Sheriff: another \$1,000 donation brightens holiday

Another Christmas season has come and gone, but the generosity of a handful of Huron County residents hasn't subsided.

Few people understand that as keenly as Huron County Sheriff Kelly J. Hanson, whose department was asked by a county resident over the weekend to anonymously distribute a \$1,000 donation to residents in need.

The cash, presented to the sheriff's department Saturday, was the fourth such gift to come across Hanson's desk over the past two weeks. The first came Dec. 18, when a family anonymously donated \$1,000. From there, the

State's road plan in the hands of voters

Falkenberg will do well at Owen-Gage

The new year will bring some new challenges for Terri Falkenberg – recently named the new superintendent at Owen-Gage Schools – but we're confident the district's first-ever female school chief will be more than up to the task.

Falkenberg was the ideal choice to fill former interim Supt. Bob Drury's shoes, and not just because she's benefited from working with the veteran Thumb educator and administrator over the past few years. Drury, who will tell you she's well prepared to lead Owen-Gage, has included her in virtually every aspect of running a school district during his two tenures as the 165-student district's school chief, from mechanical issues to budgeting.

And, Falkenberg knows Owen-Gage – its students, staff, parents and other community members, having considered herself a loyal Bulldog since she joined the district in 1999. During her tenure, she has taught just about every subject in grades five through 12, in addition to creating a new art program for students early on in her

Since 2010, Falkenberg has served as K-12 principal, a role she will now juggle with her duties as superintendent.

You won't find one of Falkenberg's most impressive characteristics on her resume, but residents in the community are certain to find out – if they haven't already — just how passionate she is about providing students with a quality education, and ensuring parents that small school districts aren't necessarily on the endangered list.

A small but dedicated group of residents can take some credit for that, following a unified and successful effort to pass a \$3.1 million bond issue last *year – after two failed votes — to fund numerous* major capital improvement projects and upgrades at Owen-Gage. Without that money, which has paid for roof repairs, new boilers and technology upgrades, school officials would have been forced to close the doors eventually.

Today, Falkenberg can proudly tell residents that Owen-Gage has a healthy fund balance of nearly \$260,000, an amount equal to about 15 percent of the district's general fund budget.

"Things are going very well right now, so I hope to carry that forward," she commented during a recent interview with the Chronicle.

"We have great programs for our students. We have one-on-one computers plus iPads (for our students), so we're very proud of that. And our staff is very aware of what goes on here in the district and they've been a big help in keeping (it) going," she said.

Falkenberg added, "These are the things that are

going to keep us alive and well."

We're confident Falkenberg will play a key role in Owen-Gage's success in the future as well, thanks to her own devotion to the kids, a solid working relationship with the board of education, and a strong desire to do what it takes to maintain a viable school system.

We wish her and the entire Owen-Gage community a Happy New Year!

Credit Card Reject



It was a simple trip to the grocery store. Something I could probably do in my sleep. Pick up a few items, hit the checkout line and bag up the goods. I'd even remembered my coupons. It was a good day.

I didn't even bring my purse because I have a new trendy phone case that has a nearly invisible compartment to hold a driver's license and one credit card. I snapped open the case, feeling smart and sleek and #hipster and handed the checkout lady my plastic. I didn't give it a second thought.

I had no idea my day was about to change.

She swiped the card through the swipey machine. Twice. I hardly noticed because I was thinking about the meatballs I planned to make for supper using extra jumbo pack of ground beef that was on sale and in my cart. The lady with my card frowned and picked up her phone to call someone over to the register. I figured the machine was jammed or some-

A second clerk came and stood by the lady with my card. Together they stared at the computer screen, which I could not see.

Behind me, people were starting to pile up in line. First one man. Then another. Then a young mom with a couple squirming kids.

The second store employee shook her head and said, "We'll have to call the manager."

I was beginning to take notice.

