamotte Fire/Rescue and a Marlette Ambulance crew all responded to the

"Deputies' investigation indicated that a 1998 Dodge pickup truck driven by 60-year-old Constance Osentoski of Cass City was traveling north on Van Dyke Road, following a large tractor hauling a manure tank," Washkevich said. "Osentoski attempted to pass the tractor, at which time the tractor and trailer turned west, causing the two vehicles to collide. The Osentoski vehicle struck the rear tractor tire, causing damage to her vehicle."

Investigators concluded the accident occurred as a result of the tractor's trailer not being properly maintained to ensure the tail lights and turn signals were cleaned off and visible to approaching motorists.

Osentoski was transported to Marlette Regional Hospital with what deputies described as non-life threatening injuries.

The driver of the tractor...Ricardo Sigala-Munoz, who was working for Vanrijn Dairy out of Deford, was not injured and was taken into custody after deputies were advised from U.S. Border Patrol that Sigala-Munoz was an illegal immigrant," Washkevich said. Republicans win races for House, Senate seats

Republicans ruled races for seats representing Thumb residents in Lansing during the Nov. 4 general election.

The winners included newcomer Dr. Edward J. "Ned" Canfield, a 58year-old Sebewaing family physician who defeated Democratic challenger and Ubly native David Jaroch in a race for the 84th District House seat representing Tuscola and Huron counties. Incumbent 84th District State Rep. Terry Brown (D-Pigeon) was forced from the post by term

Canfield, who defeated six other candidates in the August primary election to advance to last week's vote, received 16,617 votes, or about 59 percent of the ballots cast. Jaroch garnered 11,379 votes.

Jaroch, a retired educator who emerged victorious from the primary over challenger Richard Badger, Mavville, has served on both the Ubly Village Council and Huron County Board of Commissioners

Brown squared off against St. Clair's Phil Pavlov for the 25th Senate District last week, but failed in his effort to unseat the Republican incumbent. The tally was 45,376 votes for Pavlov (about 55 percent of the ballot cast) to Brown's 36,143

The 25th Senate District encompasses Huron, Sanilac and St. Clair counties along with Armada Township, Richmond Township, Memphis City and the city of New Baltimore, all in northern Macomb

The Cass City Board of Education and the Cass City Village Council will each welcome a new face following last week's general election, although voters decided only one race – for a council seat.

In the local school district, incumbent trustees Dave Osentoski, currently serving as board treasurer, and Alice Zaleski, board vice president, won reelection to four-year terms, receiving 1,231 votes and 1,177 votes, respectively, while newcomer Stacey Bliss won the third available term, garnering 1,164 votes. Current board Secretary Sloane Stimpfel opted not to seek

In addition, residents approved the district's request for renewal of its 18mill non-homestead tax for the next 10 years, 2015 through 2024, by a vote of 1,259 to 577. The levy is assessed only on non-homestead properties industrial and commercial along with some agricultural property and second

The non-homestead millage is a requirement of Proposal A, the state's school funding structure stipulating that the 18 mills on non-homestead property cannot be collected unless it comes before voters in an election. For the Cass City Schools, the tax adds of up to some \$770,000 in funding annually.

VILLAGE VOTE

In the vote to fill three available four-year terms on the Cass City Village, incumbent Trustee Marilyn Biefer was reelected with 497 votes, followed by newcomers Stephen D. Erickson (372 votes) and the Rev. Mark Karwowski (361 votes) in a close race that saw incumbent Trustee Don Richards garner

Incumbent Trustee Israelson did not seek reelection.



Marshall Distributing, an industry leader in the distribution of aftermarket parts and accessories for motorcycle, snowmobile, ATV and personal watercraft, boasts more than 100,000 part numbers.

The company was established back in 1964 when Marshall and his father, John Marshall, purchased the John Deere farm implement dealership in Cass City. With the popularity of snowmobiling increasing, Roger saw a need for snowmobiling parts and accessories to meet the needs of local riders.

