Two injured in one-car crash

Sanilac County Sheriff's deputies are continuing their investigation into a one-vehicle traffic crash that left two people injured Saturday afternoon in Sanilac County's Moore Township.

The accident was reported at about 1 p.m. on Freiberger Road near Urban Road, according to investigators, who said a 2007 Ford Focus driven by a Taylor man was traveling northbound on Freiberger Road

when a deer crossed his path. The driver tried to avoid striking the deer and lost control, causing the car to enter the west ditch and roll over.

Both the driver and his passenger were transported to McKenzie Memorial Hospital, Sandusky, for treatment of their injuries. occupants were wearing seatbelts, according to reports.

Deputies did not release any names. A Sanilac EMS crew and the Moore Township Fire Department assisted officers at the scene.

Police arrest man following assault

Cass City police arrested a local man following a reported assault Friday at Marshall Distributing, 4162 Doerr Rd., Cass City.

According to reports, officers arrested Norman J. Peters, 49, Cass City, on suspicion of assault or assault and battery after Peters allegedly punched Marshall's employee Joseph P. Mooney, 50, of Saginaw, multiple times in the parking lot of the business.

Mooney told police that Peters also assaulted him the day before after work when he (Peters) allegedly followed him as he traveled to Caro. Mooney stated his vehicle was repeatedly rammed by a vehicle allegedly driven by

Tuscola Co. man dies in crash



Tuscola County Sheriff's deputies say an icy roadway contributed to a fatal traffic crash that claimed the life of a county man Thursday morning in Indianfields Township.

Tuscola County Undersheriff Glen Skrent said the crash was reported shortly after 8 a.m. on Gilford Road near Purdy Road.

"Deputies found that a vehicle had been eastbound on Gilford Road, lost control on the icy road, left the roadway and struck a tree," Skrent reported. "The driver, an 85-year-old Fairgrove man, was pronounced dead at a local hospital. The passenger was the driver's son, a 38-year-old Fairgrove man who was slightly injured." Skrent did not release the name of the occupants.

The Caro Police Department, MMR Ambulance Service and the Tuscola County Road Commission assisted deputies at the scene.

Eight-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon wrote a letter to the editor of New York's Sun, and the quick response was printed as an unsigned editorial Sept. 21, 1897. The work of veteran newsman Francis Pharcellus Church has since become history's most reprinted newspaper editorial, appearing in part or whole in dozens of languages in books, movies, and other editorials, and on posters and stamps. We present it again to our readers for their enjoyment.

DEAR EDITOR: I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, 'If you see it in THE SUN it's so.' Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?

VIRGINIA O'HANLON. 115 WEST NINETY-FIFTH STREET."

VIRGINIA, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except [what] they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, VIRGINIA, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no VIRGINIAS. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, VIRGINIA, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood

Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder shared an early Christmas present with state residents last week in the form of news on the unemployment front.

Snyder announced that Michigan's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for November fell fourtenths of a percent to 6.7 percent. The rate is the lowest in the state since April 2006.

With the Michigan Prepares Emergency Plan app, Michiganders can easily import emergency contacts from their phone into their emergency plan, designate meeting places, create an emergency kit for your home, and have quick access to fact sheets and links to more information about common hazards in Michigan. Once the plan is complete, a printable version can be easily emailed to you and your emergency contacts so the entire family can be prepared for an emergency, even when smartphones aren't

A lifetime in 3 years? You bet

I've lived a lifetime in just three years.

Not a very long period of time in the broad picture of life, you say? Well, you're dead wrong, because to an addict, 24 hours can seem like a lifetime. So can a week, a month, or any string of days you can put together as a sober human being.

I touch on this subject here during the holiday season each year because December marks a turning point in my life, when I went from alcoholic to recovering alcoholic.

I took my last drink Dec. 29, 2011.

Contrary to what some believe, I'm willing to talk openly about this issue because I know there are others living in the utterly selfish, hopeless, dark place I left nearly three years ago, and I want them to know that it's never too late to turn their lives around if they're willing to emerge standing from what can be an excruciatingly painful battle, one that you'll never really win until you've drawn your last breath.

Hey, if I really wanted to draw attention to myself, I'm reasonably sure I could come up with a less embarrassing/humiliating subject, especially knowing how some people enjoy judging others while ignoring the little "secrets" in their lives.