The manager came over and the three store employees stared at the screen, which I still could not see, but was beginning to wish I could. They were frowning. I was trying not to. The people in line had grown to a small crowd inconvenienced by my credit card

After about five infinitely long seconds, the manager spoke up. "Your card's been rejected," she said in a voice loud enough for people as far back as the produce section to hear.

I was perplexed, but this was hugely outweighed by embarrassment at having my card rejected within ear and eyeshot of a standing-room-only grocery store crowd. I wanted to shout, "I have excellent credit. There's been a mistake here!"

Instead, I offered to call the credit card company. I figured I could clear up this pesky little mess in no

The manager, all no-nonsense, escorted me to the courtesy counter where I could make the call. No need to further inconvenience the real shoppers who had legitimate means to pay for their food. I wanted to crawl in a hole or curl up in the fetal position and make myself invisible. Instead, I dialed the 1-800 number and spoke to a chipper lady named Jess in Ohio. I explained my situation and Jess listened politely. Then her perky voice said, "We sent out new

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cards to that account."

'My husband got one," I acknowledged.

"Yours was sent a day after his," she said. "When he activated his new card, yours became invalid."

I looked at my cart full of bagged – albeit unpaid for - food. I asked Jess what she thought I should do and how I should pay for my groceries. After a cheerful and enthusiastic apology about my unfortunate circumstances, which she totally understood, but which she was sadly and regrettably unable to do anything to remedy, she came up with her first (and only) useful suggestion. If I called my husband, he could provide the new secret code numbers from the back of his card and the transaction would be successful and complete.

Thank goodness (thank goodness!) my husband picked up after the second ring. He had his card, gave me the numbers and I was free to take my food to my car. I don't have to tell you I practically ran. And the next time I go to the store, one thing's for certain. I'm bringing cash.

Secretary of State Ruth Johnson and State Treasurer Kevin Clinton recently announced that select motorists are being sent letters stating they are eligible to perform community service in place of paying certain Driver Responsibility fees.

About 168,000 residents meet the criteria for the Driver Responsibility Fee Community Service program. The new law, which was passed in 2014, requires individuals to complete 10 hours of community service for each qualifying Driver Responsibility assessment.

'This new law allows eligible residents to perform a service for their community while easing the burden of paying the fees," Johnson said. "It provides a benefit to the individual and the community."

Under the program, community service is defined as engaging in a useful and productive activity for someone other than a family member without receiving any compensation (money or gifts). Volunteer work at local nonprofits organizations, churches, synagogues, temples, mosques and other places of worship, schools, or city and state agencies can count.

The Driver Responsibility fees that can be erased by community service are for no proof of insurance, no insurance, driving without license/endorsement/vehicle group designator, driving while license is expired and driving while unlicensed or with an invalid license.

Michigan motorists aren't the only ones benefiting from performing community service to reduce penalties. Vassar varsity basketball Coach Chuck Fabbro says Vulcan athletes who commit violations of team rules can have their punishment reduced by doing community unteer work.

A just-released observation survey of Michigan drivers found that 8.4 percent were talking, texting or using a hands-free device.

The survey was conducted by the Wayne State University Transportation Research Group and funded by the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning with federal traffic safety funds.

This is largely unchanged from a survey conducted in 2010 when 8.6 percent of drivers were engaged in the same activities.

"Cell-phone use and other distractions while operating a motor vehicle remain a concern in our state," said Michael L. Prince, director of the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning. "Advances in technology and communication have provided more means for people to connect, however, our focus remains on getting drivers to keep their hands on the wheel and eyes on the road."

Last year, 682 Michigan drivers involved in crashes were using a cell phone in some manner.

The Virginia Tech Transportation Institute found sending and receiving a text takes the driver's eyes from the road for an average of 4.6 seconds. That is the equivalent of driving an entire football field at 55 mph.

Distracted driving is a concern for safety advocates as cell phone use and in-vehicle technology increases. According to the Governors Highway Safety Association, 44 states have adopted anti-texting laws and 14 states have prohibited the use of all hand-held phones for motorists.

