Deputies help nab child porn suspect in California

"She said she had recently been 'friend requested' by an unknown individual and accepted. When she opened the request, child pornogra-phy appeared," Hanson explained.

"Our investigating deputy was able to gather some information from the victim's account, which led him to the suspected sender, who appeared to be a police officer at a police department in the Santa Cruz, Calif., area," Hanson said. "Our deputy then made contact with the suspected officer's agency and learned that the suspected officer was a detective who handles crimes such as child pornography. That agency then enlisted in investigation assistance from the Santa Cruz Sheriff's Office, who teamed up with federal authori-

The investigation then led them to a 31-year-old Santa Cruz man with a **ISD lockdown** history of Internet crimes, who was familiar with the suspected police officer and was also apparently representing himself as the suspected police officer, according to Hanson.

gained for a search warrant, which was served this past Monday (Jan. 5)," the sheriff said. "Property, as well as child pornography were seized and the suspect was immediately arrested and lodged in a Santa Cruz area jail."

The suspect remains lodged on child pornography charges with a \$250,000 bond. Additional federal charges are also being considered.

Hanson cited the incident as an example of the challenges smaller law enforcement agencies can face if they are forced to investigate on-line few details, including the identity of crimes alone.

"Hardly a week will ever go by site where our office doesn't hear of a person being scammed or victimized through the Internet. Locally, all too often our hands are normally tied because of lack of resources or other circumstances beyond our control," he said. "Fortunately in this case, we were in a partnership with large law enforcement agencies who have officers doing nothing other than work-

ing with internet crimes.
"We highly advise against ever opening (email) messages from senders who you don't know, as well as to refrain from ever giving any personal information over the Internet," Hanson added.

Sanilac K-9 receives gift of state-of-the-art protection

Sanilac County Sheriff's Deputy Baki is now sporting the latest in protective gear, thanks to a non-profit organization's gift.

The sheriff's department applied for a K-9 ballistic vest last fall for Baki, the department's K-9 officer.

"The ballistic vest was made possible thanks to a nonprofit organization, Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., a Massachusetts-based organization, and Armor Express, a Michigan-based manufacturer," Sanilac County Sheriff Garry Biniecki said.

An incentive program is offered by Armor Express, Central Lake, to Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., in which for every 15 vests purchased by the charity, the company awards one free vest, Biniecki noted.

Vested Interest in K9s, Inc., is a 501c (3) charity located in East Taunton. Mass., whose mission is to provide bullet and stab protective vests for law enforcement dogs throughout the United States. Each vest costs \$950 and has a five-year warranty.

The non-profit organization was established to assist law enforcement agencies with this potentially lifesaving body armor for their four-legged K-9 officers. Through private and corporate sponsorships, Vested

enforcement dogs with protective vests since its inception in August 2009.

donated to departments in 40 states, including Alaska and Hawaii.

The organization orders the Armor Express vests made in Central Lake exclusively from distributor Regency Supply in Hyannis, Mass, which also does the custom embroidery on the body armor.

New K-9 graduates as well as K-9s with expired vests are eligible to apply for the ballistic vests. The program is open to U.S. employed and certified K-9s that are at least 19 months of age.

Sanilac County Sheriff's Deputy Baki is a two-year-old German Shepherd certified in explosives detection work and also trained in patrol and tracking. K-9 Baki is assigned to Deputy Josh Horst, also of the Sanilac County Sheriff's Department. Horst has been with the department since 2009 and has been a K-9 handler since October 2013.

"K-9 Baki has been a valuable addition to the sheriff's office and, with the receipt of this vest, he will now be better protected in serving our community," Biniecki

graduated from Cass City High School in 1939. Bruce attended Bay City Junior College and Wayne State University with an original ambition of becoming a math teacher, but

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
eventually returned to the family Michigan farm where he raised and managed a Association, member of the District Registered Holstein dairy herd before unofficially retiring in April

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

Dear taxpayers, do these bills bug you?