CO poisoning silent and invisible killer

You can't see, smell or taste it, but exposure to carbon monoxide gas can be deadly, and with another winter at our doorsteps, now is the time to take steps to protect you and your family.

Exposure to carbon monoxide is responsible for more poisoning deaths in the United States than anything else. Experts say most poisonings occur between November and February when homes and businesses are being heated by various fuel sources.

Carbon monoxide gas is produced whenever any fuel – wood, charcoal, gasoline, oil, kerosene, propane or natural gas – is burned.

Deadly amounts of carbon monoxide can be the scare factor multiplies. Consider this: Snapchat users produced as a result of defective or poorly vented appliances that use these fuels, including furnaces, fireplaces and woodstoves.

Unintentional poisonings accounted for nearly 5,150 deaths in the country between 1999 and 2010, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) which reports most poisonings occur in the home.

In Michigan, department of health officials say there were 934 cases of intentional carbon monoxide poisoning and 22 deaths in the state in Re: Letter to the editor High efficient furnaces and 2011. Among the cases where the source of exposure was identified, more than 76 percent involved faulty furnaces or water heaters, followed by generators (23 percent) and vehicles (10.3 percent).

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning often mimic the flu, and include headaches, nausea, fatigue, dizziness, shortness of breath, and stinging or burning in the eyes. Prolonged exposure can cause disorientation, convulsions, unconsciousness and, ultimately, death.

The best defense against carbon monoxide- ran up a couple of high Detroit. related health issues is to install an audible carbon monoxide detector, which can also be purchased as a unit that detects both carbon monoxide and smoke and sounds an audible alarm to alert homeowners of danger. Make sure the alarm complies with EN 50291, carries a CE mark, has an end of life indicator and carries an independent certification mark.

Equally important, homeowners are strongly encouraged to make sure all fuel burning appliances are properly installed and maintained. Furnaces should also be cleaned and inspected Administration, It was a long road that took annually by a qualified technician. Finally, venting on furnaces, water heaters and chimneys should be inspected periodically to be sure that animal nests or other debris don't interfere with proper ventilation.

Those who operate lawn equipment, snow blowers and/or generators should never leave them running in an enclosed area such as a garage.

If you suspect there is a carbon monoxide leak in your home, you should evacuate all people and pets immediately, move to fresh area and call 911.

Taking a few precautions now could save lives as well as your home and other belongings. Don't put it off – nothing is more important than ensuring your loved ones are protected against a major health risk in a place where they should feel safe and secure - their home.





Like most folks, I tend to tire of election campaigns quickly because they inevitably result in a bombardment of negative television and radio advertisements.

Now, don't get me wrong; there are a number of area residents who have sought local and state political offices and at the same time made a point to steer clear of that sort of nonsense (a sure way to earn my respect). In other words, they focus on their own qualifications and let the voters decide if the other guy or gal is better qualified.

Anyway, I absolutely fell in love with one political advertisement in which the sponsoring candidate made fun of negative ads using his own name. Let's call him Joe Schmo for the purpose of this column. I'm also changing the script a bit because my memory isn't what it used to

"Joe Schmo is running for a seat in the state Legislature, but Joe Schmo doesn't pick up his own socks. Do we want a candidate who doesn't pick up his own socks representing us in Lansing?" the advertisement asked. "Last week he even forgot to take out the garbage. Joe Schmo doesn't even cut his own grass..."

Sort of tempted me to consider running for office myself. I mean, I usually pick up my socks and nearly always remember to take out the garbage. Some years I even remember my wedding anniversary.

Speaking of politics, candidates seeking votes to serve area residents in Lansing spent a fair share of time this year debating the facts related to Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder's claim that his administration has upped education spending in the state by more than a billion dollars during his first term in office.