Oddly enough, I sometimes find myself having to work hard not to judge others, too. Pretty ironic for a drunk, don't you think? But, yeah, there was a time I figured alcoholics were all a bunch of weak, poor excuses for normal folks like – well, like me.

And then I woke up one day and realized I was one. It was a gradual process, taking years to reach that point, then a few more years to accept just how deep I was in this mess, and a few more years to really get serious about getting better.

I've come to realize a number of things along the way. Addicts are strong people, for example. They have to be because addiction is hard work and exhausting, especially among those who are determined to live a "normal" life – hang onto their families and jobs, stay out of jail, etc., while trying to keep up with an insatiable habit.

I've learned firsthand that recovering addicts are some of the most human people you'll meet, maybe because they've been forced to take a really hard look at how low they've sunk. This is a fight that requires brutal honesty, and frankly, the truth isn't very pretty sometimes.

I'll clue you in on another secret. You can't possibly make an addict or

drunk feel worse than they already feel about themselves. Can't be done. And, no offense, but if you've never been an addict or alcoholic, consider yourself fortunate. Heck, go ahead and look down on those who are. But don't ever presume to understand what it's like to be one.

On the other hand, you could reach out to someone struggling with addiction, and let them know you're there for them. Sure, they'll likely recoil at first, but who knows what a word of encouragement (without a side of judgment) might do in the long run for someone you care about.

In time, they may experience a reality you couldn't convince them of now if your life depended on it: that sobriety will deliver everything their drug of choice promised.

Perhaps most important, I've learned to never underestimate the power of being grateful, not just for everyone and everything in my life, but for each and every day. It's a good feeling, one I hope our readers will be enjoying as they gather with friends and family this holiday season.

Officers issue 1,814 citations during campaign

Officers from more than 150 police departments, sheriff's offices and the Michigan State Police issued 1,814 seatbelt and child restraint citations during the Click It Or Ticket seatbelt enforcement campaign Oct. 27-Nov.

The Michigan State Police released the figures Dec. 11. "Officers from local, county and state agencies conduct seatbelt enforcement zones to remind motorists that seatbelts are your best and primary defense in the event of a crash," said Michael L. Prince, director of the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP). "These efforts are about saving lives and preventing injuries."

For the first time since 2009, seatbelt use in Michigan increased slightly in 2014, from 93 percent to 93.3 per-

During the two-week effort, officers also issued 512 citations for speeding, 319 citations for driving with a suspended license, 258 citations for red-light running and 445 citations to uninsured motorists. Officers arrested 119 fugitives and 142 others for misdemeanors. Of the 180 arrests for drunken driving, 23 had a blood alcohol content (BAC) of 0.17 percent or higher.

According to reports, there were six traffic fatalities Oct. 31-Nov. 1. One of those involved alcohol and two drivers were not wearing seatbelts. There were 13 fatalities during the same period in 2013.

The traffic enforcement effort was paid for with federal traffic safety funds coordinated by OHSP.

Grant-funded seatbelt and drunken driving enforcement is part of Michigan's Strategic Highway Safety Plan signed by Gov. Rick Snyder in February 2013.

Clemens Food Group, a food processing firm based out of Hatfield, Penn., recently announced plans to build a \$255-million pork processing plant in Coldwater, Mich. The plant will process hogs from Michigan and surrounding states into finished pork products and directly employ 810 workers.


"This announcement represents the return of pork processing to Michigan and the beginning of substantial growth in the entire agriculture processing industry," Green said. "It is an exciting day for future."

At located in the state, owned by Thorn committee hearings on the bill, he Apple Valley, was closed in 1998 used a store-bought pound of bacon with a loss of 1,000 jobs. Under PA 22's agriculture provision, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) secured the Clemens project in Michigan over an alternative location in Ohio.

In addition to creating jobs, the plant will allow Michigan's pork producers to have their hogs processed in the state, reducing related transport costs.

"With the completion of the new plant, Michigan hogs will be processed by Michigan workers into products sold to consumers, including bacon, and that is something we can be proud of," said Green. "This development also sends the message to other job creators in the processing industry that Michigan's door is open to business and I believe we will see more projects like this in the