Michigan law prohibits a driver from reading, manually typing or sending a text message while driving. Motorists violating this law receive a \$100 fine for the first offense and a \$200 fine for subsequent offenses. In 2013, more than 2,300 drivers were cited under the texting ban.

Teen drivers operating on a Level 1 and Level 2 license are prohibited from using a cell phone. Known as Kelsey's Law, the cell phone ban for younger motorists is named for 17-year-old Kelsey Raffaele. In January 2010, the Sault Ste. Marie teen was killed in a cell phone-related crash.



Kingston gals cruise

Sarah Savage and Jenna Boyl combined for 39 points Monday to lead Kingston past North Branch in the opening game of the Harry C. Moore basketball tournament in Brown City.

The Lady Cardinals' full court pressure resulted in several easy baskets as a short-handed Coach Jay Green squad improved to 6-1 on the year with the lopsided 54-27 triumph. The Broncos, meanwhile, fall to 0-6.

"We were missing 2 players out with injuries," said Green noting the absent of Kali Powell and Michayla McComb. "But we still were able to execute well. The girls passed the ball around and we were able to convert our open looks."

Four different Cardinal players scored buckets in the early going resulting in a quick 8-1 advantage before most fans had time to find their seats in the noon contest. After a North Branch time out did little to slow down the winners, Kingston closed the opening frame with a 5-0 run and took a 13-1 edge into the second quarter.

Bickel's 9 points were tops for North Branch, while Calla McNuty had 7 points.



chased the John Deere farm implement dealership in Cass City. With the popularity of snowmobiling growing at the time, Roger saw a need for snowmobiling parts and accessories to meet the needs of local riders.

In 1968, Marshall Plastic Company was formed, with plastic windshields, tracks, etc., manufactured in a shed behind the existing Marshall Implement Company. A year later, the company issued its first parts catalogue, and in 1973, Marshall's expanded to include motorcycle parts and accessories. The firm continued to expand, opening warehouses in Clifton Park, N.Y., and Sparks, Nev., in 2004 and 2009, respectively.

CAMPBELL ELEMENTARY

Cass City School officials voted to list the former Campbell Elementary School building for sale after several months of debate and discussion over the future of the structure.

The decision came in April after the board had hoped to let voters decide the issue at the polls, but subsequently learned that wasn't a legal option. At the time, it had been more than two years since school officials closed Campbell in a consolidation effort designed to cut expenses following a multi-year trend of declining enrollment that has cost the local district more than 500 students.

In early 2013, the board began talks with representatives of a group of Thumb dentists who had proposed utilizing the building to house a nonprofit regional dental clinic to serve Medicaid patients.

The dentists agreed to a three-year lease and offered to buy the building outright, but negotiations stalled when the board approved, on a split vote, a motion to not sell the former school.

Board members opposed to selling expressed concern for the possible need for more space in the future, especially in light of construction of the new Dairy Farmers of America (DFA) plant in town. However, other board members suggested it's highly unlikely enrollment will increase significantly due to the plant construction. They also noted the district has some existing space that could be used to accommodate additional students.

Today, the building remains for sale, with a portion of the space leased to Thumb Area Psychological Services, which provides services such as counseling, tutoring and applied behavior analysis for autistic children as well as typically devel-

FATAL SHOOTING

The case involving an accidental fatal shooting that claimed the life of a Sanilac County boy in November 2013 came to a conclusion in 2014 with the conviction and sentencing of a father and son.

The victim in the shooting, Tyler Dunn, 11, died during an unsupervised sleepover in Marlette Township, where the juvenile defendant was showing Dunn a leveraction rifle that accidentally discharged. There were no adults in the home at the time.

The 12-year-old defendant was subsequently convicted on a charge of reckless discharge of a firearm and sentenced to a period of intense probation that could continue until he reaches the age of 19. His 57-yearold father, who pleaded guilty to charges of being a felon in possession of a firearm and contributing to the delinquency of a minor, was sentenced to 365 days in jail.