In one political commercial aired on radio stations in the Thumb, a well-known Senate candidate in the area defended Snyder's record and chided other candidates along with "special interest groups" for questioning the education funding claim, basically calling their arguments an attempt to mislead citizens via a language he termed "polititian-ese".

Just my opinion, but I think both Republicans and Democrats are guilty of that tactic. I suspect the reality here is that, yes, Snyder has devoted more money to education. But, no, the lion's share of that increase has not gone to what most taxpayers think of when the issue of school funding comes up in conversation: more dollars for books, computers, instruction, supplies, etc.

As far as I'm concerned, K-12 funding has become a sad shell game in which state officials continue to take from Peter to give to Paul, and our kids are losing out.

If legislators really want to make a difference, they'll focus on making some real progress in catching up with K-12 funding cuts from the past (especially per-pupil funding), and they'll put an end to the steady stream of unfunded mandates Lansing is famous (infamous?) for, starting with forcing our educators to prepare for yet another new standardized test that's almost certain to be abandoned before anyone - including those who created the exam – can even begin to understand it.

I know at least one "special interest group" that would appreciate such an effort. I call them teachers.

Michigan students encouraged to apply for ag scholarships

High school seniors and current farmer requests to keep rural youth college students in Michigan who are planning to pursue a career in agriculture are now eligible to apply for a \$1,500 scholarship.

America's Farmers Grow Ag Leaders is now launching in 40 states, with more than \$500,000 worth of scholarships available. Sponsored by the Monsanto Fund, the program provides \$1,500 college scholarships to students pursuing a degree related to agriculture. Starting Nov. 15, high school seniors and college students in Michigan and other eligible states can apply for this opportunity.

"Farmers know the rewards of a career in agriculture, but many of today's youth may not. Luckily, there is an abundance of evidence that agriculture is a smart career choice," said Elizabeth Vancil, Youth and Community Outreach manager at Monsanto.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), nearly 55,000 jobs in agriculture are available every year, with many of the nation's largest land-grant institutions, such as Penn State and Texas A&M University, reporting job placement rates above 90 percent for their ag students.

Kady's return leads EPBP win over Cass City in district championship

Not this year, Cass City.

A terrific season that exceeded expectations came to an end Friday for the Cass City football team as host Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port claimed Division 7 district honors with a one-sided victory.

With the 32-6 whipping, the 11-0 Lakers advance into this week's regional contest against 10-1 Michigan Lutheran Seminary in Pigeon. The Cardinals, despite both teams' records, will be heavily favored. Their only loss was delivered by Ithaca, who is in the midst of the nation's second longest win streak and hasn't lost since Oct was felt early and often in the district 16, 2009.

Cass City, meanwhile, finishes with a 7-4 mark, the school's most victories in a season since 2005.

"Lakers out-played us. They were the better team on Friday night. We had an exciting year," said Cass City Coach Scott Cuthrell.

The Lakers had their way en route to a 20-0 lead at the break and never looked back. Kady opened the scoring with a one-yard plunge and then extended the margin to 14-0 when he busted free and scampered 28 yards to the house.

Two Kady touchdown passes – the first to Seth Bowles and the second to Brady Post - had the Lakers up 26-0 with just over 7 minutes remaining in the third quarter.

Each team would add meaningless scores in the final quarter. Evan Shemka found pay dirt from one yard out for the winners, while Red Hawk Branden Horne prevented the shutout with a short run in the closing seconds.

A balanced Laker attack saw Terrance Dubs runs for 68 yards, while Mauricio Diaz-Reyes chipped in 67 rushing yards. Kady completed 8-of-9 pass attempts for 133 yards.

Cass City's offense had Nick Perry with 65 rushing yards on 12 carries,

while Sawyer Cuthrell was held to 55 yards on 19 carries. A limited air attack had quarterback Mason Erla connect with Parker Haire for the Red Hawks' only completion.

Defensively, Haire and Erla led the way in vain with 8 and 7 tackles, respectively.