Reports from the state Capitol late last year were filled with stories of a \$1.9 billion tax hike the previous Legislature wants Michigan taxpayers to impose on themselves come May 5. But hours before that vote it appeared all this state's problems had been solved, because time had been found to introduce the following bill, as described by Michigan Votes.org:

2014 House Bill 6094: Establish official state bug – Introduced by Rep. Phil Cavanagh, D-Redford, on Dec. 18, 2014, to establish that henceforth, as a matter of law and statute, the monarch butterfly, and no other butterfly or bug, shall be the official insect of the great state of Michigan.

We jest, of course. Rep. Cavanaugh would surely and correctly note that legislators are capable of multitasking. Still, the bill provides another opportunity to explore why career politicians so frequently introduce such puffery.

The answer, of course, is to curry favor with certain special interests or segments of the population they believe may be helpful for keeping their current jobs, or finding their next elected or appointed government position.

It's a common Lansing pastime. Other recent examples include:

*In 2014 Rep. Bruce Rendon, R-Lake City, introduced a bill to create an Official State Poem.

*In 2012 then-Senator John Moolenar, R-Midland, introduced a bill to declare that Iosco County was the official "birding capital" of Michigan.

*In 2014 then-Rep. Fred Durhal, D-Detroit, introduced a bill to mandate that the state give a state flag to some survivor of current or former state lawmakers

Alas for term limits and the uncompleted agendas they leave in their wake. As he was heading for the exits last month, Rep. Durhal gave a tearful farewell speech in which he reiterated his desire to see he and his now-former colleagues honored with those funeral flags. This was actually a scaled down effort; his first attempt would have required a state police escort at the funerals of former legislators.

Previous examples of these "Acts of Officialdom" include proposals for an official state song, bird, birdof-peace, amphibian, nickname, cookie, beverage, dialect and fruit. A Senate Resolution recognizing "Talk Like a Pirate Day" was an annual event the past few years, with the sponsor sporting an eye patch on the Senate floor and — you guessed it — talking like a

Some measure of frivolity as they carry on the people's business is only human. And at least "Talk Like a Pirate Day" was purely "notional" and didn't propose putting any new provisions into state statute.

But Michigan lawmakers are among the most highly paid in the country. Every time they propose cluttering the statute books with items that are primarily selfpromoting public relations puff, this should remind voters that politicians are less important to this state's well-being than they would like us to think.

Hiding behind the monogram



They sat indiscriminately on the clearance rack marked down like a thousand percent from their initial price. Hand towels. Not your everyday, ordinary, runof-the-mill hand towels. These happened to be emblazoned with the letter "P" as in the first letter of my last name. I contemplated my good fortune for a millisecond before tossing a pair in my cart.

A couple bucks later, I returned home with monogrammed towels.

Monogrammed towels! I figured I'd finally hit the big time. Never mind they cost like a dollar apiece. It's not every day you find yourself confronted with the possibility of a monogram. A monogram practically sings your name – at least the first letter of it. Monograms are snazzy and jazzy and they look like they were made just for you – or for someone who shares your initials. I hung them in the bathroom and waited for company to

Meanwhile, I took the old, worn and tattered towels that had previously hung in the bathroom and tossed them in the back of a cupboard. No need for friends, family or visiting strangers to witness our tatters.

I took another proud look at my new monograms and the metaphor hit me: People are like towels. (Which I realize is actually a simile, but bear with me here.)

We display our monograms for the world to see and hide the tatters in places where they aren't as likely to be noticed. Whether it's a monogram on a towel, a logo on a purse, a label on the back of jeans or a brand name on the back of a vehicle, we work hard to show only our best side when the world's camera comes in for our

Consider social media. When's the last time someone posted "At a youth sporting event. My kid struck out twice - so far," or, "Report cards came home today. Billy got three D's. At least it's better than last semester." How about, "TV dinners again tonight," or, "Please excuse the lack of beach photos. We can't afford a vacation this year."

Posts like these aren't going to happen because these examples simply aren't monogram material. They're probably all real and all accurate, but they are not our choice for sharing in public because we consider them our tatters. We don't want people to see our worst; we want them to be aware of our monograms. In all honesty, life is messy and flawed. There's just no need for anyone to know about it.