WAR ON DRUGS

Thumb law enforcement officials particularly those in Huron County, scored some victories in their battle to keep heroin traffickers in check over the past 12 months.

Huron County sheriff's deputies arrested a pair of Elkton residents in April following a several-monthlong investigation targeting heroin use and sales. They also seized five grams of the drug, with a street value of \$50 to \$100 per tenth of a gram, along with drug paraphernalia and a vehicle. Both suspects were subsequently convicted and sentenced.

A few months later, the sheriff's department arrested two more suspects following a seven-week investigation, also targeting heroin traf-

ficking. Seized were nearly four standards...are changing so frequent- the opening of Baker College's sculptor, among other professions. dozen packets of suspected heron along with drug paraphernalia, prescription drugs and cash.

Heroin use in the United States jumped a whopping 79 percent from 2007 to 2012, and heroin overdose deaths rose 45 percent between 2006 and 2010. Police and health officials say Michigan is on the same track.

Experts say the increased use and overdoses involving heroin are directly related to the rapid increase in the misuse of opiate prescription drugs such as OxyContin and Vicodin. The steep cost of those drugs is prompting a number of addicts to seek out heroin, a cheaper opiate. Unfortunately, buying heroin on the street comes with a number of risks, starting with the fact that the user doesn't know just how potent a dose he or she is purchasing, or whether the drug has been laced with some form of poison.

NEW PARISH

It was a difficult year for many area residents, as restructuring came to pass among parishes within the Diocese of Saginaw.

The local parish, including the churches of St. Pancratius in Cass City, Holy Family in Sebewaing, St. Agatha in Gagetown and St. Michael in Wilmot, are now known as Our Lady Consolata Parish in accordance with a study conducted by Bishop Joseph Cistone called "Planning Tomorrow's Parishes". The study's goal was to merge 105 parish communities into 56 in an effort to put each individual church to better use.

Officials with the Catholic church said the restructuring was due, in part, to decreasing church attendance, fewer priests and shifting demographics.

As a result, St. Pancratius remains a parish church, with regularly scheduled masses and sacraments for all members of the parish community, while Holy Family is an additional use church, also with regularly scheduled masses and celebrations. St. Agatha and St. Michael, however, became "occasional use" churches, meaning they no longer host regular mass but may be used for weddings, funerals and other events.

ELECTION YEAR

Like the winter of 2013-14, Republicans roared into the general election this year, dominating at the polls for seats representing Thumb residents in Lansing.

In fact, Republicans didn't just hold onto the state House and Senate, they grew their majorities, guaranteeing Michigan Gov. Rick Snyder, won reelection over Democratic challenger Mark Schauer, at least two more years of full GOP control in Lansing.

Closer to home, the winners included Dr. Edward J. "Ned" Canfield, a 58-year-old Sebewaing family physician who defeated Democratic challenger David Jaroch in a race for the 84th District House seat representing Tuscola and Huron counties.

Incumbent 84th District State Rep. Terry Brown (D-Pigeon), forced from the post by term limits, ran unsuccessfully against St. Clair's Phil Pavlov for the 25th Senate District seat.

In the 31st Senate District, which includes Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties, first-term Senator Mike Green (R-Mayville) posted a convincing victory over Democratic challenger Ron Mindykowski.

NEW LEADERSHIP

The year saw a change in leadership at Hills and Dales General Hospital in Cass City, where Jean Anthony was selected to fill a vacancy left by the departure of veteran administrator Mike Falatko, who had been on family/medical leave and was unable to return to his duties as president and CEO.

Anthony has been a fixture at Hills and Dales for close to four decades, beginning her career as a licensed practice nurse (LPN). In the years since, she has earned her license as a registered nurse (RN) as well as a Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing and a Master of Arts and Organizational Management Degree. Anthony previously served as Hills

and Dales' chief operating officer for 14 years.

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
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