If you visit, and you use my bathroom, you might note

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I have monogrammed towels and you might surmise that I have money to purchase monogrammed towels. From there you might jump to the conclusion that I have an orderly and well-organized household where the laundry is never piled high, no one ever gets angry, homework is done on time every time without any reminders from parents and the towels remain perfectly folded on the rack monogram side out never becoming soiled or tattered.

And if you thought that, you would be wrong. Despite the monograms bought on clearance, I have my share of tatters – and piles of laundry. And it is okay. Even during the best times, life is not meant to be perfect. I've discovered over the years that good can be great and so-so might be the best you're going to get, depending on the day. But even when it's two steps forward, one step back, you are making the effort and that counts for something - whether you are monogrammed, tattered or, like most of us, somewhere in between.

And when you have friends and family who love you, tatters and all, it begins to make sense and you understand there's no need to hide behind a monogram. Not really. Even though I still do sometimes.

But I'm working on it.

During National Stalking Awareness Month, the Michigan State Police is seeking to educate citizens about how to identify stalking and how to report this serious

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, 46 percent of stalking victims experienced at least one unwanted contact per week, and nearly three in four stalking victims know their offender.

Stalking is a crime. In Michigan, stalking is defined as a willful course of conduct involving repeated or continuing harassment of another individual that would cause a reasonable person to feel terrorized, frightened, intimidated, threatened, harassed or molested, and that actually causes the victim to feel terrorized, frightened, intimidated, threatened, harassed or molested.

"Unfortunately, victims of stalking are often afraid to come forward," said Trooper Mark Swales of the Michigan State Police post in Caro. "It is important for victims of stalking to report this crime to law enforcement so we have a better opportunity to protect victims and help prevent future stalking encounters.'

*Actress and Southfield native and U-M grad Selma Blair, whose movie credits include Cruel Intentions, Legally Blond and The Sweetest Thing. *Detroit native, television personality and politician Salvatore Phillip 'Sonny" Bono.

*Model Christie Brinkley, a Monroe native.

*Actor James Caan, who played college football at MSU and was nominated for an Academy Award for his role as Santino "Sonny" Corleone in The Godfather. By the way, the movie's director, Francis Ford Coppola, is originally from Detroit.

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

from Michigan State University in marriage and family therapy. She also has specialized training through the U.S. Department of Defense to work with traumatic brain injury (TBI) and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), is experienced in hospice and medical social work, certified in school social work, and is currently working on her trauma therapy and intervention certifications.

Mroz says she has a passion for working with adolescents, adults, couples, and veterans.

"Providing individualized counseling has long been a passion of mine since my days of counseling with Catholic Family Services. It was (during) my time with Catholic Family Services that I came to see the need and importance of offering a sliding scale for clients," she said, referring to a fee scale that is based on income for clients who do not have insurance or have very high deductibles

"I know that this service will allow us to change lives, families and the community in a positive way," Mroz added.

Another partner at TAPS, Nicole Kohaif, is a school psychologist and board certified behavior analyst (BCBA) who has more than 10 years of experience working with individuals of all ages. She oversees the TAPS' applied behavior analysis team as well as academic tutoring.

Kohaif has bachelor's degrees in social work and psychology, a master's degree in education, an education specialist degree in school psychology, and board certification in applied behavior analysis (ABA). She has worked in schools across the state, at a learning acceleration clinic, psychosocial rehabilitation center, residential care/nursing homes, hospice, an autism clinic and with behavioral/community health services.

"She is passionate about continually learning more and providing the most current and researched-based interventions to those she serves," Mroz said. "As a mother, she knows how critical it is to bring knowledge, heart and energy into the work she does with children and families and she looks forward to serving the community in which she was born and raised.'

Partner Deborah Thomas, meanwhile, is a board certified assistant behavior analyst (BCaBA) with nine years of experience working with children with challenging behaviors. She has extensive experience implementing behavior intervention plans and providing support and training to teams working with children with Autism Spectrum Disorder, according to Mroz, who said her specialties including working with children and families struggling to overcome challenging behaviors, language delays or delayed adaptive skills that adversely affect the child's success at home, school and in the community.

Cass City's Heather Langenburg, a therapist at TAPS, is an experienced clinical social worker who specializes in utilizing therapeutic techniques with youth through play and sand tray therapy.

Owendale area resident Amanda Faist serves TAPS as a tutor and behavior technician. She is currently a social work student at SVSU and plans to graduate with a master's degree in social work in 2017 at MSU.

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Flu update: cases widespread in state, still time to vaccinate

throughout the state, the Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) is reminding residents to protect themselves and their loved ones against the virus by getting vaccinated and taking simple, everyday preventative measures.

"Each flu season is unpredictable and can last until early spring, so it is not too late to benefit from the protection vaccines provide," said Dr. Matthew Davis, chief medical executive of the MDCH. "We must remain vigilant against the virus by getting vaccinated and being attentive to our health. Flu vaccine that provides even partial protection remains the most important step to prevent flu and its complications."

The flu can be serious, and complications are usually more common in voung children, older adults, pregnant women, and people with chronic health conditions.

Pilot program requires abusers on assistance to get treatment

Gov. Rick Snyder recently signed legislation creating a one-year pilot program that would help people on state assistance who are abusing drugs to get the help they need.

House Bill 4118 and Senate Bill 275, sponsored by state Rep. Jeff Farrington and state Sen. Joe Hune, respectively, creates a limited, threecounty pilot for screening and testing for welfare recipients and applicants if there is reason to believe they are abusing drugs.

"We want to remove the barriers that are keeping people from getting good

jobs, supporting their families and living independently," Snyder said. "This pilot program is intended to help ensure recipients get the wrap-around services they need to overcome drug addiction and lead successful lives. We'll then have opportunity to assess effectiveness and outcomes. Under the pilot, three counties in Michigan to be determined will administer a suspicion-based screening and testing program to Family Independence

Michigan Department of Human Services staff to suspect use of a controlled substance, the applicant or recipient must take a substance abuse test. Refusal to take the test results in ineligibility of benefits for six months. If the result of a substance abuse test is positive, the applicant or recipient will be referred to a treatment program. If an individual refuses to partici-

Program recipients suspected of drug use. If the screening prompts the

pate in the program or fails to submit to periodic substance abuse testing required under the program, their assistance will be terminated. Benefits can be restored after a person passes a substance abuse test.

The pilot program must be completed by Sept. 30, 2016. The bills are now Public Acts 394 and 395 of 2014.

Snyder also signed SB 1103, sponsored by state Sen. Randy Richardville, extending the sunset for the Michigan film credit program by seven years to 2021. The bill also revises the rebate amount for state-serviced qualified production and personnel expenditures, but limits incentive funding for highlevel personnel to no more than 30 percent of production's total incentive.

In addition, the incentive now requires one Michigan resident to be hired for every non-resident through Sept. 30, 2017 and 1.5 Michigan residents for every nonresident hired Oct. 1, 2017 until Sept. 30, 2020. The new law also requires that at least 10 percent of funding awarded be for motion pictures, documentaries or television series with a budget of under \$15 million. It is

Snyder also signed two other bills.

HB 5781, sponsored by state Rep. Matt Lori, updates who can administer the oath of office for state representatives and senators to include the secretary of the Michigan Senate and clerk of the Michigan House of Representatives. The bill removes chancellor or chief justice of Michigan's chancery court, which has not existed in Michigan since 1847, when chancery courts were replaced with circuit courts. It is now PA 397.

HB 4890, sponsored by state Rep. Ed McBroom, gives cemetery owners the ability to recover burial rights for abandoned burial plots. Under this bill, cemetery owners can re-sell burial plots if no contact has been made with the cemetery owner for 60 years. Prior to certifying burial rights abandoned, the cemetery must post a written notice of intent and attempt to contact the owner. It is now PA 398.

Snyder also vetoed HB 5380, sponsored by state Rep. Ray Franz, which establishes procedures for naming Michigan delegates and alternates to a federal constitutional convention, in the event that one is called. This bill would give four individual legislative leaders in the House and Senate the authority to appoint two-thirds of the constitutional delegation. In his veto letter, Snyder wrote that because those leaders are not elected by the entire state, this method of choosing delegates does not give all Michiganders an equal voice.
